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Keeping Our Promises to God

Our dedication to God is undoubtedly the most important promise we can make. By taking this step, we demonstrate that we want to serve Jehovah forever. While God's commandments are not burdensome, it may not always be easy to do his will, living as we do in this wicked system of things. (2 Timothy 3:12; 1 John 5:3) But once we have 'put our hand to the plow' and have become dedicated servants of Jehovah and disciples of his Son, Jesus Christ, we should never look back at the things of the world that we have left behind.—Luke 9:62.

When we pray to Jehovah, we may feel moved to promise him that we will fight to overcome a weakness, cultivate a Christian quality, or increase some aspect of our theocratic activity. What will help us follow through on these promises?—Compare Ecclesiastes 5:2-5.

Sincere promises stem from the heart as well as the mind. Therefore, let us back up our promises to Jehovah by opening our hearts to him in prayer, honestly expressing our fears, desires, and weaknesses. Praying about a promise will strengthen our resolve to keep it. We could look on our promises to God as debts. When debts are large, payment has to be made gradually. Likewise, many promises we make to Jehovah will take time to fulfill. But by regularly giving him what we can, we show that we mean what we say, and he will bless us accordingly.

We can demonstrate that we take our promises seriously by praying about them often, perhaps each day. This will show our heavenly Father that we are sincere. It will also serve as a regular reminder. David left us a fine example in this regard. In song, he beseeched Jehovah: "Do hear, O God, my entreating cry. Do pay attention to my prayer. . . . I will make melody to your name forever, that I may pay my vows day after day."—Psalm 61:1, 8.

TRUST IS ESSENTIAL TO OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD

⁶ Can you bring a distressing problem to Jehovah in prayer and thereafter be at peace, knowing that you have done what you can about the situation and he will handle the rest? Yes, you can! **(Read Psalm 62:8; 1 Peter 5:7.)** Learning to do so is an important aspect of developing a relationship with Jehovah. Yet, trusting that Jehovah will provide what you need can be quite a challenge. Why? One reason may be that Jehovah does not always respond right away.—Ps. 13:1, 2; 74:10; 89:46; 90:13; Hab. 1:2.

⁷ Why does Jehovah not give us an immediate response to our every request? Recall that he likens our relationship with him to that of children with a father. (Ps. 103:13) A child cannot rightly expect a parent to grant every request or to do so right away. Some of a child's requests may be mere passing whims. Others must wait till the time is right. Still others may not be in the child's best interests or in the best interests of others involved. Furthermore, to concede immediately to a child's every request would change the relationship to one of master and slave, the child being the master. Similarly, Jehovah may in our best interests allow time to pass before his response to our prayers becomes evident. That is his prerogative as our wise Creator, loving Master, and heavenly Father. Fulfilling all our requests right away would distort the proper relationship between us and him.—Compare Isaiah 29:16; 45:9.

⁸ Another factor is that Jehovah is fully aware of our limitations. (Ps. 103:14) Therefore, he does not expect us to endure in our own strength but offers us his fatherly help. Of course, at times, we might feel that we cannot go on anymore. But Jehovah assures us that he will never allow his servants to suffer beyond their limit of endurance. Yes, he will "make the way out." (Read 1 Corinthians 10:13.) Therefore, we have good reason to trust that Jehovah's assessment of what we can bear is right.

⁹ When relief does not immediately follow our prayers for help, let us wait on the One who knows just when to act in our behalf. Remember that he too is exercising patience, for he is ever eager to come to our rescue. "Jehovah is waiting patiently to show you favor, and he will rise up to show you mercy. For Jehovah is a God of justice. Happy are all those keeping in expectation of him."—Isa. 30:18.

