Jehovah, the Giver of "every good gift and every perfect present," is indeed worthy of our thanks. (James 1:17) As our loving Shepherd, he tenderly cares for all our physical and spiritual needs. (Psalm 23:1-3) He has proved to be "our refuge and strength"—especially in times of distress! (Psalm 46:1) Surely we have many reasons to agree wholeheartedly with the psalmist who wrote: "Give thanks to Jehovah, for he is good; his loyal love endures forever."—Psalm 106:1.

In these perilous and uncertain days, taking delight in Jehovah's righteousness is a source of security and protection. To the question: "O Jehovah, who will be a guest in your tent? Who will reside in your holy mountain?" King David answered: "He who is walking faultlessly and practicing righteousness." (Psalm 15:1, 2) By pursuing God's righteousness and finding delight in it, we can maintain a good relationship with him and continue to enjoy his favor and blessing. Thus, ours is a life of contentment, self-respect, and peace of mind. "He that is pursuing

righteousness and loving-kindness will find life, righteousness and glory," says God's Word. (Proverbs 21:21) Furthermore, trying our best to do what is just and right in all our endeavors means happy personal relationships and an improved quality of life—morally and spiritually. The psalmist declared: "Happy are those observing justice, doing righteousness all the time."—Psalm 106:3.

2 Why is it important for us to consider this matter of giving thanks? As foretold, people in these last days have become increasingly unthankful. (2 Timothy 3:2) Many take their blessings for granted. Influenced by the commercial world and its advertising, millions of people strive to obtain more instead of being content with what they have. We too can be affected by this unappreciative spirit. Like the ancient Israelites, we could become ungrateful and lose appreciation for our precious relationship with Jehovah and for the blessings that we have received from him.—Psalm 106:7, 11-13.

3 Then, too, consider what can happen when we undergo difficult trials. At such times, we could easily become overwhelmed and lose sight of our blessings. (Psalm 116:3)

Therefore, how can we cultivate a grateful heart and maintain it? And what will help us to remain positive even when we are undergoing severe trials? Let us see.

Reference: w01 6/15 13 paragraphs 1-3.

1 "Unforgettable" would be a good word to describe the miracles performed by Jehovah in ancient Egypt. Each one of the Ten Plagues was undeniably awesome. Those blows were followed by the amazing deliverance of the people of Israel through the parted waters of the Red Sea.

(Deuteronomy 34:10-12) If you had been an eyewitness of those events, hopefully you would never have forgotten the One responsible for them. Yet, the psalmist sang: "They [the Israelites] forgot God their Savior, the Doer of great things in Egypt, wonderful works in the land of Ham, fear-inspiring things at the Red Sea."—Psalm 106:21, 22.

2 After crossing the Red Sea, the Israelites "began to fear Jehovah and to put faith in Jehovah." (Exodus 14:31) The men of Israel joined Moses in a victory song to Jehovah, and Miriam and other women responded by playing tambourines and dancing. (Exodus 15:1, 20) Yes, God's people were impressed with Jehovah's mighty acts. But their appreciation for the One who performed those acts was short-lived. Soon afterward many of them behaved as though they had suffered a major memory loss. They became murmurers and complainers against Jehovah. Some

engaged in idolatry and sexual immorality.—Numbers 14:27; 25:1-9.

What Could Make Us Forget?

3 Israel's lack of appreciation is indeed perplexing. Still, the same thing could happen to us. True, we have not witnessed such divine miracles. In our relationship with God, however, there surely have been occasions that were unforgettable. Some of us may remember when we accepted the truth from the Bible. Other joyful times may include our prayer of dedication to Jehovah and our water baptism as true Christians. Many of us have experienced Jehovah's helping hand at other points in our life. (Psalm 118:15) Above all, through the sacrificial death of God's own Son, Jesus Christ, we have received the hope of salvation. (John 3:16) Nevertheless, because of our imperfect nature, when faced with wrong desires and the anxieties of life, we may too easily forget the good things that Jehovah has done for us.

