JEREMIAH 5-7 | They Stopped Doing God's Will

Jeremiah in the gate of the house of Jehovah



7:1-4, 8-10, 15

- Jeremiah boldly exposed the Israelites' sins and hypocrisy
- The Israelites considered the temple to be a talisman that would protect them
- Jehovah let it be known that ritualistic sacrifices did not make up for wrong conduct

Consider: How can I make sure that my worship is in harmony with Jehovah's will and does not become formalistic?

Jeremiah 5-7

- 5** Roam the streets of Jerusalem.
Look around and take note.
Search her public squares to see
Whether you can find a man who acts with
justice,
One who seeks to be faithful,
And I will forgive her.
- 2** Even if they say: “As surely as Jehovah is alive!”
They would still swear to what is false.
- 3** O Jehovah, do your eyes not look for faithfulness?
You struck them, but it made no impact on them.
You exterminated them, but they refused to
accept discipline.
They made their faces harder than a rock,
And they refused to turn around.
- 4** But I said to myself: “Surely these must be the
lowly.
They act foolishly, for they do not know the way
of Jehovah,
The judgment of their God.
- 5** I will go to the prominent men and speak with them,
For they must have taken note of the way of
Jehovah,
The judgment of their God.

But they had all broken the yoke
And torn apart the restraints.”

⁶ That is why a lion of the forest attacks them,
A wolf of the desert plains keeps ravaging them,
A leopard lies awake at their cities.
Everyone going out from them is torn to pieces.
For their transgressions are many;
Their acts of unfaithfulness are numerous.

⁷ How can I forgive you for this?
Your sons have abandoned me,
And they swear by what is no God.
I satisfied their needs,
But they kept committing adultery,
And they flocked to the house of a prostitute.

⁸ They are like eager, lustful horses,
Each neighing after another man’s wife.

⁹ “Should I not call them to account for these
things?” declares Jehovah.
“Should I not avenge myself on such a nation?”

¹⁰ “Come up against her vineyard terraces and bring
ruin,
But do not make a complete extermination.
Take away her spreading shoots,
For they do not belong to Jehovah.

¹¹ For the house of Israel and the house of Judah

Have been utterly treacherous with me,”
declares Jehovah.

¹² “They have denied Jehovah, and they keep saying,
‘He will do nothing.
No calamity will come upon us;
We will not see sword or famine.’

¹³ The prophets are full of wind,
And the word is not in them.
Let this happen to them!”

¹⁴ Therefore this is what Jehovah, the God of armies,
says:

“Because these men are saying this,
Here I am making my words a fire in your mouth,
And this people is the wood,
And it will consume them.”

¹⁵ “Here I am bringing in on you a nation from far
away, O house of Israel,” declares Jehovah.

“It is an enduring nation.
It is an ancient nation,
A nation whose language you do not know,
And whose speech you cannot understand.

¹⁶ Their quiver is like an open grave;
All of them are warriors.

¹⁷ They will devour your harvest and your bread.
They will devour your sons and your daughters.
They will devour your flocks and your herds.

They will devour your vines and your fig trees.
They will destroy with the sword your fortified
cities in which you trust.”

¹⁸ “But even in those days,” declares Jehovah, “I will not carry out a complete extermination of you. ¹⁹ And when they ask, ‘Why has Jehovah our God done all these things to us?’ you should answer them, ‘Just as you abandoned me to serve a foreign god in your land, so you will serve foreigners in a land that is not yours.’”

²⁰ Declare this in the house of Jacob,
And proclaim it in Judah, saying:

²¹ “Hear this, you foolish and senseless people:
They have eyes but cannot see;
They have ears but cannot hear.

²² ‘Do you not fear me?’ declares Jehovah,
‘Should you not tremble before me?
It is I who placed the sand as the boundary for
the sea,
A permanent regulation that it cannot pass over.
Although its waves toss, they cannot prevail;
Although they roar, they still cannot pass beyond
it.

²³ But this people has a stubborn and rebellious
heart;
They have turned aside and gone their own way.

²⁴ And they do not say in their heart:

“Let us now fear Jehovah our God,
The One who gives the rain in its season,
Both the autumn rain and the spring rain,
The One who guards for us the appointed weeks
of the harvest.”

²⁵ Your own errors have prevented these things from
coming;
Your own sins have deprived you of what is
good.

²⁶ For among my people there are wicked men.
They keep peering, as when birdcatchers crouch
down.
They set a deadly trap.
It is men whom they catch.

²⁷ Like a cage full of birds,
So their houses are full of deception.
That is why they have become powerful and rich.

²⁸ They have grown fat and smooth;
They overflow with evil.
They do not plead the legal case of the
fatherless,
That they may gain success;
And they deny justice to the poor.”

