Treasures From God's Word

Isaiah 11:3-5—Righteousness will prevail forever

Reference: ip-1 160-161 paragraphs 9-11.

A Righteous and Merciful Judge

9 Isaiah foretells more of the Messiah's characteristics: "He will not judge by any mere appearance to his eyes, nor reprove simply according to the thing heard by his ears." (Isaiah 11:3b) If you had to stand before a court of law, would you not be grateful for a judge like that? In his capacity as Judge of all mankind, the Messiah is not swayed by false arguments, clever courtroom tactics, rumors, or superficial factors, such as wealth. He sees through deception and looks beyond unflattering outward appearances, discerning "the secret person of the heart," "the hidden man." (1 Peter 3:4, footnote) Jesus' superlative example serves as the model for all who are called upon to judge matters in the Christian congregation.—1 Corinthians 6:1-4.

10 How will the Messiah's superlative qualities influence his judicial decisions? Isaiah explains: "With righteousness he must judge the lowly ones, and with uprightness he must give reproof in behalf of the meek ones of the earth. And he must strike the earth with the rod of his mouth; and with the spirit of his lips he will put the wicked one to death. And righteousness must

prove to be the belt of his hips, and faithfulness the belt of his loins."—*Isaiah 11:4, 5.*

11 When his followers need correction, Jesus delivers it in the way that benefits them most—an excellent example for Christian elders. On the other hand, those who practice wickedness can expect judgment of a severe sort. When God calls this system of things to account, the Messiah will "strike the earth" with his authoritative voice, issuing a judgment of destruction for all the wicked. (Psalm 2:9; compare Revelation 19:15.) Eventually, there will be no wicked people left to disturb the peace of mankind. (Psalm 37:10, 11) Jesus, with his hips and loins girded with righteousness and faithfulness, has the power to accomplish this.—Psalm 45:3-7.

Isaiah 11:6-8—Peace will exist between humans and animals

Reference: w12 9/15 9-10 paragraphs 8-9.

8 Is it really possible for humans to have all the animals in subjection and to be at peace with them? Many people are very close to their pets, such as dogs and cats. What about wild animals, though? One report says: "Scientists who have lived closely with beasts and studied them have found that all mammals are emotional." Of course, we see animals become frightened or ferocious when they are threatened, but

are they capable of what some might describe as tender feelings? The report continues: "It is in the raising of their young that mammals reveal their greatest attribute—their tremendous capacity for warm affection."

9 So we should not be surprised when we read in the Bible that peace will come to prevail between humans and animals. (Read Isaiah 11:6-9; 65:25.) Why not? Recall that when Noah and his family emerged from the ark after the Flood, Jehovah told them: "A fear of you and a terror of you will continue upon every living creature of the earth." That was for the animals' self-preservation. (Genesis 9:2, 3) Could not Jehovah remove a measure of that fear and terror, so that his original mandate would be fulfilled? (Hosea 2:18) What an enjoyable time awaits all who will survive to live on earth then!

Isaiah 11:9—All mankind will learn Jehovah's ways

Reference: w16.06 8 paragraph 9.

In the new world, we will experience to the full the blessings of the spiritual paradise. Then, our spiritual paradise will have its perfect counterpart—a literal paradise under the rulership of God's Kingdom. During that time of global restoration, Jehovah will continue to mold earth's inhabitants, educating them to a degree that we might now find hard to imagine. (Isaiah 11:9)

Furthermore, God will make our minds and bodies perfect, so that we will be able to absorb his teaching and do his will flawlessly. So let us be determined to continue submitting to Jehovah, showing him that we view his molding as an expression of his love for us.—Proverbs 3:11, 12.