The situation of fellow Christians, however, is different, and so is their spirit. The apostle Paul wrote: "Always be rejoicing." (1 Thessalonians 5:16) There are many reasons for us to be joyful and to rejoice together. We worship the

Most High God, Jehovah; we understand the Bible's message of truth; we have the hope of salvation and eternal life; and we can also help others to attain the same blessings.—Psalm 106:4, 5; Jeremiah 15:16; Romans 12:12.

3 It is to Jehovah God, our Creator and Life-Giver, that we owe our gratitude, especially as we consider some of the bounteous gifts he has showered upon us. (James 1:17) Daily, we thank Jehovah that we are alive. (Psalm 36:9) Around us, we observe abundant evidence of Jehovah's handiwork, such as the sun, moon, and stars. Our planet's rich storehouse of life-sustaining minerals, the atmosphere's finely balanced mixture of vital gases, and the intricate cycles in nature all testify to the debt we owe our loving heavenly Father. "Many things you yourself have done, O Jehovah my God," sang King David, "even your wonderful works and your thoughts toward us; there is none to be compared to you. Were I inclined to tell and speak of them, they have become more numerous than I can recount."—Psalm 40:5.

4 Though far removed from a physical paradise, Jehovah's servants today relish living in a spiritual paradise. In our Kingdom Halls and at our conventions and assemblies, we experience the fruitage of God's spirit at work in our fellow

believers. Indeed, when preaching to people who have little or no religious background, some Witnesses refer to what Paul described in his letter to the Galatians. They first draw attention to "the works of the flesh" and ask their listeners what they have observed. (Galatians 5:19-23) Most readily agree that these characterize human society today. When shown the description of the fruitage of God's spirit and upon being invited to the local Kingdom Hall to see evidence of this for themselves, many quickly acknowledge: "God is really among you." (1 Corinthians 14:25) And this is not limited to the local Kingdom Hall. Travel where you may, when you meet any of the more than six million Witnesses of Jehovah, you find the same happy, joyous spirit. Truly, this upbuilding association is reason for giving thanks to Jehovah, the one who supplies his spirit to make it possible.—Zephaniah 3:9; Ephesians 3:20, 21.

5 The greatest gift, the most perfect present that Jehovah has bestowed, is that of his Son, Jesus, by means of whom the ransom sacrifice was provided. "If this is how God loved us," wrote the apostle John, "then we are ourselves under obligation to love one another." (1 John 4:11) Yes, we show ourselves thankful for the ransom not only by expressing love and gratitude to Jehovah but also by living our lives in a way that manifests love for others.—Matthew 22:37-39. 6 We can learn more about showing gratitude by considering the way Jehovah dealt with Israel of old. By

means of the Law, which he gave to the nation through Moses, Jehovah taught the people many lessons. Through "the framework of the knowledge and of the truth in the Law," we can learn much that will help us follow Paul's counsel: "Show yourselves thankful."—Romans 2:20; Colossians 3:15.

You should not be distracted or discouraged by the fact that not all stand complete and with firm conviction. Some may fail, be deflected, or simply give up. That happened among those closest to Jesus, his apostles. But when Judas turned traitor, did the other apostles slow down or quit? No, indeed! Peter applied Psalm 109:8 to show that another would take Judas' place. A replacement was selected, and God's loyal ones actively got on with their preaching assignment. (Acts 1:15-26) They were determined to stand complete with firm conviction.

Did God predestine Judas to betray Jesus in order

to fulfill prophecy?

The traitorous course of Judas Iscariot fulfilled divine prophecy and demonstrated Jehovah's foreknowledge as well as that of his Son. (Psalm 41:9; 55:12, 13; 109:8; Acts 1:16-20) Yet it cannot be said that God foreordained or predestinated Judas himself to such a course. The prophecies foretold that some intimate acquaintance of Jesus would be his betrayer, but they did not specify which of those sharing such acquaintance it would be. Again, Bible principles rule against God's having foreordained Judas' actions. The divine standard stated by the apostle is: "Never lay your hands hastily upon any man; neither be a sharer in the sins of others; preserve yourself chaste." (1 Timothy 5:22; compare 3:6.) Evidencing his concern that the selection of his 12 apostles be wisely and properly made, Jesus spent the night in prayer to his Father before making known his decision. (Luke 6:12-16) If Judas were already divinely foreordained to be a traitor, this would result in inconsistency in God's direction and guidance and, according to the rule, would make him a sharer in the sins that one committed.

