¹ Our Web site, jw.org, is designed to appeal to people of all ages. The section of the Web site entitled "Children" (go to Bible Teachings > Children) helps young children and their parents to draw close to one another and to Jehovah. (Deut. 6:6, 7) How can you use this section to teach your children?

² Be Adaptable: Each child has unique

³ Family Worship Projects: These projects are tools to help family heads study with their children. To learn how to use the stories and activities, click the download button, and read the "Parents' Guide" for each project. Use picture activities, such as coloring pages, to teach younger children. Help older children to complete the study activities. All the activities in each project relate to the same Bible story or lesson, so children of all ages can participate in the same family worship project.

⁴ **Become Jehovah's Friend:** The videos, songs, and activities in this section of our Web site help parents to inculcate God's Word into their little children. (Deut. 31:12) Each short animated video teaches an important lesson. Activities such as search-and-find games underscore those lessons. Since children often like to sing—and songs help children to remember what they have learned—Kingdom songs and songs written especially for children are posted regularly.

⁵ Parents, Jehovah wants you to be successful mothers and fathers. So ask him to help you teach your children the truth. (Judg. 13:8) With Jehovah's support, you can train your children to become "wise for salvation through the faith in connection with Christ Jesus."—2 Tim. 3:15; Prov. 4:1-4.

prophet. Jeremiah had been carrying a wooden yoke to signify coming under the yoke of Babylon; Hananiah got violent and broke the yoke. Who could know what Hananiah would do next? So, what did Jeremiah do? We read: "The prophet proceeded to go his way." Yes, Jeremiah left the scene. Later, at Jehovah's direction, he returned and told Hananiah what God would bring about —bondage to the king of Babylon for the Jews and death for Hananiah.—Jer. 28:1-17.

¹² It is clear from this inspired account that in preaching, we do well to couple our boldness with sound judgment. If at one home someone refuses to accept Scriptural reasoning and becomes angry, even threatening violence, we can excuse ourselves courteously and move on to another house. There is no need to have a heated argument with anyone regarding the good news of the Kingdom. By keeping ourselves "restrained under evil," we leave the way open to help the householder at a more favorable time.—*Read 2 Timothy 2:23-25;* Prov. 17:14.

Why is trust in Jehovah so important as we preach the good news? Why should we balance boldness with good judgment?

"DO NOT BE AFRAID"

¹³ True worshippers were affected by the appalling conditions that prevailed before Jerusalem's destruction in 607 B.C.E. You can thus understand why God told Jeremiah: "Do not be afraid." (Jer. 1:8; Lam. 3:57) And Jehovah had him tell others of his people the same encouraging words. (*Read Jeremiah 46:27.*) What insight can we gain

^{13.} Why did Jehovah tell Jeremiah: "Do not be afraid," and why should we consider this?

from this? In this dangerous time of the end, we could occasionally feel fear. At such times, will we listen to Jehovah, who in effect is telling us: "Do not be afraid"? Earlier in this volume, we considered how God sustained Jeremiah during that truly fearful time. Let us briefly review what happened, in order to see a lesson in it for us.

¹⁴ As the Babylonians tightened their grip on Jerusalem, hunger overtook the people. Soon many were without food. (Jer. 37:21) As if the famine were not enough, Jeremiah was trapped in a place that could become his grave. The princes of Judah had pressed weak-willed King Zedekiah to acquiesce. Then they had Jeremiah thrown into a deep cistern. There was no water in it, just a lot of mire. As Jeremiah began sinking into the mud, he could see no human way out. If you had been in that situation, would you not have felt some fear?—Jer. 38:4-6.

¹⁵ Though he was a mortal like us, Jeremiah trusted Jehovah's word that He would never abandon him. (*Read Jeremiah 15:20, 21.*) Did Jehovah reward that trust? We know for a fact that he did. God moved Ebed-melech to defy the princes and rescue Jeremiah. With the king's permission, Ebed-melech pulled the prophet up out of the cistern, rescuing him from death in that muddy deep.—Jer. 38:7-13.

¹⁶ Even when Jeremiah was back standing on solid ground, he was not out of danger. Pleading in Jeremiah's behalf, Ebed-melech had told the king: "He will die where he is because of the famine. For there is no bread anymore in the city." (Jer. 38:9) Food was so scarce in Jerusalem that people were resorting to cannibalism.

