4 Having received the holy spirit, the disciples in Jerusalem lost no time in sharing the good news of salvation with others, beginning with the crowd who had gathered that morning. Their preaching fulfilled a remarkable prophecy, recorded eight centuries earlier by Joel, the son of Pethuel: "I shall pour out my spirit on every sort of flesh, and your sons and your daughters will certainly prophesy. As for your old men, dreams they will dream. As for your young men, visions they will see. And even on the menservants and on the maidservants in those days I shall pour out my spirit . . . before the coming of the great and fearinspiring day of Jehovah."—Joel 1:1; 2:28, 29, 31; Acts 2:17, 18, 20.

5 Did this mean that God was going to raise up a whole generation of prophets, both male and female, in the manner of David, Joel, and Deborah, and use them to foretell future events? No. Christian 'sons and daughters, menservants and maidservants' would prophesy in the sense that they would be impelled by Jehovah's spirit to declare "the magnificent things" that

Jehovah had done and would still do. So they would serve as spokesmen for the Most High. How, though, did the crowd react?—Hebrews 1:1, 2.

Look at the matter from another standpoint. Jehovah God told the prophet Joel of a time when people of every sort would prophesy, so to speak: "After that it must occur that I shall pour out my spirit on every sort of flesh, and your sons and your daughters will certainly prophesy. As for your old men, dreams they will dream. As for your young men, visions they will see." (Joel 2:28-32) On the day of Pentecost 33 C.E., the apostle Peter applied this passage to the pouring out of holy spirit upon those who were gathered in an upper chamber in Jerusalem and to their subsequent preaching of "the magnificent things of God." (Acts 1:12-14; 2:1-4, 11, 14-21) Now consider our time. Joel's prophecy has been undergoing its major fulfillment since early in the 20th century. Spiritanointed Christians—male and female, old and young—began to "prophesy," that is, to declare "the magnificent things of God," including the good news of the Kingdom, now established in the heavens.

Genuine repentance is heartfelt. It involves an inward 'ripping apart of our hearts,' not an outward 'ripping apart of garments.'

Joel 3:14—What is "the valley of the decision"?

It is a symbolic place for meting out God's judgment. In the days of Judean King Jehoshaphat, whose name means "Jehovah Is Judge," God delivered Judah from surrounding nations by confusing their military forces. Hence, the place is also called "the low plain of Jehoshaphat." (Joel 3:2, 12) In our day, it represents a symbolic location in which nations will be crushed like grapes in a winepress.—Revelation 19:15.

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Are You Making Good Use of JW.ORG Contact Cards?



KEEP BUILDING FAITH IN JEHOVAH'S RIGHTEOUS REQUIREMENTS

³ First of all, we need to strengthen our faith in divine law. In the course of studying this book, you have considered a number of Jehovah's righteous requirements regarding conduct. What is your view of them? Satan would like to mislead you into viewing Jehovah's laws, principles, and standards as restrictive, even oppressive. He has been using this tactic ever since it proved so effective way back in Eden. (Genesis 3:1-6) Will his tactic work on you? Much will depend on your point of view.

⁴ To illustrate: As you walk along in a pleasant park, you notice a sturdy high fence blocking off part of the grounds. The landscape beyond the fence looks inviting. At first, you might view the fence as a needless restriction of your freedom. As you look through it, though, you notice a ferocious lion stalking prey on the other side! Now you see the fence for what it is—a protection. Is there a dangerous predator stalking you right now? God's Word warns: "Keep your senses, be watchful. Your adversary, the Devil, walks about like a roaring lion, seeking to devour someone."—1 Peter 5:8.

satan is a vicious predator. Because Jehovah does not want us to become Satan's prey, He has instituted laws to protect us from the many "crafty acts" of that wicked one. (Ephesians 6:11, footnote) So whenever we meditate on God's laws, we should see in them the love of our heavenly Father. Viewed in that light, God's laws are a source of security and joy. The disciple James wrote: "He who peers into the perfect law that belongs to freedom and who persists in it . . . will be happy in his doing it."

