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PSALMS 79-86 | Who Is the Most Important Person in Your Life?

(*w08* 10/15 13 ¶7-8) ⁷ What was the psalmist's foremost concern? Of course, he must have been very worried about his own personal safety and that of his family. Yet, the subject of his prayer was the reproach being brought on Jehovah's name and the threats against the nation that bore that name. May we all keep a similar, balanced viewpoint as we endure the difficult final days of this old world.—*Read Matthew 6:9, 10.*

⁸ The psalmist quotes Israel's enemies as saying: "Come and let us efface them from being a nation, that the name of Israel may be remembered no more." (Ps. 83:4) What hatred those nations had for God's chosen people! But they had another motive for their conspiracy. They coveted Israel's land and boasted: "Let us take possession of the abiding places of God for ourselves." (Ps. 83:12) Has something similar been true in our day? Yes!

(*w08* 10/15 15 ¶16) ¹⁶ Throughout these "last days," Jehovah has thwarted all efforts to eliminate his people. (2 Tim. 3:1) As a result, opposers have been shamed. Psalm 83:16 foreshadowed this when it said: "Fill their faces with dishonor, that people may search for your name, O Jehovah." In country after country, opponents have failed miserably in their effort to silence Jehovah's Witnesses. In those lands, the steadfastness and endurance of worshippers of the one true God have served as a witness to righthearted ones, and many have 'searched for Jehovah's name.' In a number of lands where Jehovah's Witnesses were once viciously persecuted, there are now tens of thousands, even hundreds of thousands, of happy praisers of Jehovah. What a triumph for Jehovah! And how embarrassing for his enemies!—*Read Jeremiah 1:19.*

(*w11* 5/15 16 ¶1-2) PERHAPS the first time you saw Jehovah's name was when it was shown to you at Psalm 83:18. You may have been surprised to read those words: "That people may know that you, whose name is Jehovah, you alone are the Most High over all the earth." Since then, you no doubt have used this same scripture to help others come to know our loving God, Jehovah.—Rom. 10:12, 13.

² Although it is important for people to know Jehovah's name, such knowledge in itself is not enough. Notice how the psalmist highlights yet another truth essential to our salvation when he says: "You alone are the Most High over all the earth." Yes, Jehovah is the most important Person in the whole universe. As the Creator of all things, he has the right to expect full submission from all his creatures. (Rev. 4:11) For good reason, then, we need to ask ourselves, 'Who is the most important person in *my* life?' It is vital that we carefully analyze our answer to that question!

(*w08* 10/15 15-16 ¶17-18) ¹⁷ We know, of course, that the battle is not over. And we continue to preach the good news—even to opposers. (Matt. 24:14, 21) However, the opportunity now open to such opposers to repent and gain salvation will soon come to an end. The sanctification of Jehovah's name is far more important than human salvation. (*Read Ezekiel 38:23.*) When the nations combine in the foretold earth-wide effort to destroy God's people, we will remember these words of the psalmist's prayer: "O may they be ashamed and be disturbed for all times, and may they become abashed and perish."—Ps. 83:17.

¹⁸ A humiliating end awaits determined opposers of Jehovah's sovereignty. God's Word reveals that those who "do not obey the good news"—and for this reason are executed at Armageddon—will suffer "everlasting destruction." (2 Thess. 1:7-9) Their destruction and the survival of those who worship Jehovah in truth will be convincing evidence that Jehovah is the only true God. In the new world, that great victory will not be forgotten. Those who come back in the "resurrection of . . . the righteous and the unrighteous" will learn of Jehovah's great act. (Acts 24:15) In the new world, they will see convincing evidence of the wisdom of living under Jehovah's sovereignty. And meek ones among them will quickly be convinced that Jehovah is the only true God.

(w06 7/15 12 ¶5) **79:9.** Jehovah listens to our prayers, especially when they are concerning the sanctification of his name.