¹³ Consider this: From his prehuman existence, Jesus observed firsthand Jehovah's response to the prayers of His human servants. Then, during his earthly ministry, Jesus used prayer as his means of communicating his feelings to his Father in heaven. Would he have done so—even spending an entire night in prayer—had he thought that Jehovah was not really listening? (Luke 6:12; 22:40-46) Would he have taught his disciples to pray had he thought that prayer was nothing more than a psychological crutch? Clearly, Jesus knew that prayer is real communication with Jehovah. On one occasion, Jesus said: "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. True, I knew that you always hear me." We too can have confidence that Jehovah is the "Hearer of prayer."—John 11:41, 42; Ps. 65:2.

¹⁴ When you are specific in your prayers, you become more keenly aware of Jehovah's answers, even though they may be subtle. Answered prayers will make Jehovah more real to you. In addition, the more you express your innermost concerns to Jehovah, the closer he will draw to you.

¹⁰ The second way in which you can strengthen your desire to serve Jehovah wholeheartedly is by means of your prayers. At Psalm 65:2, we read: "O Hearer of prayer, even to you people of all flesh will come." Even during the time that Israel was God's covenant people, foreigners who came to Jehovah's temple could approach him in prayer. (1 Ki. 8:41, 42) God is not partial. Those who observe his commandments have the assurance that he will listen to them. (Prov. 15:8) Surely, "people of all flesh" include you young ones.

(*it*-2 668 ¶2)

Those Whom God Hears. People "of all flesh" may come to the "Hearer of prayer," Jehovah God. (Ps 65:2; Ac 15:17) Even during the period that Israel was God's "private property," his covenant people, foreigners could approach Jehovah in prayer by recognizing Israel as God's appointed instrument and the temple at Jerusalem as his chosen place for sacrifice. (De 9:29; 2Ch 6:32, 33; compare Isa 19:22.) Later, by Christ's death, the distinction between Jew and Gentile was forever removed. (Eph 2:11-16) At the home of the Italian Cornelius, Peter recognized that "God is not partial, but in every nation the man that fears him and works righteousness is acceptable to him." (Ac 10:34, 35) The determining factor, then, is the heart of the individual and what his heart is moving him to do. (Ps 119:145; La 3:41) Those who observe God's commandments and do "the things that are pleasing in his eyes" have the assurance that his "ears" are also open to them.—1Jo 3:22; Ps 10:17; Pr 15:8; 1Pe 3:12.

CHAPTER NINETEEN

He Protected, He Provided, He Persevered

JOSEPH swung another load onto the donkey's back. Picture him looking around at the darkened village of Bethlehem and patting the flank of the sturdy beast of burden. He was surely thinking of the long trip ahead. Egypt! A foreign people, a foreign tongue, foreign customs—how would his little family adapt to so much change?

² It was not easy to tell the bad news to his beloved wife, Mary, but Joseph braced himself and did it. He told her of the dream in which an angel delivered this message from God: The king, Herod, wanted their little son dead! They had to leave right away. (*Read Matthew 2:13, 14.*) Mary was deeply concerned. How could anyone want to kill her innocent, harmless child? Neither Mary nor Joseph could fathom it. But they trusted in Jehovah, so they readied themselves.

³ Unaware of the unfolding drama, Bethlehem slept as Joseph, Mary, and Jesus slipped out of the village in the darkness. Heading southward, with the sky beginning to lighten in the east, Joseph likely wondered what lay ahead. How could a lowly carpenter protect his family against forces so powerful? Would he always be able to provide for his own? Would he manage to persevere in carrying out this heavy assignment that Jehovah God had given him, to care for and raise this unique child? Joseph faced daunting challenges. As we consider how he rose to meet each one, we will see why fathers today—and all of us—need to imitate the faith of Joseph.

Joseph Protected His Family

⁴ Months earlier, in his hometown of Nazareth, Joseph found

Joseph acted decisively and selflessly to protect his child

that his life changed forever after his engagement to the daughter of Heli. Joseph knew Mary as an innocent, faithful young woman. But then he learned that she was pregnant! He intended to divorce her secretly to protect her from scandal.* However, an angel spoke to him in a dream, explaining that Mary was pregnant by means of Jehovah's holy spirit. The angel added that the son she bore would "save his people from their sins." He further reassured Joseph: "Do not be afraid to take Mary your wife home."—Matt. 1:18-21.