^{14, 15. (}a) In what dangerous situation did Jeremiah find himself? (b) How did Jehovah fulfill his promise to protect Jeremiah?

^{16.} From what dangers did Jehovah rescue his loyal ones?

Yet, Jehovah again intervened to save his prophet. And Jeremiah passed on to Ebed-melech a guarantee of protection from Jehovah. (Jer. 39:16-18) Jeremiah had not forgotten God's assurance: "I am with you to deliver you." (Jer. 1:8) With Almighty God guarding those two loyal men, neither human enemies nor hunger would finish them off. They escaped death in that doomed city. What is the point? Jehovah promised protection and fulfilled his promise.—Jer. 40:1-4.

¹⁷ The fulfillment of Jesus' prophecy about the conclusion of the system of things is moving inexorably toward its climax. In the near future, there will occur "signs in sun and moon and stars, and on the earth anguish of nations, not knowing the way out . . . while men become faint out of fear and expectation of the things coming upon the inhabited earth." (Luke 21:25, 26) We must wait to see what form those signs will take and what terror they produce among many. No matter what develops, though, you need never doubt Jehovah's ability and desire to save his people. The out-

come for those who do not have his favor, however, will be quite different. (*Read Jeremiah 8:20; 14:9.*) Even if it seems that his servants are in a condition as hopeless as the dank, dark bottom of a cistern, he can rescue them! God's words to Ebed-melech will apply to his people: "'I shall without fail furnish you an escape, and by the sword you will not fall; and you will certainly come to have your soul as a spoil, because you have trusted in me,' is the utterance of Jehovah."—Jer. 39:18.

¹⁸ "To all those to whom I shall send you, you should go; and everything that I shall command you, you should speak." (Jer. 1:7) Jeremiah's life changed forever when he heard that command from God. From that moment forward, his overwhelming concern was to announce "the word of Jehovah." That phrase appears repeatedly throughout the book of Jeremiah. In the last chapter, Jeremiah relates the capture of Jerusalem and the exiling of its last king, Zedekiah. Yes, Jeremiah continued teaching and exhorting the people of Judah to obey Jehovah until events made it clear that his work was complete.

¹⁹ There are many parallels between Jeremiah's assignment and the public ministry of Jehovah's Witnesses today. Like him, you serve the true God during a time of judgment. Other responsibilities require some of your time and energy; yet the preaching of the good news

is by far the most significant work you can do in this system of things. By means of it, you exalt God's great name and accept his absolute right and authority as Universal Sovereign. (*Read Lamentations 5:19.*) You also demonstrate outstanding love for neighbor by helping others to know the true God and his requirements for life.—Jer. 25:3-6.

²⁰ Regarding the work that Jehovah gave him to do, Jeremiah said: "Your word becomes to me the exultation and the rejoicing of my heart; for your name has been called upon me, O Jehovah God of armies." (Jer. 15:16) Such rejoicing and contentment are set before all today whose hearts move them to speak on behalf of the true God. You thus have good reason to keep proclaiming Jehovah's message, as did Jeremiah.

How can the examples of Jeremiah and Ebed-melech help you to be courageous? What quality of Jeremiah do you want to imitate as you preach?

1 Paul, Sil·va'nus, *a and Timothy, b to the congregation of the Thes-sa-lo'ni-ans in union with God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ:

May you have undeserved kindness and peace.

2 We always thank God when we mention all of you in our prayers, 3 for we continually remember your faithful work, your loving labor, and your endurance because of your hoped in our Lord Jesus Christ in the presence of our God and Fa-

ther. 4 For we know, brothers loved by God, his choosing of you, 5 because the good news we preach did not come to vou with speech alone but also with power and with holy spirit and with strong conviction, just as you know what sort of men we became among you for your sakes. 6 And you became imitators of usa and of the Lord.b seeing that you accepted the word under much tribulation^c with joy of holy spirit, 7 so that you became an example to all the believers in Mac·e·do'ni·a and in A-cha'ia.

