These three will be presented, on a contribution of 50c, and any of the brethren may use Light 1 and 2 and *Prophecy* along with the three *Vindication* books, on a contribution of a dollar, or place these others with those who already have *Vindication*. What an offer to the people! Special three-book wrappers will be sent with the next Informant, as well as testimony cards presenting this special offer.

When the 50c combination cannot be taken, drop to Riches, on a contribution of 25c; and if a smaller combination is desired, present three booklets, two colored-cover and one self-covered, on contribution of 10c.

This is the midsummer campaign, and is vacation time. Those brethren who are engaged in secular work, why not try to join the Bethel family in having your vacation to embrace "Jehovah's Praise" testimony period, and make this your big period of the year so far for hours in the service? Good news in respect to this special offer of literature: It does not end with the 9th, but is to be continued throughout the entire month of August, only!

The company territory should be covered with Riches by the end of July. Those who have received Riches should be specially called on during August, as they should cer-tainly be anxious to have further Kingdom instruction. Aid everyone in the company and associated therewith to take part in the service at this time.

With God's children there should be nothing in a name to furnish an excuse for the exaltation of men. Some persons appear to gladly seize upon the meaning that may be placed upon a name as an excuse for self-exaltation or for unnecessary criticism of others.

The name "Director", by which this paper has been known for some time, means in the English merely one who transmits information concerning the directing or instructions relative to field service work. In some languages, however, the word when translated appears to have a different meaning. For instance, the name "Director" translated in one language is given the meaning of "Commander, Big boss, or Important one". All such names are displeasing to the Lord and should be avoided. For reasons assigned, this paper hereafter will be designated as informant. That name means merely one who or that which gives information. The purpose of this paper is to give information to the field workers about the work and the manner in which it is to be done, so that all may work harmoniously. When you receive your copy you may expect to find therein up-to-date information given out by the Society organization for the benefit of those who do the publishing work concerning the Kingdom.

When a man desires to be approved of men, the Devil seizes upon that selfish desire to induce such a one to exalt himself and thus cause friction in the Lord's organization. It seems best, therefore, that the following changes should be made in the names or titles of positions held in the organization, to wit: Instead of using the name or title "company director", hereafter that position will be known as "company servant"; instead of using the name "regional service director", hereafter that position will be known as 'regional servant"; instead of "divisional leader", hereafter that position will be known as "divisional servant". Remember the words of the Lord Jesus: 'For one is your Master, even Christ, and whosoever shall exalt himself shall be abased.' (Matt. 23:9-12) All the true followers of Christ Jesus are servants. There is no excuse or justification to exalt one above another. To whatsoever position one in the Lord's organization is assigned, he should serve obediently and joyfully and without murmuring, complaining, or fault-

Where a number of companies are working together, for instance, such as the area of Greater New York or London, the person who takes the lead and transmits the instructions received, instead of being known as "service director", will hereafter be known as "servant of companies", and the servant of the separate companies in this organization will be known as "captain of service".

Hereafter none of the servants in the field will be known as "sharpshooters". That is eliminated, and all such workers are considered as companies or integral parts of companies. If there is just one isolated person in the community, instead of being known as "sharpshooter", he is merely a servant, meaning, of course, servant of the Lord.

Let us see to it that no excuse is furnished for self-exaltation of any creature. We are all brethren in Christ and delight to serve one Master and one God. All at unity in Christ will work exactly in harmony and will be willing and anxious to carry out the information received through the INFORMANT, or other means that proceeds from the proper source.

Heretofore the Society's representative at a branch office has been known as "manager" or "director". Hereafter such representatives will be known as "branch servants", meaning the representative of the Society at a branch office, acting with authority from the main office of the Society and, of course, as servant of the Lord. All branch offices, please be governed accordingly.

New Phonograph

Weighs Only 9¾ Pounds

The use of the phonograph is becoming more pronounced every day. Its use in the field is bringing splendid results and presenting to many of the "great mul to many of the "great multitude" the truths which sweep away the refuge of lies. Do you have one? and are you using it?

The Society has just completed a completed as the control of the

newly designed phonograph, the size of which is $14 \times 13 \times 5$ inches, covered with brown cloth and having rounded corners. Its weight is 9 pounds 13 ounces, and one can carry three discs. With the three discs it weighs 12 pounds 6 ounces. This machine is made very compact, which could be accomplished only by use of a removable tone arm. It is a very simple matter to attach this in its proper position, and it is ready for use inmediately. The volume is just as strong as of the previous model, and its tone is of the best quality. When the machines are sent out from here they are timed properly, at 78 r.p.m. Do not change this.

The phonograph is being placed with the company publishers and auxiliaries with three discs on a contribution of \$10.00. If you already have records and prefer this phonograph it can be had for \$8.00. Special rates are made for pioneers. Order your phonograph now. Keep them busy in your regular door-to-door witnessing, back calls and loaning to parties who will use them extensively. Have in mind that this new phonograph is 51 pounds lighter than our last one.

Riches Studies

In addition to carefully reading Riches, the brethren of all company units will wish to study this publication. There should be available in every unit a study of The Watchtower and the Riches book which all may attend. It is recommended that those companies that have not already done so institute Riches studies even if this necessitates the changing of some of the other book and booklet studies which are now being held.

"Riches" First Week's Placements

Surpasses Any Previous Distribution of Books

Publishers Increased; Hours Dropped

The result of "His Strange Work" testimony period has been waited for with anticipation by the brethren everywhere. Herewith find a comparison between "His Strange Work" testimony period of April this year and the "Anointed's Thanksgiving" period, of April last year. The *Riches* book went splendidly.

The Riches book went splending. It has exceeded any other single bound-book distribution we have ever had by over 35,000. In fact, the increase in Riches placements over its closest competitor, Preparation, was greater than the TOTAL placements for special periods a few years back. We placed 140,491 Riches during that week, to compare with 104,553 Preparation. The figures in this comparison speak for themselves.

Let each one of the anointed and their companions, however, study them very carefully, compare them with their own personal activity and see how the Lord really blessed them by permitting them to have a part in contributing to this splendid increase, and also let each one examine himself and see to what extent he was responsible for the decrease in time spent in the service. Even though there were 611 more publish-

ers in the field during "His Strange Work" period, this year, than there were during "The Anointed's Thanksgiving" period, of April last year, we are 16,521 hours short of last year. In other words, the average number of hours per publisher dropped from 11.3 hours last year to 10.3 hours this year. That drop, on an average of one hour per publisher, meant just 13,500 Riches books. In other words, if we had maintained last year's average, each publisher putting in 11.3 hours, we should have 13,500 more Riches in the hands of the people than were placed. There is much food for serious thought here on the part of each and every one of us.

New Radio Folder

A new radio folder is being prepared advertising the stations throughout the United States now carrying the regular five-minute series by Brother Rutherford. It has been changed considerably, and one point of importance that should be noted by the brethren is the announcement that a special service is carried on by Jehovah's witnesses, namely, the use of the phonograph, by which these lectures can be brought to their home at the time convenient to the person de-siring these lectures. This notice closes with the statement, "Address Watch Tower, 117 Adams St., Brooklyn, N. Y., or Phone," The brethren can stamp on these radio folders their phone number and local address before distributing them in their territory. It might be well to choose the phone number of some individual where there is usually someone at home. Pioneers in isolated territory, if at some rooming house, might obtain permission from the landlord to stamp his phone number, and explain to this party to get the name and address of anyone you might phone. The truth should be made available to all persons, whether we find them at home in our regular door-to-door witnessing or not. Radio folders should always be left at homes when no one is there. Do not, however, leave them in the mail boxes. Slip them under

Spanish Transcription Records

This also applies to the brethren serving under the Brooklyn office but living in Cuba, Costa Rica, Panama, Canal Zone, and Colombia.

Have plenty of ammunition to carry on during the "Jehovah's Praise" testimony period, which is August 1-9. Please bear in mind that orders cannot be filled during vacation period, as no one will be here to answer letters or telegrams. The mail will be given immediate attention on the reopening of the factory on August 10.

Any new territory required should be written for now. Please do not wait until the last minute.

NATIONAL PETITION "JEHOVAH'S Praise"

Listeners Eager for More Broadcasts

Hierarchy Threatens "More Drastic Action"

Humble persons of good will who have listened to Jehovah's Kingdom message as broadcast in speeches of Brother Rutherford frequently write the Society that they want to hear those broadcasts oftener. Three years ago the Roman Catholic press made world-wide announcement of the Hierarchy's decision to "drive Rutherford from the air", as they put it. They tried. They staggered in the attempt. "But the end is not yet."
Hating the truth broadcast throughout the world last February,

in "Separating the Nations", high officials of the Hierarchy at Vatican City and in this country have conspired anew to take "more drastic action" to accomplish their announced purpose. Fresh attempts to coerce owners of radio stations are being launched. The Catholic press renews its campaign of stout protests, insisting that "Judge Rutherford misrepresents the teachings of the Catholic church" and therefore he must be stopped; or "electro-cuted", says one of the Hierarchy's agents. Another of its so-called "fathers", a principal (but unprinci-pled) representative at New York, blandly proposes death for all of Jehovah's witnesses! And now prayers of "the faithful" during the month of August are called for by the head of the Hierarchy, to save us from the infamous Judge Rutherford of the Watch Tower movement.

Reasonable persons, including even many of the "Catholic population", are beginning to see the inconsist-ency of the Hierarchy's position. Catholic leaders are being asked, Why plan murder? Why not openly show the people wherein Judge Ruth-Catholic erford misrepresents the teachings?

At Philadelphia, in June, many of such fair-minded ones signed a petition to WIP, prominent radio station there that had been forced by the Hierarchy to discontinue broadcasting Brother Rutherford's answers to Bible questions, after that station had refused to break its contract to broadcast "Separating the Nations" in February. Now thousands at other places in Pennsylvania and New Jersey are joining in that petition, asking WIP to broadcast a public discussion of the disputed questions, 'one side to be taken by a high Catholic spokesman and the other side by Judge Rutherford.

Honest Catholics, as well as others, are reporting that the demand for such an open discussion is by no means limited to the people of Philadelphia and vicinity. We agree, and also believe that throughout this entire land there are millions who are eager not only to hear those disputed questions reasonably discussed but also to sign a petition

asking that such a debate be arranged and widely broadcast.

In the public interest, therefore, and for the public convenience, petition blanks and introductory cards similar to those now in use at Philadelphia have been printed and are being contributed to all who want to use them.

ORDERLY CO-OPERATION

Any isolated pioneer or other publisher not associated with a company and who desires to assist persons that want to sign the petition will be furnished blanks and cards on request.

Companies are being supplied a sufficient quantity of cards and blanks for immediate use. When more are needed, let us know well in advance.

Let each publisher be provided with a separate container (celluloid) for the special green introductory card. Also provide each one with a substantial cardboard of same size as petition blank (8½ inches by 11 inches). Upon that board two or more petition blanks can be fastened with rubber bands, to keep blanks neat and clean. Cardboard may be folded in half, lengthwise, with blanks inside (length-wise), and thus be carried conven-Carry also a fountain pen or indelible pencil.

At each home or business place, FIRST present the special green card and petition.

That being disposed of, then introduce the literature, using at all times the current presentation. Durative this continuous transfer of the continuous continuous transfer of the cont ing this petition service, instead of using testimony card for literature, we recommend a verbal testimony, formed according to the current tes-timony card, either word for word or including in your own language the points shown in card. (For use wherever desirable, carry with you in a separate celluloid container the literature testimony card, so as to be ready to present that card whenever you see fit.) Let this manner of serving the petition and the lit-erature from now on be carefully considered and clearly understood by each publisher. Note well: Make it a habit to see that each signer of the petition fills in correct address, completely, including city and

NAMES FOR COMPANY'S FILE

As each petition sheet is filled, let name and address of each signer be copied with care on a separate slip or card, suitable for filing, us-ing paper of uniform size for each name. Such copying by typewriter is, of course, preferable. In due time further information will be sent as to use of copied names kept in the company's file.

As the year progresses the comparative reports are of increasing interest to those who have the witness work at heart. You remember that the seven months' comparative report showed we were behind by 71,145 bound books, ahead by 504,224 booklets, ahead by 432,676 pieces of literature, behind by 38 in average number of publishers, and 172,305 hours under the number for the seven months of last year. Notice the great increase in bound books, accounted for by Riches. Booklets have taken a corresponding drop, although they are still ahead a little. However, to keep this lead, and increase it if possible every publisher must remember to the booklets in combination with Riches, and booklets alone when Riches cannot be taken, and get out those pieces of literature at every call possible, which will increase the witness given. The number of pub-lishers is going in the right direc-tion, and this should certainly increase. No doubt there are many in the companies throughout the land who have not previously awakened to their privileges and responsibilities, and these may join in the work Jehovah is doing, and as the publishers increase as they should a greater witness may be given.