(w06 7/15 12 ¶9) **86:5.** How grateful we can be that Jehovah is "ready to forgive"! He is on the lookout for any evidence that would provide a basis for him to show mercy to a repentant wrongdoer.



1. What is God's Kingdom?

4. What happened when Jesus began ruling?



5. What does God's Kingdom accomplish?

God's Kingdom will protect them when it destroys the present wicked system of things on earth. So all who want to benefit from God's Kingdom should learn to be obedient subjects of Jesus. 

A Beloved Brother Lost—And Restored

¹⁴ Did Martha accept Jesus' gentle reproof and learn from it? We need not wonder. The apostle John, in introducing a thrilling account about Martha's brother, reminds us: "Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus." (John 11:5) Months had passed since Jesus' visit to Bethany described above. Clearly, Martha had not indulged in sulking; she was not nursing a grudge against Jesus for his loving counsel. She had taken it to heart. In this matter too, she set an excellent example of faith for us, for who of us does not need a little correction at times?

¹⁵ When her brother took ill, Martha surely busied herself with his care. She did everything in her power to soothe his discomfort and help him get better. Nonetheless, Lazarus sank still deeper into his illness. Hour after hour, his sisters stayed by his side to care for him. How often Martha must have gazed into her brother's haggard face, remembering their many years together and the joys and sorrows they had shared!

16 When it looked as if Lazarus was beyond their help, Martha and Mary sent a message to Jesus. He was preaching some two days' journey away. Their message was simple: "Lord, see! the one for whom you have affection is sick." (John 11:1, 3) They knew that Jesus loved their brother, and they had faith that he would do whatever he could to help his friend. Did they cling to the hope that Jesus might arrive before it was too late? If so, their hopes were dashed. Lazarus died.

¹⁷ Together, Martha and Mary mourned their brother, taking care of the preparations for his burial and receiving the many guests from Bethany and its environs. Still, no news of Jesus. Martha may have grown more puzzled as the time passed. Finally, four days after Lazarus' death, Martha heard that Jesus was nearing the town. Ever the woman of action, even in this grim

hour, Martha got up and, without telling Mary, rushed out to meet Jesus.—Read John 11:18-20.

¹⁸ When Martha caught sight of her Master, she put into words the thought that had been tormenting her and Mary for days: "Lord, if you had been here my brother would not have died." But hope and faith were not dead in Martha. She added: "And yet at present I know that as many things as you ask God for, God will give you." Jesus immediately said something to strengthen her faith: "Your brother will rise."—John 11:21-23.

¹⁹ Martha thought that Jesus was talking about the future resurrection, so she replied: "I know he will rise in the resurrection on the last day." (John 11:24) Her faith in that teaching was remarkable. Some Jewish religious leaders, called Sadducees, denied that there would be a resurrection, though it was a clear

Martha's faith in Jesus was rewarded when she and Mary saw their brother resurrected

teaching in the inspired Scriptures. (Dan. 12:13; Mark 12:18) Martha knew, however, that Jesus taught the resurrection hope and had even performed resurrections—although not of anyone who had been dead as long as Lazarus had. She did not know what lay ahead.

²⁰ Jesus then made an unforgettable statement: "I am the resurrection and the life." Indeed, Jehovah God has given his Son the authority to perform resurrections on a global scale in the future. Jesus asked Martha: "Do you believe this?" Then she gave the answer discussed at the outset of this chapter. She had faith that Jesus was the Christ, or Messiah, that he was the Son of Jehovah God, and that he was the one whom the prophets had foretold would come into the world.—John 5:28, 29; *read John* 11:25-27.

²¹ Do Jehovah God and his Son, Jesus Christ, value faith like that of Martha? The events that next unfolded before Martha's eyes provide the clearest of answers. She hurried to get her sister. Thereafter, she saw that Jesus was deeply moved as he talked to Mary and the many mourners with her. She saw the tears come to his eyes as he freely showed his deep grief over the pain that death causes. She heard Jesus order that the stone be rolled away from her brother's tomb.—John 11:28-39.