IT SHAPED THE COURSE OF HIS LIFE

WHAT impact may taking part in relief work have on young ones? Consider what happened to Peter Johnson, who did so for the first time at age 18. He recalls: "Seeing the gratefulness of the brothers and feeling the joy that comes from giving touched me deeply. It reinforced my desire to use my life to serve Jehovah to the fullest extent." Thereafter, Peter started pioneering. He also worked at Bethel and later began serving as a member of a Regional Building Committee. "Doing relief work that first time back in 1974," says Peter today, "shaped the course of my life." Are you young? Could you follow Peter's example? Who knows how relief work may shape the course of your life in Jehovah's service!

exactly what relief workers today experience. "Doing relief work made me feel closer to my brothers than ever before," says an elder who helped in flood relief. One grateful sister who received relief aid put it this way, "Our brotherhood is the closest thing we have to Paradise on earth."—Read Proverbs 17:17.

disaster, our afflicted brothers experience in a special way the truth of God's promise: "I, Jehovah your God, am grasping your right hand, the One saying to you, 'Do not be afraid. I will help you.'" (Isa. 41:13) After surviving a disaster, a sister said: "I felt hopeless seeing the damage, but Jehovah extended his hand. The help I received from the brothers is indescribable." After a disaster devastated their area, two elders wrote in behalf of the congregations where they serve: "The earthquake caused great pain, but we experienced the help that Jehovah provides through our brothers. We had read about relief work, but now we saw it carried out in front of our eves."

VOLUNTEERS AROUND THE WORLD BRING RELIEF

CENTRAL AND WEST AFRICA

In 1994, some 800,000 or more people in Rwanda were killed in tribal genocide. In the aftermath of that massacre, unrest spread to other lands in Central Africa, resulting in overcrowded refugee camps. To help their afflicted fellow believers, Jehovah's Witnesses in Belgium, France, and Switzerland airlifted some 300 tons of clothing, medicine, tents, food, and other supplies. Within weeks, those supplies reached our needy brothers.

Also in Africa, a team of ten Witness doctors and nurses from France have been providing relief to our brothers to alleviate their suffering caused by civil war, famine, and disease. In the past two years alone, the team handled over 10,000 medical consultations. Their work brings praise to Jehovah and his organization. "When we arrive in an area to help our brothers and sisters," relates one of the nurses, "people say with respect: 'These are Jehovah's Witnesses. They have come to help their brothers.'" After receiving help from a nurse, one Witness exclaimed: "Thank you, my sister. Thank you, Jehovah!"

At times, relief work may also be needed when severe accidents occur. In 2012, a road accident in Nigeria killed

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13 Witnesses, all belonging to one small congregation, and left 54 others seriously injured. A relief committee organized around-the-clock personal care for each victim. When a hospital patient observed the outpouring of support that the injured brothers and sisters received, she telephoned her pastor, saying: "No one from our church has visited me. Come to the hospital and see love in action among Jehovah's Witnesses!"

Though our dear brothers in that small congregation suffered a painful loss, they felt comforted by the expressions of love they received from their fellow believers. Furthermore, after observing the loving care that the relief workers showered on the afflicted brothers, several individuals in that congregation were moved to intensify their ministry. Before the accident, the congregation had 35 publishers. Within a year, that number had grown to 60.

AUSTRALIA

In 2013, parts of Queensland's coast were hit by a flood that left 70 Witnesses homeless. Mark and Rhonda and their daughter fled their flooded home and ended up in an evacuation center. The place was packed. "It was basically standing room only," relates Rhonda. The deafening noise from the helicopters that were landing and departing close-by added to the tense atmosphere in the

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center. Worried, she asked her husband, "What are we going to do?" Mark fervently prayed to Jehovah, asking for help. "About 30 minutes later," says Rhonda, "a car arrived at the center, and three brothers got out. When we met, they said: 'We're taking you with us. You will stay at a brother's house.'" Adds Rhonda: "It's hard to describe the overwhelming emotion we felt at that moment for the loving care of Jehovah's organization."

Over 250 volunteers rushed to that same disaster area to help their brothers. Says an elderly brother: "A group of Witnesses came out of nowhere and toiled like ants to clear up the mess in my home. My wife and I will never forget how they came to our aid."

BRAZIL

In 2008, mudslides and floods in the state of Santa Catarina forced some 80,000 people out of their homes. It was like a "tsunami of clay, mud and trees," said a resident. Some brothers found shelter in an Assembly Hall. "They escaped with only the clothes they were wearing, all soaked with mud," relates Márcio, the hall's caretaker. Says one sister: "Our house collapsed. It was painful to see it disappear in seconds, but I will never forget how our brothers and sisters comforted us. We received so many expressions of love! The experience taught me how wise it is to treasure spiritual things."