⁵ Joseph, a righteous and obedient man, did just that. He took on the weightiest of assignments: raising and caring for a son who was not his own but who was most precious to God. Later, in obedience to an imperial decree, Joseph and his pregnant wife went to Bethlehem to register. It was there that the child was born.

⁶ Joseph did not take the family back to Nazareth. Instead, they settled in Bethlehem, just a few miles from Jerusalem. They were poor, but Joseph did all he could to protect Mary and Jesus from want or suffering. In a short time, they took up living in a humble home. Then, when Jesus was no longer a baby but a small child—perhaps over a year old—their lives suddenly changed again.

⁷ A group of men arrived, astrologers from the East, likely from faraway Babylon. They had followed a "star" to the home of Joseph and Mary and were looking for a child who was to become king of the Jews. The men were deeply respectful.

⁸ Whether they knew it or not, the astrologers had put little Jesus in great peril. The "star" they had seen led them first, not to Bethlehem, but to Jerusalem.[#] There they told wicked King Herod that they were looking for a child who was to become king of the Jews. Their report filled the man with jealous rage.

⁹ Happily, though, there were forces greater than Herod or Satan at work. How so? Well, when the visitors reached Jesus'

house and saw him with his mother, they brought out gifts, asking for nothing in return. How strange it must have been for Joseph and Mary to find themselves suddenly in possession of "gold and frankincense and myrrh"—valuable commodities! The astrologers intended to go back and tell King Herod just where they had found the child. However, Jehovah intervened. By means of a dream, he instructed the astrologers to return home by another route.—*Read Matthew 2:1-12.*

¹⁰ Shortly after the astrologers left, Joseph received this warning from Jehovah's angel: "Get up, take the young child and its mother and flee into Egypt, and stay there until I give you word; for Herod is about to search for the young child to destroy it." (Matt. 2:13) So, as we noted at the outset, Joseph obeyed swiftly. He

Joseph sacrificed his own comfort for the sake of his family

put his child's safety above all else and took his family to Egypt. Because those pagan astrologers had brought such costly gifts, Joseph now had assets that might help the family during their sojourn ahead.

¹¹ Apocryphal myths and legends later romanticized the journey to Egypt, claiming that little Jesus miraculously shortened the trip, rendered bandits harmless, and even made date palms bend down to his mother to yield their fruit.* In truth, it was simply a long, arduous trek into the unknown.

¹² Parents can learn a lot from Joseph. He readily set aside his work and sacrificed his own comfort in order to protect his family from danger. Clearly, he viewed his family as a sacred trust from Jehovah. Parents today raise their children in a perilous world, a world full of forces that would endanger, corrupt, or even destroy young ones. How admirable it is when mothers and fathers act decisively, as Joseph did, working hard to protect their children from such influences!



¹³ It seems that the family did not stay long in Egypt, for soon the angel informed Joseph that Herod was dead. Joseph

^{*} The Bible clearly shows that Jesus' first miracle, "the beginning of his signs," did not occur until after his baptism.—John 2:1-11.

^{12.} Parents who are raising children in this perilous world can learn what from Joseph?

^{13, 14.} How did Joseph and Mary end up raising their family in Nazareth?



Joseph trained his son to become a carpenter brought his family back to their homeland. An ancient prophecy had foretold that Jehovah would call his Son "out of Egypt." (Matt. 2:15) Joseph helped to fulfill that prophecy, but where would he lead his family now?

¹⁴ Joseph was cautious. He wisely feared Herod's successor, Archelaus, who was likewise vicious and murderous. Divine guidance led Joseph to take his family up north, away from Jerusalem and all its intrigues, back to his hometown of Nazareth in Galilee. There he and Mary raised their family.—*Read Matthew 2:* 19-23.