²⁹ “Should I not call them to account for these
things?” declares Jehovah.
“Should I not avenge myself on such a nation?”

- ³⁰ Something appalling and horrible has occurred in
the land:
- ³¹ The prophets prophesy lies,
And the priests dominate by their own authority.
And my own people love it that way.
But what will you do when the end comes?"
- 6** Take shelter, O sons of Benjamin, away from
Jerusalem.
Blow the horn in Te-ko'a;
Light a fire signal over Beth-hac-che'rem!
For a calamity looms from the north, a great
disaster.
- ² The daughter of Zion resembles a beautiful and
delicate woman.
- ³ The shepherds and their droves will come.
They will pitch their tents all around her,
Each grazing the flock in his care.
- ⁴ "Prepare for war against her!
Rise up, and let us attack her at midday!"
"Woe to us, for the day is declining,
For the shadows of evening are getting longer!"
- ⁵ "Rise up, and let us attack during the night
And destroy her fortified towers."
- ⁶ For this is what Jehovah of armies says:
"Cut down wood and raise up a siege rampart
against Jerusalem.

She is the city that must be held to account;
There is nothing but oppression within her.

⁷ As a cistern keeps its water cool,
So she keeps her wickedness cool.
Violence and destruction are heard in her;
Sickness and plague are constantly before me.

⁸ Be warned, O Jerusalem, or I will turn away from
you in disgust;
I will make you desolate, a land without
inhabitants.”

⁹ This is what Jehovah of armies says:
“They will thoroughly glean the remnant of Israel
as the last grapes on a vine.
Pass your hand again like one gathering grapes
from the vines.”

¹⁰ “To whom should I speak and give warning?
Who will listen?
Look! Their ears are closed, so that they are
unable to pay attention.
Look! The word of Jehovah has become
something they scorn;
They find no pleasure in it.

¹¹ So I am filled with the wrath of Jehovah,
And I am tired of holding it in.”
“Pour it out on the child in the street,
On the groups of young men gathered together.

They will all be captured, a man along with his wife,
The old men along with the very old.

¹² Their houses will be turned over to others,
Together with their fields and their wives.
For I will stretch my hand out against the inhabitants of the land,” declares Jehovah.

¹³ “For from the least to the greatest, each one is making dishonest gain;
From the prophet to the priest, each one is practicing fraud.

¹⁴ And they try to heal the breakdown of my people lightly, saying,
‘There is peace! There is peace!’
When there is no peace.

¹⁵ Do they feel ashamed of the detestable things they have done?
They feel no shame at all!
They do not even know how to feel humiliated!
So they will fall among the fallen.
When I bring punishment on them they will stumble,” says Jehovah.

¹⁶ This is what Jehovah says:
“Stand at the crossroads and see.
Ask about the ancient roadways,
Ask where the good way is, and walk in it,

And find rest for yourselves.”

But they say: “We will not walk in it.”

17 “And I appointed watchmen who said,
‘Pay attention to the sound of the horn!’”
But they said: “We will not pay attention.”

18 “Therefore hear, O nations!
And know, O assembly,
What will happen to them.

19 Listen, O earth!
I am bringing calamity on this people
As the fruitage of their own schemes,
For they paid no attention to my words
And they rejected my law.”

20 “What do I care that you bring frankincense from
She'ba
And sweet cane from a distant land?
Your whole burnt offerings are not acceptable,
And your sacrifices do not please me.”

21 Therefore this is what Jehovah says:
“Here I am setting for this people stumbling
blocks,
And they will stumble over them,
Fathers and sons together,
A neighbor and his companion,
And they will all perish.”

22 This is what Jehovah says:

“Look! A people is coming from the land of the north,
And a great nation will be awakened from the remotest parts of the earth.

²³ They will grab hold of the bow and the javelin.
They are cruel and will have no mercy.
Their voice will roar like the sea,
And they ride on horses.
They draw up in battle order like a man of war
against you, O daughter of Zion.”

²⁴ We have heard the report about it.
Our hands fall limp;
Distress has seized us,
Anguish like that of a woman giving birth.

²⁵ Do not go out into the field,
And do not walk on the road,
For the enemy has a sword;
There is terror all around.

²⁶ O daughter of my people,
Put on sackcloth and roll in the ashes.
Mourn as for an only son, with bitter wailing,
For suddenly the destroyer will come upon us.

²⁷ “I have made you a metal tester among my people,
One making a thorough search;
You must take note and examine their way.

²⁸ All of them are the most stubborn men,

Walking about as slanderers.
They are like copper and iron;
All of them are corrupt.

²⁹ The bellows have been scorched.
Out from their fire there is lead.
One keeps refining intensely simply for nothing,
And those who are bad have not been
separated.

³⁰ Rejected silver is what people will certainly call
them,
For Jehovah has rejected them.”