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Mudslides have devastated entire neighborhoods on the mountain slopes near the city of Rio de Janeiro. To respond effectively to such recurring disasters, the brothers formed a permanent Disaster Relief Committee. When there is a threat of imminent mudslides, monitors (assigned brothers living in the affected area) alert the committee. Quickly, volunteers arrive in trucks marked with the sign "Jehovah's Witnesses—Humanitarian Aid." All members of the well-equipped rescue crews have preassigned tasks. The workers wear vests that clearly identify them as Jehovah's Witnesses. Together with brothers of the Hospital Liaison Committees, they provide aid to injured brothers and sisters. Relief workers bring in food, water, medical supplies, clothing, and cleaning products. Cleaning mud from houses is a huge task. After one recent mudslide, it took 60 volunteers to remove four truckloads of mud from just one home!



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Imitate Jehovah's Compassion

What does it mean to be compassionate? Both Jehovah and Jesus have set perfect examples of exercising this quality. In what practical ways, though, can we imitate their examples? And what good results can we obtain from doing so?

Imitate Jehovah's Compassion

"Jehovah, Jehovah, a God merciful and compassionate."—EX. 34:6.

ON ONE occasion, God revealed himself to Moses by declaring His own name and qualities. The first ones that he listed were mercy and compassion. (Read Exodus 34:5-7.) Jehovah could have stressed his power or his wisdom.

^{1.} In what special way did Jehovah reveal himself to Moses, and why is this significant?

Yet, to Moses, who was seeking reassurance of God's backing, Jehovah emphasized instead qualities that underscore his willingness to help his servants. (Ex. 33:13) Do you not find it heartwarming that God mentioned these endearing traits ahead of any others? This article will focus on the quality of compassion, a sympathetic awareness of another's suffering or adversity coupled with a desire to lessen it.

² Humans were made in God's image. Accordingly, because Jehovah is compassionate, interest in others' well-being is rooted in human nature. Even those who do not know the true God often show compassion. (Gen. 1:27) We find many accounts in the Bible where a sense of compassion shines through. Recall the account of the two prostitutes who argued before Solomon over which one of them was the actual mother of a child. When Solomon put them to the test by ordering that the baby be cut in half, the real mother's compassion was stirred. That moved her to act, even at the cost of giving the child up to the other woman. (1 Ki. 3:23-27) Or recall Pharaoh's daughter who saved baby Moses' life.

Though she realized that the infant she had found was a child of the Hebrews and should not be kept alive, "she felt compassion for him" and decided to raise the child as her own.—Ex. 2:5, 6.

³ Why should the topic of compassion interest you? Because the Bible urges you to imitate Jehovah. (Eph. 5:1) Yet, while humans were created to be compassionate, our imperfection as descendants of Adam inclines us toward self-interest. Sometimes we may find that it is not easy to decide whether we will help others or concentrate on ourselves. For some, this is an ongoing conflict, or a balancing act. What can help you to develop and maintain your interest in others? First, take time to examine how Jehovah has shown compassion and how others have shown it. Second, consider how you can imitate God's example and how your doing so is truly beneficial.

JEHOVAH—THE PERFECT MODEL OF COMPASSION

⁴ We find many instances where Jehovah's compassion must have been involved. Think of what God did for Lot. That righteous man was "greatly dis-

tressed" by the brazen conduct of the inhabitants of Sodom and Gomorrah. Indeed, God determined that those immoral people deserved to die. (2 Pet. 2:7, 8) God sent angels to rescue Lot. They urged him and his family to flee from the doomed cities. "When he kept lingering, then because of Jehovah's compassion for him, the [angels] seized hold of his hand and the hand of his wife and the hands of his two daughters, and they brought him out and stationed him outside the city." (Gen. 19:16) Does that example not indicate that Jehovah is fully aware of the difficult situations in which his faithful people sometimes find themselves?—Isa. 63:7-9; Jas. 5:11, ftn.; 2 Pet. 2:9.

⁵ Not only has Jehovah shown compassion but he has also taught his people the need to display that quality. Consider the law given to Israel regarding the seizing of a man's garment as security for a loan. (Read Exodus 22:26, 27.) A hard-hearted lender might have been tempted to seize the debtor's garment, leaving him without a covering in which to sleep. Yet, Jehovah taught his people to avoid such an unfeeling attitude and course. His people were to be compassionate. Does not the principle reflected

in that particular law move us to action? Would we want to leave our brothers out in the cold, so to speak, if there is something that we can do to relieve their suffering?—Col. 3:12; Jas. 2:15, 16; read 1 John 3:17.

⁶ Jehovah felt compassion for his people Israel even when they sinned. We read: "Jehovah the God of their forefathers kept warning them by means of his messengers, warning them again and again, because he felt compassion for his people and for his dwelling place." (2 Chron. 36:15) Should we not feel similar compassion for people who could potentially repent over a sinful life course and gain God's favor? Jehovah does not want any to be destroyed in the coming judgment. (2 Pet. 3:9) So until God acts to destroy the wicked, let us continue to proclaim his compassionate warning message.