¹⁵ They led a simple life—but not an easy one. The Bible refers to Joseph as the carpenter, using a word that embraces many ways of working with wood, such as cutting down timber, hauling it, and seasoning it for use in building houses, boats, small bridges, carts, wheels, yokes,

and all kinds of farm implements. (Matt. 13:55) It was hard physical work. A carpenter in Bible times often worked near the doorway of his modest house or in a shop adjacent to it.

¹⁶ Joseph used a wide range of tools, some likely handed down from his father. He may have used a square, a plummet, a chalk line, a hatchet, a saw, an adze, a hammer, a mallet, chisels, a drill that he worked by pulling a bow back and forth, various glues, and perhaps some nails, though they were costly.

¹⁷ Imagine Jesus as a small boy watching his adoptive father at work. His eyes wide and intent on Joseph's every movement, he no doubt admired the strength in those broad shoulders and sinewy arms, the skill of the hands, the intelligence in the eyes. Perhaps Joseph began showing his young son how to perform such simple tasks as using dried fish skin to smooth out rough spots on wood. He likely taught Jesus the differences between the varieties of wood that he used—the sycamore fig, oak, or olive, for example.





WHETHER people agree with us or bitterly oppose us, few would deny that as a group Jehovah's Witnesses are wellknown for their preaching activities. It may even be that you have met people in your ministry who have stated that while they disagree with our beliefs, they respect us for the work we do. As we know, Jesus foretold that the good news of the Kingdom would be preached in all the inhabited earth. (Matt. 24:14) But how do we know that the work we do is in fulfillment of Jesus' prophecy? Is it presumptuous on our part to think that we are the ones who are doing this work?

² Many religious groups feel that they are preaching the Gospel, or good news. However, their efforts are often limited to personal testimonies, church services, or programs broadcast through the media—whether by means of television or on the Internet. Others point to their charitable activities or their endeavors in the fields of medicine and education. How do these claims measure up when compared

^{1, 2.} What questions arise because of Jesus' words found at Matthew 24:14?

with what Jesus commanded his disciples to do?

³ Were Jesus' disciples to be passive, waiting for people to come to them? Definitely not! After his resurrection, Jesus addressed hundreds of his disciples and told them: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of people of all the nations, baptizing them . . . , teaching them to observe all the things I have commanded you." (Matt. 28:19, 20) Four actions are therefore required. We must make disciples, baptize them, and teach them, but what is the first thing we need to do? Jesus said: "Go"! With regard to this command, one Bible scholar commented: "To 'go' is the task of each believer, whether across the street or across the ocean."-Matt. 10:7: Luke 10:3.

⁴ Was Jesus referring only to the individual efforts of his followers, or was he alluding to an organized campaign to preach the good news? Since one individual would not be able to go to "all the nations," this work would require the organized efforts of many. Jesus indicated as much when he invited his disciples to become "fishers of men." (Read Matthew 4:18-22.) The type of fishing he referred to here was not that of a lone fisherman using a line and a lure, sitting idly while waiting for the fish to bite. Rather, it involved the use of fishing nets-a labor-intensive activity that at times required the coordinated efforts of many. -Luke 5:1-11.

⁵ To know who are preaching the good

news today in fulfillment of Jesus' prophecy, we need to answer these four questions:

- What should be the message of the preaching work?
- What should be our motive for doing this work?
- What methods should be used?
- What should be the scope and duration of this preaching work?

The answers to these questions will help us not only to identify who are doing this lifesaving work but also to strengthen our resolve to persevere faithfully in it. -1 Tim. 4:16.

WHAT SHOULD BE THE MESSAGE?

