Something about "he lets them harden their hearts". So you are on your own.

Jesus' response was to refer them back to their own Law: "Is it not written in your Law,..." (Jn 10:34)

If any of you suspect that i get emails refuting my findings, but that i ignore them, i do not.

I get very few emails regarding scriptural understanding, and none of them have refuted anything i have written.

I share those emails with you, and as you can see from them, when scriptures are actually sent to me, they are within copied and pasted quotes from JW publications, or misapplied personal opinion, not from the emailer using scripture to point out a flaw in my reasoning.

Regarding the GB, they are supposed to feed Christ's lambs and little sheep, that is to say, the new ones to the teachings of Christ. But they still hold on to them even after they have become mature Christians. (see my article "Feed My Lambs")

The GB are supposed to only pass on the words of God and Christ given to us in the Bible.

(Hebrews 13:7) Remember those who are taking the lead among you, <u>who have spoken the</u> word of God to you, and as you contemplate how their conduct turns out, imitate their faith.

If we should not question those taking the lead, why would the Bible tell us to do so? (1Th 5:21) They may be *"taking the lead"* but that does not mean that we are to follow blindly though. As the 2017 Watchtower says: "Never be content passively or blindly to accept what you hear. (Proverbs 14:15) Use your God-given thinking abilities and power of reason to make the truth your own." (*w*17 7/15 p. 28 pars. 3, 4)

The words we are to believe, the words we are to act on, are the words from the Bible. "The word of God." Not the words of men. Like a waiter or a server in a restaurant, the job of the GB (and any Christian teacher) is not to make the food, or to cook it, but only to serve it. (Mr 8:6)

(Hebrews 13:7) <u>Remember</u> those who are taking the lead among you, who have spoken the word of God to you, and as you contemplate how their conduct turns out, <u>imitate their faith</u>.

That verse does <u>not</u> say that after we have contemplated how the conduct of those taking the lead turns out and find it acceptable, that we are to listen to and believe their own personal teachings, opinions, or interpretations, or even to obey them. No, but it tells us to "*remember*" them and *"imitate their faith."* The orders and commandments we are to obey come from the Bible.

Yes, Hebrews 13:17 says to "be <u>obedient</u> to those who are taking the lead among you and be <u>submissive</u>," but as i show in my article "Are You Worshiping Jehovah Acceptably? - Expanded", that obedience and submission is referring to imitating their faith, not following their orders.

Christ refers to us as sheep who follow their shepherd. A shepherd does not drive the sheep forward with commands and orders and directions. He leads the way. And if a sheep wishes to be in his flock, it will follow.

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At John 8:40 Christ said: "But now you are seeking to kill me, a man who has told you the truth that I heard from God."

I too have "told you the truth that I heard from God." How did i hear it from God? I read it in His words spoken to all of us: the Bible.

Although the Bible commands us to "make sure", many become upset when i share my results from making sure.

They cannot find any fault with my findings, so they condemn me instead.

It is disappointing and sad. (Pr 1:22; 17:16)

(John 8:31, 32) Then Jesus went on to say to the Jews who had believed <u>him</u>: "If you remain in <u>my word</u>, you are really my disciples, <sup>32</sup> and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."

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Did you read what i wrote and think i am arrogantly comparing myself to Christ? Well i am. AND YOU SHOULD TOO!

We are Christians! We are supposed to follow his example and act like him.

(John 13:15) For I set the pattern for you, that just as I did to you, you should also do.

(1 Peter 2:21) In fact, to this course you were called, because even Christ suffered for you, leaving a model for you to follow his steps closely.

If you are not emulating Christ, you are not a Christian, because that is part of what it means to be a Christian: to be Christlike.

No one does it perfectly, but we should all try our best. And when we do, we will be treated as he was.

(John 15:20) A slave is not greater than his master. If they have persecuted me, they will also persecute you; if they have observed my word, they will also observe yours.

Since Jesus' day men have chosen the words of their religious leaders over the words in the Bible. And when anyone dared to point out any contradictions, they paid the price for it.

(2 Timothy 3:12) In fact, all those desiring to live with <u>godly devotion</u> in association with Christ Jesus <u>will also be persecuted</u>.

Yes, "godly devotion" is what we should strive for. Not devotion to men, no matter how good and righteous and well intended we think those men are.