8 The fact is, not only has the word of Jehovah* sounded out from vou in Mac·e·do'ni·a and A-cha'ia but your faith in God has spread abroad in every place, a so that we do not need to say anything. 9 For they themselves keep reporting about our first contact with you and how vou turned to God from your idols to slave for a living and true God, 10 and to wait for his Son from the heavens.c whom he raised up from the dead, namely, Jesus, who rescues us from the wrath that is coming.d

You yourselves surely know, brothers, that our visit to you has not been without results.e 2 For although we had first suffered and been insolently treated in Phi·lip'pi. f as you know, we mustered up boldness* by means of our God to tell you the good news of Godg in the face of much opposition.# 3 For the exhortation we give does not spring from error or from uncleanness or with deceit, 4 but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the good news, so we speak to please, not men, but God. who examines our hearts.h

5 In fact, you know that we never used flattering speech or put on any false front with greedy motives: God is witness! 6 Nor have we been seeking glory from men, either from you or from others, though we could be an expensive burden as apostles of Christ. 7 On the contrary, we became gentle in your midst, as when a nursing mother tenderly cares for* her own children. 8 So having tender affection for you, we were determined* to impart to you, not

only the good news of God but also our very selves.*a because vou became so beloved to us.b

9 Surely you remember. brothers, our labor and toil. We were working night and day, so that we would not put an expensive burden on any one of you, when we preached the good news of God to you. 10 You are witnesses. God is also, of how loval and righteous and blameless we behaved toward vou believers. 11 You well know that we kept exhorting and consoling you and bearing witness to each one of you.d just as a fathere does his children, 12 so that you would go on walking worthily of God, who is calling you to his Kingdomg and glory.h

13 Indeed, that is why we also thank God unceasingly, because when you received God's word, which you heard from us, you accepted it not as the word of men but, just as it truthfully is, as the word of God, which is also at work in you believers. 14 For you, brothers, became imitators of the congregations of God in union with Christ Jesus that are in Ju-de'a, because vou suffered at the hands of vour own countrymen the same things that they also are suffering at the hands of the Jews, 15 who even killed the Lord Jesusk and the prophets and persecuted us. Furthermore, they are not pleasing God, but are against the interests of all men, 16 as they try to prevent us from speaking to people of the nations so that these might be saved.m In this way they always fill up the measure of their sins. But his wrath has at last come upon them.n

17 But when we were separated from* you, brothers, for just a short time (in person, not

in our hearts), because of our strong desire, we made every effort to see you in person.*

18 For this reason we wanted to come to you, yes I, Paul, tried not just once but twice; yet Satan cut across our path.

19 For what is our hope or joy or crown of exultation before our Lord Jesus at his presence? Is it not in fact you?^a

20 You certainly are our glory and joy.

3 So when we could bear it no longer, we thought it best to stay on alone in Athens:b 2 and we sent Timothy,c our brother and God's minister* in the good news about the Christ, to make you firm# and comfort vou regarding your faith. 3 so that no one might be shaken* by these tribulations. For you yourselves know that we cannot avoid suffering such things.#d 4 For when we were with you. we used to tell you in advance that we would suffer tribulation. and that is what has happened. just as you know.e 5 That is why, when I could bear it no longer, I sent to learn of your faithfulness, in case somehow the Tempter^g might have tempted you, and our labor might have turned out to be in vain.

6 But Timothy has just now come to us from you^h and has given us the good news about your faithfulness and love, that you always continue to remember us fondly and that you long to see us in the same way as we also do you. **7** That is why, brothers, in all our distress* and tribulation, we have been comforted because of you and the faithfulness you demonstrate.

11 Now may our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus make a way for us to come to you. 12 Moreover, may the Lord cause you to increase, yes, to abound in love for one another and for all, just as we do for you, 13 so that he may make your hearts firm, blameless in holiness before our God² and Father at the presence of our Lord Jesus^d with all his holy ones.

4 Finally, brothers, just as you received instruction from us on how you should walk in order to please God, e just as you are in fact walking, we request you and appeal to you by the Lord Jesus to keep doing it more fully. 2 For you know the instructions* we gave you through the Lord Jesus.

3 For this is the will of God. that you should be holv and abstain from sexual immorality.*g 4 Each one of you should know how to control his own body*h in holiness and honor. 5 not with greedy, uncontrolled sexual passion like the nations have that do not know God.k 6 No one should go beyond proper limits and take advantage of his brother in this matter, because Jehovah* exacts punishment for all these things, just as we told vou previously and also strongly warned you. 7 For God has

called us, not for uncleanness, but for holiness.^a **8** So, then, the man who disregards this is disregarding, not man, but God,^b who gives you his holy spirit.^c

9 However, concerning brotherly love,d you do not need us to write to you, for you yourselves are taught by God to love one another.e 10 In fact, you are doing so toward all the brothers in all of Mac·e·do'ni·a. But we urge you, brothers, to go on doing so in fuller measure. 11 Make it your aim to live quietly and to mind your own business^g and to work with your hands, i just as we instructed you, 12 so that you may walk decently in the eyes of people outside and not need anything.