7 This is the word that came to Jeremiah from
Jehovah, saying: ² “Stand in the gate of the house of
Jehovah and proclaim there this message, ‘Hear the
word of Jehovah, all you people of Judah who enter
these gates to bow down to Jehovah. ³ This is what
Jehovah of armies, the God of Israel, says: “Reform
your ways and your actions, and I will allow you to
keep residing in this place. ⁴ Do not put your trust in
deceptive words and say, ‘This is the temple of
Jehovah, the temple of Jehovah, the temple of
Jehovah!’ ⁵ For if you truly reform your ways and
actions; if you truly uphold justice between a man and
his neighbor; ⁶ if you do not oppress foreign residents,
orphans, and widows; if you do not shed innocent
blood in this place; and if you do not follow other gods

to your own harm; ⁷ then I will allow you to keep residing in this place, in the land I gave to your forefathers for all time.””

⁸ “But you are putting your trust in deceptive words—it will bring absolutely no benefit. ⁹ Can you steal, murder, commit adultery, swear falsely, make sacrifices to Ba'al, and follow after gods you had not known, ¹⁰ and then come and stand before me in this house that bears my name and say, ‘We will be saved,’ despite your doing all these detestable things? ¹¹ Has this house that bears my name become a cave of robbers in your eyes? Here I have seen it for myself,” declares Jehovah.

¹² “‘However, go now to my place in Shi'loh, where I first caused my name to reside, and see what I did to it because of the badness of my people Israel. ¹³ But you kept doing all these things,’ declares Jehovah, ‘and even though I spoke to you again and again, you did not listen. I kept calling you, but you would not answer. ¹⁴ So I will do to the house that bears my name, in which you are trusting, and to this place that I gave to you and your forefathers, just as I did to Shi'loh. ¹⁵ I will throw you out of my sight, just as I threw out all your brothers, all the descendants of E'phra·im.’

¹⁶ “As for you, do not pray in behalf of this people. Do not cry out or offer a prayer or plead with me in their

behalf, for I will not listen to you. ¹⁷ Do you not see what they are doing in the cities of Judah and in the streets of Jerusalem? ¹⁸ The sons are gathering wood, the fathers are lighting the fire, and the wives are kneading dough in order to make sacrificial cakes to the Queen of Heaven, and they are pouring out drink offerings to other gods to offend me. ¹⁹ ‘But am I the one they are hurting?’ declares Jehovah. ‘Is it not they themselves, to their own shame?’ ²⁰ Therefore this is what the Sovereign Lord Jehovah says, ‘Look! My anger and my wrath will be poured out on this place, on man and beast, on the trees of the field and the fruitage of the ground; it will burn and will not be extinguished.’

²¹ “This is what Jehovah of armies, the God of Israel, says, ‘Go ahead, add your whole burnt offerings to your other sacrifices, and eat the flesh yourselves.

²² For on the day I brought your forefathers out of the land of Egypt, I did not speak with them or command them concerning whole burnt offerings and sacrifices.

²³ But I did give them this command: “Obey my voice, and I will become your God, and you will become my people. You must walk in all the way that I command, so that it may go well with you.” ²⁴ But they did not listen or incline their ear; instead, they walked in their own schemes, stubbornly following their wicked heart, and they went backward, not forward, ²⁵ from the day

your forefathers came out of the land of Egypt until this day. So I kept sending all my servants the prophets to you, sending them each day, again and again. ²⁶ But they refused to listen to me, and they did not incline their ear. Instead, they were stubborn, and they acted worse than their forefathers!

²⁷ “You will speak all these words to them, but they will not listen to you; you will call to them, but they will not answer you. ²⁸ And you will say to them, ‘This is the nation that did not obey the voice of Jehovah their God and refused to accept discipline. Faithfulness has perished and is not even mentioned among them.’

²⁹ “Shear off your uncut hair and throw it away, and on the bare hills raise a dirge, for Jehovah has rejected and will abandon this generation that has infuriated him. ³⁰ ‘For the people of Judah have done what is bad in my eyes,’ declares Jehovah. ‘They have set up their disgusting idols in the house that bears my name, in order to defile it. ³¹ They have built the high places of To'pheth, which is in the Valley of the Son of Hin'nom, in order to burn their sons and their daughters in the fire, something that I had not commanded and that had never even come into my heart.’

³² “‘Therefore look! the days are coming,’ declares Jehovah, ‘when it will no longer be called To'pheth or the Valley of the Son of Hin'nom but the Valley of the

Slaughter. They will bury in To'pheth until there is no place left. ³³ And the dead bodies of this people will become food for the birds of the heavens and for the beasts of the earth, with no one to frighten them away. ³⁴ I will put an end to the sound of exultation and the sound of rejoicing, the voice of the bridegroom and the voice of the bride, in the cities of Judah and in the streets of Jerusalem, for the land will be reduced to ruins.'"

