



Treasures From God's Word

Hosea 14:2—Jehovah highly values "the praise of our lips"

Reference: w07 4/1 20 paragraph 2.

Furthermore, the Bible indicates that our expressions of praise can be viewed as sacrifices offered to Jehovah. The prophet Hosea used the phrase "the young bulls of our lips," showing that God considers the praise of our lips to be one of the finest sacrifices. (Hosea 14:2) The apostle Paul urged the Hebrew Christians: "Offer to God a sacrifice of praise, that is, the fruit of lips which make public declaration to his name." (Hebrews 13:15) Today, Jehovah's Witnesses stay very busy preaching the good news and making disciples of people of all nations. (Matthew 24:14; 28:19, 20) They are offering sacrifices of praise to God day and night around the earth.— Revelation 7:15.

Hosea 14:4—Jehovah grants forgiveness, approval, and friendship to those offering their best to him

Reference: w11 2/15 16 paragraph 15.

A bull was the costliest animal that an Israelite could offer to Jehovah. Hence, "the young bulls of our lips" referred to sincere, well-thought-out words spoken in praise of the true God. How did Jehovah respond to those making such sacrifices? He said: "I shall love them of my own free will." (Hosea 14:4) To those offering such sacrifices of praise, Jehovah granted his forgiveness, approval, and friendship.

Hosea 14:9—Walking in Jehovah's ways is good for us

Reference: jd 87 paragraph 11.

Hosea 14:9 also turns our attention to the positive aspects of observing an upright course. Blessings and benefits come from measuring up to God's requirements. As the Creator, he knows our makeup. What he expects of us is for our good. To illustrate the relationship between us and God, we might think of an automobile and its manufacturer. The maker knows how the auto is designed and put together. He knows that the car requires an oil change every so often. What would happen if you ignored that standard, perhaps reasoning that the car is running well? Much sooner than might otherwise be so, the engine would deteriorate and fail. The same is true of humans. Our Creator has given us commandments. Keeping them is for our benefit. (Isaiah 48:17, 18) Appreciating that we do benefit gives us additional reason to live up to his standards, to keep his commandments.—Psalm 112:1.

If we worship Jehovah in an unhypocritical and upright way, we will be recipients of his lovingkindness, or loyal love. The wayward Israelites were told: "Sow seed for yourselves in righteousness; reap in accord with loving-kindness. Till for yourselves arable land, when there is time for searching for Jehovah until he comes and gives instruction in righteousness to you."— Hosea 10:12.

Like the Israelites, the Messiah would be called out of Egypt. (Hosea 11:1) Before Herod's death-dealing decree, an angel directed that Joseph, Mary, and Jesus go to Egypt. There they remained "until the decease of Herod, for that to be fulfilled which was spoken by Jehovah through his prophet [Hosea], saying: 'Out of Egypt I called my son.'" (Matthew 2:13-15) Of course, Jesus himself could not have orchestrated any of the foretold events associated with his birth and early life.

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

CAN WE REALLY BELIEVE WHAT THE BIBLE SAYS?

Yes, for at least three reasons:

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EASTER—FERTILITY WORSHIP IN DISGUISE

¹³ Promoted as a celebration of Christ's resurrection, Easter is actually rooted in false religion. The name Easter itself has been linked to Eostre, or Ostara, the Anglo-Saxon goddess of the dawn and of spring. And how did eggs and rabbits come to be associated with Easter? Eggs "have been prominent as symbols of new life and resurrection," says the *Encyclopædia Britannica*, while the hare and the rabbit have long served as symbols of fertility. Easter, therefore, is really a fertility rite thinly disguised as a celebration of Christ's resurrection.*

¹⁴ Would Jehovah condone the use of a filthy fertility rite to commemorate his Son's resurrection? Never! (2 Corinthians 6:17, 18) In fact, the Scriptures neither command nor authorize the commemorating of Jesus' resurrection in the first place. To do so in the name of Easter, therefore, is to be doubly disloyal.

HALLOWEEN IS FAR FROM HOLY

¹⁵ Known for its witches, goblins, and other grotesque decorations and paraphernalia, Halloween—also called All Hallows' Eve or the eve of All Saints' Day—can be traced back to the ancient Celts of Britain and Ireland. On the full moon nearest November 1, they celebrated the festival of Samhain, meaning "Summer's End." They

^{*} Easter has also been linked to the worship of the Phoenician fertility goddess, Astarte, who had as her symbols the egg and the hare. Statues of Astarte have variously depicted her as having exaggerated sex organs or with a rabbit beside her and an egg in her hand.