And now the total of hours, that very important item, which each one of the Lord's people can affect one way or the other. It is still under last year by \$1,206, but last month it was 172,305 less than a year ago. The brethren who are really in the war now are making an effort to increase their hours, and the trend in hours is in the right direction. Now we have to keep this up and 'let not our hands be slack', if we bring our time in the field ahead of last year and to the quota. There is still a big loss to be made up, and time in the field must have the attention of every company servant and publisher.

The report as a whole is very gratifying, and manifests Jehovah's rich blessing on those who are putting first the interests of his kingdom. With the few remaining months of this year the Lord's little army should, in His strength, accomplish a splendid witness; surpassing the summer work of any previous year; and this can be done by diligent planning and effort on the part of each one to spend time in actual house-to-house witnessing.

Magazines

Are there many people not associated with your company organization reading the Watchtower and Golden Age magazines in your territory? There should be. According to the distribution of Riches, there are hundreds of thousands of persons desirous of having a clearer understanding of God's purposes. Why not have these people in touch with God's organization through one of its publications, The Watchtower or The Golden Age? Mention these magazines particularly on your back calls.

Provide Studies for Jonadabs

Riches Invitation Slips Prepared

The importance of the establishing of studies throughout the territory of the company cannot be overstated. These studies must be so arranged for the convenience of the interested. Those who obtain literature should be invited to attend the nearest Riches study. So as to aid the publisher in doing this work, the Society is printing an invitation slip neatly arranged which the publisher or the one in care of the territory can fill out in advance. There should be written on this slip, neatly with pen or typewriter, the street address, the day and time of the Riches study nearest to the territory you will be working in during the day. A slip is to be left with each placement, or with those very much interested and who have previously obtained literature. A copy of the invitation slip is sent along with the Informant. Please show it to the publishers, and place your order. In lots of 1,000 they can be had at 40c, the same as the radio folders. They should be ordered with other literature and supplies. Be sure that all publishers are furnished with slips with the proper address written thereon for the territory being worked.

At the meeting place there should always be one of the electric signs furnished by the Society, so that the newly interested will know where to attend. Even though they have the address, they will feel more confident in a home where the electric sign is displayed.

Publishers should always be on the alert to find locations for new *Riches* studies. In many instances these are begun by the use of the phonograph. Pioneers should arrange them in their territory, and, before leaving, ask one of those present to carry on the meeting in the same manner that they have been conducted. These groups should be reported to the Society if you believe it possible to organize them for field work.

It seems advisable that each company organization keep a card file of all publishers and persons of good will who have attended one or more meetings, and at various times throughout the year send them one of these invitation slips or a post card asking them to come to these meetings. This should be done periodically if they are not regular attendants of the company studies. We want to aid the great multitude all possible in taking their stand for the Kingdom.

A Respectable Presentation

of the Kingdom Message

The Kingdom message should be presented to the people in a respectable manner, which means, in a manner deserving of regard, and decent in behavior. Let those who are bearing to the people a message of the Devil's organization conduct themselves in a manner befitting the one they serve, if they so desire; but this is not for Jehovah's messengers.

Sincerity and earnestness in presenting the truth to the people is that which accomplishes good results. In carrying *Riches* and other literature from house to house, the most effective witness is given in showing the people that you really believe what you tell them. Those

of good will recognize that the publisher is sincere, and, because of real earnestness and enthusiasm coming from courage and conviction, are impressed; and, more than anything else that the publisher can do, this respectable presentation results in placements of the printed message.

How different this presentation is from a bulldozing method, which is wrong. Why should one become angry with those to whom he witnesses, or tell them they 'have no brains', or make any such remark, which is not respectable or decent behavior? Occasionally someone errs in the manner of presentation. Let all carefully observe the rule and not displease Jehovah or dishonor him.

Riches in Foreign Languages

The Society now has on hand a good supply of *Riches* in Spanish, Italian and Greek, Additionally, we shall shortly have in stock *Riches* in Bohemian, French, German, Hungarian, and Swedish, also *Creation* in Portuguese.

Do You Have the Year Book?

The Society is clearing out its entire stock of the 1936 Year Book of Jchovah's witnesses. These are being offered on a 15c contribution.

With This Informant

There is being sent along with this *Informant* petition blanks, testimony cards for the petition, wrappers for the three bound books, testimony card for the August campaign, sample of invitation slip to *Riches* studies.

Special Testimony Card

Any pioneers or other publishers desiring testimony cards which present four bound books on a contribution of one dollar, for general use, may order the number they need, as we now have a stock of these on hand, a new card having been prepared. These will be sent only on order.

Company Servants' Reports

Company servants formerly known as sharpshooters will continue to use their yellow report cards until new ones are supplied. Instead of heading the yellow report card by using your personal name, use the name of the town or city in which your company is located. Sign your own name on the bottom of the report card in the space generally used for remarks. This change is effective at once. If you will follow these brief instructions we shall be able to properly identify your reports when they come in to this office.

Electric Sign Is Doing Good Work

The one thing the Lord's people must do is to keep the message of the Kingdom before the minds of the people. The Lord's organization is for the sole purpose of advertising the King and the Kingdom. Why not, then, advertise by the use of electric signs? The Society still has a good supply and can fill all orders. The company servant should take up this matter in detail with the brethren. It is necessary that we identify ourselves publicly, so that those of good will who are seeking the truth may know where we are in case we miss them.

Report Cards Must Be Properly Marked for Credit Allowance

During the month of August the brethren throughout the United States will have the privilege of offering the three *Vindication* books on a contribution of 50c. Many of the pioneers and some auxiliaries and company workers will want to offer six bound books on a contribution of a dollar. This may be done by offering Vindication 1, 2 and 3, Light 1 and 2, and Prophecy. In or-der to obtain the proper credit on your account because of the reduction, it is absolutely necessary to mark on the bottom of your report card the number of three-book combinations placed. If you place one six-book combination, that is equal to two three-book combinations and should appear on the report card as follows: "2 combinations of 3 books." Adjustments will be made on auxiliary and company accounts only. The companies will be allowed a credit on their account of 15c for each combination; the auxiliaries, 18c. It is definitely understood by the Society that you do not want any credit on your account if there is no statement of number of combinations placed marked on the bottom of your report card. Credit will be made on all company and auxiliary accounts where a notation of combinations is made. The treasurer, stockkeeper and company servant should make it their business to check the report cards before they are mailed in to the Society. Send in your report card correctly made out. Companies should use storage stock, and when auxiliaries and pioneers in company territory run out of literature they may borrow, and replace with books as they desire later. Please have in mind that if the party does not take the combination offered, then you will drop to the Riches book on a contribution of 25c, or 3 booklets on a contribution of 10c. Credit is not given on single placements; only on combinations. Be sure that the publishers turn in this information to you on their report slips.

The New Phonograph

Greatly Appreciated

A light-weight phonograph is now being manufactured by the Society for the purpose of advancing the Kingdom interests. Those who have seen it and used it are very much enthused over its quality of tone and its lightness in weight. With this use of the phonograph the brethren are able to put in much more time in sound work than before. The orders are extremely heavy. We are making them as fast as possible to fill these. We believe that many more of the brethren will desire one to aid them in their witness work. The big reduction in cost that was made possible by manufacturing in large quantities makes it possible now for many more of the brethren to get the phonograph and use it in the service. It is being offered on a contribution of \$10.00, including three records of your choice. or if you have records now the phonograph can be had for only \$8.00.

There is now in course of preparation a series of signs which the Society hopes to print within the next month. These signs will be changed weekly. As soon as they are prepared notice will be set out in the *Informant*, and they should be ordered by the company servant for all those who have signs. However, the main thing to do in the meantime is to get your sign and put it into use. These signs complete are only \$1.50.

"The campaign from the book "The campaign from the book Riches resulted in the placing of more than 20,000 bound books in the territory under the supervision of the Australian branch, during 'His Strange Work' testimony period. This has exceeded by far the previous bost bound book experiors. previous best bound-book campaign, when 12,238 *Jehovah* were placed in nine days. From all quarters reports show great enthusiasm among the publishers, and it has been diffi-cult to keep all supplied with books. At the time of writing, most of the 55,000 Riches books already supplied to this branch are either placed with the people or in the hands of the publishers.

"During this campaign it was noticeable that the opposition of the enemy is increasing and that deeds of personal violence were reported from various quarters. On the other hand, many people of good will, at the present time under the control of the Roman Catholic Hierarchy, were glad to accept the publication brought to them by Jehovah's faithful ones and expressed their determination to get out of that wicked organization."

CANADA

"Jehovah's witnesses and Jonadabs in Canada and Newfoundland entered into 'His Strange Work' testimony period with a zeal and determination to make it the greatest witness yet given in these countries, and by His grace the results have been most gratifying. A total of 12,010 *Riches* was placed in the hands of the people, the largest num-ber of bound books placed in any nine-day period since 1930."

JAPAN

"Devil carried a severe attack against Jehovah's witnesses with arrests, sickness, extremely cold weather and very much snow and raining during the whole period. The Roman priests began their activity to use public press. The Osaka Asahi, the largest newspaper in Japan, carried a big article against Jehovah's witnesses. Several pioneers were thrown into the prison during the period. All faithful ones are ever rejoicing to serve Most High and to prove their integrity under this trial condition."

SPAIN

"After several brethren from Madrid had worked a small, near-by town, two brothers went back to an inn to collect the reserve stock left there earlier in the day. A large crowd of infuriated workmen had gathered and, suspecting our work gathered and, suspecting our work of being Fascist propaganda under a disguise, beat them and handled them roughly. Even though the mayor himself, who happened to be a Communist like the men, intergold for the brothers and proided. ceded for the brothers and provided them with an escort of two civil guards back to the station and actually right into the train itself, they were pursued even there and received blows in the train itself.'

SWEDEN

"The arrival of Riches in Swedish on the Monday before the period started was, of course, an item of greatest interest and importance to the publishers. And although we did not receive the whole edition in one shipment, we were nevertheless able to supply almost all publishers with this grand weapon. And it went out well, too! Some had to wire for more already on the evening of the second day. Many reports show that the people have received this message more favorably than ever before.

"Response from publishers and people called upon with Riches is best yet; praise the LORD! Attack upon sound car by excited women furthered the witness. This is by far the best testimony period, and they seem to get better and better."

INDIA

"Another intensive witness by eight publishers operating in two sound cars was given in the Nilgiri Hills, where many people are on holiday at this season of the year. The speech 'Separating the Nations' aroused the anger of the missionaries and those of their flocks who are blind, while a few more gave serious attention to the message. From other districts come reports of general opposition by the modern Philistines and general apathy on the part of the com-mon people, but some everywhere are showing interest in the message."

CHINA

"Two Jonadabs (Chinese) participated in the service with result of 50 booklets placed. Being Easter time, offices all closed for three days, most of people were away from Shanghai for holiday excursion. Two days had showers and heavy rain. Riches did not come on hand during the Period. The lecture 'Separating the Nations' was broadcast over XMHA on the 19th. About 50 orders for Riches obtained during the campaign."

BRAZIL

"Ten persons were immersed, This is the best report we have had. Jonadabs are coming in. A greater number of publishers entered the field this year than in the last year. The weather was the best. The doors are still open in this part of the field; praised be Jehovah!"

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

"Many attended the Memorial supper. A few Jonadabs underwent water immersion. Since the Lord revealed to his people who are the modern Philistines, there was great zeal among the brethren here who are working in perfect unity until the Lord may say 'It is enough'."

SOUTH AFRICA

"This was the best bound-book effort to date. Comparing our results with the figures for the campaign when the bound book Jehovah was released we find there was an increase of 700 bound volumes and morial attendance 14,000 booklets on this occasion. The largest on record.

"The balance of *Riches* edition figures for the sound machine work rived one week later and just in are also better than anything we have had heretofore, the increase in the hours being 90 and in the attendance 3,500. *Riches* was enthusiastically received by the publishers, and the public have already clearly demonstrated that they want it, too! The crew of one sound car reports: 'We covered 900 miles and gave lectures in the twelve main dorps of the Northern Transvaal and also on several thickly populated farms. We had visible audiences up to 500 in some dorps, and we could discern the Jonadabs among the crowds. Some bishop had the police come up to arrest us, but when the constables arrived they told us that we had full right to go on. Thus Jehovah protects his people for his name's sake.'

NYASALAND

"The work continues to go forward in the face of considerable opposition in some parts. Just lately more than one of our fellows have been rather badly handled. They have had their books snatched away and not returned, their testimony cards torn, stones, sticks and sand thrown at them, and one of the sisters was entirely disrobed. These incidents took place during the campaign. A protest has been lodged with the district commissioner, who has oversight of the district con-

NORTHERN RHODESIA

"The misrepresentation and persecution which has been going on in Northern Rhodesia has not discouraged the brethren in any way. Although the greater number of the Society's publications are at present banned, the publishers, by putting forth the best effort to date, equaled the distribution during the corresponding effort of last year. Just before the campaign began all the Europeans in Northern Rhodesia were served with a copy of GANo. 425. This special issue has since been the subject of a question in the Legislative Council. There cannot be any Europeans, and can be only a very few natives, in Northern Rhodesia who have not heard of Jehovah's witnesses and the message of the Lord which they declare."