Treasures From God's Word

Jeremiah 6:13-15—Jeremiah exposed the nation's sins

Reference: w88 4/1 11-12 paragraphs 7-8.

7 “And they will be certain to fight against you,” warned Jehovah, “but they will not prevail against you.” (Jeremiah 1:19) Now why would the Jews and their rulers want to fight against this prophet? Because his message attacked their complacency and their formalistic form of worship. Jeremiah did not pull his punches: “Look! The very word of Jehovah has become to them a reproach, in which word they can take no delight. For from the least one of them even to the greatest one of them, every one is making for himself unjust gain; and from the prophet even to the priest [the very ones who should have been the guardians of moral and spiritual values], each one is acting falsely.” — **Jeremiah 6:10, 13.**

8 True, they were leading the nation in making sacrifices. They were going through the motions of true worship, but their hearts were not in it. Ritual meant more to them than right conduct. At the same time, the Jewish religious leaders were lulling the nation into a false sense of security, saying, “There is peace! There is peace!” when there was no peace.

(Jeremiah 6:14; 8:11) Yes, they were fooling the people into believing that they were at peace with God. They felt that there was nothing to worry about, for they were Jehovah's saved people, possessing the holy city and its temple. But is that how Jehovah viewed the situation?

Jeremiah 7:1-7—Jehovah tried to move them to repentance

Reference: w88 4/1 12 **paragraphs 9-10.**

9 Jehovah commanded Jeremiah to take a position in full public view at the gate of the temple and deliver His message to the worshipers who entered there. He had to tell them: "Do not put your trust in fallacious words, saying, 'The temple of Jehovah, the temple of Jehovah, the temple of Jehovah they are!' . . . It will certainly be of no benefit at all." The Jews were walking by sight, not by faith, as they boasted in their temple. They had already forgotten Jehovah's cautionary words: "The heavens are my throne, and the earth is my footstool. Where, then, is the house that you people can build for me?" Jehovah, the Sovereign Lord of this vast universe, was certainly not restricted to the confines of their temple, no matter how glorious it might be!—Jeremiah 7:1-8; Isaiah 66:1.

10 Jeremiah continued with his stinging public rebuke: “Can there be stealing, murdering and committing adultery and swearing falsely and making sacrificial smoke to Baal and walking after other gods whom you had not known, . . . and must you say, ‘We shall certainly be delivered,’ in the face of doing all these detestable things?” The Jews, as God’s ‘chosen people,’ thought he would tolerate any kind of conduct, as long as they were bringing their sacrifices to the temple. However, if they perceived him as a sentimental father pampering a spoiled and only child, they were in for a rude awakening.—**Jeremiah 7:9, 10; Exodus 19:5, 6.**

Jeremiah 7:8-15—Israel believed that Jehovah would not take action

Reference: *jr* 21 **paragraph 12.**

At the start of Jehoiakim’s reign, Jehovah told Jeremiah to go to the temple and roundly condemn the Judeans for their wickedness. They considered Jehovah’s temple to be a talisman that would protect them. Yet, if they would not abandon their “stealing, murdering and committing adultery and swearing falsely and making sacrificial smoke to Baal and walking after other gods,” Jehovah would forsake his temple. And he would do the same to the hypocrites who worshipped in it, just as he abandoned the

tabernacle at Shiloh in the days of High Priest Eli. The land of Judah would “become nothing but a devastated place.” (Jeremiah 7:1-15, 34; 26:1-6) Think of the courage Jeremiah needed to declare that message! Likely, he did so in public before prominent, influential people. Some brothers and sisters today have likewise felt that they needed a measure of courage to share in street witnessing or to address wealthy or important people. We can, though, be sure of this: God’s support for us is certain, just as it was for Jeremiah.—Hebrews 10:39; 13:6.

Digging for Spiritual Gems

Jeremiah 6:16—What was Jehovah urging his people to do?

Reference: w05 11/1 23 paragraph 11.

Are we really allowing God’s Word to guide us that closely? It is worthwhile to pause at times and examine ourselves honestly. Consider a verse that will help us to do so: “This is what Jehovah has said: ‘Stand still in the ways, you people, and see, and ask for the roadways of long ago, where, now, the good way is; and walk in it, and find ease for your souls.’” (Jeremiah 6:16) These words might remind us of a traveler who pauses at a crossroads to ask for directions. In a spiritual sense, Jehovah’s rebellious people in Israel

needed to do something similar. They needed to find their way back to “the roadways of long ago.” That “good way” was the way in which their faithful forefathers had walked, the way from which the nation had foolishly strayed. Sadly, Israel responded stubbornly to this loving reminder from Jehovah. The same verse continues: “But they kept saying: ‘We are not going to walk.’” In modern times, though, God’s people have responded differently to such counsel.

