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

Daniel 7-9

7 In the first year of King Bel-shaz'zar of Babylon, Daniel saw a dream and visions of his head as he lay on his bed. Then he wrote down the dream; he recorded a complete account of the matters. ² Daniel declared:

"I was watching in my visions during the night, and look! the four winds of the heavens were stirring up the vast sea. ³ And four huge beasts came out of the sea, each different from the others.

- ⁴ "The first one was like a lion, and it had the wings of an eagle. I watched until its wings were plucked out, and it was lifted up from the earth and was made to stand up on two feet like a man, and it was given the heart of a man.
- ⁵ "And look! another beast, a second one, like a bear. It was raised up on one side, and three ribs were in its mouth between its teeth; and it was told, 'Get up, eat much flesh.'
- ⁶ "After this I kept watching, and look! another beast, like a leopard, but on its back it had four wings like those of a bird. And the beast had four heads, and it was given authority to rule.

⁷ "After this I kept watching in the visions of the night, and I saw a fourth beast, fearsome and terrifying and unusually strong, and it had large iron teeth. It was devouring and crushing, and what was left it trampled down with its feet. It was different from all the other beasts that were prior to it, and it had ten horns.

⁸ While I considered the horns, look! another horn, a small one, came up among them, and three of the first horns were plucked up from before it. And look! there were eyes like human eyes in this horn, and there was a mouth speaking arrogantly.

⁹ "I kept watching until thrones were set in place and the Ancient of Days sat down. His clothing was white like snow, and the hair of his head was like clean wool. His throne was flames of fire; its wheels were a burning fire. ¹⁰ A stream of fire was flowing and going out from before him. A thousand thousands kept ministering to him, and ten thousand times ten thousand stood before him. The Court took its seat, and books were opened.

¹¹ "I kept watching at that time because of the sound of the arrogant words that the horn was speaking; I watched until the beast was killed and its body was destroyed and it was given over to be burned in the fire. ¹² But as for the rest of the beasts, their rulerships were taken away, and their lives were prolonged for a time and a season.

¹³ "I kept watching in the visions of the night, and look! with the clouds of the heavens, someone like a son of man was coming; and he gained access to the Ancient of Days, and they brought him up close before that One. ¹⁴ And to him there were given rulership, honor, and a kingdom, that the peoples, nations, and language groups should all serve him. His rulership is an everlasting rulership that will not pass away, and his kingdom will not be destroyed.

¹⁵ "As for me, Daniel, my spirit was distressed within me because the visions of my head frightened me. ¹⁶ I went near to one of those who were standing there to ask him about the true meaning of this. So he replied and made known to me the interpretation of these things.

¹⁷ "These huge beasts, four in number, are four kings who will stand up from the earth. ¹⁸ But the holy ones of the Supreme One will receive the kingdom, and they will possess the kingdom forever, yes, forever and ever."

¹⁹ "Then I wanted to know more about the fourth beast, which was different from all the others; it was extraordinarily fearsome, with iron teeth and copper claws, and it was devouring and crushing, and trampling down what was left with its feet; ²⁰ and about the ten horns on its head, and the other horn that came

up and before which three fell, the horn that had eyes and a mouth speaking arrogantly and whose appearance was bigger than that of the others.

²¹ "I kept watching as that horn made war on the holy ones, and it was prevailing against them, ²² until the Ancient of Days came and judgment was rendered in favor of the holy ones of the Supreme One, and the appointed time arrived for the holy ones to take possession of the kingdom.

²³ "This is what he said: 'As for the fourth beast, there is a fourth kingdom that will come to be on the earth. It will be different from all the other kingdoms, and it will devour all the earth and will trample it down and crush it. ²⁴ As for the ten horns, ten kings will rise up out of that kingdom; and still another one will rise up after them, and he will be different from the first ones, and he will humiliate three kings. ²⁵ He will speak words against the Most High, and he will continually harass the holy ones of the Supreme One. He will intend to change times and law, and they will be given into his hand for a time, times, and half a time. ²⁶ But the Court sat, and they took away his rulership, in order to annihilate him and to destroy him completely.

²⁷ "And the kingdom and the rulership and the grandeur of the kingdoms under all the heavens were given to the people who are the holy ones of the

Supreme One. Their kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and all rulerships will serve and obey them.'

²⁸ "This is the end of the matter. As for me, Daniel, my thoughts alarmed me greatly, so that I turned pale; but I kept the matter in my own heart."