6 Read Luke 4:43. Jesus preached "the good news of the Kingdom," and he expects his disciples to do the same. What group of people are preaching that message in "all the nations"? The answer is obvious-only Jehovah's Witnesses. Even some opposers acknowledge this fact. For example, a missionary priest once told a Witness that he had lived in many different countries and that he had asked the Witnesses in each country what message they were preaching. What answer was he given? The priest said: "They were all so stupid that they gave the same answer: 'The good news of the Kingdom.'" Far from being "stupid," however, those Witnesses were speaking in unity, as true Christians should. (1 Cor. 1:10) And they were echoing the message contained in The Watchtower Announcing Jehovah's Kingdom. This magazine is available in 254 languages, and an average of nearly 59 million copies of

each issue are produced, making it the most widely circulated magazine in the world.

⁷ The clergy of Christendom are not preaching God's Kingdom. If they do speak about the Kingdom, many refer to it as a feeling or a condition in the heart of a Christian. (Luke 17:21) They do not help people to understand that God's Kingdom is a heavenly government with Jesus Christ as Ruler, that it is the solution to all mankind's problems, and that it will soon remove all wickedness from this earth. (Rev. 19:11-21) Rather, they prefer to remember Jesus at Christmas and Easter. They seem to have no idea of what Jesus will accomplish as earth's new Ruler. Since they have lost sight of the message they are supposed to preach, is it any wonder that they have also lost sight of what should be the motive for doing this work?

WHAT SHOULD BE OUR MOTIVE FOR DOING THE WORK?

⁸ What should be the motive for doing the preaching work? It should not be to collect money and construct elaborate buildings. Jesus told his disciples: "You received free, give free." (Matt. 10:8) The Word of God should not be commercialized. (2 Cor. 2:17, ftn.) Those preaching the message should not seek personal gain for the work that they do. (**Read Acts 20:33-35.**) Despite this clear direction, most churches are sidetracked by collecting money or by making efforts to survive financially. They have to support a paid clergy, as well as a multitude of other employees. In many cases, the leaders of Christendom have amassed great wealth.—Rev. 17:4, 5.

9 What is the record of Jehovah's Witnesses regarding collections? Their work is supported by voluntary donations. (2 Cor. 9:7) No collections are taken at their Kingdom Halls or conventions. Yet, last year alone, Jehovah's Witnesses spent 1.93 billion hours in preaching the good news and conducting free of charge over nine million Bible studies each month. Amazingly, not only do they go unpaid for their work but they also gladly cover their own expenses. When speaking of the work of Jehovah's Witnesses, one researcher stated: "The main goal is preaching and teaching.... There is no clergy, which cuts costs considerably." What, then, is our motive for doing this work? Put simply, we do this work of our own volition because we love Jehovah and we love our neighbor. This willing spirit is in fulfillment of the prophecy found at Psalm 110:3. (Read.)

WHAT METHODS SHOULD BE USED?

¹⁰ What methods did Jesus and his disciples use to preach the good news? They went to the people wherever they could be found—in public areas and in private homes. The preaching work included searching for deserving ones from house to house. (Matt. 10:11; Luke 8:1; Acts 5:42; 20:20) This systematic method showed impartiality.

^{7.} How do we know that the clergy of Christendom are not preaching the right message?

¹¹ How have the churches of Christendom measured up in this regard? For the most part, church members have been happy to leave any preaching to the paid clergy. But rather than being "fishers of men," Christendom's clergy seem more concerned with merely keeping the "fish" they already have. True, at times certain clergymen may endeavor to stir up some form of evangelism. For example, early in the year 2001, Pope John Paul II stated in a letter: "Over the years, I have often repeated the summons to the new evangelization. I do so again now ... We must revive in ourselves the burning conviction of Paul, who cried out: 'Woe to me if I do not preach the Gospel.'" The pope then went on to say that this mission "cannot be left to a group of 'specialists' but must involve the responsibility of all the members of the People of God." But how many have responded to this appeal?