Jeremiah 6:22, 23—Why could it be said that a people would be “coming from the land of the north”?

Reference: w88 4/1 13 **paragraph 15**.

By about 632 B.C.E., Assyria had fallen to the Chaldeans and the Medes, and Egypt was reduced to a minor power to the south of Judah. The real threat to Judah would come through the invasion route to the north. Thus, Jeremiah had to give his fellow Jews some bad news! “Look! A people is coming from the land of the north . . . It is a cruel one, and they will have no pity. . . . It is drawn up in battle order like a man of war against you, O daughter of Zion.” The ascendant world power at that time was Babylon. This would be God’s instrument for punishing faithless Judah.—**Jeremiah 6:22, 23; 25:8, 9**.

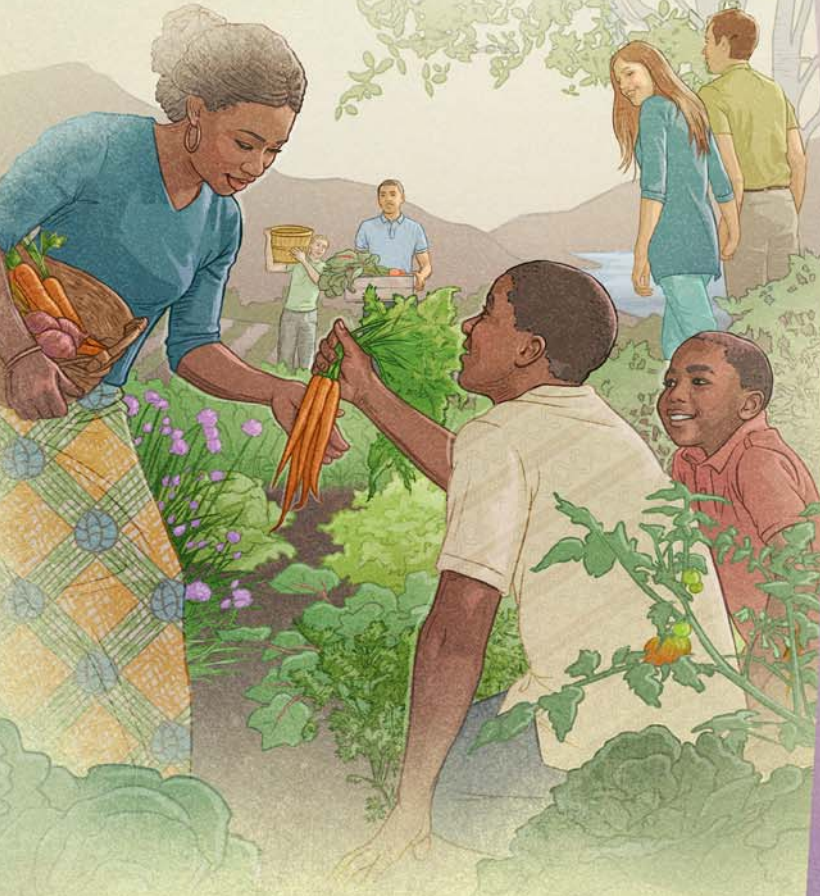

How many of Jehovah's Witnesses do you know? Some of us may be your neighbors, work colleagues, or classmates. Or we may have engaged you in Bible discussions. Who really are we, and why do we publicly share our beliefs?

We are ordinary people. We come from various backgrounds and social conditions. Some of us formerly practiced a different religion, while others did not believe in God. Before becoming Witnesses, however, all of us took the time to examine carefully the teachings of the Bible. (Acts 17:11) We agreed with what we learned, and then we made a personal choice to worship Jehovah God.

We benefit from studying the Bible. Like everyone else, we have to deal with problems and our own weaknesses. But by trying to apply Bible principles in our everyday lives, we have experienced a marked improvement in our quality of life. (Psalm 128:1, 2) That is one reason why we share with others the good things that we have learned from the Bible.

We live by godly values. These values, as taught in the Bible, promote well-being and respect for others, along with such qualities as honesty and kindness. They contribute to the development of healthy and productive members of society, and they encourage family unity and morality. Convinced that "God is not partial," we belong to a spiritual brotherhood that is truly international, free of racial and political barriers. Although we are ordinary, we make up a unique people.—Acts 4:13; 10:34, 35.

¹⁶ You will recall that Jesus told his apostles: “The reaper is . . . gathering fruit for everlasting life, so that the sower and the reaper may rejoice together.” (John 4:36) How do we “rejoice *together*” in the global harvest? In several ways. Let us consider three.