God's Kingdom Will End All Prejudice

While Bible knowledge can help to control and root out strong emotions, there are two other elements that must be dealt with before prejudice can be completely eliminated. First, there is sin and human imperfection. The Bible plainly states: "There is no man that does not sin." (1 Kings 8:46) So no matter how hard we try, we face the same internal struggle as the apostle Paul, who wrote: "When I wish to do what is right, what is bad is present with me." (Romans 7:21) Thus, from time to time, our imperfect heart will resort to "injurious reasonings" that can lead to prejudice.—Mark 7:21.

Second, there is the influence of Satan the Devil. The Bible describes him as "a manslayer" and says that he "is misleading the entire inhabited earth." (John 8:44; Revelation 12:9) That explains why prejudice is so prevalent and why mankind seems so helpless in the face of bigotry, discrimination, genocide, and other forms of racial, religious, and social intolerance.

Hence, before there can be the total elimination of prejudice, there must be the removal of human sin, imperfection, and the influence of Satan the Devil. The Bible shows that God's Kingdom will accomplish just that.

Jesus Christ taught his followers to pray to God in these words: "Let your kingdom come. Let your will take place, as in heaven, also upon earth." (Matthew 6:10) God's Kingdom is the means by which all injustices—including all forms of intolerance and prejudice—will be done away with.

When God's Kingdom comes and takes control over earth's affairs, Satan will be "bound," or completely restrained, so that "he might not mislead the nations." (Revelation 20:2, 3) There will then be a "new earth," or human society, in which "righteousness is to dwell."—2 Peter 3:13.

Those living in that righteous human society will be brought to perfection, free from sin. (Romans 8:21) As subjects of God's Kingdom, "they will not do any harm or cause any ruin." Why? "Because the earth will certainly be filled with the knowledge of Jehovah." (Isaiah 11:9) At that time, all mankind will learn Jehovah God's ways and imitate his loving personality. This will indeed mean the end of all prejudice, "for there is no partiality with God."—Romans 2:11.

Isaiah 11:1, 10—How can Jesus Christ be "the root of Jesse" as well as a twig that grew "out of the stump of Jesse"?

Jesus was "out of the stump of Jesse" in a fleshly way. He was a descendant of Jesse through Jesse's son David. (Matthew 1:1-6; Luke 3:23-32) However, the receiving of the kingly power affects Jesus' relationship with his ancestors. By virtue of his having been given power and authority to grant obedient mankind everlasting life on earth, Jesus becomes their "Eternal Father." (Isaiah 9:6) Hence, he is also "the root" of his ancestors, including Jesse.

Isaiah 13:17—In what sense did the Medes regard silver as nothing and take no delight in gold?

(Proverbs 13:20; 1 Corinthians 15:33) You can also absorb that evil spirit through objectionable literature, pornographic or apostate Internet sites, unwholesome entertainment, and highly competitive sports—really, through anyone or anything that conveys the thinking of Satan or his system.

10 How can we resist the insidious spirit of the world and keep ourselves in God's love? Only by taking full advantage of Jehovah's spiritual provisions and by praying constantly for holy spirit. Jehovah is far greater than the Devil or the wicked world under satanic control. (1 John 4:4) How important, then, that we stay close to Jehovah in prayer!

same as the sheep in Jesus' parable of the sheep and the goats. (Matt. 25:33-40) The great multitude would be among the "other sheep," of whom Jesus said: "Those too I must bring in." (John 10:16) When the speaker, J. F. Rutherford, asked: "Will all those who have the hope of living forever on the earth please stand?" more than half the audience rose to their feet! "Behold!" he declared. "The great multitude!" Many were deeply moved to understand at last their hope for the future.

focus their efforts on gathering the prospective members of this great crowd that will emerge, alive and safe, from the great tribulation. At first, the ingathering did not seem impressive. Brother Rutherford once even commented: "It looks as if the 'great multitude' is not going to be so great after all." Of course, we now know how greatly Jehovah has blessed the harvest since then! Under the guidance of Jesus and the holy spirit, both the anointed and their companions of the "other sheep" have become just what Jesus foretold—"one flock" serving together under "one shepherd."