²² Ever practical, Martha objected that the body would smell by now, four days after death. Jesus reminded her: "Did I not tell you that if you would believe you would see the glory of God?" She did believe, and she did see the glory of Jehovah God. Right then and there, he empowered his Son to bring Lazarus back to life! Think of the moments that must have been etched in Martha's memory to the end of her days: Jesus' commanding call, "Lazarus, come on out!"; the faint noise from the cave where Lazarus was entombed as the man rose and, still bound in the bandages used to prepare the body, inched his way to the door of the cave; Jesus' command to "loose him and let him go"; and, to be sure, the ecstatic embrace as Martha and Mary flew into their brother's arms. (*Read John 11:40-44.*) The burden on Martha's heart was lifted!

^{20.} Explain the meaning of Jesus' unforgettable statement recorded at John 11:25-27 and of Martha's reply.

²¹, **22**. (a) How did Jesus reveal his feelings for those who mourn? (b) Describe the resurrection of Lazarus.

²³ This account shows that the resurrection of the dead is not mere wishful thinking; it is a heartwarming Bible teaching and a proven historical reality. (Job 14:14, 15) Jehovah and his Son love to reward faith, as they did in the case of Martha, Mary, and Lazarus. They have such rewards in store for you too if you build strong faith.

"Martha Was Ministering"

²⁴ The Bible record mentions Martha just one more time. It was at the outset of the final week of Jesus' life on earth. Knowing well what hardships lay ahead of him, Jesus again chose that haven at Bethany as his residence. From there he would walk the two miles to Jerusalem. Jesus and Lazarus were dining at the home of Simon the leper, and there we get this last glimpse of our subject: "Martha was ministering."—John 12:2.

²⁵ How typical of that industrious woman! When we first come upon her in the Bible, she is working; when we leave her, she is still working, doing her best to care for the needs of those around her. Congregations of Christ's followers today are blessed to have women like Martha—stouthearted and generous, always putting their faith into action by giving of themselves. Did Martha keep doing just that? It seems likely. If so, she acted wisely, for she had yet to meet her share of obstacles.

²⁶ Within days, Martha had to endure the terrible death of her beloved Master, Jesus. Further, the same murderous hypocrites who killed him were determined to kill Lazarus as well, since his resurrection was boosting the faith of so many. (*Read*

John 12:9-11.) And, of course, death did eventually sever the loving bonds that joined Martha to her siblings. We do not know how or when that happened, but we may be fairly sure of this: Martha's precious faith helped her endure to the end. That is why Christians today do well to imitate the faith of Martha.



Benefit Fully From Jehovah's Provisions

"I, Jehovah, am your God, the One teaching you to benefit yourself."—ISA. 48:17.

JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES love the Bible. It provides reliable instruction and helps us to find comfort and hope. (Rom. 15:4) We view the Bible, not as a collection of human ideas, but "just as it truthfully is, as the word of God."—1 Thess. 2:13.

² No doubt all of us have our favorite portions of the Bible. Some especially enjoy the Gospels, which paint a beautiful picture of Jehovah's personality as reflected in his Son. (John 14:9) Others are fond of parts of the Bible containing prophecy—perhaps Revelation, with its preview of "the things that must shortly take place." (Rev. 1:1) And who among us has not found comfort in the Psalms or drawn practical lessons from the book of Proverbs? The Bible truly is a book for everyone.

³ Because we love the Bible, we also love our Bible-based publications. For instance, we appreciate the spiritual food we receive in the form of books, brochures, magazines, and other

literature. We know that these provisions from Jehovah help us to stay spiritually alert, well-fed, and "healthy in faith." —Titus 2:2.

⁴ In addition to publications for Jehovah's Witnesses in general, we receive Bible-based material that appeals to specific groups. Some material is especially designed to help young people; other material assists their parents. Much of the material in print and on our website is prepared with the non-Witness public in mind. Such an abundance of spiritual food reminds us that Jehovah has kept his promise to "make for all the peoples a banquet of rich dishes."—Isa. 25:6.