8 In the third year of the kingship of King Bel-shaz'zar, a vision appeared to me, Daniel, after the one that appeared to me previously. ² I saw the vision, and as I watched I was in Shu'shan the citadel, which is in the province of E'lam; I viewed the vision, and I was next to the watercourse of U'lai. ³ As I raised my eyes, look! there was a ram standing before the watercourse, and it had two horns. The two horns were tall, but one was higher than the other, and the higher one came up later. ⁴ I saw the ram making thrusts to the west and to the north and to the south, and no wild beasts could stand before it, and there was no one who could provide rescue from its power. It did as it pleased and exalted itself.

⁵ As I kept watching, look! there was a male goat coming from the west crossing the surface of the whole earth without touching the ground. And the goat had a conspicuous horn between its eyes. ⁶ It was coming toward the ram with the two horns, which I had seen standing before the watercourse; it was running toward it in a powerful rage.

⁷ I saw it closing in on the ram, and it was filled with bitterness toward it. It struck down the ram and broke its two horns, and the ram was powerless to stand up to it. It threw the ram to the ground and trampled it down, and there was no one to rescue it from its power.

⁸ Then the male goat exalted itself exceedingly, but as soon as it became mighty, the great horn was broken; then four conspicuous horns came up instead of the one, toward the four winds of the heavens.

⁹ Out of one of them came another horn, a small one, and it grew very great toward the south and toward the east and toward the Decoration. ¹⁰ It grew so great that it reached all the way to the army of the heavens, and it caused some of the army and some of the stars to fall to the earth, and it trampled them down. ¹¹ It exalted itself even against the Prince of the army, and from him the constant feature was taken away, and the established place of his sanctuary was thrown down.

And an army was given over, together with the constant feature, because of transgression; and it kept throwing truth to the earth, and it acted and had

success.

¹³ And I heard a holy one speaking, and another holy one said to the one speaking: "How long will the vision of the constant feature and of the transgression

causing desolation continue, to make both the holy place and the army things to trample on?" ¹⁴ So he said to me: "Until 2,300 evenings and mornings; and the holy place will certainly be restored to its right condition."

¹⁵ While I, Daniel, was watching the vision and seeking to understand it, suddenly I saw standing in front of me someone who appeared to be a man.

¹⁶ Then I heard the voice of a man in the midst of the U'lai, and he called out: "Ga'bri-el, make that one understand what he saw." ¹⁷ So he came near to where I was standing, but when he came I was so terrified that I fell facedown. He said to me: "Understand, O son of man, that the vision is for the time of the end." ¹⁸ But while he was speaking with me, I fell fast asleep with my face to the ground. So he touched me and made me stand up where I had been standing. ¹⁹ Then he said: "Here I am causing you to know what will happen in the final part of the denunciation, because it is for the appointed time of the end.

²⁰ "The two-horned ram that you saw stands for the kings of Me'di-a and Persia. ²¹ The hairy male goat stands for the king of Greece; and the great horn that was between its eyes stands for the first king. ²² As for the horn that was broken, so that four stood up instead

of it, there are four kingdoms from his nation that will stand up, but not with his power.

²³ "And in the final part of their kingdom, as the transgressors act to a completion, a fierce-looking king who understands ambiguous sayings will stand up.
²⁴ His power will become great, but not through his own power. He will bring ruin in an extraordinary way, and he will be successful and act effectively. He will bring mighty ones to ruin, also the people made up of the holy ones. ²⁵ And by his cunning he will use deception to succeed; and in his heart he will exalt himself; and during a time of security he will bring many to ruin. He will even stand up against the Prince of princes, but he will be broken without human hand.

²⁶ "What was said in the vision about the evenings and the mornings is true, but you must keep the vision secret, for it refers to a time many days from now."

²⁷ As for me, Daniel, I felt exhausted and I was sick for some days. Then I got up and carried out the king's work; but I was numbed by what I had seen, and no one could understand it.

9 In the first year of Da·ri'us the son of A-has·u-e'rus—a descendant of the Medes who had been made king over the kingdom of the Chal-de'ans—² in the first year of his reign I, Daniel, discerned by the

books the number of years mentioned in the word of Jehovah to Jeremiah the prophet to fulfill the desolation of Jerusalem, namely, 70 years. ³ So I turned my face to Jehovah the true God, entreating him in prayer, along with fasting and sackcloth and ashes. ⁴ I prayed to Jehovah my God and made confession and said:

"O Jehovah the true God, the great and awe-inspiring One, who keeps his covenant and shows loyal love to those who love him and keep his commandments, ⁵ we have sinned and done wrong and acted wickedly and rebelled; and we have deviated from your commandments and your judgments. ⁶ We have not listened to your servants the prophets, who spoke in your name to our kings, our princes, our forefathers, and all the people of the land. ⁷ To you, O Jehovah, belongs righteousness, but to us belongs shame as is the case today, to the men of Judah, the inhabitants of Jerusalem, and all Israel, those nearby and far away, in all the lands to which you dispersed them because they acted unfaithfully toward you.