^{13, 14.} What are the roots of popular Easter customs?

^{15.} What is the origin of Halloween, and what may be significant about the date chosen to celebrate this holiday?

believed that during Samhain, the veil between the human and the supernatural worlds was parted and that spirits, both good and evil, roamed the earth. The souls of the dead were thought to return to their homes, and families would put out food and drink for their ghostly visitors in hopes of appeasing them. Thus, when children today, dressed as ghosts or witches, go from house to house threatening a mischievous trick unless they receive a treat, they unwittingly perpetuate the rituals of Samhain.

KEEP YOUR WEDDING UNDEFILED

¹⁶ Soon, "no voice of a bridegroom and of a bride will ever be heard in [Babylon the Great] again." (Revelation 18:23) Why? In part because of her spiritistic practices, which can defile a marriage right from the wedding day. —Mark 10:6-9.

¹⁷ Customs vary from country to country. Some customs that may appear innocent may have their roots in Babylonish practices that are supposed to bring 'good luck' to the bridal couple or their guests. (Isaiah 65:11) One such tradition involves the throwing of rice or its substitutes. This practice may have had its roots in the notion that food appeased evil spirits and kept them from doing injury to the bride and groom. Additionally, rice has a long mystical association with fertility, happiness, and longevity. Clearly, all who want to remain in God's love will shun such tainted customs.—2 Corinthians 6:14-18.



that is, our preaching and teaching work. (2 Cor. 5:18-20; 1 Tim. 2:3-6) The other part involves a ministry that we perform in behalf of fellow believers. Specifically, Paul referred to a "relief ministry." (2 Cor. 8:4) As to the expressions "*ministry* of the reconciliation" and "relief *ministry*," in both instances the word "ministry" is a translation of a form of the Greek word *di*·*a*·*ko*·*ni*′*a*. Why is that significant?

⁵ By using the same Greek word for both activities, Paul grouped relief work with other forms of ministry that were carried out in the Christian congregation. He had stated earlier: "There are different ministries, and yet there is the *same* Lord; and there are different activities, . . . But [they] are performed by the very *same* spirit." (1 Cor. 12:4-6, 11) In fact, Paul linked the various congregational ministries with "sacred service."^[2] (Rom. 12:1, 6-8) No wonder he felt that it was appropriate to give part of his time "to minister to the holy ones"!—Rom. 15:25, 26.

⁶ Paul helped the Corinthians to see why relief work was part of their ministry and worship to Jehovah. Note his reasoning: Christians who provide relief do so because they are "submissive to the good news about the Christ." (2 Cor. 9: 13) Hence, moved by their desire to put Christ's teachings into practice, Christians help fellow believers. The kind acts that they perform in behalf of their brothers, stated Paul, are nothing less than expressions of "the surpassing undeserved kindness of God." (2 Cor. 9:14; 1 Pet. 4:10) Thus, in commenting on serving our brothers in need, which includes relief work, *The Watchtower* of December 1, 1975, rightly stated: "We should never doubt that Jehovah God and his Son Jesus Christ give real importance to this kind of service." Yes, relief work is a valuable form of sacred service.—Rom. 12:1, 7; 2 Cor. 8:7; Heb. 13:16.

Relief Work With Clear Objectives

⁷ What are the objectives of our relief ministry? Paul addressed that question in his second letter to the Corinthians. (**Read 2 Corinthians 9:11-15.)** In these verses, Paul highlights three main objectives, or goals, that we attain by sharing in "the ministry of this public service," that is, relief work. Let us consider them one at a time.

⁸ First, our relief ministry brings glory to Jehovah. Note how often in the five verses cited above Paul directs his brothers' attention to Jehovah God. The apostle reminds them of "an expression of thanks to God" and of "many expressions of thanks to God." (Verses 11, 12) He

^[2] Paul used the plural form of *di*·*d*/*ko*. *nos* (minister) to describe "ministerial servants."—1 Tim.3:12.

mentions how relief efforts cause Christians to "glorify God" and to praise "the surpassing undeserved kindness of God." (Verses 13, 14) And Paul concludes his consideration about the relief ministry by declaring: "Thanks be to God."—Verse 15; 1 Pet. 4:11.