⁵ Very likely, most of us wish that we had more time to read the Bible and Bible-based publications. We can be sure that Jehovah appreciates our efforts to make "the best use of [our] time" by engaging in regular Bible reading and personal study. (Eph. 5:15, 16) Realistically, we may not always be able to give equal attention to all the spiritual food available to us. However, we need to be aware of a subtle danger. What is it?

⁶ There is a danger that we could miss out on some benefits because we assume that certain spiritual provisions do not apply to us. For example, what if a portion of the Bible does not seem relevant to our situation? Or what if we are not part of the primary audience for a certain publication? Do we tend to give such information superficial consideration or even skip it altogether? If so, we could be depriving ourselves of information that would be of great benefit to us.

How can we avoid falling into that trap? Above all, each one of us should bear in mind that God is the Source of our spiritual provisions. Through the prophet Isaiah, he said: "I, Jehovah, am your God, the One teaching you to benefit yourself." (Isa. 48:17) It will be helpful to consider three suggestions for benefiting from all portions of the Bible and the various types of spiritual food available to us.

SUGGESTIONS FOR BENEFICIAL BIBLE READING

⁷ **Read with an open mind.** The Bible clearly says that "all Scripture is inspired of God and beneficial." (2 Tim. 3:16) True, some portions of the Bible were initially directed to one individual or group. That is why we need to read the Scriptures with an open mind. "When I read the Bible. I try to remember that there may be several lessons that can be drawn from a passage," says one brother. He adds: "Remembering this motivates me to look beyond the obvious." Before reading God's Word, we do well to pray for an open mind and for wisdom to discern the lessons that Jehovah wants us to learn.-Ezra 7:10: read James 1:5.

⁸ **Ask questions.** As you read a Bible passage, take time to pause and ask yourself such questions as these: 'What does this tell me about Jehovah? How can I apply this information in my life? How can I use it to help others?' When we reflect on such questions, we will

surely get more out of our Bible reading. As an example, think about the Scriptural qualifications for Christian elders. (Read 1 Timothy 3:2-7.) Since the majority of us do not serve as elders, we might initially think that this passage would have little application to our own life. However, when we consider a few of the many possible answers to the following questions, we will see that this list of qualifications can benefit all of us in a number of ways.

9 What does this tell me about Jehovah? By giving this list of qualifications, Jehovah reveals that he has a high standard for those who serve in an appointed capacity. He expects them to set a good example, and he holds them accountable for the way they treat the congregation, "which he purchased with the blood of his own Son." (Acts 20:28) Jehovah wants us to feel safe in the care of the appointed undershepherds. (Isa. 32: 1, 2) From that standpoint, the Scriptural qualifications for Christian elders remind us of how much Jehovah truly cares for us.

10 How can I apply this information in my life? From time to time, an appointed man should examine himself in the light of these spiritual qualifications, looking for areas in which he can improve. A brother who is "reaching out to be an overseer" needs to give careful attention to these qualifications, for he should strive to meet them to the best of his ability. (1 Tim. 3:1) In fact, each Christian can learn from the qualifications listed in these verses, as most of them involve things that Jehovah asks of all Christians. For instance, all of us should be reasonable and sound in mind. (Phil. 4:5; 1 Pet. 4:7) As elders prove to be "examples to the flock," we can learn from them and "imitate their faith."—1 Pet. 5:3: Heb. 13:7.

¹¹ How can I use this information to help others? We could use the list of qualifications for Christian overseers to help interested ones or Bible students to see

ways that elders among Jehovah's Witnesses differ from the clergy of Christendom. Also, when reading through the list, we might recall the effort that elders in our own congregation are putting forth in our behalf. Reflecting on how they expend themselves deepens our "respect for those who are working hard" among us. (1 Thess. 5:12) And the more we show our sincere respect for these hardworking overseers, the more we add to their joy.—Heb. 13:17.