Thus, it seems evident that at the time of his being selected as an apostle, Judas' heart presented no definite evidence of a treasonous attitude. He allowed a 'poisonous root to spring up' and defile him, resulting in his deviation and in his accepting, not God's direction, but the Devil's leading in

a course of thievery and treachery. (Hebrews 12:14, 15; John 13:2; Acts 1:24, 25; James 1:14, 15; see JUDAS Number 4.) By the time such deviation reached a certain point, Jesus himself could read Judas' heart and foretell his betrayal.— John 13:10, 11.

True, in the account at John 6:64, on the occasion of some disciples stumbling over certain teachings of Jesus, we read that "from the beginning ["from the outset," JB] Jesus knew who were the ones not believing and who was the one that would betray him." While the word "beginning" (Gr., arkhe') is used at 2 Peter 3:4 to refer to the start of creation, it can also refer to other times. (Luke 1:2; John 15:27) For example, when the apostle Peter spoke of the holy spirit falling on Gentiles "just as it did also upon us in the beginning," he obviously was not referring to the beginning of his discipleship or apostleship but to an important point in his ministry, the day of Pentecost, 33 C.E., "the beginning" of the outpouring of the holy spirit for a certain purpose. (Acts 11:15; 2:1-4) It is therefore interesting to note this comment on John 6:64 in Lange's Commentary on the Holy Scriptures (page 227): "Beginning . . . means not, metaphysically from the beginning of all things, . . . nor from the beginning of His [Jesus'] acquaintance with each one, . . . nor from the beginning of His collecting of the disciples around Him, or the beginning of His Messianic ministry, . . . but from the first secret germs of unbelief [that produced

the stumbling of some disciples]. So also He knew His betrayer from the beginning."—Translated and edited by P. Schaff, 1976; compare 1 John 3:8, 11, 12.

The sword-wielding right hand of a soldier normally lacks the protection of the shield, which was held on the left. Metaphorically, Jehovah is "at the right hand" of his servants, to fight for them. Thus he gives them protection and help—a fine reason for us to "laud [him] very much"!







swered the question, repeating some of the popular misconceptions surrounding Jesus' identity. But Jesus wanted to know more. Were his closest followers making the same mistakes? "You, though, who do you say I am?" he asked.—Luke 9:18-20.

13 Again, Peter was quick to respond. He put into clear, bold words the conclusion that had formed in the hearts of many there. "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God," he said. We can imagine Jesus giving Peter a smile of approval as He commended him warmly. Jesus reminded Peter that it was Jehovah God—not any man—who had made this vital truth so plain to those with genuine faith. Peter had been enabled to discern one of the greatest truths Jehovah had yet revealed—the identity of the long-promised Messiah, or Christ!—*Read Matthew 16:* 16, 17.

14 This Christ was the one called in ancient prophecy a stone that the builders would reject. (Ps. 118: 22; Luke 20:17) With such prophecies in mind, Jesus revealed that Jehovah would establish a congregation on the very stone, or rock-mass, that Peter had

just identified. Then he bestowed on Peter some very important privileges in that congregation. He did not give Peter primacy over the other apostles, as some have assumed, but he gave him responsibilities. He gave Peter "the keys of the kingdom." (Matt. 16: 19) It would be Peter's privilege to open the hope of entering God's Kingdom to three different fields of mankind—first to the Jews, then to the Samaritans, and finally to the Gentiles, or non-Jews.

much would have more to answer for, and the truth of those words is borne out in Peter's case. (Luke 12: 48) Jesus continued to reveal vital truths about the Messiah, including the certainty of his own impending suffering and death at Jerusalem. Peter was disturbed to hear such things. He took Jesus aside and rebuked him, saying: "Be kind to yourself, Lord; you will not have this destiny at all."—Matt. 16:21, 22.

ter, looked at the rest of the disciples—who had likely been thinking something similar—and said: "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me, because you think, not God's thoughts, but those of men." (Matt. 16:23; Mark 8:32, 33) Jesus' words contain practical counsel for us all. It is only too easy to allow human thinking to take priority over godly thinking. If we do so, even when we mean to help, we may inadvertently become proponents of Satan's purpose rather than God's. How, though, did Peter respond?