⁸ "O Jehovah, to us belongs shame, to our kings, our princes, and our forefathers, because we have sinned against you. ⁹ To Jehovah our God belong mercy and forgiveness, for we have rebelled against him. ¹⁰ We have not obeyed the voice of Jehovah our God by following his laws that he set before us through his

servants the prophets. ¹¹ All Israel has overstepped your Law and turned away by not obeying your voice, so that you poured out on us the curse and the sworn oath written about in the Law of Moses the servant of the true God, for we have sinned against Him. ¹² He has carried out his words that he spoke against us and against our rulers who ruled over us, by bringing great calamity on us; nothing has ever been done under the whole heavens such as what was done in Jerusalem. ¹³ Just as it is written in the Law of Moses, all this

Just as it is written in the Law of Moses, all this calamity has come upon us, yet we have not begged for the favor of Jehovah our God by turning away from our error and by showing insight into your truth.

¹⁴ "So Jehovah kept watchful and brought calamity on us, for Jehovah our God is righteous in all the works that he has done; yet we have not obeyed his voice.

¹⁵ "Now, O Jehovah our God, the One who brought your people out of the land of Egypt by a mighty hand and made a name for yourself down to this day, we have sinned and acted wickedly. ¹⁶ O Jehovah, according to all your righteous acts, please, may your anger and wrath turn away from your city Jerusalem, your holy mountain; for because of our sins and the errors of our forefathers, Jerusalem and your people are an object of reproach to all those around us. ¹⁷ And now listen, O our God, to the prayer of your servant

and to his entreaties, and cause your face to shine upon your sanctuary that is desolate, for your own sake, O Jehovah. ¹⁸ Incline your ear, O my God, and hear! Do open your eyes and see our desolate condition and the city that has been called by your name; for we are not entreating you because of our righteous acts but because of your great mercy. ¹⁹ O Jehovah, do hear. O Jehovah, do forgive. O Jehovah, do pay attention and act! Do not delay, for your own sake, O my God, for your own name has been called upon your city and upon your people."

²⁰ While I was still speaking and praying and confessing my sin and the sin of my people Israel and making my request for favor before Jehovah my God concerning the holy mountain of my God, ²¹ yes, while I was yet speaking in prayer, the man Ga'bri-el, whom I had previously seen in the vision, came to me when I was extremely weary at about the time of the evening gift offering. ²² And he gave me understanding, saying:

"O Daniel, now I have come to give you insight and understanding. ²³ When you began your entreaty the word went out, and I have come to report it to you, because you are someone very precious. So consider the matter and understand the vision.

²⁴ "There are 70 weeks that have been determined for your people and your holy city, in order to terminate

the transgression, to finish off sin, to make atonement for error, to bring in everlasting righteousness, to seal up the vision and the prophecy, and to anoint the Holy of Holies. ²⁵ You should know and understand that from the issuing of the word to restore and to rebuild Jerusalem until Mes-si'ah the Leader, there will be 7 weeks, also 62 weeks. She will be restored and rebuilt, with a public square and moat, but in times of distress.

²⁶ "And after the 62 weeks, Mes-si'ah will be cut off, with nothing for himself.

"And the people of a leader who is coming will destroy the city and the holy place. And its end will be by the flood. And until the end there will be war; what is decided upon is desolations.

²⁷ "And he will keep the covenant in force for the many for one week; and at the half of the week, he will cause sacrifice and gift offering to cease.

"And on the wing of disgusting things there will be the one causing desolation; and until an extermination, what was decided on will be poured out also on the one lying desolate."

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

Treasures From God's Word

Daniel 9:24—The Messiah's sacrifice opened the way for forgiveness of sins

Reference: it-2 902 paragraph 2.

Transgression and sin terminated. Jesus' being cut off in death, his resurrection, and his appearance in heaven resulted in 'terminating transgression and finishing off sin as well as in making atonement for error.' (Daniel 9:24) The Law covenant had exposed the Jews as sinners, condemned them as such, and brought upon them the curse as covenant breakers. But where sin "abounded" as exposed or made evident by the Mosaic Law, God's mercy and favor abounded much more through his Messiah. (Romans 5:20) By Messiah's sacrifice, transgression and sin of the repentant sinners can be canceled and the penalty thereof be lifted.