SOUTHERN RHODESIA

"The proposed sedition bill and native preachers bill which are now being discussed, and which if they become law will bring conditions in this country into line with those now obtaining in Germany, did not give any of the Lord's true witnesses cold feet in Southern Rhodesia. Judging by the time parliament is taking over the bills they appear to be in a real quandary. They are hoping that the bother in Northern Rhodesia would provide a nice background for these bills, but, the attempt to make us the scapegoat in Northern Rhodesia having failed and the secretary of state for the colonies having just decided that our request for European control in Northern Rhodesia should be granted, the legislators in Southern Rhodesia, having admitted that the bills were aimed at us, do not apto know now which way to pear turn. The brethren are in good spirit and pushing on with the work."

UNITED STATES

On the evening of April 6 throughout the land 35,172 of Jehovah's people assembled to celebrate the memorial of Jehovah's name. Of this number, 25,435 partook. The heart-cheering words of the "Courage and Victory" lecture were heard by most of the brethren at this time, strengthening them to have a share in Jehovah's "strange work". The Memorial attendance this year is the

In the United States 24.441 brethren were in the field during "His Strange Work" testimony period; which is the largest on record for any special period. It is interesting to note that this number is more than double the number of publishers in the field during a similar period in 1931 (12,141 publishers), and more than three times that of the publishers for a similar period

in 1928 (7,951 publishers).

The release of *Riches* during "His Strange Work" testimony period in the United States exceeded that of any previous bound book.

The "Separating the Nations" lecture, together with other lectures, was used to broadcast the Kingdom message. There was an increase in sound attendance of 300,000 persons, over the report for last year. It has also been reported that quite a number of Riches study classes have been started to further aid the people of good will in getting a knowl-

edge of the Kingdom.
"His Strange Work" testimony period was certainly a season of great refreshment and joy. It was filled with strenuous activity to the praise of Jehovah's name. It was the greatest rally of Jehovah's people up to this time in this land to raise high the standard of the Kingdom. All praise to Jehovah for continually sustaining his people and granting them the privilege of bearing his name before the nations.

Station EAQ Madrid Doing Splendid Work

Words of encouragement sent to the various broadcasting stations are a good thing. Many of the brethren in the United States who have shortwave sets can pick up EAQ Madrid, Spain. We heartily recommend that you tune in, listen to the program, and write a letter to the station expressing your appreciation and setting out how satisfactorily the broadcast was received. The brethren in Canada, the United States and Mexico, and anywhere, for that matter should do this. The Roman Catholic Hierarchy would very much like to stop this station from broadcasting the truth. Your letters every now and then will show that it has a good audience. What is especially true of station EAQ should also be carried out in this country among our local stations. EAQ broadcasts on Wednesday at 7: 15 p.m., on Saturday at 7:15 p.m., Eastern Standard time. These two are English broadcasts. Additionally, there is a Spanish broadcast on Sunday at 6:45 p.m.

(Continued from page 1, column 2) At end of each month the company servant will mail the month's accumulation of filled sheets to the office at Brooklyn. Please send all such sheets flat, by REGISTERED MAIL, and promptly at end of each month.

UNTIL END OF SEPTEMBER

Begin at once, carrying on the petition work in conjunction with all regular witnessing and in special campaigns. Plan definitely to provide everyone in your assigned territory with the opportunity to sign the petition.

By the end of August, serve as nearly as possible all rural sections; and during September, all city assignments, including business and residential. Aim to complete the work by September 30. Report in the usual manner the hours spent in such house-to-house service.

At each phonograph and transcription meeting announce the opportunity to sign; and also in connection with all sound-car work, reading entire petition once at each location after reading the introductory card.

SEVEN MILLION

To aid each publisher to see a goal, we offer the reminder that in the United States, during the first seven months of the present service year, more than five million persons were served with literature by Jehovah's witnesses and their com-panions. Much of that work was done during one of the most strenuous of winters. Jehovah sustained His servants.—Psalm 147:17.
As a goal, then, for the work from

now on it is suggested that an average of 350 signatures taken by each of 20,000 publishers shows a total of SEVEN MILLION signers. That is the equivalent of about one-half of this country's "Catholic popula-tion", not counting babies and young children.

To increase the appreciation of all as to the importance and value working shoulder to shoulder, it is further suggested that each one who understands that he can serve more than the proposed average of 350 persons with opportunity to sign petition do so, and also pair together for this special work with one who, by reason of physical infirmity or other unavoidable handicap, believes he can serve less than the average of 350 persons.

Let each publisher and each company servant prepare thoughtfully, in advance, his part in the work. Then, in union with all of Jehovah's publishers of the entire country, with joyful and fearless determination pursue the task untiringly until it is done, confidently believing that the true and living God, who gives the increase, can and will preserve and sustain His faithful servants and greatly prosper the work of their hands, for His own name's sake.

Pioneers should give first attention to their regular work, introducing the petition when it appears 202 to be opportune.

Jehovah's Service Organization To Be Studied Carefully by Publishers

Wherein Can Your Witness Work Be Improved?

The purpose here is to set out clearly the organization of those who love Jehovah, so that all who have taken their stand on Jehovah's side may take part therein. All active persons are "publishers", because they publish or make known to others the truth they have received from Jehovah.

Company Organization

A company consists of two or more publishers who are regularly devoting a combined total of eight or more hours (average) a month in carrying the WATCH TOWER publications to the people from house to house in accordance with the cam-paign outlined in The Watchtower and the Informant, but who are not serving as pioneers or auxiliaries. If there is just one isolated publisher, he is merely a servant, meaning, of course, servant of the Lord. To be enrolled, he will spend eight or more hours in field service. Each company is identified by the post-office town in which it makes its headquarters. It has a company servant appointed by the Society. Also, where there are two or more publishers, a secretary, with whom the Society may communicate as necessity may require. A service committee is necessary only in com-panies averaging eight or more pub-lishers a month regularly in the field and whose time averages more than 100 hours a month for all the publishers exclusive of pioneers or auxiliaries. In companies smaller than this there is no need for a service committee, the company servant attending to all that work, with such assistants as he may ask the company to elect.

The responsibility for determining who shall be recommended for company servant, and who shall serve as members of the service committee, rests upon the company as a whole. Anyone, in order to be properly selected, must first show that he has and manifests the spirit of the Lord, that he is kind and considerate, that he deals justly with his brethren, and is personally active in the house-to-house service and will perform the duties given him.

COMPANY SERVANT

He will receive the Society's instructions regarding service, and, co-operating with the company and the service committee, is to apply these to the activities of the local organization. He is to keep the company field records, report monthly to the Society, see that the company territory is properly assigned to the publishers, that the field witness and sound machine service are carried on, that all interested are supplied with the Informant, and all pubeverything necessary for the service. He will mail to the Society remittances and orders for literature and other supplies, and carry on all correspondence relative to the service.

When a company is not large enough to require a service committee, the company servant will personally be responsible for assigning territory, issuing literature, advancing sound machine activity, reporting field activity to the Society and keeping check on the company's account and stock, and reporting on these items to the company each month.

Beyond the above the company servant has no supervision by virtue of his appointment as company servant.

SECRETARY

Each company of two or more publishers is to have a secretary on the Society's records for communication with the company, and also attending to such correspondence as the company may request, other than service matters. Also, this one should keep the minutes of the business transacted by the company and the service committee.

SERVICE COMMITTEE

This committee is composed of not less than three and not more than seven brethren elected by vote of the company. Sisters should not be selected if there are capable brethren available. All those selected for the service committee should be active and competent and manifest the spirit of Jehovah, being devoted to him and willing to obey organization instructions. This committee should be selected once each year, the term of office being October 1 to Southwhen 20 to September 30.

As soon as possible after the company has been notified of the Society's appointment of company servant the service committee will by vote appoint the members of the committee to the various duties specified herein, as secretary, sound servant, stockkeeper, treasurer, and these nominations to the company for their approval by vote. The committee may select its chairman. It will also appoint the study chairmen of the various study meetings, but these need not be confined to the members of the committee; but select capable brethren for this service.

SOUND SERVANT

He works with and under the general supervision of the company servant in advancing the sound machine activity in the company territory in accordance with the instructory in accordance with the instruc-tions sent to the company servant by the Society for phonographs, sound cars and transcription ma-chines. He will take part in the service meetings from time to time, devising ways and means of followlishers with testimony cards and ing the instructions in the Informant

and other instructions, enabling all made out to WATCH TOWER BIBLE the publishers to participate therein. In large companies this may read turned over to the company quire one or more assistants. No one is to operate any sound equipment to the exclusion of his personal participation in the door-to-door witnessing with the literature. All transcription records and other supplies will be sent to the company servant.

STOCKKEEPER

All of the company's stock, including transcription records and supplies, should be under his supervision, and he is to supply the publishers with literature. He is to assist in making up orders to be sent to the Society by the company servant. All money received by the stockkeeper from publishers at the time literature is placed with them is to be turned over to the treasurer, and proper receipt for same be received from the treasurer. Litera-ture placed with the brethren on credit should be properly issued on statements made out in triplicate and signed by the party receiving the literature. The original may be given to the party getting the literature, the first carbon copy turned over to the treasurer for collection later, and the other carbon copy should be retained by the stock-keeper. The total cash on hand, money due from the publishers, plus stock on hand should always equal the amount due the Society. A physical inventory should be taken twice a year at least. At any time the stockkeeper may figure what is on hand from the record of literature put into the hands of the publishers since the last inventory.

STUDY CHAIRMEN

These are brethren of the company who are active in the service and capable of conducting the various studies of the company. As it is advisable for these to be rotated, they should be scheduled by the service committee so one will conduct a study for not more than three months at a time before being changed to another study. These are to assist the study group in the house-to-house witnessing, leading them in the field, furnishing them with each issue of the *Informant* (when they do not procure this at the service meetings), and all other supplies necessary. The study chair-men should attend all company service meetings so as to be fully informed of the company activities.

TREASURER

In addition to the book money, every company will have some expenses which are met by voluntary contributions of the brethren in the company, the contributions being dropped in a box provided in the meeting place. It is against the policy of the Society for any "collection plate" to be passed at any time. There is to be but one treasurer in a company, who handles all the company funds. He will collect all money from the brethren who ob-tain literature on credit, a statement of which will be supplied to him by the stockkeeper regularly. All remittances to the Society will be made by check, draft or money order

servant for mailing to the Society. The money due the Society on the company book account is not to be used for anything else at any time. Remittances should be sent to the Society regularly by companies, pioneers and auxiliaries.

Credit Arrangement

If necessary, a small supply of books may be had on credit, with the understanding that they will be paid for as placed with the people. However, no company, pioneer or auxiliary should run into debt, and if it is possible for you to accompany each order with remittance to cover, this is preferable. If not, the cost of the books must be set aside as they are placed and be sent to this office in regular payments. If you strictly adhere to this practice, by the time you are in need of more books your account will be sufficiently reduced to warrant the making of another shipment on credit. If you do not follow this procedure we cannot extend credit to you. A company account is the responsi-bility of the entire group, and the service committee should look after the interest of the company in this

AUDIT OF ACCOUNT

Every three months there should be a careful examination of the treasurer's books to see that everything is correct, all the money accounted for. It will be the duty of the service committee to appoint each time one to do this work, who will go over the record of all business transacted by the company, contributions, book fund, account and stock, see that the record is correct, and, if not, wherein lies the error, and what steps are necessary to correct the books.

INVOICES AND STATEMENTS

For every charge on your account an invoice will be sent. These should be checked over at once to see that they agree with the number of books you have received and that no error has been made in the charge. If any errors are found, notify us at once, referring to the invoice by the number appearing at the top. Do not return the invoice, but keep it for

your records. We have a copy here.
A statement of your account will be mailed to you regularly, being sent to the company servant and direct to pioneers and auxiliaries. This will show the date and total of each invoice and credit memoranor each invoice and credit memorandum sent to you during the month. The totals of the invoices will appear in the column headed "Charges", the credit memos under "Credits", and in the third column, "Balance," appears the balance of your property to each or training the search of th account as each entry is made. The last amount in this third column is the balance on your account after all charges and credits put through before the end of the month are entered. If you see stamped on the statement, "Balance Due You," you know that the amount in the third column is not owing the Society, but is to your credit.

Check over each statement care-

fully with your invoices and credit memos to see that all entries are correct. Compare by date number Compare by date, number and total amount. A remittance or order not received at this office until the end of the month will not appear on the statement for that month, but will be on the statement for the month following.

In writing about your account, do not return your statement, but keep it for your records. AL explanation of what is wrong is sufficient, since we have a record here. In writing about orders, refer to them by their date and number on the duplicate which you keep.