- ¹² **Do research.** Using tools available to us, we might look for such information as the following:
 - Who wrote this portion of the Scriptures?
 - Where and when was it written?
 - What significant events occurred when a particular Bible book was written?

Background information of this nature may bring to light lessons that are not immediately obvious.

13 For example, consider Ezekiel 14:13, 14, where we read: "If a land sins against me by acting unfaithfully, I will stretch out my hand against it and destroy its food supply, and I will send famine upon it and cut off man and animal from it. 'Even if these three men—Noah, Daniel, and Job—were within it, they would be able to save only themselves because of their righteousness,' declares the Sovereign Lord Jehovah." By doing some research, we learn that this portion of Ezekiel was written in about the year 612 B.C.E. By that time, Noah and Job had been dead for centuries, and their

record of faithfulness was in God's memory. But Daniel was still alive. In fact, he may have been in his late teens or early 20's when Jehovah said that he was just as righteous as Noah and Job. The lesson? Jehovah notices and values the integrity of all his faithful worshippers, including those who are relatively young. —Ps. 148:12-14.

BENEFIT FROM A VARIETY OF PUBLICATIONS

all portions of God's Word, we can benefit from all the spiritual food available to us. Consider a few examples. **Material for young people.** In recent years, much of our literature has been published for young people. Some of this material is designed to help them deal with the pressures at school or the challenges of adolescence. How may all of us benefit from reading such material? When we do so, we are reminded of what our faithful young people are facing. In turn, we are in a better position to help and encourage them.

¹⁵ Many of the problems addressed in material for young people are not unique to them. All of us need to defend our faith, control our emotions, reject harmful peer pressure, and avoid unwholesome associations and entertainment. These topics and many others have been addressed in material designed for teenagers. Should adult Christians feel that it is demeaning for them to read publications directed to

young people? Not at all! Although the material is presented in a way that appeals to youths, the information is based on timeless Scriptural principles, and all of us can benefit from these spiritual provisions.

¹⁶ Besides helping young people to deal with problems, our publications help them to grow spiritually and draw close to Jehovah. (Read Ecclesiastes 12:1, 13.) Here, too, adult Christians can benefit. For example, the April 2009 issue of Awake! included the article "Young People Ask . . . How Can I Make Bible Reading Enjoyable?" The article provided a number of suggestions and included a box that could be cut out and kept in the Bible for reference. Have adults also benefited from the article? "I have always struggled with Bible reading," wrote a 24-year-old wife and mother. "I took to heart the suggestions in this article, and I am making good use of the cutout that was provided. Now I look forward to Bible reading. I can see how the books of the Bible harmonize and are interwoven like a beautiful tapestry. I have never been this excited over Bible reading."

¹⁷ Material for the public. Since 2008 we have enjoyed the study edition of The Watchtower, which is written primarily for Jehovah's Witnesses. But what about our magazines that are principally for the public? Can we benefit from reading these too? Consider an illustration. Imagine that one day, before the public talk, you notice that someone whom you invited has come to the Kingdom Hall. No doubt you are thrilled. As the public speaker delivers his talk, you are likely thinking about that visitor. In effect, you are hearing the talk through his ears. As a result, you come away from that talk with renewed appreciation for the subject.

18 We can experience something similar when we read material written for the public. For example, the public edition of The Watchtower discusses Scriptural topics in terms that a non-Witness reader can understand. The same is true of many of the articles published on jw.org, such as those in the sections entitled "Bible Questions Answered" and "Frequently Asked Questions." When we read this information, we deepen our appreciation for familiar truths. Moreover, we may learn fresh ways to explain our beliefs when we are engaging in the ministry. Similarly, Awake! regularly strengthens our conviction that the true God exists, and it helps us learn how to defend our beliefs.-Read 1 Peter 3:15.

¹⁹ Clearly, Jehovah has given us an abundance of provisions to fill our "spiritual need." (Matt. 5:3) May we continue to make use of all the spiritual provisions available to us. We will thereby show our gratitude to the One who teaches us to benefit ourselves.—Isa. 48:17.