Daniel 9:25—The Messiah arrived at the end of the 69th week of years

Reference: it-2 900 paragraph 7.

Messiah's Arrival After 'Sixty-Nine Weeks.' As to the following "sixty-two weeks" (Daniel 9:25), these, being part of the 70 and named second in order, would

continue from the conclusion of the "seven weeks." Therefore, the time "from the going forth of the word" to rebuild Jerusalem until "Messiah the Leader" would be 7 plus 62 "weeks," or 69 "weeks"—483 years—from the year 455 B.C.E. to 29 C.E. As mentioned above, in the autumn of that year, 29 C.E., Jesus was baptized in water, was anointed with holy spirit, and began his ministry as "Messiah the Leader."—Luke 3:1, 2, 21, 22.

Daniel 9:26, 27a—The Messiah was put to death in the middle of the 70th week of years

Reference: it-2 901 paragraph 2.

"Cut off" at the half of the week. Gabriel further said to Daniel: "After the sixty-two weeks Messiah will be cut off, with nothing for himself." (Daniel 9:26) It was sometime after the end of the 'seven plus sixty-two weeks,' actually about three and a half years afterward, that Christ was cut off in death on a torture stake, giving up all that he had, as a ransom for mankind. (Isaiah 53:8) Evidence indicates that the first half of the "week" was spent by Jesus in the ministry. On one occasion, likely in the fall of 32 C.E., he gave an illustration, apparently speaking of the Jewish nation as a fig tree (compare Matthew 17:15-20; 21:18, 19, 43) that had borne no fruit for "three years." The vinedresser said to the owner of the vineyard: "Master,

let it alone also this year, until I dig around it and put on manure; and if then it produces fruit in the future, well and good; but if not, you shall cut it down." (Luke 13:6-9) He may have referred here to the time period of his own ministry to that unresponsive nation, which ministry had continued at that point for about three years and was to continue into a fourth year.

Reference: it-2 901 paragraph 5.

"The half of the week" would be at the middle of seven years, or after three and a half years within that "week" of years. Since the 70th "week" began about the *fall* of 29 C.E. at Jesus' baptism and anointing to be Christ, half of that week (three and a half years) would extend to the spring of 33 C.E., or Passover time (Nisan 14) of that year. This day appears to have been April 1, 33 C.E., according to the Gregorian calendar. (See LORD'S EVENING MEAL [Time of Its Institution].) The apostle Paul tells us that Jesus 'came to do the will of God,' which was to 'do away with what is first [the sacrifices and offerings according to the Law] that he may establish what is second.' This he did by offering as a sacrifice his own body.—Hebrews 10:1-10.

Digging for Spiritual Gems

Daniel 9:24—When was "the Holy of Holies" anointed?

Questions From Readers

When was "the Holy of Holies" anointed, as foretold at Daniel 9:24?

Daniel 9:24-27 is a prophecy concerning the appearance of "Messiah the Leader"—the Christ. The foretold anointing of "the Holy of Holies," then, does not refer to the anointing of the Most Holy compartment of the temple in Jerusalem. Rather, the expression "Holy of Holies" refers to the heavenly sanctuary of God—the heavenly Most Holy—in the great spiritual temple of Jehovah.—Hebrews 8:1-5; 9:2-10, 23.

When did God's spiritual temple begin to operate? Well, consider what took place when Jesus presented himself for baptism in 29 C.E. From that point on in his life, Jesus fulfilled the words of Psalm 40:6-8. The apostle Paul later indicated that Jesus had prayed to God: "Sacrifice and offering you did not want, but you prepared a body for me." (Hebrews 10:5) Jesus knew that God "did not want" animal sacrifices to continue to be offered at Jerusalem's temple. Instead, Jehovah had prepared a perfect human body for Jesus to offer

as a sacrifice. Expressing his heartfelt desire, Jesus continued: "Look! I am come (in the roll of the book it is written about me) to do your will, O God." (Hebrews 10:7) And what was Jehovah's response? The Gospel of Matthew states: "After being baptized Jesus immediately came up from the water; and, look! the heavens were opened up, and he saw descending like a dove God's spirit coming upon him. Look! Also, there was a voice from the heavens that said: 'This is my Son, the beloved, whom I have approved."—Matthew 3:16, 17.