REMITTANCES

Mail all remittances direct to the Watch Tower Bible & Tract Society, 117 Adams St., Brooklyn, N.Y. Do not under any circumstances send any remittances to any of the depots. Do not send currency through the mails, because it is liable to be stolen. The check will be drawn, or money order or draft be obtained, by the treasurer and mailed by the company servant.

Remittances sent in without orders will be acknowledged on credit memorandums. Remittances sent in with orders will be acknowledged at the bottom of the invoice on which the order is charged. Thus every remittance will be acknowledged.

Divisional Campaigns

From time to time companies in an area participate in concentrated witnessing in divisional campaigns. The divisional servant is appointed by the Society, and his sole duty is to convey to the publishers the Society's instructions to him and lead in these campaigns. The divisional servant's duties end there, and, as such, he has absolutely no jurisdiction in any matters aside from the specific divisional campaigns. Brethren participating in divisional campaigns make a special report at the campaign and also include this activity in their regular monthly report to this office.

General Instructions CHANGING ADDRESSES

Be sure to notify us of all changes in your address. Use a regular letter or post card unless you are a pioneer or an auxiliary.

The following applies to pioneers and auxiliaries only: These are always to use the "Change of Address" slips furnished by the Society. Mail a slip with the change thereon to this office before you move. Change of address notice on orders or report cards or in letters is not sufficient ; a slip must be used. Allow two weeks from mailing notice to make the change if in the far west, or one week if near by.
If in the party there are two or more wishing to have their address changed, please always send a slip for each member of the party; and this applies to man and wife, too. "Change of Address" slips are for the use of pioneers and auxiliaries

CORRESPONDENCE

All your letters, orders, requests for territory, remittances, reports, etc., in English or foreign languages, should be addressed to the Watch Tower Bible & Tract Society, 117 Adams St., Brooklyn, N. Y. Be sure to mark the envelope in accordance with the status of your enrollment, as follows:

Companies: "Company Service." Pioneers: "Pioneer Service."

Auxiliaries: "Auxiliary Service." Correspondence or complaints regarding the filling of orders, nonreceipt of orders, goods received in bad condition or shipments that have been lost should not be sent to any of the depots.

Be sure to show at the top of the first page of your letter your initials and last name, street address or post-office box or "General delivery", name of city, and state, to which you wish reply directed. Make all letters as brief and to the point as possible, and avoid all unnecessary letter writing.

DAILY RECORD SHEET

These are furnished for your convenience in making out your monthreports. Pioneers should use them also in keeping accurate record of their work in the territory on which they will report to this

HOW TO ORDER

At the present time the Society maintains three depots besides the Brooklyn office, for the purpose of filling orders, shipments being made from the following four points:

Watch Tower Bible & Tract Society, 3345 Fernwood Ave.,

Lynwood, Calif.

Watch Tower Bible & Tract Society, 800 Broadway, Seattle, Wash.

The states of Washington, Oregon and western Idaho are served by the Seattle depot; and California, Nevada, and western Arizona, by the Lynwood depot. Most of the rest of the country can be more economically served by Brooklyn, with the exception of Missouri points south of Hannibal and Kansas City, Arkansas points that cannot be served by boat and rail freight from Brooklyn, and those Illinois points within a radius of about forty miles of St. Louis.

All orders should be sent direct to the Brooklyn office, 117 Adams Street. Only when rush orders are needed should the order be sent to the depot. Always try to anticipate your needed supply of literature far enough in advance to send your order to Brooklyn and allow it to be routed in the most economical At least two weeks should be allowed for freight shipments to points within 600 or 800 miles from the depots, and three or four weeks for distant points, from the time the order reaches this office.

In extreme cases where a tele-graphic order is to be shipped by express or parcel post you may send your order direct to the depot near-

est you.

The Society's policy is to prepay all charges on shipments and send them the cheapest way. The cheapest way is by freight, and if ship-ment by mail or express is desired, you will be charged the difference in transportation costs.

Endeavor to order in 100-pound lots, as freight charges are made on the basis of 100 pounds minimum weight, which means that the Society is charged just as much freight for a small shipment as if it weighed the full 100 pounds. Weight may be ascertained by figuring that 145 clothbound books weigh 100 pounds, or about 7/10 of a pound per book. One hundred booklets will average about 10 pounds.

Mark each order as to the date the books will be needed, for our guidance in shipping them. If it is necessary to ship the order by express or parcel post instead of by freight in order to reach you in time, state specifically on the order to so ship; otherwise it will be sent by freight. If you receive mail at post office where there is no freight depot, always give us the name of the nearest railroad depot when ordering books, as well as giv-ing your mail address. On freight

to be notified at another place, fill in that information. It is well to have orders shipped together, to make the weight 100 pounds; but orders to be shipped together must be sent in together. If you wish to have your order shipped with the order from some other person or company, send in all such orders to this office in one envelope, with definite shipping instructions marked at the top of each order. Call for freight shipments promptly on arrival, or arrange to have someone claim them for you. Storage starts on a shipment 48 hours after its arrival at the depot. If you are unable to claim the shipment within two days, notify the freight agent; and if you are leaving the territory, make arrangements with the freight agent before you leave regarding forwarding the shipment to you.

Before accepting a shipment, be sure to see if there is any shortage or damage, and if so, refuse to receive it until the freight agent notes same in writing on the freight expense bill. All goods leave our hands in good condition, and you accept damaged goods at your own risk. Report to us immediately all shipping charges and damaged shipments, sending us the original bill of lading along with the freight bill with the freight agent's written no-tation on it. This procedure will greatly facilitate in the collection of damage claims.

INFORMANT

The Informant is the monthly publication sent to all companies, pioneers and auxiliaries to inform all publishers as to what is to be done in carrying on the witness campaign. Every company should re-ceive a sufficient number to supply all interested in the territory of the company, and the company servant should request additional copies of each issue when more are needed. It should be read and studied at the weekly service meetings. All activities of the company should be along the lines recommended in the Informant.

LITERATURE

Literature provided by the Society at special pioneer, or company costs is really the property of the Society entrusted to the brethren. The company as a whole is responsible for the stock, and each publisher is to take care of it, keep it in good condition, and con-tribute as it is obtained, or as placed with the people.

The policy is that any company publisher may have literature from the company stock at the contribu-tion for which the Society furnishes it to the company, if the publisher is averaging two or more hours a week in the service. It is up to each individual to decide if he or she will contribute only company cost or more. No one in the company may withhold company rates on the literature from any publisher on the ground that the publisher is not getting in sufficient time, as the is between the individual matter and the Lord. If a publisher desires to contribute the entire amount he receives, he may, of course, do so. The company, however, has no right to vote that this must be done.

All literature is to be placed on the contribution established by the Society. Publications are not to be placed until released by the Society for public distribution. During the time certain books and booklets are specially stressed, these are to be used and left in all cases, if possible, and, of course, it is in order to place literature in addition thereto when there is an opportunity.

From time to time the Society may send literature on consignment

order is to be shipped. If you wish | make large consignments to companies for storage without the companies' having ordered it. These consignments and storage stock will be charged to the company account and are to be well taken care of, kept clean and dry and in good condition. The company may at any time place literature from such storage stocks, the same as from any part of the company stock. All orders are to be sent in by the company servant.

No leaflet, card or any other mat-

ter is to be inserted in the books or booklets, or placed in conjunction with the literature, and nothing is to be printed, stamped or written thereon, unless there is first ob-tained from this office permission for this to be done. The radio slips supplied by the Society, of course, are to be used in the door-to-door service.

MONTHLY REPORTS

Every company servant, pioneer nd auxiliary is required to suband auxiliary is required mit a report to this office at the end of each month. Always use the report cards furnished by the Society.

White cards are for company reports only. The company report is to include all company publishers and the results of their work, but not to include pioneers or auxiliaries.

PINK cards are for the use of pioneers and auxiliaries only, reporting direct to this office only.
Six items of information are

asked for; namely:

(1) Total number of bound books (including Bibles) placed during the month.

(2) Total number of booklets placed during the month (including booklets placed without contribution). Do not report sample copies of or subscriptions for The Watchtower or The Golden Age.

(3) Number of company publishers taking part in the door-to-door service with the literature one or more hours during the month. As pioneers and auxiliaries are to report only their individual activities, they will leave this third space on their cards blank.

(4) Number of hours in actual field witnessing bringing the mes-

sage to the people at their homes with literature and with sound equipment. Time witnessing from house to house with literature, and the time using sound equipment in conjunction with the placing of literature, are included in the hours of field service. Every publisher should report his own work with sound equipment as stated above, regardless of who owns the equipment. In the case of company or individual machines, let each person using the equipment report the hours on daily report slips. If sound equipment is used by different companies during the month, each company reports its own work therewith, If two or more pioneers use one machine, each is to report his own hours of use of it. The one person operating the machine reports the time. Pioneers would also report their own work with machines owned by companies, or vice versa. Equipment privately owned by others than pioneers or auxiliaries should be reported through the company of which the owners are part. Time reported also includes phonograph and transcription machine back calls, and time spent in the people's homes when delivering orders; all of this is time in the field service. However, time used for transcription series, phonograph series or study meetings is not reported at all.

(5) Total number of persons ob-

taining literature during the month. (6) Total attendance at all sound

orders give the address to which the to companies, or others, and may machine meetings during the month,

This should be those persons who hear a lecture for at least 4½ minutes or more, but not to include the operators of the sound machines. This would include listeners to sound cars, PTM's and phonographs, whether used in door-to-door witnessing, back calls or series of meetings held in homes with sound equipment.

The activities for the ENTIRE month are to be reported in the upper row of spaces, including, of course, activities of any special testimony period during the month. The activities of special nine-day testimony periods are to be reported in the row of spaces marked "For SPECIAL PERIOD REPORT only", and on the same card with the entire month's report. Always check over your reports and send them in immediately at the end of each month.

PUBLISHERS' DAILY REPORT SLIPS

are provided free to all companies asking for them. They are to be used by the brethren in reporting their work each day to the company servant.

SUBSCRIPTIONS

Subscriptions for The Watchtower or The Golden Age should be accompanied by remittance to cover. Here are a few hints that will aid to better service:

Always use special subscription blanks.

Sign your name at the bottom, not the subscriber's name.

State in a letter accompanying the blanks the names and addresses of the subscribers appearing thereon, so that in case of difficulty we shall have a record from which to make adjustment.

Do not send in more than one

blank for each subscriber.

Do not use Watchtower blanks for Golden Age subscriptions, or vice versa.

If you accompany subscriptions with remittance for more than enough to cover, the price of the subscription will be deducted from the remittance and the credited to your account. balance

Company publishers are to send their subscriptions and renewals through the company organization or direct, and not through pioneers or auxiliaries.

SUPPLIES

When additional order blanks subscription blanks, or any other supplies, are needed, ask for these in your regular order for literature, as, generally, they can be sent along with your books and booklets. Pioneers and auxiliaries should use the special labels for ordering supplies, sending the labels in attached to their order for literature.

TESTIMONY CARDS

Testimony cards are supplied to all the publishers, and each company servant is to see that a suffi-cient number of these are on hand. They are available in foreign languages as well as in English, and are for the purpose of aiding the publisher in the placement of the literature. When calling on one in witness work, the publishers present the card, asking the one addressed to kindly read it carefully. A few appropriate remarks may be made in doing so if found advisable. After the card is read the publisher presents the literature referred to on the card, and, with such remarks as are necessary and appropriate, places this with the person on the established contribution. The publishers should always be equipped with the testimony cards, and their use is recommended, supplemented

by further demonstration of the literature.

On the reverse side of the testimony card is the identification and authorization of the publisher. Each publisher should PRINT his name on the first line (at the top), and at the bottom sign the name and also fill in the address. It is not necessary for every individual who reads the testimony card to read the back, but if he wishes to read it, let him do so. This is to be used particularly in case of arrests or opposition on the part of policemen or other individ-

TRANSFERRING LITERATURE

You are not to turn over any books or booklets to another pioneer, auxiliary, or company or re-ceive literature from any of these and expect an adjustment to made on the accounts at this office without first receiving from this office permission for the transfer of stock to be made. If you run short of books before your order arrives from headquarters, and feel the need of borrowing a few from a company or another publisher, then replace the same at once upon the arrival of your shipment.

Company publishers should get their stock from the company stock, and not from pioneers or auxiliaries.

Jonadabs

Have in mind that the commandment of the Lord is that His message must be carried to the people of good will, otherwise known as "Jonadabs". The Watchtower, each issue, shows matters that are of present-day interest to the Jonapresent-day interest to the dabs, and for this reason every Jonadab should be encouraged to and receive The Watchtower and study each issue carefully.

NEWLY INTERESTED

When pioneers or others find interested persons these should be put in touch with the local company, so that they can take advantage of the company studies and be lined up with the local organization. The new radio folders, stamped by each company with the local address and phone number, will aid in this, and also the new study invitation slips. Each company should have a complete file of the names and addresses of all in the company and of all in the territory who are really interested, so that these latter can be contacted from time to time and aided to get into the organization if they so desire. When territory is assigned to publishers the names and addresses of interested ones in the territory may be furnished with the assignment.