What Loyalty to the Kingdom Requires

As God's people continued to learn about the Kingdom, they also needed to grasp fully what it means to be loyal to that heavenly government. In this regard, in 1922, *The Watch Tower* pointed out that there are two organizations at work, Jehovah's and Satan's, with Satan's being made up of commercial, religious, and political elements. Those who are loyal to God's Kingdom under Christ must not compromise their loyalty through improper involvement with any aspect of Satan's organization. (2 Cor. 6: 17) What does that mean?

The spiritual food from the faithful slave has consistently exposed the corruption of big business and has warned God's people not to give in to its rampant materialism. (Matt. 6:24) Likewise, our publications have kept the spotlight focused on the religious part of Satan's organization. In 1963, *The Watchtower* clearly showed that "Babylon the

Great" represented not only Christendom but also the whole world empire of false religion. Thus, as we will see more fully in Chapter 10 of this book, God's people in every land and culture have been helped to "get out of her," cleansing themselves of all false religious practices.—Rev. 18:2, 4.

what, though, about the political part of Satan's organization? Could true Christians take part in the wars and conflicts of the nations? During World War I, the Bible Students generally understood that Christ's followers should have no share in killing their fellow humans. (Matt. 26:52) However, for many, the exhortation found at Romans 13:1 to be obedient to "the superior authorities" meant that they should join the army, wear soldiers' uniforms, and even bear arms; however, when asked to kill the enemy, they should shoot into the air.

would have no part at all in the wars and conflicts of the nations of Satan's world. What timely guidance! Christ's followers were thus protected from the horrific bloodguilt that clung to the nations in that war. Beginning in 1929, however, our publications had also reasoned that the superior authorities of Romans 13:1 were not the secular rulers at all, but Jehovah and Jesus. A more accurate understanding was still needed.

²⁴ The holy spirit guided Christ's followers to just such a view in 1962, when landmark articles on Romans 13:1-7 were published in the November 15 and December 1 issues of *The Watchtower*. Finally, God's people grasped the principle of relative subjection that Jesus had revealed in his famous words: "Pay back Caesar's things to Caesar but God's things to God." (Luke 20:25) True Christians now understand that the superior authorities are the secular powers of this world and that Christians must be subject to them. However, such subjection is relative. When the secular authorities ask us to disobey Jehovah God, then we answer as did the apostles of old: "We must obey God as ruler rather than men." (Acts 5:29) In Chapters 13 and 14 of this book, we will learn more about how God's people have put the principle of Christian neutrality into action.

25 Think of all that Christ's followers have been taught about the Kingdom over this past century. We have learned when God's Kingdom was established in heaven and how important it is. We have a clear picture of the two hopes offered to faithful people, the heavenly hope and the earthly hope. And we know how to demonstrate our loyalty to God's Kingdom while being in relative subjection to worldly authorities. Ask yourself, 'Would I know any of those precious truths if Jesus Christ had not guided his faithful slave on earth to grasp them and then to teach them?' What a blessing to have Christ and the holy spirit guiding us!



ther draws people to himself through His Son. (John 6:44, 65) Acquiring faith in Jesus, in turn, makes it possible for an individual to gain forgiveness of sins. That, then, opens up the prospect of enjoying an everlasting relationship with Jehovah. (Rom. 6:23) What did we do to deserve such a wonderful blessing? As sinners, the only thing we deserve is death. (Ps. 103:10) But Jehovah saw a potential for good in us. Out of his undeserved kindness, he opened our heart to the good news. So we began to exercise faith in Jesus with everlasting life in view.—Read 1 John 4: 9, 10.

3 But what exactly is faith? Is it limited to a mental grasp of the blessings that God has in store for us? And more important, in what ways must we exercise our faith?