Jehovah God's acceptance of the presentation of Jesus' body for sacrifice meant that an altar greater than the literal altar in Jerusalem's temple had come into existence. This was an altar of God's "will," or arrangement for accepting Jesus' human life as a sacrifice. (Hebrews 10:10) The anointing of Jesus with holy spirit meant that God had now brought forth his entire spiritual temple arrangement. Hence, at the time of Jesus' baptism, God's heavenly abode was anointed, or set apart, as "the Holy of Holies" in the great spiritual temple arrangement.

Daniel 9:27—What covenant was kept in force for the many until the end of the 70th week of years, or 36 C.E.?

Reference: w07 9/1 20 paragraph 4.

The Law covenant was removed in 33 C.E. when Jesus was impaled. But by keeping the Abrahamic covenant in force toward fleshly Israel until 36 C.E., Jehovah extended the period of special favor to the Jews on the basis of their being descendants of Abraham. The Abrahamic covenant continues in force with regard to "the Israel of God."—Galatians 3:7-9, 14-18, 29; 6:16.

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



19 Building Work That Honors Jehovah

FOCUS OF CHAPTER

Worldwide construction work serves Kingdom interests

JEHOVAH'S loyal servants have long enjoyed constructing buildings that bring praise to his name. The Israelites, for example, enthusiastically participated in the building of the tabernacle and generously provided materials for it.—Ex. 35:30-35; 36:1, 4-7.

² Jehovah does not view the building materials themselves as the primary things that bring him honor, nor are they the things that he values most. (Matt. 23:16, 17) What Jehovah treasures, the gift that brings him honor above all else, is the worship rendered him by his servants, including their willing spirit and zealous work. (Ex. 35:21; Mark 12:41-44; 1 Tim. 6:17-19) That fact is significant. Why? Because buildings come and go. For instance, the tab-

ernacle and the temple no longer exist. Those structures may be gone, but Jehovah has not forgotten the generosity and labor of his loyal servants who supported their construction.—Read 1 Corinthians 15:58; Hebrews 6:10.

³ Jehovah's modern-day servants have also worked hard to construct places of worship. And what we have accomplished under the direction of our King Jesus Christ is truly remarkable! Clearly, Jehovah has blessed our efforts. (Ps. 127:1) In this chapter, we will review just some of the work that has been done and how it has brought honor to Jehovah. We will also hear from some who have been involved in accomplishing the work.

Building Kingdom Halls

⁴ As discussed in Chapter 16, Jehovah requires that we meet for worship. (Heb. 10:25) Our meetings not only strengthen our faith but also heighten our enthusiasm for the preaching work. As the last days progress, Jehovah continues to speed up that work.

THE NEW LIGHT CHURCH

IN THE late 1880's, many members of a Baptist congregation in the area of Mount Lookout, West Virginia, became Bible Students. For a while they continued to share the Baptist church with the Baptists. Apparently, whichever group got to the building first used it. By 1890, however, our brothers had stopped meeting in the Baptist church and had constructed their own hall.

This hall appears to be one of the first places of worship built by Jehovah's modern-day people. It became known as the New Light church because the truths that the Bible Students taught were viewed as new light on the Scriptures. The hall was used until the 1920's. Brother A. H. Macmillan and other traveling speakers known as pilgrims gave talks at the hall, and it was used to show the "Photo-Drama of Creation."

In response, hundreds of thousands flock to his organization each year. (Isa. 60:22) With the greater number of Kingdom subjects comes a greater need for printing facilities to produce Bible-based literature. We also need more places of worship.

the Bible Students began to see the need for their own meeting places. It appears that one of the first places of worship constructed was in West Virginia, U.S.A., in 1890. By the 1930's, Jehovah's people had built or renovated a number of halls, but those meeting places had not yet been given a distinctive name. In 1935, though, Brother Rutherford visited Hawaii, where a hall was being constructed in conjunction with a new branch office. When asked what this building should be called, Brother Rutherford replied: "Don't you think we should call it 'Kingdom Hall,' since that is what we are doing, preaching the good news of the Kingdom?" (Matt. 24:14) That appropriate name would soon be given not only to that particular hall but to most of the meeting places used by congregations of Jehovah's people worldwide.

⁶ By the 1970's, the need for Kingdom Halls was rapidly increasing. In response, brothers in the United States developed an efficient method of building attractive, functional structures in just a few days.