¹⁷ Peter must have realized that Jesus was not calling him Satan the Devil in any literal sense. After all, Jesus did not speak to Peter as he had to Satan. To Satan, Jesus had said: "Go away"; to Peter, he said: "Get behind me." (Matt. 4:10) Jesus did not cast off this apostle in whom he saw a great deal of good, but he simply corrected Peter's wrong thinking in this matter. It is not hard to see that Peter needed to stop getting in front of his Master as a stumbling block and needed to get back behind him as a supportive follower.

18 Did Peter argue, get angry, or sulk? No; he humbly accepted correction. He thus demonstrated loyalty again. All those who follow Christ will need correction at times. Only if we humbly accept discipline and learn from it can we continue to grow closer to Jesus Christ and his Father, Jehovah God.—*Read Proverbs 4:13*.



²² Peter felt compelled to participate somehow in this extraordinary vision—and perhaps to prolong it. It looked as if Moses and Elijah were parting from Jesus. So Peter spoke up: "Instructor, it is fine for us to be here, so let us erect three tents, one for you and one for Moses and one for Elijah." Of course,

these visionary representations of two of Jehovah's long-dead servants did not need tents. Peter really did not know what he was saying. Are you not drawn to the man, though, for his enthusiastic and warm spirit?—Luke 9:33.

²³ Peter, James, and John received another reward that night. A cloud formed and loomed over them on the mountain. From it came a voice—the voice of Jehovah God! He said: "This is my Son, the one that has been chosen. Listen to him." Then the vision was over, and they were alone with Jesus on the mountain.—Luke 9:34-36.

²⁴ What a gift that transfiguration vision was for Peter—and for us! Decades later he wrote of the privilege he had that night of actually seeing a preview of Jesus as a glorious heavenly King and of being one of the "eyewitnesses of his magnificence." That vision confirmed many prophecies of God's Word and strengthened Peter's faith for the trials he had yet to face. (*Read 2 Peter 1:16-19.*) It can do the same for us if, like Peter, we remain loyal to the Mas-


JEHOVAH'S faithful servants on earth, his Witnesses, make up an organization that is indeed exceptional. True, it is composed of humans who are imperfect and who have their faults. Still, God's holy spirit has been moving his global congregation to grow and prosper. Consider a few of the wonderful things that Jehovah has been doing with his willing, although imperfect, people.

Do Not Let the Faults of Others Stumble You

- 2 When the last days of the present system began back in 1914, God's servants on earth were relatively few in number. But Jehovah blessed their preaching work. During the following decades, millions of new ones learned Bible truths and became Jehovah's Witnesses. Jehovah actually pointed forward to this outstanding growth, saying: "The little one will become a thousand and the small one a mighty nation. I myself, Jehovah, will speed it up in its own time." (Isa. 60: 22) That prophetic statement has certainly come true in these last days. Thus, the number of God's people on earth is now greater than the entire population of many nations.
- 3 During this time, Jehovah has also helped his people to cultivate to a greater degree his dominant quality—love. (1 John 4:8) Jesus, who imitated God's love, said to his followers: "I am

giving you a new commandment, that you love one another . . . By this all will know that you are my disciples—if you have love among yourselves." (John 13:34, 35) This proved especially important in recent history when the nations engaged in deadly wars on a shocking scale. For instance, some 55 million people were killed in World War II alone. However, Jehovah's Witnesses did not participate in that global slaughter. (Read Micah 4:1, 3.) This has helped them to remain "clean from the blood of all men."—Acts 20:26.