¹² What has been the record of Jehovah's Witnesses? They are the only ones who preach that Jesus has been ruling

as King since 1914. As Jesus instructed, they place a high priority on the preaching work. (Mark 13:10) The book Pillars of Faith—American Congregations and Their Partners states: "For Jehovah's Witnesses, the missionary focus overwhelms all other concerns." Referring to statements made by a Witness, the author continues: "When they encounter hunger, loneliness, and ill health, they try to help, ... but they never forget that their primary task is delivering a spiritual message about the coming end of the world and the necessity for salvation." Jehovah's Witnesses continue to deliver that message, using methods that Jesus and his disciples used.

WHAT SHOULD BE THE SCOPE AND DURATION OF THE WORK?

¹³ Jesus described the scope of the preaching work by saying that the good news would be preached "in *all* the inhabited earth." (Matt. 24:14) Disciples are to be made "of people of *all* the nations." (Matt. 28:19, 20) That entails a global work.

¹⁴ To understand how Jehovah's Witnesses have fulfilled Jesus' prophecy with regard to the scope of the preaching work, let us consider some facts. There are approximately 600,000 members of the clergy in the various denominations in the United States, where there are some 1,200,000 Witnesses of Jehovah. Worldwide, the Roman Catholic Church has a little over 400,000 priests. Now consider the number of Witnesses involved in the Bible-based

^{11, 12.} When it comes to preaching the good news, how do the efforts of Christendom compare with those of Jehovah's people?

^{13.} What should be the scope of the preaching work?

^{14, 15.} What proves that Jehovah's Witnesses have fulfilled Jesus' prophecy with regard to the scope of the work? (See opening pictures.)

Kingdom-preaching work. Worldwide, some eight million volunteer ministers preach to people in 240 lands. What an amazing work is being accomplished, all to Jehovah's praise and glory!—Ps. 34:1; 51:15.

¹⁵ As Jehovah's Witnesses, we desire to reach as many people as possible with the good news before the end comes. For this reason, we stand out as unique with regard to the work we do in translating and publishing Bible literature. Millions of books, magazines, tracts, and convention and Memorial invitations have been distributed free of charge. We have produced various publications in more than 700 languages. Over 200 million copies of the New World Translation of the Holy Scriptures have been published in over 130 languages. Last year alone, we produced approximately 4.5 billion pieces of Bible literature. On our official website, information is available in more than 750 languages. What other group of ministers is doing a similar work?

¹⁶ How long would the foretold preaching work continue? Jesus said that this global work would continue right on through the last days, "and then the end [would] come." What other religious group has continued to preach the good news during these momentous last days? Some of those whom we meet in the ministry may say: "We have the holy spirit, but you people are doing the work." But is not the fact that we can endure in the work evidence that we have God's spirit? (Acts 1:8; 1 Pet. 4:14) From time to time, certain religious groups have tried to do what Jehovah's Witnesses regularly accomplish, but those efforts usually result in failure. Others engage in so-called missionary activities for a limited time and then go back to their normal routine. Still others may even try to go from door to door, but what are they preaching? The answer to that question makes it clear that they are not carrying out the work that Christ began.

WHO REALLY ARE PREACHING THE GOOD NEWS TODAY?

¹⁷ So who really are preaching the good news of the Kingdom today? With full confidence, we can say: "Jehovah's Witnesses!" Why can we be so confident? Because we are preaching the *right message*, the good news of the Kingdom. By going to the people, we are also using the *correct methods*. Our preaching work is being done with the *right motive*—love, not financial gain. Our work has the *greatest scope*, reaching out to people of all nations and languages. And we will continue to do this work *without letup*, year in and year out, until the end comes.

¹⁸ We truly marvel at what is being accomplished by God's people in these exciting times in which we live. But how is it possible for all of this to happen? The apostle Paul answers in his letter to the Philippians: "God is the one who for the sake of his good pleasure energizes you, giving you both the desire and the power to act." (Phil. 2:13) May all of us continue to be energized by our loving Father as we do our very best and fully accomplish our ministry.—2 Tim. 4:5.