Persons really interested who are not in the territory of any company should be put in touch with this office as soon as possible, so that a new company can be organized. While in the territory, the pioneers can take these out in the service, assist in establishing Riches and Watchtower studies. The group should select one to act as chairman after the pioneer goes, so that the studies can continue. The Informant should be received by all such, and they will get this when enrolled as a company. They may make special request direct to be placed on the mailing list for the Informant prior to enrollment, if they desire. As soon as possible they should order literature direct from the Society. The activities of the newly interested working with pioneers should be reported to the Society, but are not to be shown on the pioneers' report cards. Separate publishers' slips should be made out and forwarded to the Society, showing their activity and the complete name and address.

Pioneers and Auxiliaries

Pioneers are those who are giving their full time in house-to-house witnessing, serving Jehovah 'with all their heart, mind and TIME'. They are special representatives of the Society in a close and confidential relationship to headquarters. These are appointed by the Society, after making proper application, and are responsible to the Society to fulfill the obligations laid upon them by their pioneer commission. The Society arranges for the special consideration which is given to faithful witnesses and establishes the requirements which are to be met by them, and their primary obligation is to get in their time in the house-to-house service. minimum number of hours for pioneers is 110 each month, and this is to be exceeded in order that an effective witness may be given and the pioneer get on well. The pioneer service is not a secondary job of less importance than some secular work. To be a full-time publisher of Jehovah's kingdom is the greatest of privileges and responsibilities, and a pioneer does not have time for all the odd jobs that come along and that would interfere with his getting in his pioneer hours.

All pioneers are assigned territory by the Society. When assigned to witness in conjunction with a company, they obtain their local territory from the company servant. A pioneer, however, makes all reports to the Society only, and not to the local company. It is necessary that each pioneer report regularly to the Society each month (even though kept out of the field work for some reason during the month), and also send in such territory reports as may be asked for at the time the territory assignment is made by this office.

Auxiliaries are also special representatives appointed by the Society, and the responsibility of auxiliaries, even as in the case of pioneers, is to the Society's office in Brooklyn, to which all auxiliary reports are to be made each month. These brethren, while not devoting all their time to the service, or unable to get in pioneer hours, enjoy great privileges and blessings. who can do so should change from the status of company publishers to that of auxiliaries or pioneers.

The minimum time for auxiliary service is 50 hours a month in the house-to-house witness. Most auxiliaries are serving in co-operation with various companies, obtaining their local territory from the company servant, but reporting to the Society only. It is entirely in order for brethren who are pioneers or auxiliaries to be elected as servants by the company with which they are associated, if the company wishes to do so and such service does not interfere with their getting in pioneer or auxiliary time and otherwise meeting their obligations as

Quotas

To aid the publishers in seeing the importance of time in the field, which will result in a witness in proportion to the effort and time spent, the Society has established the quota of 15 hours a month for all company publishers to strive for. If this cannot be reached, each publisher should, of course, do all he can; but let each company establish a company quota based on the average of 15 hours per month per publisher. Of course, no one should stop at 15 hours a month if more time can be devoted to the service. Everyone taking part in the actual house-to-house witness during the month is to be reported as a pub-lisher, regardless of whether he

The minimum time for pioneers is 110 hours a month, and the auxiliaries must spend at least 50 hours a month in the service, in order to meet the requirements for these branches of the service. Every pub-lisher who can spend 50 or more hours in the service should enroll as an auxiliary, and all who can spend full time in the witness work should enroll as pioneers. Pioneer and auxiliary service is not to be included in company quotas. Their reports are made direct to the Society.

Service Meetings

There should be a weekly service meeting of all in the company. In very small companies of less than eight publishers, it may be found advisable to add half an hour or so to a study meeting for the service meeting. This is the meeting at which all the publishers come together for a study of the Informant, discussion of service matter, special letters, ways and means of applying instructions relative to field service and sound activity to the company territory and the partici-pation of all the publishers there-in, how the quota can be met, what can be done for the newly interested, etc. Plans for the week-end activity of the company can be completed, territory assigned, transportation decided upon, as well as witnessing on weekdays.

The company servant is the chairman of the service meeting. Other members of the service committee should take part by prior arrangement and conduct the study and application of service instructions. Service meetings should be prepared and well arranged in advance by the company servant.

Sound Machine Activity

OPPOSITION

In the Kingdom interests, we must do everything possible in meeting opposition, to keep the issue on the proper basis, which is the message of God's kingdom. The brethren must not jeopardize the work by misconduct on their part. We can best serve the interests of the work by carefully planning our sound car service and carrying it out solely for presenting the Kingdom message.

In covering a large area, it is well to be some distance away from the nearest house, so that good volume can be turned on and yet those near the sound car will not receive the message unduly loud and still the sound will carry for several blocks. When using the sound equipment adjacent to homes, have the volume turned up reasonably loud. Obey traffic regulations.

The policy to be adopted on interference will be found in the September 1, 1935, Watchtower: "Should Jehovah's witnesses procure a license to operate a sound car where the ordinance requires such license?" Answer: "Yes; this is on the same principle as obtaining a license to operate an automobile. It is not asking for a license or permit to preach the gospel. A license to operate a sound car is in no wise contrary to God's law. Where a sound car is to be used in the streets application should first be made to the police department and no doubt a permit or license will be issued."

Where this is denied, however, an effort should be made to obtain the use of some private property to put on your sound car meeting. In such cases, always endeavor to get permission in writing from the owner of the property to put on such meetings, so that the authorities will have no come-back on you from the standpoint of trespassing. Where neither license nor private property reached the quota of 15 hours or not. is available, the brethren have been

PHONOGRAPHS

The phonograph is an important piece of sound equipment. Every publisher should certainly use it in his own home, running the lectures for those who call, and also take the phonograph with him in the house-to-house service when this is possible. It has been effectively used in the open for small crowds gathered around the car, attracted by a musical record.

In addition to using the phonograph in the regular house-to-house witness work, each company should arrange for back-call service. This work, carried on primarily in the evenings, is at homes where contact has been made in the regular houseto-house service with the literature at which time an appointment was made for the back call. Also regular territory may be selected and thoroughly covered from house to house with the phonograph and literature. These calls, if made between the hours of, say six to eight in the evenings, generally reach the entire family just after the evening meal, at which time several can hear the lectures. The brethren may set aside certain evenings each week for this particular service, having arranged the company studies so that all the brethren will be able to participate.

In making back calls on parties previously contacted it is advisable for the publisher who previously called with the literature to return in person with the phonograph. If this cannot be done the name should be turned in to the sound servant, so that someone else can make the call.

In covering a territory with the phonograph in the evenings, after introducing yourself, proceed in a manner similar to the method of presenting the literature and phonograph in your other house-to-house service. Several records may be run, and any questions the people have pertaining to the subject should be discussed with them. Show them where the matter is treated more claborately in the literature, which they may wish to obtain. In some cases it may be necessary to go back with the phonograph a number of times. They may wish to invite some of their relatives and friends to hear some of the records and discuss the matter with them. On such occasions offer to loan them the phonograph for one or more evenings when you can spare it, when you believe they are sincere and will take proper care of the equip-ment. Ask them to keep record of the number of persons who hear and this total may be included in the regular monthly report to the Society.

SOUND CARS

The new (Number 3) sound car equipment which the Society is at present manufacturing uses the new transcription machine which may be removed from the sound car and used at transcription meetings in the regular way, separate from the rest of the sound equipment.

Good results are obtained in coordinating the sound car activity with the house-to-house witnessing by taking the sound car into the territory where the brethren are going from house to house with the literature, covering a portion of the territory with a lecture and an-

getting good results by going outside | nouncements, and moving on to another portion, and repeating this throughout the area so that the entire section is covered.

TRANSCRIPTION MACHINES

No one of the Lord's people should hesitate to open his home for transcription meetings. If each one assents to do this, there immediately become available in every company territory a large number of points where transcription meetings can be held. The various company headquarters should likewise be utilized for transcription service, and an unlimited number of other points, such as homes of interested people where phonographs have been used, funeral parlors, lodge homes, church school houses, empty buildings, municipal lodging houses, and a great number of places which can be obtained without charge by brethren who are on the alert for openings and present the matter properly before those having charge of such places. This equipment can also be used outdoors in parks, vacant lots or in the streets, the same as a sound car.

Studies

A study of the current issue of The Watchtower should be available for every one in the company, likewise of the book *Riches*, and in large companies several Riches studies may be established throughout the territory, so that newly interested persons may be invited to one conveniently near them.

A study meeting should be an hour or an hour and a quarter in duration, as determined by the company. It should be opened by prayer by the chairman or someone on whom he calls. The chairman at each study selects someone who can understandingly to read a paragraph or two. After the paragraph is read, let the chairman call for questions from anyone desiring to ask one. After a question is asked, the chairman should call upon two or three by name to give their answer. Then the chairman may say, "Does anyone else have a comment?" and then anyone may volunteer a comment. In this way the meeting will be orderly. All questions and comments should be brief and on the subject matter under consideration at that particular time. The chairman may ask for the questioner's own comment, who may have something to add to what has been said, and then the chairman may sum

up the answer.

It is proper to have a juvenile Riches study, to which competent brothers or sisters should be appointed. The children should also be led and helped in the field service.

It is recommended that there be no study or other meetings held for the publishers during the daytime on Sundays, but that all such meetings be held in the evenings, permitting the entire day to be spent in the service.

Territory

Company territory should be covered at least four times a year if this is possible. It may be covered more frequently, even once a month, to accomplish a more intense witness; so companies that are going over their territory very often still have much work to do.

BUSINESS DISTRICTS

As some of the brethren still seem to avoid the business territory, these sections are included in the company assignment only if specifically noted on the assignment sheet. Business districts refer to retail stores, offices, factories, water fronts, in fact, all but the residential territory of a city. Often, away from the main "downtown business section" are

groups of business houses of all kinds, and these are also included in the term "business districts"

The company servant should see to it that neighborhood stores, service stations along the road, businesses located singly or in groups throughout the residential or rural sections, or small country towns, are witnessed to, and the best way would be for the publisher having the adjoining residences to take these little stores as he comes to them. Let every company servant write the Society asking definitely for the business districts in their territory to be added to their assignment, if these are not already specifically noted on their assignment sheet; but only if they can thoroughly cover them frequently and but only if they can thorefficiently.

Territory is assigned by counties. and by post-office towns and the intermediate rurals, and should always be referred to in that manner, as other local divisions, such as townships, rivers, roads, etc., are without value for our records. When a company is assigned a section of the county the post-office towns specified are assigned, and the rurals intermediate are included. The rurals, however, do not extend be yond the county line. If the company can include additional towns in its work, the company servant should make request for increase in the

SUBDIVIDING COMPANY TERRITORY

simple, efficient subdivision of the territory of companies is advisable, and most of the companies already have in effect such a system. To accomplish this a map system should be built up, which, though it may be varied according to the size of the company, should, in general, embrace the following:

MASTER MAP

At the service headquarters there should be the master map showing the entire territory of the company. If the territory is large enough to justify it, it should be first subdivided into zones, and then each zone into territories. In each case the territory should have a number identifying it, and each zone should be numbered. The number of the territory should indicate in which zone it is located; that is, in zone 1 the territories would be numbered 101, 102, 103, etc., and in zone 2, they would be 201, 202, 203, etc. For uninumber zones and territories from left to right, beginning across the top of the map. After such a map has been mounted and subdivided, its surface can be preserved by giving it a coat of shellac and then several coats of varnish, or by giving it two coats of glue sizing followed by two coats of clear

ZONE MAPS

If the territory is large enough to be zoned, a map similar to the master should be cut up into zones, each zone corresponding to the zone as outlined in the master map, and each one of these zone maps should be marked off into territories corresponding to the master map, and coated to provide a marking surface and preserve the maps. These zone maps can be used by zone servants, members of the service committee, they to assist the company servant in their assigned zone.

TERRITORIES

The territories themselves which are assigned to the publishers may be indicated on slips showing the boundaries and territory number or may be shown by pasting on a light card (bearing the territory number) each portion of a map which has are been cut up into territories. Be sure

the outside boundaries are plainly marked. This is optional. Brethren find that by typewriting the boundaries on the slips they have ample information for the assignment. The slips or cards are provided by the companies locally.

ASSIGNMENTS

A publisher is given a territory assignment slip showing just what he is to cover, and on the zone map or the master map (or on both) this territory should be marked as having been assigned, so that at a glance it can be seen what territory is open and what is taken. This can be indicated by making a line with a colored pencil on the territory on the zone map and master map. Pencils used for marking china are satisfactory for this, the marks be-ing very easily erased with art gum. When an assignment is returned, the line indicating the assignment can be crossed with another line showing the territory to have been covered. If for any reason the territory assigned was not witnessed to, the line indicating that the territory was assigned can be erased entirely, showing it not only is open, but has not been covered.