BRANCH CONSTRUCTION—ADJUSTING TO CHANGING NEEDS

AS THE Kingdom-preaching work began to expand worldwide, branch offices were set up in one country after another. The first one was established in Britain in 1900; the second, in Germany in 1903; and the third, in Australia in 1904. The demand for literature also grew rapidly, requiring that printing facilities be constructed. One of the first was an eight-story structure in Brooklyn, New York, that was built in 1927. By 2013, Bibles, books, or magazines were being printed by 15 branches.

From the mid-1970's to the early 1990's, new branch facilities were built in some 60 lands. In a further 30 locations, branch offices were expanded. In recent years, however, a number of branch offices have been consolidated. Explaining some of the reasons, the 2013 Yearbook of Jehovah's Witnesses said: "Improvements in communications and printing technology have reduced the number of personnel needed at larger branches. With fewer people serving at larger branches, room became available to house some who were working in smaller branches in other countries. Now, from key locations, a pool of experienced Witnesses [care] for the work of Bible education."

By 1983, some 200 of such Kingdom Halls had been erected in the United States and Canada. To accomplish the work, brothers began forming regional building committees. This method worked so well that in 1986, the Governing Body formalized the arrangement, and by 1987, there were 60 Regional Building Committees (RBCs) in the United States.*[1] By 1992, RBCs had also been appointed in Argentina, Australia, France, Germany, Japan, Mexico, South Africa, and Spain. To be sure, the hardworking brothers who build Kingdom Halls and Assembly Halls deserve our support, for the work they are doing is part of sacred service.

⁷ These quickly built Kingdom Halls provided a wonderful witness to the communities in which they were constructed. A newspaper in Spain, for example, carried the headline "Faith Moves Mountains." Commenting on the construction of such a Kingdom Hall in the town of Martos, the paper asked: "How

^{*[1]} In 2013, more than 230,000 volunteers were approved to work with the 132 RBCs in the United States. In that country, annually those committees coordinated the construction of about 75 new Kingdom Halls and helped with the renovation or repair of about 900 halls.

is it possible that in this present world based on selfishness, volunteers from various regions [of Spain] unselfishly travel to Martos in order to erect a building that has broken all records for speed, perfection, and organization?" The article answered the question by quoting the words of one of the Witness volunteers: "The merit simply lies in the fact that we are a people taught by Jehovah."

Building in Lands With Limited Resources

8 As the 20th century drew to a close, people streamed into Jehovah's organization in lands where the brothers have limited resources. The local congregations did what they could to build meeting places. But in some countries, they had to endure ridicule and prejudice because the local Kingdom Halls were very primitive when compared with other places of worship. Starting in 1999, however, the Governing Body approved a program to accelerate the construction of Kingdom Halls in developing lands. Funds from more prosperous lands were made available so that an "equalizing" could take place.



"The Peace of God . . . Surpasses All Understanding"

"The peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts."—PHIL. 4:7.

IT IS about midnight. Two missionaries, Paul and Silas, are in prison—the innermost part of the prison—in the city of Philippi. Their feet are fastened securely

^{1, 2.} What events in Philippi led to the imprisonment of Paul and Silas? (See opening picture.)

in stocks, and their backs are still aching from the beatings they had just received. (Acts 16:23, 24) How quickly things had happened! Without any warning, they had been dragged by a mob to the marketplace to stand before a hastily convened court. Their clothes were torn off them, and they were severely beaten with rods. (Acts 16:16-22) The injustice of it all! Paul, a Roman citizen, deserved a proper trial.*

² As Paul sits in the darkness, he contemplates the events of the day. He thinks about the people of Philippi. They do not even have a Jewish synagogue in their city, unlike so many other cities that Paul has visited. In fact, the Jewish worshippers need to gather outside the city gates beside a river. (Acts 16:13, 14) Is this because there are not even ten Jewish males in the city, the number required to form a synagogue? The people of Philippi are obviously very proud of their Roman citizenship, even if it is only a partial or secondary form of citizenship. (Acts 16:21) Could this be why they do not even think it possible that these Jews, Paul and Silas, could be Roman citizens? Whatever the case, here they are, unjustly thrown into prison.

^{*} Apparently, Silas too was a Roman citizen.—Acts 16:37.