13 Moreover, brothers, we do not want you to be ignorant* about those who are sleeping in death, so that you may not sorrow as the rest do who have no hope.k 14 For if we have faith that Jesus died and rose again, so too God will bring with him those who have fallen asleep in death through Jesus.m 15 For this is what we tell you by Jehovah's* word, that we the living who survive to the presence of the Lord will in no way precede those who have fallen asleep in death; 16 because the Lord himself will descend from heaven with a commanding call, with an archangel's voice and with God's trumpet, and those who are dead in union with Christ will rise first.º 17 Afterward we the living who are surviving will, together with them, be caught away in cloudsp to meet the Lord in the air: and thus we will always be with the Lord. 18 So keep comforting one another with these words.

Now as for the times and the **3** seasons, brothers, you need nothing to be written to you. 2 For you vourselves know very well that Jehovah's* dava is coming exactly as a thief in the night.b 3 Whenever it is that they are saying, "Peace and security!" then sudden destruction is to be instantly on them, just like birth pains on a pregnant woman, and they will by no means escape. 4 But you, brothers, you are not in darkness, so that the day should overtake you as it would thieves. 5 for you are all sons of light and sons of day.d We belong neither to night nor to darkness.e

6 So, then, let us not sleep on as the rest do, but let us stay awakeg and keep our senses.h 7 For those who sleep, sleep at night, and those who get drunk are drunk at night. 8 But as for us who belong to the day, let us keep our senses and put the breastplate of faith and love and the hope of salvation as a helmet 9 because God assigned us, not to wrath, but to the acquiring of salvation^k through our Lord Jesus Christ. **10** He died for us, so that whether we stay awake or are asleep.* we should live together with him. 11 Therefore, keep encouraging* one another and building one another up. n just as you are in fact doing.

12 Now we request you, brothers, to show respect for those who are working hard among you and presiding over you in the Lord and admonishing you; 13 and to give them extraordinary consideration in love because of their work. Be peaceable with one another. 14 On the other hand, we

urge you, brothers, to warn* the disorderly, a speak consolingly to those who are depressed, support the weak, be patient toward all. See that no one repays injury for injury to anyone, but always pursue what is good toward one another and to all others.

17 Pray constantly.^f
18 Give thanks for everything.^g
This is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.
19 Do not put out the fire of the spirit.^h
20 Do not treat prophecies with contempt.^f
21 Make sure of all things;^f hold fast to what is fine.

a result we ourselves take pride in you³ among the congregations of God because of your endurance and faith in all your persecutions and the hardships* that you are suffering.**b 5 This is a proof of the righteous judgment of God, leading to your being counted worthy of the Kingdom of God, for which you are indeed suffering.⁵

6 This takes into account that it is righteous on God's part to repay tribulation to those who make tribulation for you.d 7 But you who suffer tribulation will be given relief along with us at the revelation of the Lord Jesuse from heaven with his powerful angels 8 in a flaming fire, as he brings vengeance on those who do not know God and those who do not obey the good news about our Lord Jesus.g These very ones will undergo the judicial punishment of everlasting destruction^h from before the Lord and from the glory of his strength, 10 at the time when he comes to be glorified in connection with his holy ones and to be regarded in that day with wonder among all those who exercised faith, because the witness we gave met with faith among you.

What is the Bible's viewpoint as to interfaith?

How did Jesus view religious leaders who pretended to be righteous but disrespected God? "Jesus said to them: 'If God were your Father, you would love me, for from God I came forth and am here. Neither have I come of my own initiative at all, but that One sent me forth. . . . You are from your father the Devil, and you wish to do the desires of your father. That one was a manslayer when he began, and he did not stand fast in the truth, because truth is not in him. When he speaks the lie, he speaks according to his own disposition, because he is a liar and the father of the lie. Because I, on the other hand, tell the truth, you do not believe me. . . . This is why you do not listen, because you are not from God."—John 8:42-47.