RURAL TERRITORY

Rural territory can be divided just the same as city territory, and the above suggestions can be used. It will be found that the map system is the most satisfactory in the assignment of rural territory, to insure the rural assignment's being thoroughly covered on all the side roads as well as the main highways. Natural boundaries can be utilized in subdividing the rural territory. For fifty cents (money order to accompany your order) "Rural-Delivery Maps" for most counties can be obtained from Disbursing Clerk, Post Office Department, Washing-ton, D.C.; or you may be able to procure detailed road maps locally. Be sure to cover all roads.

RECORDS

A record is to be kept showing to whom the territories are assigned and when last covered, so that they can be called in in sixty days after assignment is made if not returned completed by that time. This can be simply kept in a card file prepared by each company. Have a card about 4½ by 6 inches, a card for each territory, ruled on both sides with spaces for showing the name or initial of the publisher, date of assignment, and date returned, also if covered. These can be filed alphabetically in a drawer, and the territory slip and names and addresses of interested persons filed just in front of each card, so in one place there will be the slip given to the publisher when the assignment is made, names of interested persons, and the card on which the record of the assignment is kept. The use of end-open envelopes to hold the assignments and names and addresses is optional.

REPORTS

The only territory report necessary from the publishers is the return of the assignment slip with report as to the thoroughness with which it was covered and when witnessed to. It is not necessary to keep a record of placements in the territories, and such would be need-less waste of time and effort. Let the entire setup be simple, so that all the publishers will clearly understand it and so that all can get out in the field and not spend time unnecessarily in clerical work. Any data on the territory that will aid the next publisher, such as foreign literature needed, may be noted on the assignment slip.

Pioneers already receive the books at the lowest rate, but the accounts of companies will be given credit of fifteen cents, and auxiliaries eight-een cents, for each three-book combination placed during August, only the number of combinations is shown at the bottom of the report card. If you do not give this information it is understood you do not want the credit. Each company servant should see that the publishers report this information to him. Each six-book combination placed on a dollar contribution is to be reported as two three-book combinations combinations.

What Is Your Part in This War?

World-wide Quota 600,000 Hours for Nine Days

The time is drawing near for an-The time is drawing near for another concerted attack upon the Devil's organization. Jehovah has given the command, "Arise ye, and let us rise up against her in battle." This occasion is known as the "BATTLE SHOUT", October 3-11, 1936, and Labovable fottly sorvents in and Jehovah's faithful servants in every part of the world will join in this battle cry. No doubt you have all read Brother Rutherford's "Personal Message" to Jehovah's faithful servants in the September 1 Watchtower and have been moved to put forth a more strenuous effort during the coming witness than ever before. Brother Rutherford's letter points out that we are in a real battle now, and "the time of prelim-inary war is here". All those who love Jehovah should study that letter carefully and then make preparations for the greatest campaign to date to the honor of Jehovah's name.

The book Riches will again be offered during this period, on a con-tribution of 25c Riches has new been translated and published in thirteen languages, and for the first time will be offered on a contribution of 25c no matter what language people speak. Here at the factory the presses have been running to the limit to turn out enough of these books in various languages to supply the brethren for this special campaign. The demand for *Riches* continues to be exceedingly heavy, and to date over 1,700,000 copies have been printed and shipped out at Brooklyn alone. Hundreds of thousands of copies are on their way to the branches of the Society so that Jehovah's servants may move forward as one man with one book, Riches.

Many people will have had Riches by the time of the campaign, but that should not lessen our placements. On the contrary, it should help in placing more. Those who have read *Riches* will have men-tioned it to their friends and neighbors, and many who turned it down the first time will now be anxious to get the book, and offering it again will increase the importance of the book in the minds of the people. Those who already have *Riches* should be invited to attend a study, using *Riches* as the text book. If in any language *Riches* is not available, then the latest book published

covered booklet, and any other colored-cover booklet.

The newly interested who have been attending *Riches* studies should be invited to participate in the witness work. These people should be aided in every possible way to get started as publishers of the King-

SOUND ACTIVITY

During this period as many transcription meetings as possible should be arranged, using the "Separating the Nations" lecture. In many places it will be possible to play this lecture for large outdoor gatherings as well as indoor meetings. In addition, the brethren should use the phonograph records wherever possible, both in door-to-door witnessing and in making back calls. Oftentimes the playing of only one record has resulted in the placing of a book which would otherwise have been impossible. No more than one or two records should be played at any one place while witnessing. If the party is inter-ested, arrange for a back call in the evening.

QUOTA

It is always well to have a quota of hours in mind for these special periods. Last April we reached a peak in publishers, but not the peak in hours. There were 46,209 publishers in the field, throughout the world, and these put in a total of 489,011 hours witnessing. For the coming period it is suggested that we aim at a quota of 50,000 publishers putting in 600,000 hours. That would be a nice increase over the last period, wouldn't it? How-ever, it is not difficult if each publisher takes the responsibility upon himself to do his share. There should be throughout the entire world be throughout the entire world 3,500 pioneers averaging 40 hours each for the nine days, 1,500 auxiliaries having an individual quota of 20 hours each, and 45,000 company publishers putting forth an earnest endeavor to average 10 hours each. If we do this we shall pass the 600,000 hours. Think what a witness can be given if each publisher puts in his share of the above quota! Remember, the individual quota! Important Notice

Send In Your September Report on the 27th

September is the last month of the fiscal year, and the year's report must be completed immediately thereafter. To get the report ready in time, it will be necessary to cut September's work short; so end your September work with Sunday the 27th. Your report for October will include September 28 to October 31. Each company servant, pioneer and auxiliary is to mail his report

for the twenty-seven days to this office Sunday evening, September 27, and those company servants west of the Mississippi river will aid very much by sending their reports by air mail. This means that all company publishers are to get their reports to the company servant be-fore Sunday evening, so that their work will be included in the company report mailed at that time. If it should be that there are some publishers who fail to do this, the company servant is not to hold up the report by waiting for these, but is to send the company report right on, and include such late ones the

on, and metales such late ones the following month.

This is very important. Let everyone mail the report promptly on September 27.

Inventory

Each company, pioneer, and auxiliary is required to take an exact inventory of stock as of September 30. Additionally, each one is to send in the complete report of said inven-tory to the Society by October 10, on the special blank enclosed for this very purpose.

Care is to be taken to see that the

inventory blank is properly filled out, particularly that the "totals" and "values" called for are figured

and "values" called for are ngured out correctly.

The companies and auxiliaries that want credit for the change in costs on foreign bound books must make request for it by properly showing on the inventory, under the heading "Remarks", the amount recorded to adjust the account. Company that the account. needed to adjust the account. Companies are being allowed a credit of Ge on each foreign bound book; auxiliaries, 3c. Be sure that the credit you ask for checks with the total foreign bound books reported.

Our responsibility in this battle is great. The Lord has given each one of us a definite assignment in one of us a definite assignment in his army, and if we are good soldiers we will, as Brother Rutherford stated in his letter, "be ready to enter the field on the first day and continue therein until the last, and are you go be joyful in the Lord." as you go be joyful in the Lord."

Petition Grows

Many Waiting to Sign "Be Strong, and Work"

Work in the strength of Jehovah is now seen by His witnesses and their companions as needful to serve everyone who is worthy to sign the petition. Great numbers have signed. Others are eager to sign. Jehovah's publishers are privileged to see that such persons have opportunity to sign. So let us work on with redoubled determination.

Remember, for the entire month of September, carry on the petition work in conjunction with all regular witnessing and in special campaigns. (Pioneers continue to give first attention to their regular duties, introducing the petition when opportune.) Serve particularly all city territory, including business and residential sections. Aim to complete the petition work by September 30.

Remember, at each home and business place, first present the green card and petition.

That being disposed of, then introduce the booklets being offered during September.

Take the August Informant and carefully review the outline of cooperation there shown, for the petition work. Be certain-that you are proceeding with every feature of this work in a fitting and thorough manner. Do not neglect to make this examination Now.

USE OF TIME

Thoughtful use of time spent in the field will enable publishers to serve many during September with the opportunity to sign the petition. Pass as quickly as possible from home to home, always alert to find persons of good will. Serve them and pass on promptly to find and serve others of such.

Remember the suggested average per publisher, 350 petition signers served. Generally, this work began during the fourth week of July, thus allowing ten full weeks to the end of September. On that basis, each publisher's individual weekly quota of petition signers served is 35. Have you agreed with another publisher to serve, jointly, by the Lord's grace, a combined total of at least 700 signers?

AIDS

Here and there the Catholic press and the clergy presume to "warn" people concerning the petition. Such warnings serve, naturally, to advertise the coming of the publishers who bear the petition to the people. Have in mind, then, that fair-minded Catholics, as well as many non-Catholics, expect your call with the petition.

Page 31, Choosing booklet, may be shown to aid any questioner to understand that the Nazi aim and the Hierarchy's aim are one and the same. Others particularly relish the clearly stated issue: "If the message Jehovah's witnesses are bringing to the people is true, then it is of the greatest importance to mankind. If it is false, then it is the duty of the clergymen who thus claim to come boldly forward and plainly tell the people wherein that message is false. The radio is the best means to thus reach the people at large." (Crisis booklet, page 41) The time to 'call the bluff' of scornful men is here.

In some instances persons whose sympathies lie with the lords of the Hierarchy have been moved to act violently against those who present the petition. Such rare cases stand

out in bold contrast, however, to the large percentage of even the so-called "Catholic population" who are signing the petition because they long to hear the truth plainly spoken, so listeners may judge and choose intelligently. No longer can it be said that 'the bishop decides for his people what they shall or shall not hear'.

On the part of publishers, essentials for this work are "patient continuance in well doing", never-flagging zeal for Jehovah and his truth, and firmness and kindness in dealing with every situation as met. Jehovah's commission (Isaiah 61: 1-3) to his anointed witnesses authorizes them to make known the good news to the meek. The meek willingly listen to learn, that they may go in the way of truth, to Jehovah's praise. Presentation of the petition to such persons of good will affords them opportunity to go on record as to their appreciation of righteousness, fair play. All such, whether Catholic or non-Catholic, must learn and obey God's requirements in order to live. Daily the issue is being more clearly seen and declared: It is TRUTH VERSUS FALSEHOOD; Jehovah's Word against the entrenched lies fathered by Satan and his Hierarchy's scornful leaders whose conspiracy against Jehovah's anointed as been inspired by Satan.

Companies having large quantities of filled petition sheets to send to Brooklyn at end of September may send them by express, insured.

Ten Months' Comparison

September is a booklet month this year. However, a year ago 803,829 booklets were placed in September; and the figures below show that we are 255,262 booklets behind last year in ten months. We shall have to put out 'way over a million booklets during September. Booklets with signers to petition should go fast. Let's put in time.

This change is being made to aid in a wider distribution of the Kingdom message, and the contribution of 25c applies not only to *Riches*, but, in addition, to all the bound books that Brother Rutherford has written, from *The Harp of God* to *Riches* inclusive, in any and all languages.

The publishers were previously sent the English testimony card for *Riches*. This is now translated into all languages in which *Riches* is available, and offers *Riches* on a 25c contribution. We shall be glad to supply these foreign testimony cards on your order. They are not to be used until October 1, of course, as the foreign books are placed on a 35c contribution until then. Be sure that the testimony card you use states the proper contribution at all times

Be sure to order now all the Riches you need for October and November. Stockkeepers, company servants, check your Riches, and order. You'll need them in October.

Soiled Literature

From time to time complaints are received because of the careless manner in which some brethren handle the literature entrusted to them on credit, and of their habit of returning to the company stock soiled books and booklets.

The arrangement of allowing a publisher a limited supply of literature on credit is to aid him to have a full share in the witness. Each one who takes literature under this arrangement automatically obligates himself to remit to the treasurer for this stock as placed or, if he cannot place it, return it within a reasonable time in first-class condition.

The stockkeeper is not to take back soiled literature from anyone. Each one who soils literature is responsible for placing it and remitting in full therefor. In fairness to all, the company should see that this rule is strictly enforced.

Transfers

Whenever a transfer of stock is authorized by the Society, it is understood that the literature to be transferred is in first-class condition; otherwise the company, pioneer or auxiliary taking over the literature can and should properly refuse to accept such of it as is damaged or soiled.

Have You Considered Jehovah's Service Organization?

The August Special Issue of the Informant stated that its contents are to be studied carefully by the publishers. As this is done the organization and its operation will be clear in the minds of the brethren, and this will be greatly to their advantage and to the interests of the Kingdom service. Note that the new manner of counting time begins October 1, or, more specifically, September 28.

It will be readily seen that those brethren who used to be listed under the designation of "sharpshooter" are now to proceed as company organizations. Their local work is to be organized and carried out as outlined in the *Informant*, and thus more efficient and effective service can be rendered to the honor of Jehovah's name. If your company has not yet sent in its recommendation for company servant for the coming year, action should be taken on this at once in accordance with the previous instructions you have received.