"EXERCISE FAITH IN YOUR HEART"

- 4 Faith involves much more than a mental understanding of God's purpose. It is a powerful motivating force that impels a person to act in harmony with God's will. Faith in God's means of salvation moves a believer to share the good news with others. The apostle Paul explained: "If you publicly declare with your mouth that Jesus is Lord, and exercise faith in your heart that God raised him up from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one exercises faith for righteousness, but with the mouth one makes public declaration for salvation."—Rom. 10:9, 10; 2 Cor. 4:13.
- 5 Clearly, our prospect of enjoying eternal life in God's new world depends on our having

faith and keeping it strong. The need to keep our faith healthy can be likened to a plant's need for water. Unlike an artificial plant, a living plant keeps changing. A live plant either withers because of a lack of water or continues to thrive with a regular supply of moisture. If deprived of sufficient water, a once healthy plant will eventually die. So, too, our faith. It will wither and die if neglected. (Luke 22:32; Heb. 3:12) But if we give it due attention, our faith will stay alive and keep "growing," and we will be "healthy in faith."—2 Thess. 1:3; Titus 2:2.

THE BIBLE'S DESCRIPTION OF FAITH

6 The Bible's description of faith is found at Hebrews 11:1. (Read.) Faith focuses on two kinds of things that are not visible to us:

^{6.} In what two ways does Hebrews 11:1 describe faith?

- (1) "What is hoped for"—this may include future events that have been promised to happen but that have not yet occurred, such as the end of all wickedness and the coming new world. (2) "Realities that are not seen." In this context, the Greek word translated "evident demonstration" refers to "convincing evidence" of an invisible reality, such as the existence of Jehovah God, Jesus Christ, the angels, and the activities of the heavenly Kingdom. (Heb. 11:3) How do we prove that our hope is alive and that we believe in the unseen things spoken of in God's Word? By our words and deeds —without which our faith would be incomplete.
 - 7 Hebrews 11:7 highlights the faith of Noah

who, "after receiving divine warning of *things* not yet seen, showed godly fear and constructed an ark for the saving of his household." Noah exercised his faith by building the gigantic ark. Without doubt, his neighbors must have asked him why he was building such a colossal structure. Did Noah keep quiet or tell them to mind their own business? By no means! His faith moved him to witness boldly and to warn his contemporaries of God's coming judgment. Quite likely, Noah repeated to the people the exact words that Jehovah had spoken to him: "I have decided to put an end to all flesh, because the earth is full of violence on account of them . . . I am going to bring floodwaters upon the earth to destroy from under the heavens all flesh that has the breath of life. Everything on the earth will

perish." Also, Noah no doubt explained to the people the only means of escape, repeating God's command: "You must go into the ark." Thus, Noah further exercised his faith by being "a preacher of righteousness."—Gen. 6:13, 17, 18; 2 Pet. 2:5.

8 The letter of James was likely written shortly after the apostle Paul wrote his inspired description of faith. Like Paul, James explained that true Christian faith is not just a matter of believing; action is involved. "Show me your faith without the works," wrote James, "and I will show you my faith by my works." (Jas. 2: 18) James goes on to show the clear difference between mere belief and the exercising of one's faith. The demons believe that God exists, but

they have no true faith. Rather, they faithlessly work against the fulfillment of God's purposes. (Jas. 2:19, 20) By contrast, referring to another ancient man of faith, James asks: "Was not Abraham our father declared righteous by works after he offered up Isaac his son on the altar? You see that his faith was active along with his works and his faith was perfected by his works." Then to drive home the point that faith must be shown by works, James adds: "Just as the body without spirit is dead, so also faith without works is dead."—Jas. 2: 21-23, 26.

Over three decades later, the apostle John wrote his Gospel and three letters. Did he appreciate the depth of meaning that other Bible writers had been inspired to explain respecting

true Christian faith? More than any other Bible writer, John used the Greek verb that is sometimes translated "exercise faith."

who exercises faith in the Son has everlasting life; the one who disobeys the Son will not see life, but the wrath of God remains upon him." (John 3:36) Christian faith includes a demonstration of obedience to Jesus' commands. John often quoted Jesus' words that show that exercising faith is an ongoing process.—John 3:16; 6:29, 40; 11:25, 26; 14:1, 12.