Would it demonstrate loyalty to God and to his righteous standards if his servants were to embrace in religious brotherhood those who themselves practice what God condemns or who condone such practices? "Quit mixing in company with anyone called a brother that is a fornicator or a greedy person or an idolater or a reviler or a drunkard or an extortioner, not even eating with such a man. . . . Neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor men kept for unnatural purposes, nor men who lie with men, nor thieves, nor greedy persons, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners will inherit God's kingdom." (1 Cor. 5:11; 6:9, 10) "Whoever . . . wants to be a friend of the world is constituting himself an enemy of God." (Jas. 4:4) "O you lovers of Jehovah, hate what is bad. He is guarding the souls of his loyal ones."—Ps. 97:10.

2 Cor. 6:14-17: "Do not become unevenly yoked with unbelievers. For what fellowship do righteousness and lawlessness have? Or what sharing does light have with darkness? Is belonging to an organized religion necessary?

Most religious organizations have produced bad fruitage. It is not the fact that groups are organized that is bad. But many have promoted forms of worship that are based on false teachings and are largely ritualistic instead of providing genuine spiritual guidance; they have been misused to control the lives of people for selfish objectives; they have been overly concerned with money collections and ornate houses of worship instead of spiritual values; their members are often hypocritical. Obviously no one who loves righteousness would want to belong to such an organization. But true religion is a refreshing contrast to all of that. Nevertheless, to fulfill the Bible's requirements, it must be organized.

Heb. 10:24, 25: "Let us consider one another to incite to love and fine works, not forsaking the gathering of ourselves together, as some have the custom, but encouraging one another, and all the more so as you behold the day drawing near." (To carry out this Scriptural command, there must be Christian meetings that we can attend on a consistent basis. Such an arrangement encourages us to express love toward others, not only concern about self.)

let him do a single thing for his father or his mother.³ 13 Thus you make the word of God invalid by your tradition that you have handed down.⁵ And you do many things like this.⁷ 14 So calling the crowd to him again, he said to them: "Listen to me, all of you, and understand the meaning.^d 15 Nothing from outside a man that enters into him can defile him; but the things that come out of a man are the things that defile him."^e

17 Now when he had entered a house away from the crowd, his disciples began to question him about the illustration. 18 So he said to them: "Are you also without understanding like them? Are you not aware that nothing from outside that enters into a man can defile him. 19 since it enters, not into his heart, but into his stomach, and it passes out into the sewer?" Thus he declared all foods clean. 20 Further, he said: "That which comes out of a man is what defiles him.g 21 For from inside, out of the heart of men,h come injurious reasonings, sexual immorality,* thefts, murders, 22 acts of adultery, greed, acts of wickedness, deceit, brazen conduct,* an envious eye, blasphemy, haughtiness, and unreasonableness. 23 All these wicked things come from within and defile a man."

24 He rose up from there and went into the region of Tyre and Si'don. There he entered into a house and did not want anyone to know it, but he could not escape notice. 25 Immediately, a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit

heard about him and came and fell down at his feet. 26 The woman was a Greek, a Sy-rophoe·ni'cian by nationality;* and she kept asking him to expel the demon from her daughter. 27 But he said to her: "First let the children be satisfied, for it is not right to take the bread of the children and throw it to the little dogs." b But she replied to him: "Yes, sir, and yet even the little dogs underneath the table eat of the crumbs of the little children." 29 At that he said to her: "Because you said this, go; the demon has gone out of your daughter."c 30 So she went away to her home and found the young child lying on the bed, and the demon was gone.d

31 When Jesus returned from the region of Tyre, he went through Si'don to the Sea of Gal'i-lee, through the region of De·cap'o·lis.*e 32 Here they brought him a deaf man with a speech impediment, f and they pleaded with him to lay his hand on him. 33 And he took him aside privately, away from the crowd. Then he put his fingers into the man's ears, and after spitting, he touched his tongue.g 34 And looking up into heaven, he sighed deeply and said to him: "Eph'pha·tha," that is, "Be opened." 35 At this his ears were opened, h and his speech impediment was removed, and he began speaking normally. 36 With that he ordered them not to tell anyone, but the more he would order them, the more they would proclaim it. 37 Indeed, they were astounded bevond measure.k and they said: "He has done all things well.