¹⁷ First, we rejoice to see Jehovah’s role in the work. When we preach the Kingdom message, we sow seed. (Matt. 13:18, 19) When we help someone

Jesús Martín (aged 77, baptized in 1955) recalls: "When I learned the truth, there were 300 Witnesses here in Spain. In 1960, the repression against us became brutal. The government ordered the police to snuff out Jehovah's Witnesses. At that time, it was hard to imagine how we would ever be able to preach the good news throughout the country. Everything seemed to be stacked against us. But today, there are nearly 111,000 Witnesses in Spain. Having witnessed how that growth has taken place despite opposition reinforces my conviction that with Jehovah on our side, nothing is impossible!"

HOW TWO TRACTS TOUCHED TWO HEARTS IN THE AMAZON

A FAITHFUL 91-year-old Christian elder named Antônio Simões fondly remembers how his father and his uncle found the truth by means of two tracts published by Jehovah’s Witnesses. “Do you want to hear about it?” he asks his visitors. “We would love to,” they say. Antônio’s kind eyes light up, and with a smile he sits down to tell his story.

“My father, Zeno, was a Baptist preacher. In 1931, he traveled to a remote part of the Amazon forest to visit a church member. In her home, he noticed two Bible tracts. She had found them in the church, but she didn’t know who left them. One tract spoke about hell; the other about the resurrection. Father was touched by what he read. He immediately thought about his brother-in-law, Guilherme, who had often told him: ‘I don’t believe in hellfire. A God of love couldn’t create such a place.’ Eager to show the tracts to Guilherme, Father got into his canoe and paddled for eight hours to Manaquiri, a settlement near Manaus, where Guilherme was living.

“After Father and Uncle Guilherme examined the tracts, both said, ‘This is the truth!’ Right away, they wrote to the branch office in Brazil, asking for litera-

ture. Father resigned as a pastor, and he and my uncle began sharing the Bible's message in that isolated area. The people responded so well that within a year a congregation was formed in Manaquiri. Before long, 70 villagers attended the meetings, making it, at the time, the largest congregation in Brazil." Antônio pauses. Then, he asks, "Isn't it wonderful to hear how the Kingdom message entered the Amazon?" Indeed, it is. Two tiny scattered seeds—two small Bible tracts—took root in the vast Amazon forest and sprouted into a flourishing congregation. And today the 83-year-old Manaquiri Congregation is no longer the only congregation in Brazil's Amazonas State, but one of 143!

have had an experience similar to that of Joan, a Christian sister in Britain who was baptized 60 years ago. She said: "I have met individuals who told me that I planted a seed in their heart when I preached to them years ago. Unknown to me, other Witnesses later studied the Bible with them and helped them to become servants of Jehovah. I rejoice that the seed I planted grew and was harvested."—**Read 1 Corinthians 3:6, 7.**

¹⁸ Second, we remain joyful workers when we keep in mind that Paul stated: “Each person will receive his own reward according to his *own work*.” (1 Cor. 3:8) The reward is given according to the work, not according to the results of that work. How heartening that assurance is for those preaching in territories where there is little response! In God’s eyes, every Witness who wholeheartedly shares in the sowing work is “bearing much fruit” and therefore has reason to rejoice.—John 15:8; Matt. 13:23.

¹⁹ Third, we rejoice that our work fulfills prophecy. Consider Jesus’ answer to his apostles when they asked: “What will be the sign of your presence and of the conclusion of the system of things?” He told them that one feature of that sign would be a global preaching work. Was he speaking of the disciple-making work? No. He said: “This good news of the Kingdom will be *preached* in all the inhabited earth for a witness.” (Matt. 24:3, 14) Thus, Kingdom preaching—sowing seed—is a feature of the sign.

Hence, as we preach the good news of the Kingdom, we keep in mind that even if we do not succeed in making a disciple, we do succeed in giving “a witness.”*^[4] Yes, no matter how people respond, we share in fulfilling Jesus’ prophecy and have the honor to serve as “God’s fellow workers.” (1 Cor. 3:9) What good reason to rejoice!

“From the Rising of the Sun to Its Setting”

²⁰ In the first century, Jesus helped his apostles to see that the harvest work was urgent. From 1919 onward, Jesus has helped his modern-day disciples to grasp the same truth. In response, God’s people have intensified their activities. In fact, the harvest work has proved to be unstoppable. As foretold by the prophet Malachi, the preaching work is being carried out today “from the rising of the sun to its setting.” (Mal. 1:11) Yes, from sunrise to sunset—from east to west, no matter where they are on earth—sowers and

*^[4] That vital truth was already understood by the early Bible Students. *Zion’s Watch Tower* of November 15, 1895, stated: “If but little wheat can be garnered, abundant *testimony to the truth* can at least be borne. . . . All can preach the gospel.”