It will be readily seen also that in the selection of brethren in the companies for the duties of study chairmen and other work the thing to be considered is the work to be done and who can do it well. There is no reason why a company or service committee should select one to be a study chairman, or to some other such duty, just because he has been in the truth for a long time and will feel slighted and hurt if he is not appointed, when there is someone else more capable who might be selected. The Informant calls attention to the proper manner of choosing workers in the company organization.

Let all the publishers work orderly, and harmoniously, and perform their part in Jehovah's service organization.

Relative to Radio Service

It is well for the brethren to write to the radio stations that broadcast the lectures of Brother Rutherford, expressing from time to time how well the programs come over, and manifesting appreciation of the broadcasts. You may write, not only to the local radio station in your particular territory, but to more distant stations as well. Sometime check up the list of stations on the radio folder, tune in on a more distant one, and then, after hearing the lecture, write the station. All the brethren and all people of good will may do this from time to time, so that the stations themselves will know that the programs are appreciated. This should be done in a businesslike manner.

Placards Handbills Sound

There is no greater organization in the world today than that formed by Jehovah. He has instructed His people to preach this gospel of the Kingdom in all the world for a wit-ness, and that, by His grace, they will do. Conventions such as this one at Newark require much advertising, and the Lord's people appreciate this opportunity of putting forth an extraordinary effort, particularly in an area where more than 2,000,000 people will be informed of the Kingdom.

How to Advertise

All cars coming to the convention at Newark who can arrange it, should prepare large banners which can be mounted on the top of their car, the printing to be painted on sign muslin. Attractive colors should be used, and it should be done neatly. Some might prefer to have tire covers, bumper streamers, anything to attract attention and advertise the lecture. In addition to signs on your

car, there will be placards provided at the convention, Arrangements are being made for a "sandwich sign" parade through the business sections of Newark. Each one may bring along his phonograph, with several 4½-minute records, to be used in the regular witness work. The sound-car equipment should be brought along, and on both sides of the horn and on the covers, both front and back, special signs can be made and attached. Spot announcements will be prepared for the sound cars, and these you will get when applying for special sound territory. Handbills will be provided all publishers at the convention, for wide distribution. 

European Conventions

By Jehovah's grace, Brother Rutherford has safely returned from overseas, after a survey of European conditions and a season of intense activity in behalf of the Kingdom interests there. Every Kingdom publisher will want to read the forth-coming issue of *The Golden Age*, containing extensive reports of the European conventions and of the great popular demonstrations at the public addresses by Brother Rutherford, which serve as an index of what you may expect at Newark.

Referring you to the fuller reports to appear in *The Golden Age*, we here set out some of the noteworthy items. You'll see the Lord's blessing. No matter in what country the witness is being given; no matter what language is used, the same spirit of earnest zeal is seen. Brother Rutherford was greatly used by Jehovah to give what is probably the most effective public witness and warning yet given in the European countries visited. Great opposition was manifested by the Roman Cathelle Vicerophy. olic Hierarchy.

Within the last decade, the city of Glasgow has increased its "Cath-olic population" until now there are as many Catholics as Protestants. Brother Rutherford delivered the message of warning in that city on August 2, 1936. So great was the interest that it required three auditoriums to hold the people that came. "Armageddon" was the subject used, and the message was received with greater enthusiasm than at any other time in Scotland. Over 7,000 people crowded into the auditoriums, and many were unable to gain admission. Of course, the Hierarchy was busy warning its "population" not to attend the meetings, but this only served to make a large number of honest Catholics come.

Jehovah's witnesses attending the convention in Glasgow threw them-selves into advertising the big public witness. Over 1,000 participated in the "sandwich sigu" parades, 35 up to 100 in a group, walking up and down the busy streets of Glasgow announcing the public meeting in this very effective way. Over one hundred autos covered the city and outlying districts with banners and

On Sunday, September 13, 1936, London, England, was warned of the near approach of Armageddon. About 3,000 joined in publicizing the big witness. Over a thousand joined in the "sandwich sign" parades. Crowds came to the Alexandra Palace; some got in, many heard on the outside. Powerful loud-speakers served from the roof of the building. The speaker's voice was thus carried a great distance from the Palace into the densely populated area. It would be impossible to estimate how many people heard in this way. Never has Great Britain had such a witness in two of its largest cities.

On September 4, 1936, there gathered in the beautiful and historic city of Lucerne, Switzerland, a convention of Jehovah's witnesses. On Monday, September 7, there was to be a large public witness. Over 3,500 publishers of the Kingdom message attended, from twenty-one different countries. One motive, one thought, dominated all: the honoring of the name of Jehovah. Some had traveled far on foot; others had come a jour-

Order What You Need Everybody a Publisher

Autumn is a busy time for those in Jehovah's service. The fall season is in many respects the most favorable time of the year for the service, and this November promises to be no exception. Every one of Jehovah's people is to have a personal part in the field service. November gives us an opportunity to finish the fall campaign by stressing booklets, inasmuch as along with the continued placing of *Riches*, and any other books when opportunity is had, booklets are to be stressed.

In this work with booklets during all of the month of November, the chief placement will, of course, be the ten-cent combination: Choosing, another colored-cover booklet, and Loyalty or Government, on a tribution of ten cents. The publishers, however, should not confine the booklets they carry with them to just three, but should have a good assortment of booklets with them (there are more than thirty different ones), as well as Riches, so as to be able to take advantage of the many opportunities for placing more. Also, as you have found in your service, often those people whom you ber work; so check up and order.

may happen to meet and who have Choosing, or one of the other booklets, will take something else if you have it; and so an assortment is necessary.

It is entirely in order, and is advisable when it can be done, for larger combinations of booklets to be placed, such as six, on a contri-bution of twenty-five cents, or thirteen, on a contribution of fifty cents. The point to have in mind is that November is a booklet month. The more booklets placed, the greater the witness; so, in addition to the placements of Riches, carry booklets, a good assortment of them, talk booklets, present booklets, place booklets. brethren have on hand testimony cards presenting three-booklet combinations, which they may use. Order the booklets and other lit-

erature you will need for November's work now, including *Riches*, remembering that *Riches* will be pushed again during December. You will wish to have a good stock of Riches in the foreign languages necessary for your particular territory, and these may be included in your orders. As advantage has been taken of previous booklet campaigns to dispose of old stocks of booklets, the stocks of the companies and others will need to be well replenished for the November and Decem-

One, a cripple, hardly able to walk, and poor in this world's goods, propelled himself in his wheel chair over the country roads a distance of nearly 200 miles; but he got there. And was he happy! He was from Germany. Nearly 300 courageously journeyed across the German border into Switzerland in the face of the possibility of arrest and imprison-ment in a concentration camp on their return.

A large municipal building housed the convention. Here was to be the public witness. The "harlot" got busy. She began to allure and seduce the police officials. Lucerne is mostly Catholic. Catholics have votes; police officials need votes to keep them in office. And so "the whore" insisted. Brother Rutherford was served with a notice from the city president that arrest would follow any attempt to hold the meeting. Brother Rutherford in turn served notice personally upon the president that he would be at the auditorium at eight o'clock that evening and that the meeting would be held. He placed the responsibility of any trouble squarely upon the shoulders of this city official. Two hours before the meeting the hall was packed. A large crowd gathered outside. The police came and surrounded the building with the purpose of keep-

ing the people out, but the auditorium was filled long before the police got there.

Brother Rutherford stepped upon the platform on time and a tremendous applause rang out. As the message was carried to the outside through loud-speakers placed in the lobby of the auditorium, the crowds there cheered and shouted. Needless to say, it was clearly pointed out who was behind this attempted stopping of the witness; and from the comments heard throughout the entire audience it was seen that an even greater witness had been effected. Satan always overreaches himself. Jehovah always prevails. Some few disgruntled ones demanded that the police officer in charge have the loud-speakers shut off that were serving the people on the outside. The officer said: "I have no authority to do any such thing. I am only here to carry out the orders I have. That speaker can stay on just as long as it likes; I'm not going to touch it"; and he said this with a smile. Copies of the Resolution were handed out to the police who were forming a cordon around the building, and many read it with much interest.

Tremendous Witness Given in New Jersey

12,000 Hear Brother Rutherford

Declaration and Warning Unanimously Adopted Persecutors Arrest Many Publishers

Jehovah Richly Blessed His Organization

From every state in the Union cars rolled into the city of Newark. The brethren were tired on arrival, but everyone overjoyed with the expectation of serving Jehovah in the enemy's own back yard. The very first thing the publishers did was to register for service. They obtained their territory and prepared for the fight; and it was a fight. All the police departments of every city were duly informed of the convention by letter and were told what the conventioners were going to do. The letter also invited the officials to the public meeting. The higher-ups gave the police their instructions at once and saw to it that some of Jehovah's publishers were put behind the bars.

hind the bars.

Details of the convention, the arrests and persecution will all be set out in *The Golden Age* No. 448.

During Friday, Saturday and Sunday the publishers pressed on in the battle distributing the special Golden Age which contained Brother Rutherford's letter to the president of the United States as set out under the heading "Will Roosevelt Support the Hierarchy?" as well as the articles "Haters of God in Germany, Quebec and New Jersey". This Golden Age didn't set well with the authorities, because it dragged them out into the open; nor did the combination of the booklets Choosing, Universal War Near and Loyalty. The people of New Jersey were being given the opportunity of learning the truth, and it is the truth that hurts the Devil's wicked crowd. Each day found an increase in the number of publishers, beginning with 1,000 on Friday, 2,000 on Saturday, and reaching a peak of 4,247 publishers on Sunday. In spite of downpour of rain on Saturday, at times torrential, the brethren moved forward as one army into the out-door field service. It seems as though the Devil put every obstacle in the way of Jehovah's witnesses, but this did not deter them. They were there to serve the Lord, and they were neither surprised nor dismayed at

12.000 Hear Brother Rutherford

The public meeting Sunday was the big feature of the convention, and all the publishers did everything possible to advertise this public meeting. "Sandwich sign" parades were arranged which thoroughly startled the inhabitants of Newark. They could not figure it out; here were well-dressed people, sober-minded progress not redicals are

strikers, walking through the streets unashamed with "sandwich signs" on. That's something that isn't often done. All the automobiles and cars, which numbered approximately 2,000, had large eight-foot signs on them, or placards, and this in itself was a real witness and directed the attention of the people to Armageddon, the greatest battle of all time. The people came. They heard a most thrilling lecture which took Brother Rutherford nearly two hours to deliver. The audience paid rapt attention; applause broke out again and again. The orderliness, the quietness, the intense interest shown by all present were an even open. by all present, were an eye-opener to the police and the authorities in the Armory. To hear Brother Rutherford deliver that lecture on Armageddon was a joy to everyone's heart. The argument presented was so convincing that at the close, when the "Declaration and Warning" was read to the people, 12,000 who packed out the auditorium stood up as one man. There was no hesitation on the part of anyone. As the people left the auditorium a printed copy of the "Declaration and Warning was presented to every person, and, additionally, there were 9,671 books and booklets distributed at the public meeting. A wonderful witness was given to the honor and glory of Jehovah's name. WBBR, the Society's own station, carried the lecture, which covers splendidly all of the New Jersey area, and was heard even as far north as Troy, N. Y.

Jehovah brought to His people rich blessings Saturday afternoon, when Brother Rutherford spoke on the prophetic drama of Joseph and his brethren. This was a great comfort and aid, meat in due season, to everyone. There were well over 6,000 conventioners in attendance at this meeting.

Pioneers Rejoice

The pioneers came from every nook and corner. Those registering showed that they came from their territory in forty different states and there were quite a few there from the various parts of Canada. The pioneers were thrilled beyond words at the privilege of being there, and appreciated the arrangement the Society made for taking care of their expenses to and from the convention as well as providing them with a free meal ticket. With it they could get anything that was offered at the cafeteria. It was interesting to note that all these pioneers were on hand Friday morning ready for the service. They all registered, got needed literature, and went out in the field

'Rise Up and Shout Against Her'

The Newark convention is over, but the witness there commenced will continue. Of those in attendance 114 were arrested for the offense of worshiping Almighty God in New Jersey. The following cities joined in the conspiracy to jail Jehovah's witnesses:

Caldwell Harrison Hoboken Jersey City Lyndhurst Middlesex Montclair North Arlington Orange Prospect Park Ridgefield Park Union City Weehawken

At Hoboken 35 have been sentenced to prison for thirty days each, and one for sixty days. At Jersey City 17 have been sentenced for ten days each. At Weehawken 5 have received thirty-day sentences. Trials are still pending in 34 cases. Others have been released without trial.

The trials of these brethren were a disgrace to any community that claims to be civilized. Judges acted in a dual capacity of court and prosecutor. Convictions were entered without evidence. A thirty-day sentence was given in one case for declining to testify. Many were sentenced just for being in the city with Bible literature in their possession.