4 The progress of God's people is taking place in a very hostile world, which the Bible says is controlled by Satan, "the god of this system of things." (2 Cor. 4:4) He manipulates the political elements of this world, as he does the world's mass media. But he cannot stop the preaching of

the good news. However, knowing that he has only a short time left, Satan tries to turn people away from true worship, and he uses various means to do so.—Rev. 12:12.

A TEST OF LOYALTY

5 The Christian congregation emphasizes the importance of having love for God and for fellow humans. Jesus indicated that this would be the case. Responding to a question about the greatest commandment, he said: "You must love Jehovah your God with your whole heart and with your whole soul and with your whole mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment. The second, like it, is this: 'You must love your neighbor as yourself." (Matt. 22:35-39) Nevertheless, the Bible makes clear that as a result of Adam's sin, we are all born imperfect. (Read Romans 5:12,

- 19.) So at times some in the congregation may hurt us by what they say or do. This can test our love for Jehovah and for his people. What will we do on such occasions? Even faithful servants of God in the past said or did things that hurt others, and we can learn from what the Bible reveals about this.
- 6 For example, High Priest Eli had two sons who did not uphold Jehovah's laws. We read: "The sons of Eli were wicked men; they had no regard for Jehovah." (1 Sam. 2:12) Though their father played a key role in promoting true worship, his two sons committed very serious sins. Eli knew about this and should have disciplined them, but he was lax in that regard. As a result, God adversely judged the household of Eli. (1 Sam. 3:10-14) In time, his descendants would not be allowed to serve as high priests. Had you

lived in Eli's day, how would you have reacted to Eli's toleration of the sins committed by his sons? Would you have let it stumble you to the point that you would no longer serve God?

7 David was loved by Jehovah, who found him to be a man "agreeable to his heart." (1 Sam. 13: 13, 14; Acts 13:22) But David later committed adultery with Bath-sheba, and she became pregnant. That occurred while her husband, Uriah, was away serving in the army. When he came home temporarily, David tried to get him to have sexual relations with Bath-sheba so that it might appear that Uriah was the child's father. Uriah would not do what the king suggested, so David arranged to have him killed in battle. David paid dearly for his crime—calamities came upon him and his household. (2 Sam. 12:9-12) Yet, God 7. How did David sin seriously, and what did God do about it?

showed mercy to this man who overall walked before Jehovah "with integrity of heart." (1 Ki. 9:4) If you had lived among God's people back then, how would you have reacted? Would David's wrong conduct have stumbled you?

8 Another Bible example is that of the apostle Peter. Jesus had selected him as one of the apostles; still, Peter at times said or did things that he later regretted. For example, at a critical moment, the apostles abandoned Jesus. Peter had earlier stated that even if the others did that, he would not. (Mark 14:27-31, 50) Nevertheless, when Jesus was being taken into custody, all the apostles—including Peter—abandoned him. Peter repeatedly denied even knowing Jesus. (Mark 14:53, 54, 66-72) However, Peter showed remorse, and Jehovah continued to use

him. Had you been a disciple then, would Peter's actions have affected your loyalty to Jehovah?

9 The above are but a few examples of individuals who did things that hurt others. Many other cases in past centuries and in recent times could be cited in which some who served Jehovah committed bad acts and hurt others. The point is, how will you respond? Will you let their mistakes stumble you, so that you abandon Jehovah and his people, including those in the local congregation? Or will you recognize that Jehovah may allow time for repentance on the part of wrongdoers and that he will ultimately correct the wrongs and act in a just way? On the other hand, sometimes those who have been guilty of serious sins reject Jehovah's mercy and are unrepentant. In such situations, will you have confidence that Jehovah will in time judge such

wrongdoers, perhaps removing them from the congregation?

MAINTAIN LOYALTY

10 The Bible provides us with accounts of servants of God who remained loyal to Jehovah and his people despite the serious faults of others around them. For example, after spending a night in prayer to his Father, Jesus selected the 12 apostles. Judas Iscariot was one of those. When Judas later betrayed him, Christ did not let that defection mar his own relationship with his Father, Jehovah; nor did Jesus allow Peter's denial to do that. (Luke 6:12-16; 22:2-6, 31, 32) Jesus knew that those actions were not the fault of Jehovah or his people in general. Jesus continued his wonderful work despite the disappointment that some of his followers caused him. Jehovah rewarded 10. What did Jesus understand about the faults of Judas **Iscariot and Peter?**

him by resurrecting him from the dead, thus opening the way for Jesus to become King of the heavenly Kingdom.—Matt. 28:7, 18-20.