²¹ As we look back today over some 100 years and see how a small group of God’s servants has grown into “a mighty nation,” our heart does indeed “throb and overflow” with joy. (Isa. 60:5, 22) May that joy and our love for Jehovah, “the Master of the harvest,” impel each one of us to keep on doing our share in completing the greatest harvest of all time! —Luke 10:2.

Why Modesty Still Matters

“Wisdom is with the modest ones.”

—PROV. 11:2.

KING SAUL of ancient Israel began his reign as a modest and respected man. (1 Sam. 9:1, 2, 21; 10:20-24) But soon after he became king, he carried out a series of presumptuous acts. When God’s prophet Samuel did not show up in Gilgal at the

appointed time, Saul became impatient. The Philistines were preparing for battle, and the Israelites were deserting Saul. He must have thought, ‘I have to do something—and quickly.’ So he offered up a sacrifice to God, which he was not authorized to do. Jehovah was not pleased.—1 Sam. 13:5-9.

² When Samuel arrived in Gilgal, he rebuked Saul. Instead of accepting the correction, Saul made excuses, tried to shift the blame, and minimized what he had done. (1 Sam. 13:10-14) That started a terrible chain of events that eventually cost Saul his kingship and, more important, Jehovah’s approval. (1 Sam. 15:22, 23) Despite a promising beginning, Saul’s life ended in complete disaster.—1 Sam. 31:1-6.

³ In today’s competitive world, many feel that they have to stand out from the crowd in order to get ahead. In doing so, they may sacrifice all modesty. For example, a well-known movie star, turned politician, once said: “Modesty is not a word that applies to me in any way—I hope it never will.” Why, though, does modesty still matter? What is modesty, and what is it not? And how can we

remain modest despite challenging situations or pressure from others? In this article, we will answer the first two questions. The third question will be addressed in the following article.

WHY IS MODESTY IMPORTANT?

⁴ The Bible contrasts modesty with presumptuousness. (Read Proverbs 11:2.) Wisely, David asked Jehovah to “hold [him] back from presumptuous acts.” (Ps. 19:13) What are “presumptuous acts”? By definition, when someone rashly or impertinently does something that he is not authorized to do, he is acting presumptuously. Because of inherited sin, we all act presumptuously at times. But as King Saul’s example illustrates, if we develop a pattern of pushing ahead, sooner or later we will find ourselves in serious trouble with God. Psalm 119:21 says of Jehovah: “You rebuke the presumptuous.” Why is that?

⁵ Presumptuous acts are more serious than innocent mistakes. First, when we act immodestly, we fail to honor Jehovah as our rightful Sovereign. Second, if we act beyond the scope of our

authority, we are likely to get into conflict with others. (Prov. 13:10) And third, when it becomes clear that we have acted presumptuously, we may be embarrassed or even humiliated. (Luke 14: 8, 9) Presumptuous acts do not turn out well. As the Scriptures show, modesty is always the right course.

WHAT DOES MODESTY INVOLVE?

⁶ Modesty and humility are closely linked traits. In the Bible, humility refers to being free from pride or arrogance. It is described as “lowliness of mind.” (Phil. 2:3, ftn.) A humble person is generally also a modest person, able to estimate accurately his own abilities and achievements, to acknowledge his mistakes, and to accept suggestions and new ideas. Humility greatly pleases Jehovah.

⁷ In the Bible, modesty similarly refers to having a proper estimate of ourselves and an awareness of our limitations. In the original language of the text, the emphasis seems to be on how that awareness should affect our behavior toward others.

⁸ When might we start to think or act immodest-

ly? Consider a few of the warning signs. We might be taking ourselves or our privileges too seriously. (Rom. 12:16) We might be drawing attention to ourselves in inappropriate ways. (1 Tim. 2:9, 10) Or we might be advocating strong opinions solely on the basis of our position, connections, or personal thinking. (1 Cor. 4:6) Often, when we act like this, we may not even be aware that we have crossed the line from modesty to presumptuousness.

⁹ Anyone can act immodestly if he allows himself temporarily to be overcome by fleshly desires. Selfish ambition, envy, and uncontrolled anger have led many to presumptuous acts. Bible characters like Absalom, Uzziah, and Nebuchadnezzar succumbed to such works of the flesh and were humbled by Jehovah for their presumptuousness.—2 Sam. 15:1-6; 18:9-17; 2 Chron. 26:16-21; Dan. 5:18-21.

¹⁰ There are other reasons, though, why someone may act immodestly. Consider, for example, the following Bible accounts: Genesis 20:2-7 and Matthew 26:31-35. Were the seemingly

ACKNOWLEDGING OUR PLACE

¹¹ Modesty really starts with acknowledging our place in God's arrangement. As a God of order, Jehovah gives each one of us a place or sphere of operation in his household. Everyone's role in the congregation is unique, but all of us are needed. In his undeserved kindness, Jehovah has given each of us certain gifts, assets, abilities, or talents. We can use them to glorify him and to benefit others. (Rom. 12:4-8) Jehovah has entrusted us with a stewardship that comes with honor, trust, and responsibility.—Read 1 Peter 4:10.