Back of this cruel and outrageous maladministration of justice is the conspiracy of the Roman Catholic Hierarchy to suppress truth, right-

eousness and freedom of worship. A prominent "child" of the Catholic church is Mayor Frank Hague, of Jersey City. Hague is the political boss of New Jersey, and his power is such that a word from him is law in most of the state. There is good reason to believe that Mayor Hague is co-operating with the Hierarchy in this Inquisition. These persecutors pose before the world as clean men. Fittingly applied to them are the words of Jesus at Matthew 23: 27, 28.

(Continued from page 1, column 4) the affair and hold open hearings thereon, in order that those guilty of the unholy conspiracy may be brought to justice; state that such actions are destructive of American liberties and a disgrace to the state of New Jersey, and that all officials supporting or condoning such proceedings are responsible before Almighty God therefor. Tell Mayor Hague that if he has any regard for public decency and the rights of Christian people he will use his influence to bring such unholy persecution to an end.

The brethren incarcerated are from many states. If one or more are from your area, write to your local congressmen and senators and protest to them over the treatment given a citizen of their state. Advise them to investigate and demand a Congressional investigation of these inhuman and pernicious tactics.

Write these letters in your own words. Make them short, concise and strong. Demand action. 'Rise and shout against her' with all your might. Write on only one side of the paper. Use a typewriter if possible. Keep a copy of your letter. Don't wait. Do it now.

There is much work to be done with Riches. It has been available for but a few months, and while the companies have been using it in their territory during the past summer with good results, it seems they are, as it were, just getting started. "His Victory" period offers another opportunity to concentrate on this publication. The Watchtower states:

entitled Riches, setting forth the
plain truths of and concerning his
kingdom and fully exposing the enemy, and particularly the modern

Who Will Take Part?

How can one share in the victory of the present warfare without making use of the most effective instrument against the modern Philistines to date: *Riches?* "Who will have a part in that witness work? Jehovah's remnant, being of the bride class, will engage in this work. The Jona-

dabs, or great multitude, will hear and also join in the witness work, saying to the people, 'Come.' EVERY-ONE WHO LOVES GOD will have a part in this witness work."

When Riches cannot be taken, drop to the booklets. This is important, and every publisher is to make a practice of offering booklets, so that in addition to combinations including Riches, and Riches books themselves, a large number of booklets will be left with the people. If the person witnessed to cannot take the combination or Riches, do not leave at once without calling his attention to the three-booklet combination, or, finally, one booklets. We are responsible for making good use of this literature which Jehovah has put in our hands. So remember the booklets at each call.

Even in the homes where Riches has been placed previously, the work in connection therewith is not finished. Additional calls there will enable the publisher not only to stimulate interest in the book if it should be that some of the family have not read it yet, but to present additional literature to them, explaining the necessity of further Bible study. The phonograph used in these homes will aid in this, and in presenting the Watchtower and Golden Age magazines to them with the view of obtaining the subscriptions.

This means that in addition to *Riches* and the booklets mentioned, you will, during "His Victory", as at other times, carry a good assortment of booklets, and one or more other bound books if you can do so; also the phonograph. This latter you can introduce and use whether the people have previously procured *Riches* or not.

Back Calls During "HIS VICTORY"

During "His Victory" testimony period, make back calls (preferably on those evenings when you are not doing the regular house-to-house witnessing) on interested persons you have found during the day, or on others whose names have been previously obtained. Such names and addresses should be furnished with the territory assignment to the publishers. At all back calls take the phonograph; and if you know you will be back in the territory the following day, you can often leave it overnight with some interested, reliable persons, for them to use until you pick it up the next day for your field service.

Even those whose extreme age or feeble physical condition prevents them from carrying the new, light phonograph from house to house opportunities for inaugurating the winter campaign in the most efficient manner, including evenings set aside for phonograph witnessing parties.

Get All Your Booklet Stock Out on the Counter

Devote the Remainder of December and All of January to Witnessing with Booklets

The inventory of the companies' stock shows that they have approximately 5,500,000 colored-cover booklets on hand and a fair supply of self-covered booklets. Beginning with December 14, until the end of January, every company servant and stockkeeper should see to it that a good supply of your booklet stock s put out on the counter so that the brethren can see them and take them into the field. In order to make up the special combination of seven, on 25c contribution, take two selfcovered booklets, Loyalty, Government (or any other self-covered booklets that you have on hand), with *Choosiny* and four other col-ored-cover booklets. This makes a total of seven. A special testimony card for seven booklets is being sent with this *Informant*, and the breth-ren should use it during the period

For some time now we have been offering booklets, three on 10c contribution. What we desire everyone to do during the winter months is to offer seven booklets on a contribution of 25c, or fourteen on a contribution of 50c, which many have reported is a very attractive offer. Always carry *Riches* and other bound books with you, and if you can place them, do so; but your main and first offer should be seven booklets on 25c contribution. Do not carry only seven different booklets with you, but have the complete assortment, so that you can offer four-teen. That combination of fourteen booklets should include four selfcovered booklets and ten coloredcover booklets.

On your back calls with the phonograph, have a full array of booklets with you, as well as bound books. You can spread the booklets out on the table and let them have their choice of seven or more, thus giving

can participate in the phonograph work by locating interested persons in the field service for back calls to be made either by themselves or by other publishers. Of course, all publishers should be familiar with the Riches studies and other studies in the territory, so they may invite persons to attend, using the invitation slip for that purpose. them a good supply of reading material. Reports have been received from various sections of the country that the brethren fail to carry with them more literature than that used in the particular campaign in effect. The Lord has provided us with many publications, and everyone should always have a good assortment, so that when we meet persons who have the books we are offering, or the booklets, we can always show them something else.

It is rather easy to handle booklets in the winter months, when it is cold. You can display them well in your hand, and can carry a lot of booklets in your bag. It is much easier to display seven booklets than three bound books; so let's place booklets this winter.

We can't overstate the importance of carrying *Riches* at all times; so stockkeepers should inquire of each publisher if he has *Riches* with his assortment of booklets.

In another article in this Informant you will find what the brethren did in October. Please note the tremendous drop in booklet distribution. October has always been about the best month in the year, but for some reason it has taken a terrible drop this year. Every person interested in the Kingdom should now be a publisher and help to get the booklets off the shelves of the company stockroom and into the hands of the people. If all the company publishers put in a good number of hours during December and January, we should be able to dispose of most of this booklet stock. According to the figures we have on hand, all the booklet stock of the companies could be put out during this period of seven weeks if each publisher placed but 210 booklets, which would be only 30 placements per publisher. That's not many for seven weeks, is it? Some companies may not have as big a supply of booklets on hand as they need; so the company servant and the stockkeeper should check their literature immediately and order such quantities as they require. Have a full assortment of all booklets, particularly Loyalty and Government. Remember, now, and get ready for it: seven booklets on a contribution of 25c for the next seven weeks after "HIS VICTORY".

It is His victory, the victory of Jehovah by and through Christ Jesus and his kingdom, that is the earnest desire of everyone who takes the right side in this present warfare. These are charged with the obligation and responsibility of giving a good account of the many things which have been given and entrusted to them, and must put forth an earnest effort to support the organization of Jehovah's people, even as the Israelites of old were obligated to pay their tithes for the support of the temple work. The foregoing table tells an eloquent though unexplainable story that is anything but encouraging. There was a very definite drop in the witness work in this country for the month of October-1,177,000 pieces of literature less than for October last year. Some will undoubtedly say that that is easily accounted for in that we offered three booklets on a 10c contribution in 1935 and featured the Riches book

While that is true and accounts for some of the difference in the amount of literature placed, it by no means accounts for a great many other details in this report. For illustration: It does not account for the fact that we had over one thousand fewer publishers in the field this October, or account for the fact that we put in over 108,000 fewer hours in the work during October this year. Nor does it explain why the publishers averaged 3½ hours less time in the field than last October; nor does it explain the deficit of over a half million in sound attendance this year. All these facts are really unexplainable. For some reason the brethren did not take hold of the witness work in October this year in the manner they should. October is the best month of the year, generally. It is the one month of the year when the Lord's witnesses everywhere should be storing up a reserve of time which they could draw on during the severe winter months that follow.

However, there is nothing that can be done about what has taken place in the past. Nothing can be accomplished by bemoaning the condition. The thing to do, therefore, is to face the fact that we have a very decided deficit in every branch of the work and for each and every one to accept his responsibility in overcoming that deficit and bringing

Building Up Your Wet-Battery Portable **Transcription Machine**

Can You Use a Sound Car Equipment?

We are pleased to advise that the Society is in position now to rebuild the wet-battery portable transcription machine into No. 3 sound equipment. We can handle this work this winter so that any who desire to take advantage of the opportunity and have a No. 3 equipment instead of just the wet-battery portable transcription machine by next spring may make arrangements now. The additional equipment can be built up from your present wet-battery portable transcription machine. If your machine has a serial number lower than 451 it will be necessary to send your machine to the factory here and have it altered. It will be equipped with two-speed motor and microphone and be generally overhauled and put in first-class condition, and then the additional sound equipment will be placed on it to make it a No. 3 equipment. If your machine has a serial number above 451 it will not be necessary to return the machine to the factory, as all of that series have two-speed motor and microphone already attached.

The cost for building up your equipment is \$90 where a microphone is required, or \$80 if you have your own microphone. Write the office for full information regarding this matter and the Society's arrangement for time payments on this work. Do not send your equipment to the factory, however, until you are definitely instructed to do so by the Society's office. Present orders will require our entire output of No. 3 equipments for December and January, but during February and March, we believe, we can take care of all rebuilt jobs.

Do You Take Subscriptions?

The frequent repetition of an important matter which is part of our service to Jehovah should impress us with the necessity of giving heed thereto.

Continually our attention is called to the importance that all publishers not only subscribe for The Watchtower and The Golden Age them-selves, but, in their witness work, take subscriptions for these publications whenever possible.

Not only should sample copies of The Golden Age and The Watch-tower be carried for demonstrating to the interested persons, but the fine description of these two journals in the Society's catalogue may be brought to the attention of the people as an aid in pointing out to them the importance of regularly receiving these magazines in their homes.

If the person to whom you witness has the publications you present at the time, make it a point to present other books, booklets, and The Watchtower and The Golden Age. Many of the people who have some of the literature and like it do not realize that there are available more than thirty of the book-lets, fifteen of the bound books, and, in addition, The Watchtower and The Golden Age. Part of our work is to acquaint them with these pub

Are You Using One? Back Calls Real Aid to Jonadabs

Those who have really taken advantage of the phonograph work find it the most thrilling and effective means of proclaiming the Kingdom message. Similar to all other features of the Lord's work, we must, of course, creep before we can walk or run. We cannot hope to be proficient and have the most effective method all at once. We must keep at it, become accustomed to introducing and using the phonograph so that we do it in a natural and an effective way; and when this is mastered it will be found that this is one of the best means of preaching the Kingdom gospel.

It is one of the best, first, because the phonograph is a provision made by the Lord to be used at this time the glory of His name, and, secondly, because it is a practical and reasonable method of presenting the Kingdom message. It enables one to make a clear and concise presentation of the truth without interruption, which is something that can rarely be done by the witnesses if they try to do it themselves. No one should become discouraged because the use of the phonograph is a little awkward at first. The same is true of the witness work in general. When we first started out we were awkward and nervous and found it difficult. The same is true of our use of the testimony card and other features of the work that the Lord brings to our attention from time to time. If we had rebelled back there and refused to avail ourselves of the Lord's provisions, where would we be today? Not participating in the Kingdom witness work, that is

Let us recognize, then, that the phonograph is the Lord's provision for His people and that the use of the phonograph is really organization instructions, which are not discretionary, but entirely mandatory, and let us apply ourselves to its use, and the Lord will bless us with success. of the slip, and follow up by saying, 'Now if you would be interested in hearing these all-important ques-tions answered from the Biblical standpoint, we, Jehovah's witnesses, would enjoy aiding you to an understanding of these all-important subjects by bringing to your home phonograph records explaining these questions.' Then I call their attention to the special service note at the bottom. It has proved very helpful with the ones I have been privileged to meet with. I've so much enjoyed working with the sound work, and especially the phonograph, as each subject is so short and sharp it just seems to wade right through and tread down Satan's lies and false doctrine. As I always watch the Informant for helps from others along the phonograph line, I felt that these radio folders with the questions on were really a blessing to me, as I've been able to open several more meetings. I take only three questions for one meeting, have my scripture and facts copied down, and have the records that most nearly explain them; as, for the first three questions I use "Rebellion" first, "Armageddon," "Sheep lion" first, "Armageddon," "Sheep and Goats." It usually takes half an hour to get under way enough to get them to open up and start asking questions. Then the evening is always well spent, and I am invited back, as they always notice I have other records that I haven't played the first night. Care of Phonographs

Quite a few of the brethren have lost the set screw which holds the needle in the reproducer of their phonograph. In order to prevent this, so that we shall not have to replace them, we suggest that before you close up your phonograph after using it you turn the needle screw of the reproducer all the way in. Don't turn it too tight, but just tight enough to know it can't be turned any more. If you do this the screw will not be lost. Do not leave needles in the phonograph repro-