³ Perhaps Paul is also thinking about the events of the past few months. He was on the other side of the Aegean Sea, in Asia Minor. While Paul was there, the holy spirit repeatedly stopped him from preaching in certain areas. It was as if the holy spirit were pushing him to go somewhere else. (Acts 16: 6, 7) But where? The answer came in a vision while he was in Troas. Paul was told: "Step over into Macedonia." With such a clear indication of Jehovah's will, Paul immediately accepted the invitation. (Read Acts 16:8-10.) But what happened next? Soon after he arrived in Macedonia. he ended up in prison! Why did Jehovah allow this to happen to Paul? How long would he be stuck in prison? Even if these questions weighed heavily on Paul's mind, he did not let them erode his faith and joy. Both he and Silas started "praying and praising God with song." (Acts 16:25) Their hearts and minds were soothed by the peace of God.

⁴ Perhaps there have been times in your life when you felt that you, like Paul, were following the leadings of God's holy spirit, but then things did not

turn out the way you expected. You came face-toface with challenges, or you found yourself in new circumstances that required massive changes in your life. (Eccl. 9:11) As you look back, maybe you are left wondering why Jehovah allowed certain things to happen. If so, what can help you to continue to endure with full confidence in Jehovah? To find the answer, let us return to the account of Paul and Silas.

⁵ As Paul and Silas sing songs of praise, a series of totally unexpected events occurs. Suddenly, there is a violent earthquake. The doors of the prison are thrown wide open. All the prisoners' bonds are loosened. Paul stops the jailer from committing suicide. The jailer and his entire family get baptized. As the new day starts, the city magistrates send constables to release Paul and Silas. The officials ask them to leave the city peacefully. Then, on realizing that Paul and Silas are Roman citizens, the magistrates see that they have made a huge blunder, so they themselves come to escort the two men out. But Paul and Silas insist on first saying good-bye to their newly baptized sister Lydia. Additionally, they use the opportunity to strengthen the brothers. (Acts 16:26-40) How quickly everything changed!

IT "SURPASSES ALL UNDERSTANDING"

⁶ What do we learn from these events? Jehovah can do the unexpected, so we need not be anxious in the face of trials. That lesson no doubt made a deep impression on Paul, as evidenced by what he later wrote to the brothers in Philippi about anxiety and the peace of God. Let us first discuss Paul's words recorded at Philippians 4:6, 7. (Read.) Then, we will review some additional Scriptural examples of how Jehovah did the unexpected. Finally, we will consider how "the peace of God" can help us to endure with full confidence in Jehovah.

⁷ No doubt when the brothers in Philippi read Paul's letter to them, they remembered what had happened to him and how none of them had expected Jehovah to take action in the way that he did. What lesson was Paul teaching them? Basically: Do not worry. Pray, and then you will receive the peace of God. But notice that "the peace of God . . . surpasses all understanding." What does that mean? Some translators render this expression "surpasses all our dreams" or "excels all human planning." Paul was, in effect, saying that "the

peace of God" is more wonderful than can be imagined. So although from a human viewpoint we may not see a way out of our problems, Jehovah does, and he can do the unexpected.—Read 2 Peter 2:9.

⁸ As the brothers in Philippi thought over what had happened in the ten years since those events, they would have been strengthened. What Paul wrote was true. Although Jehovah had allowed an injustice to occur, this ultimately resulted in "the defending and legally establishing of the good news." (Phil. 1:7) Those city magistrates would think twice before doing anything against the newly formed Christian congregation in their city. Perhaps because of Paul's actions, his traveling companion Luke, the physician, was able to remain in Philippi after Paul and Silas left. Luke could thus give extra help to the new Christians in that city.

⁹ Indeed, when those brothers in Philippi read Paul's letter, they knew that these were not the words of an academic who was sitting somewhere in an office. Paul had experienced extreme difficulties; yet, he demonstrated that he had "the peace of God." In fact, when Paul wrote to those brothers,

he was under house arrest in Rome. But he was still showing that "the peace of God" was with him. -Phil. 1:12-14; 4:7, 11, 22.

"DO NOT BE ANXIOUS OVER ANYTHING"

What can help us not to be anxious over anything and to experience "the peace of God"? Paul's words to the Philippians show us that the antidote to worry is prayer. So when we are anxious, we need to turn our worries into prayers. (Read 1 Peter 5: 6, 7.) Pray to Jehovah in full faith, knowing that he cares for you. Pray to him "with thanksgiving," remembering your blessings. Our confidence in him will be strengthened when we keep in mind that he can "do more than superabundantly beyond all the things we ask or conceive."—Eph. 3:20.