⁹ Like Paul, God's servants today view relief efforts as opportunities to bring glory to Jehovah and to adorn his teachings. (1 Cor. 10:31; Titus 2:10) In fact, relief work often plays a considerable part in removing negative notions that some people have about Jehovah and his Witnesses. To illustrate: A woman living in an area struck by a hurricane had a sign on her door that read: "Jehovah's Witnesses—Do Not Call." Then one day she saw relief workers restoring a damaged house across the street from her home. For days, she observed the friendly workers, and then she went over to find out who they were. On learning that the volunteers were Jehovah's Witnesses, she was impressed and said, "I have misjudged you people." The result? She took down the sign on her door.

¹⁰ Second, we "provide well for the needs" of fellow believers. (2 Cor. 9:12a) We are eager to meet the immediate needs and to help alleviate the suffering of our brothers and sisters. Why? Because the members of the Christian congregation form "one body," and "if one member suffers, all the other members suffer with it." (1 Cor. 12:20, 26) Hence, brotherly affection and compassion move numerous brothers and sisters today to drop what they are doing at a moment's notice, gather their tools, and head for disaster-stricken areas to bring relief to fellow believers. (Jas. 2:15, 16) For instance, after a tsunami struck Japan in 2011, the United States branch office sent a letter to Regional Building Committees in the United States, asking if "a few qualified brothers" would be available to help with rebuilding Kingdom Halls there. What was the response? Within weeks, nearly 600 volunteers applied to help-and agreed to fly to Japan at their own expense! "We have been overwhelmed with the response," noted the United States branch office. When a brother in Japan asked a relief worker from abroad why he had come to help, he was told: "Our brothers in Japan are part of 'our body.' We feel their pain and suffering." Moved by self-sacrificing love, relief workers have at times even risked their lives to help fellow believers.^[3]—1 John 3:16.

¹¹ Non-Witnesses also express appreciation for our relief work. For instance, after a disaster struck the state of Ar-

^[3] See the article "Aiding Our Family of Believers in Bosnia," in the November 1, 1994, issue of *The Watchtower*, pages 23-27.

kansas, U.S.A., in 2013, a newspaper reported on the rapid response of Witness volunteers, stating: "The organizational structure of the Jehovah's Witnesses has developed the disaster response volunteer service to a fine art." Indeed, as the apostle Paul noted, we "provide *well*" for our brothers in need.

¹² Third, we help afflicted ones get back into their spiritual routine. Why is this important? Paul states that those receiving relief aid will be moved to make "many expressions of thanks to God." (2 Cor. 9:12b) What better way could there be for afflicted ones to express their thanks to Jehovah than by getting back to their spiritual routine as quickly as possible? (Phil. 1:10) *The Watchtower* stated in 1945: "Paul approved . . . the collecting of the contributions because it was helping . . . needy Christian brethren to enjoy some material relief and to thus be able to engage more freely and energetically in Jehovah's witness-work." Our objective is the same today. By getting back in the preaching work, our brothers strengthen not only their distressed neighbors but also themselves.—**Read 2 Corinthians 1:3, 4.**

¹³ Consider some comments from those who were recipients of much-needed relief aid, resumed sharing in the ministry, and were strengthened by doing so. "It was a blessing for our family to go in field service," noted a brother. "It gave us a brief respite from anxiety over our own affairs as we tried to comfort others." A sister said: "Focusing on spiritual activity took my mind off the destruction around me. It gave me a sense of security." Another sister observed: "While many things were beyond our control, the ministry provided direction for my family. Talking with others about our hope of the new world strengthened our confidence that all things will be made new."

¹⁴ Attending meetings is another spiritual activity that our afflicted fellow believers need to resume as quickly as possible. Consider what happened to Kiyoko, a sister then in her late 50's. After she lost everything in a tsunami except the clothes and sandals she was wearing, she was at a loss as to how she would survive. Then an elder told her that they would have their regular Christian meeting in his car. Says Kiyoko: "An elder and his wife and another sister and I sat in the car. The meeting was simple but, like a miracle, the memory of the tsunami just slipped away from me. I felt peace of mind. That meeting showed me the power of Christian association." PREPARATION FOR A DISASTER

The Governing Body has directed that all branches worldwide give guidelines to congregation elders and traveling overseers as to how to prepare for and deal with disasters. For example, even before a disaster occurs, the elders need to make sure that they have up-to-date contact information for each congregation member.