¹² Our place in God's arrangement is not fixed, however. It can change over time. Consider Je-

sus' example. Initially, he was alone with Jehovah. (Prov. 8: 22) Then he helped make other spirit creatures, the material universe, and finally, humans. (Col. 1:16) Still later, Jesus took on a new role on earth, first as a helpless baby and then as an adult. (Phil. 2:7) After his sacrificial death, Jesus returned to heavenly spirit life to become the King of God's Kingdom in 1914. (Heb. 2:9) And that will not be his last change of assignment. After his Thousand Year Reign, Jesus will hand over his Kingdom to Jehovah so that "God may be all things to everyone."—1 Cor. 15:28.

¹³ We can likewise expect our assignments to change from time to time, often because of decisions we make. For example, were you single,

but then you got married? Have you begun raising children? In your later years, have you simplified your life to take up the full-time ministry? Each of those decisions came with certain privileges and responsibilities. Our changing circumstances can expand or limit our sphere of operation. Are you young or up in years? Is your health good or fragile? Jehovah always considers how each of us might best be used in his service. He only expects from us what is reasonable, and he greatly appreciates whatever we do.—Heb. 6:10.

¹⁴ Jesus found joy in every one of his assignments, and we can find joy in ours. (Prov. 8:30, 31) A modest person does not feel cramped by his current assignments or responsibilities in the congregation. He does not worry about gaining future privileges or about what others are achieving. Instead, he focuses his energies on finding purpose and enjoyment in his present role because he views it as coming from Jehovah. At the same time, he sincerely respects the role or place that Jehovah has given to others. Modesty helps us to enjoy giving others due honor and support.—Rom. 12:10.

WHAT MODESTY IS NOT

¹⁵ Gideon is an excellent example of modesty in action. When Jehovah's angel first appeared to him, Gideon readily acknowledged his modest background and credentials. (Judg. 6:15) After he accepted Jehovah's assignment, Gideon made sure that he thoroughly understood what was required, and he looked to Jehovah for guidance. (Judg. 6:36-40) Gideon was bold and courageous. Yet, he acted with caution and shrewdness. (Judg. 6:11, 27) He did not seize upon his assignment to gain prominence. Rather, as soon as he could, he gladly returned to his former place.—Judg. 8:22, 23, 29.

¹⁶ Being modest does not mean that we should never reach out for or accept additional privileges of service. The Scriptures encourage all of us to make advancement. (1 Tim. 4:13-15) Does this always require a change of assignment though? Not necessarily. With Jehovah's blessing, we can make spiritual progress in whatever role we are currently serving. We can continue to cultivate our God-given abilities and expand in doing good works.

¹⁷ Before accepting a new assignment, a modest person will first find out what will be required of him. He can then make an honest evaluation of his circumstances. For example, will he be able to take on more work or responsibility without neglecting other important things? Can some of his current work be delegated to make room for the new responsibility? If the answer to one or both of these questions is no, perhaps there is someone else who might be in a better position to care for the assignment right now. A prayerful and realistic analysis will help us to avoid overreaching our current abilities and limitations. Modesty may lead us to say no.

¹⁸ When we do accept a new assignment, Gideon's example reminds us that we cannot succeed without Jehovah's direction and blessing. After all, we have been invited "to walk in modesty with [our] God." (Mic. 6:8) So any time we take on new responsibilities, we need to reflect prayerfully on whatever Jehovah tells us through his Word and his organization. We have to learn to adjust our unsteady steps to match Jehovah's steady lead.

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18. (a) What will modesty move us to do in a new role or assignment?
(b) How does Romans 12:3 apply to a modest person?

Let us remember that it is Jehovah's humility and not our own ability that 'makes us great.' (Ps. 18:35) Choosing to walk modestly with God will therefore help us to think neither too much nor too little of ourselves.—Read Romans 12:3.

¹⁹ A modest person gives Jehovah the honor he deserves, since Jehovah is our Creator and Universal Sovereign. (Rev. 4:11) Modesty helps us to be satisfied with and productive in our assigned place in God's arrangement. Modesty restrains us from acting dishonorably, and it promotes unity among Jehovah's people. Modesty motivates us to consider others ahead of ourselves, and it encourages us to be cautious, thus avoiding serious mistakes. For these reasons, modesty still matters to all of God's people, and Jehovah treasures those who cultivate it. But what about when we are under pressure? The next article will show us how to remain modest in stressful situations.

Make Me Know Your Ways

(Psalm 25:4)