¹¹ As in the case of Paul and Silas in Philippi, we may be surprised by what Jehovah does for us personally. It may not be spectacular, but it will always be what we need. (1 Cor. 10:13) Of course, this does not mean that we sit back and do nothing, simply waiting for Jehovah to correct the situation or solve the problem. We need to act in harmony with our prayers. (Rom. 12:11) Our actions thereby

prove our sincerity and give Jehovah something to bless. But at the same time, we need to realize that Jehovah is not limited by our requests, plans, and expectations. Sometimes he surprises us by doing the unexpected. Let us consider some Bible accounts that reinforce our confidence in Jehovah's ability to do the unexpected in our behalf.

EXAMPLES OF JEHOVAH DOING THE UNEXPECTED

12 As we search the Scriptures, time and again we find examples of Jehovah doing the unexpected. King Hezekiah lived at a time when King Sennacherib of Assyria invaded Judah and captured all the fortified cities, with the exception of Jerusalem. (2 Ki. 18:1-3, 13) Then, Sennacherib turned his attention to Jerusalem. What did King Hezekiah do when faced with this imminent threat? He approached Jehovah in prayer and turned to Jehovah's prophet Isaiah for advice. (2 Ki. 19:5, 15-20) Hezekiah also tried to show his reasonableness by paying the fine that Sennacherib imposed on him. (2 Ki. 18:14, 15) In time, Hezekiah made prepara-

tions for a long siege. (2 Chron. 32:2-4) But how was the situation resolved? Jehovah sent an angel to destroy 185,000 of Sennacherib's soldiers in one night. Truly, not even Hezekiah expected that to happen!—2 Ki. 19:35.

¹³ Consider the young man Joseph, a son of Jacob. While in a prison hole in Egypt, did Joseph have any idea that he would be appointed to

the second-highest position in the land or that he would be used by Jehovah to save his family from starvation? (Gen. 40:15, ftn.; 41:39-43; 50: 20) No doubt Jehovah's actions exceeded all of Joseph's expectations. Think, too, about Joseph's great-grandmother Sarah. Did aged Sarah expect that Jehovah would allow her to give birth to her own son, not just receive as son the child produced by her servant girl? The birth of Isaac certainly exceeded all that Sarah could ever have imagined. —Gen. 21:1-3, 6, 7.

14 Granted, we do not expect that Jehovah will miraculously take away all our problems before the promised new world; nor do we demand that spectacular things occur in our lives. But we do know that the God who helped his servants in amazing ways is our God, Jehovah. (Read Isaiah 43:10-13.) This confidence helps us to have faith in him. We know that he can do whatever is needed to empower us to accomplish his will fully. (2 Cor. 4:7-9) What lessons do we learn from these Bible accounts? As the examples of Hezekiah, Joseph, and Sarah show, Jehovah can help us to conquer the seemingly unconquerable if we remain faithful to Him.

^{14.} What confidence can we have in Jehovah?

¹⁵ How can we face challenges and still retain "the peace of God"? It is by maintaining a good relationship with our God, Jehovah. Such a relationship is possible only "by means of Christ Jesus," who offered his life as a ransom sacrifice. The provision of that ransom is yet another one of the amazing works of our Father. Jehovah uses the ransom to cover our sins, enabling us to have a clean conscience and draw close to him.—John 14:6; Jas. 4:8; 1 Pet. 3:21.

IT WILL GUARD OUR HEARTS AND MENTAL POWERS

¹⁶ What results when we receive this "peace of God that surpasses all understanding"? The Scriptures answer by saying that it 'will guard our hearts and our mental powers by means of Christ Jesus.' (Phil. 4:7) The original-language word for "guard" was a military expression. It referred to a garrison of troops that was assigned to guard a fortified city in ancient times. Philippi was such a city. The inhabitants of Philippi slept soundly at night, knowing that soldiers were guarding the gates of their city.

^{15.} What will help us to retain "the peace of God," and how is this possible?

^{16.} What will result when we attain "the peace of God"? Illustrate.

In a similar manner, when we have "the peace of God," our hearts and minds remain at rest. We know that Jehovah cares for us and wants us to succeed. (1 Pet. 5:10) That knowledge guards us from becoming overwhelmed by anxiety or discouragement.

¹⁷ Soon mankind will face the greatest tribulation that will ever occur here on earth. (Matt. 24:21, 22) We do not know all the details of what that will mean for us individually. However, there is no need for us to be consumed by anxiety. Even though we do not know everything Jehovah will *do*, we do know *our God*. We have seen from his past dealings that no matter what happens, Jehovah will always accomplish his purpose, and sometimes he does it in an unexpected manner. Each time Jehovah does so for us, we may experience in a new way "the peace of God that surpasses all understanding."