AN ADDED TOOL FOR RELIEF WORKERS

IN June 2013, the brochure Jehovah's Witnesses and Disaster Relief became available. It was especially prepared for government officials in the United States who oversee emergency management efforts. The brochure describes some of the relief efforts that we have carried out since the mid-1940's. It also features a map that illustrates the global scale of our relief work. "Brothers serving on

Disaster Relief Committees use this brochure to establish contacts with key officials in disaster-prone areas well before disasters strike," explains an elder who is involved in organizing relief efforts. "When such officials are already familiar with our relief activities, it becomes easier for us to obtain from them the permissions needed to enter areas where disasters have occurred."

IT SHAPED THE COURSE OF HIS LIFE

WHAT impact may taking part in relief work have on young ones? Consider what happened to **Peter Johnson**, who did so for the first time at age 18. He recalls: "Seeing the gratefulness of the brothers and feeling the joy that comes from giving touched me deeply. It reinforced my desire to use my life to serve Jehovah to the fullest extent." Thereafter, Peter started pioneering. He also worked at Bethel and later began serving as a member of a Regional Building Committee. "Doing relief work that first time back in 1974," says Peter today, "shaped the course of my life." Are you young? Could you follow Peter's example? Who knows how relief work may shape the course of *your* life in Jehovah's service!


The Ministry of Relief Brings Lasting Benefits

¹⁵ In his consideration of the ministry of relief, Paul also explained to the Corinthians the benefits that they and other Christians would receive from sharing in this work. He stated: "With *supplication for you*, they [the Jewish Christians in Jerusalem who received the assistance] express *affection for you* because of the surpassing undeserved kindness of God upon you." (2 Cor. 9:14) Yes, the generosity of the Corinthians would move the Jewish Christians to pray in behalf of their brothers in Corinth, including Gentiles, and would deepen their affection for them.

¹⁶ Applying Paul's words about the benefits of relief work to our day, *The Watchtower* of December 1, 1945, stated: "When one section of God's consecrated people contributes to the needs of another group of them, think of the unifying effect it has!" That is exactly what relief workers today experience. "Doing relief work made me feel closer to my brothers than ever before," says an elder who helped in flood relief. One grateful sister who received relief aid put it this way, "Our brotherhood is the closest thing we have to Paradise on earth."—**Read Proverbs 17:17**.



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Courage is essential for Christians. How can we benefit from the example of those who in the past displayed this quality? How can young ones, parents, older sisters, and baptized brothers show that they are courageous and ready to perform good works?

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Cultivate Self-Control

"The fruitage of the spirit is . . . self-control."-GAL. 5:22, 23.

SELF-CONTROL is a godly quality. (Gal. 5:22, 23) Jehovah possesses self-control in perfect measure. Humans, however, are imperfect and therefore struggle to maintain selfcontrol. Indeed, many of the problems that people face today stem from a lack of self-control. That lack may result in procrastination and underperformance in school or at work. It may also lead to verbal abuse, drunkenness, violence, divorce, needless debt, addiction, imprisonment, emotional trauma, sexually transmitted disease, and unwanted pregnancy, to name a few.—Ps. 34:11-14.

² Clearly, people who lack self-control are causing problems for themselves and for others. And the problem of lacking self-control is worsening. Self-discipline was studied in the 1940's, but recent studies have shown that people have become much worse at exercising self-discipline. This is no surprise to students of God's Word because the Bible foretold that one evidence that we are living in "the last days" is that men would be "without self-control."—2 Tim. 3:1-3.

³ Why should you be interested in cultivating self-control? Consider two important reasons. First, it has been observed SONGS: 121, 36

that people who are able to control their impulses generally have fewer major problems. They are more stable emotionally, they are better at forming wholesome relationships, and they are not as angry and prone to anxiety and depression as are impulsive people. Second, the ability to resist temptation and to control inappropriate impulses is fundamental to retaining God's favor. The failure of Adam and Eve illustrates this truth. (Gen. 3:6) And think of the sad results reaped by others who since then have failed to exercise this important quality.