11 Jesus' confidence in Jehovah and his people was well-founded and still is. Indeed, when we consider the things that Jehovah is accomplishing through his servants in these last days, it is simply amazing. No other people are preaching the truth globally, for others do not have Jehovah guiding them as does his united congregation today. Isaiah 65:14 describes the spiritual condition prevailing among God's people: "Look! My servants will shout joyfully because of the good condition of the heart."

12 Jehovah's servants rejoice at the good things they can do because they are being guided by Jehovah. In contrast, the world under Satan's

influence mourns, as it were, as conditions worsen. It would certainly be unwise and misguided to blame Jehovah or his congregation for the faults of relatively few of God's servants. We need to maintain our loyalty to Jehovah and his arrangements and to learn how to view or react to the faults of others.

HANDLING FAULTS

one of God's servants says or does something that hurts our feelings? A fine Bible principle is this: "Do not be quick to take offense, for the taking of offense lodges in the bosom of fools." (Eccl. 7:9) We must consider that all of us are some 6,000 years removed from the human perfection that existed in Eden. Imperfect people are prone to make mistakes. good to expect too much of fellow believers and to let their faults rob us of the joy that comes from being part of God's people in these last days. An even greater mistake would be to allow the faults of others to stumble us and cause us to leave Jehovah's organization. Were that to happen, we would lose not only the privilege of doing God's will but also the hope of life in God's new world.

- 14 To maintain our deep joy and firm hope, we want to keep clearly in mind the comforting promise of Jehovah: "Look! I am creating new heavens and a new earth; and the former things will not be called to mind, nor will they come up into the heart." (Isa. 65:17; 2 Pet. 3:13) Do not let the faults of others prevent you from obtaining such blessings.

world, we should consider God's thoughts on how to handle matters when others say or do things that hurt our feelings. For example, one principle to remember is what Jesus said: "If you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you; whereas if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." Recall, too, that when Peter asked whether we should forgive "up to seven times," Jesus replied: "I say to you, not up to seven times, but up to 77 times." Clearly, Jesus meant that we should always be willing to forgive; this should be our first and predominant leaning.—Matt. 6:14, 15; 18:21, 22.

16 A good example of how to handle faults was set by Joseph, the first of Jacob's two sons by Rachel. Joseph's ten half brothers were jealous of him because he was favored by their fa-

ther. Then they sold Joseph into slavery. After many years, the good work that Joseph had done in Egypt resulted in his becoming second to the ruler of that country. When a famine struck the region, Joseph's brothers came to Egypt to buy food but did not recognize him. Joseph could have used his authority to exact vengeance for the very bad way that his brothers had treated him. Instead, he tested his brothers to find out if they had changed their disposition. When he saw that his brothers had truly changed. Joseph identified himself to them. He later said: "Do not be afraid. I will keep supplying you and your little children with food." The Bible account adds: "Thus he comforted them and spoke reassuringly to them."—Gen. 50:21.

17 It is also wise to remember that since we all have faults, we may be offending others. If $\overline{17}$. What do you want to do when others make mistakes?

we discern that we have done so, the Bible's direction is to go to the one whom we have offended and try to reconcile matters. (Read Matthew 5:23, 24.) We appreciate it when others do not hold our faults against us, so we should act the same way toward them. Colossians 3:13 urges us: "Continue putting up with one another and forgiving one another freely even if anyone has a cause for complaint against another. Just as Jehovah freely forgave you, you must also do the same." Christian love "does not keep account of the injury," observes 1 Corinthians 13:5. If we practice forgiving others, Jehovah will forgive us. Yes, when it comes to handling the faults of others, the Christian course is to imitate our merciful Father's dealings with us when we make mistakes.—Read Psalm 103:12-14.