How grateful we should be that Jehovah used his holy spirit to reveal the truth to us and to enable us to exercise faith in the good news! (Read Luke 10:21.) We should never cease thanking Jehovah for drawing us to himself 11. How can we show appreciation for knowing the truth?

through his Son, "the Chief Agent and Perfecter of our faith." (Heb. 12:2) To show our appreciation for such undeserved kindness, we should keep strengthening our faith through prayer and study of God's Word.—Eph. 6:18; 1 Pet. 2:2.

12 We should keep exercising our faith in Jehovah's promises. We must do this in ways that are clearly evident to others. For example, we keep on preaching about God's Kingdom and sharing in the work of making disciples. We also keep working "what is good toward all, but especially toward those related to us in the faith." (Gal. 6:10) And we work hard to "strip off the old personality with its practices," guarding against anything that could weaken us spiritually.—Col. 3:5, 8-10.

FAITH IN GOD IS PART OF OUR FOUNDATION

- 13 "Without faith," the Bible states, "it is impossible to please God well, for whoever approaches God must believe that he exists and that he becomes the rewarder of those earnestly seeking him." (Heb. 11:6, ftn.) God's Word describes "faith in God" as part of the "foundation" that is needed for anyone to become and remain a true Christian. (Heb. 6:1) On that foundation, Christians must "supply to [their] faith" other important qualities "in order to keep [themselves] in God's love."—Read 2 Peter 1:5-7; Jude 20, 21.

dreds of times. No other Christian quality is mentioned as often. Does this mean that faith is the most important Christian quality?

15 Comparing faith with love, Paul wrote: "If I have all the faith so as to move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing." (1 Cor. 13:2) Jesus emphasized the allimportant quality of love for God when he answered the question: "Which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" (Matt. 22:35-40) Love embraces many essential Christian qualities, including faith. "Love," the Bible states, "believes all things." It has faith in the things God has said in his Word of truth.—1 Cor. 13: 4, 7.

qualities together multiple times, often in the same sentence or phrase. Paul urged his brothers to "put on the breastplate of faith and love." (1 Thess. 5:8) Peter wrote: "Though you never saw [Jesus], you love him. Though you do not see him now, yet you exercise faith in him." (1 Pet. 1:8) James asked his anointed brothers: "Did not God choose those who are poor from the world's standpoint to be rich in faith and heirs of the Kingdom, which he promised to those who *love* him?" (Jas. 2:5) John wrote: "This is [God's] commandment: that we have faith in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another."—1 John 3:23.

17 Although faith is essential, aspects of this quality will pass away when we see the ful-fillment of God's promises and experience the

reality of our Christian hope. But the need to grow in love for God and for our neighbor will never cease. Thus, Paul could write: "Now, however, these three remain: faith, hope, love; but the greatest of these is love."—1 Cor. 13:13.

A POWERFUL DEMONSTRATION OF FAITH

- 18 In our present day, Jehovah's people have been exercising their faith in God's established Kingdom. This has resulted in the development of a worldwide spiritual paradise that has over eight million inhabitants. It is a place that abounds with the fruitage of God's spirit. (Gal. 5:22, 23) What a powerful demonstration of true Christian faith and love!
- No human can take credit for this. It has 18, 19. What powerful demonstration of faith do we see today, and who deserves the credit for this?

been accomplished by our God. This wonderful work is bringing "fame to Jehovah, an everlasting sign that will never perish." (Isa. 55:13) Indeed, it is "God's gift" that we be "saved through faith." (Eph. 2:8) Our spiritual paradise will continue to grow and to flourish until the whole earth is filled with perfect, righteous, and happy humans to the eternal praise of Jehovah's name.