⁴ No imperfect human can exercise perfect self-control. Jehovah is aware of his servants' struggles in this regard, and he wants to help them dominate their sinful tendencies. (1 Ki. 8:46-50) As a loving Friend, he warmly encourages sincere individuals who want to serve him but who have a hard time exercising self-control in some area of life. Let us consider Jehovah's perfect example. Then we will learn from good examples and bad ones recounted in the Bible. And we can review practical suggestions that can help us to strengthen our self-control.

JEHOVAH SETS THE EXAMPLE

⁵ Jehovah exercises the quality of selfcontrol perfectly, for he is perfect in all that he does. (Deut. 32:4) We, however, are imperfect. Even so, in order to understand the quality of self-control, we need to examine Jehovah's example so that we can better imitate him. What are some noteworthy instances when Jehovah displayed self-control?

⁶ Think about how Jehovah exercised self-control in dealing with Satan's brazen rebellion. That challenge needed to be met. The Devil's challenge no doubt aroused indignation, anger, and contempt among heavenly creatures loyal to God. Perhaps you feel similar emotions when you consider all the suffering Satan has caused. Jehovah, however, did not react hastily. His response was measured and entirely fitting. He has been slow to anger and has been just in dealing with Satan's revolt. (Ex. 34:6; Job 2:2-6) Why? Jehovah has allowed time to pass because he does not want anyone to be destroyed but "desires all to attain to repentance."-2 Pet. 3:9.

⁷ Jehovah's exercise of self-control teaches us that we too ought to weigh our words and consider our steps carefully; we should not rush into things. When you face an important issue, give yourself the time you need to act wisely. Pray for wisdom to say or do the right thing. (Ps. 141:3) In the heat of the moment, it is all too easy to react emotionally. Many of us have lived to regret hasty words or rash actions!—Prov. 14: 29; 15:28; 19:2.

EXAMPLES AMONG GOD'S SERVANTS -GOOD AND BAD

⁸ What Bible examples underscore the value of controlling our reactions? You can no doubt recall several Bible characters who exercised appropriate restraint when tested. One is Jacob's son Joseph.

^{4.} What should be encouraging to any who are struggling to exercise self-control?

He showed restraint when he was serving in the house of Potiphar, the chief of Pharaoh's guards. Potiphar's wife set her eyes on Joseph, who was "well-built and handsome," and she tried to seduce him. What prevented Joseph from succumbing to her repeated advances? No doubt, he took the time to consider what the consequences would be if he were to lower his guard. And when the situation became critical, he fled from her. He reasoned: "How could I commit this great badness and actually sin against God?"—Gen. 39:6, 9; **read Proverbs 1:10.**

⁹ What does Joseph's example teach us? One thing is that we may need to flee from the temptation to break one of God's laws. In the past, some who are now Witnesses struggled with overeating, heavy drinking, smoking, drug abuse, sexual immorality, and the like. Even after baptism, they may at times be tempted to return to their former practices. Still, if you are ever tempted to break one of Jehovah's laws, strengthen yourself by taking time to ponder the disastrous spiritual consequences that you could face for failing to restrain sinful impulses. You can try to foresee situations in which temptations could likely present themselves and decide how you can avoid them. (Ps. 26:4, 5; Prov. 22:3) Should you ever face such a test, ask Jehovah to give you the wisdom and selfcontrol to resist.

¹⁰ Many young Christians face a trial like Joseph's. Consider Kim. Most of her

classmates were sexually active, and after a typical weekend, they boasted of their latest sexual encounters. Kim had no such stories to tell. She admits that being different at times made her feel "abandoned and alone" and that her peers considered her stupid because she did not date. Yet, Kim was wise enough to know that among many youths the temptation to engage in sex is great. (2 Tim. 2:22) Schoolmates often asked whether she was still a virgin. That gave her the opportunity to explain why she would not engage in sex. We are proud of young Christians who are determined to resist pressure to share in sexual immorality, and Jehovah is proud of them too!

¹¹ The Bible gives warning examples of individuals who lacked self-control concerning sexual conduct. It also shows the sad consequences that can result from such uncontrolled behavior. Anyone facing a situation similar to that of Kim would do well to ponder the case of the naive young man described in Proverbs chapter 7. Think, too, of the course Amnon took and the terrible outcome of his behavior. (2 Sam. 13:1, 2, 10-15, 28-32) Parents might help their children to develop self-control and wisdom in regard to romantic relationships by discussing the topic during family worship, using the Bible passages just mentioned.

¹² On another occasion, Joseph again set a fine example of self-control. To understand what was in his brothers' hearts, Joseph concealed his identity when they appeared before him in Egypt to buy food. And when his feelings were

particularly intense, he withdrew to a private place to hide his tears. (Gen. 43: 30, 31; 45:1) If a fellow Christian or a loved one displays poor judgment, your showing restraint similar to that of Joseph might help you to avoid an impulsive reaction. (Prov. 16:32; 17:27) If you have disfellowshipped relatives, you may need to control your feelings in order to avoid unnecessary contact with them. Self-restraint in such situations is not automatic, yet it is easier if we realize that our actions are in line with God's example and in harmony with his counsel.

¹³ The Bible offers a notable example in King David. He wielded great power but refrained from using it out of anger when provoked by Saul and Shimei. (1 Sam. 26:9-11; 2 Sam. 16:5-10) That is not to say that David always controlled himself, as we know from his sin with Bath-sheba and his initial reaction to Nabal's greed. (1 Sam. 25:10-13; 2 Sam. 11:2-4) Nevertheless, we can learn valuable lessons from David. First, overseers among God's people need to be especially careful to exercise self-control so that they do not abuse their authority. Second, no one can be complacent, thinking that he is safe from temptation. -1 Cor. 10:12.

PRACTICAL THINGS YOU CAN DO

¹⁴ What can you do to work on your self-control? Consider this real-life situation. A vehicle rear-ended Luigi's car. Despite being in the wrong, the other driver insulted Luigi and tried to start a fight. Luigi prayed, asked Jehovah to help him keep his composure, and tried to calm the other driver-but to no avail. Luigi made a note of the man's insurance details and left while the man was still shouting. A week later, Luigi was making a return visit on a woman and he learned that her husband was the other driver! The man was embarrassed and apologized for his tirade. He offered to contact Luigi's insurance company to speed up the claim. The man took part in the spiritual conversation and appreciated what was being said. In hindsight, Luigi could see how important it was that he had kept calm after the accident and how detrimental it could have been had he lost his temper.-Read 2 Corinthians 6:3. 4.

¹⁵ Diligent and conscientious Bible study can help Christians to develop self-control. Recall that God told Joshua: "This book of the Law should not depart from your mouth, and you must read it in an undertone day and night, in order to observe carefully all that is written in it; for then your way will be successful and then you will act wisely." (Josh. 1:8) How is it that Bible study can help you to cultivate self-control?

¹⁶ As we have just noted, the Scriptures contain accounts that vividly illustrate both the benefits and the consequences of our actions. Jehovah had these accounts recorded for a purpose. (Rom. 15:4) How wise it is to read them, meditate on them, and study them! Try to grasp how they apply to you and your family. Ask Jehovah to help you to ap-

^{13.} What lessons can we learn from accounts concerning King David?

ply his Word. If you discern that you are deficient in some aspect of self-control, admit it. Then pray about it, and strive to see how you can improve. (Jas. 1:5) No doubt, research in our Christian publications can help you to locate relevant material that will further help you.

¹⁷ How can you help your children to develop self-control? Parents know that this quality does not come naturally to young people. And as is the case with all qualities that their children need to learn, parents should set the example. (Eph. 6:4) So if you see that your children are struggling to control their impulses, ask yourself whether you are setting a fine example. Do not minimize the good effect of your being regular in the field service, in attending meetings, and in conducting family worship. Do not be afraid to say no to your children's requests if need be! Jehovah set limits for Adam and Eve-limits that could have

instilled in them a proper regard for his authority. Similarly, parental discipline and example have the goal of teaching children self-control. Love for God's authority and respect for his standards are among the most precious things that you can cultivate in your children.

-Read Proverbs 1:5, 7, 8.

¹⁸ Certainly, whether you are a parent or not, you should not overlook the need to choose your associations wisely. Seek the company of those who will encourage you to pursue worthwhile goals and avoid trouble. (Prov. 13:20) Spiritually-minded associates will have a positive influence on you, moving you to imitate their course of life marked by self-control. And no doubt your good conduct will encourage your friends. The self-control that results is fundamental to your enjoying everyday life in God's favor and to sharing good things with your loved ones.

^{18.} Why can you be confident that good associations will prove to be a blessing?