⁷ Many experiences could be used to illustrate God's acts of compassion. Consider what happened to the family of a 12-year-old lad whom we will call Milan. It was during a time of ethnic strife in the early 1990's. Milan, his brother, his parents, and a

number of other Witnesses were riding on a bus from Bosnia to Serbia. They were on their way to a convention at which Milan's parents intended to get baptized. But at the border, soldiers pulled the family off the bus because of their ethnicity; yet, they allowed the other brothers to proceed. After holding the family for two days, the officer in charge radioed his superior to ask what should be done with them. The officer was standing right in front of the family, so all heard the response, "Just take them out and shoot them!"

⁸ As the officer spoke to his men, two strangers came up to the family and quietly identified themselves as Witnesses. They had heard of the crisis from others on the bus. The two told Milan and his brother to get into their car to cross the border, as the children's papers were not being checked. The newcomers then told the parents to walk around the back of the border post and meet them on the other side. Milan did not know whether to laugh or to cry at this suggestion. "Do you think they are just going to let us walk off?" his parents asked. Yet, as they walked away, it seemed as if the soldiers were staring right through them. The parents and children were reunited on the other side of the border. They proceeded to the convention city, convinced

that Jehovah had answered their desperate prayers for help. We know from the Bible that there have been times when Jehovah did not directly intervene to protect his servants. (Acts 7:58-60) Yet, Milan shares how he felt. He says, "It seemed to me that the angels blinded the soldiers and that Jehovah rescued us."—Ps. 97:10.

⁹ We can learn a lesson from Jesus. He felt compassion for the crowds he met, for "they were skinned and thrown about like sheep without a shepherd." How did he react to their pitiful state? "He started to teach them many things." (Matt. 9: 36; read Mark 6:34.) His attitude was in stark contrast to that of the Pharisees, who had no desire to help the common people. (Matt. 12:9-14; 23:4; John 7:49) Do you not feel a yearning, similar to what Jesus had, to feed spiritually famished people?

¹⁰ That is not to say that compassion is to be shown in every situation. God's compassion was appropriate in the Bible examples mentioned above. However, King Saul was disobedient when he showed what he may have felt was compassion. He

spared the life of Agag, an enemy of God's people, and he also spared the best of the flock. Consequently, Jehovah rejected Saul from being king over Israel. (1 Sam. 15:3, 9, 15, ftn.) Jehovah, of course, is the righteous Judge. He can read people's hearts, and he knows when compassion is not warranted. (Lam. 2:17; Ezek. 5:11) The time is coming when he will execute judgment on all those who refuse to obey him. (2 Thess. 1:6-10) That will not be the time for him to show compassion for those whom he has judged to be wicked. Rather, executing them will be an appropriate expression of God's compassion for the righteous, whom he will preserve.

11 Clearly, it is not our role to judge whether people should be executed or preserved alive. Instead, we need to do all we can now to help people. So how can we manifest fitting compassion for our fellow man in practical ways? Consider a number of suggestions.

CULTIVATING AND SHOWING APPROPRIATE COMPASSION

¹² Be helpful in everyday life. Showing compassion for one's neighbor and Christian brothers is a basic

requirement of those who strive to imitate Jesus. (John 13:34, 35; 1 Pet. 3:8) One meaning of compassion is "to suffer together." A person who shows compassion is moved to relieve others' suffering, perhaps by helping them out of their difficulties. Seek opportunities to do so! For example, could you help someone by offering to perform a necessary chore, maybe running an errand for him?—Matt. 7:12.

Show your compassion for others by offering practical help (See paragraph 12)



¹³ Share in relief work. The sufferings of those struck by disasters move many to manifest compassion. Jehovah's people are known for coming forward to help in such times of need. (1 Pet. 2:17) One Japanese sister lived in an area that was seriously damaged by the earthquake and tsunami of 2011. She says that she was "very encouraged and comforted" by the efforts of the many volunteers from elsewhere in Japan and from overseas to repair property damage. She writes: "This experience helped me to realize that Jehovah cares. And fellow Witnesses care about one another. Many brothers and sisters all over the world are praying for us."

¹⁴ Assist the sick and the elderly. When we see others experiencing the effects of Adamic sin, we are rightly moved to show compassion. We long to see sickness and aging brought to an end. So we pray for God's Kingdom to come. In the meantime, we do what we can to assist those in need. Consider what one author wrote about his elderly mother, who suffered from Alzheimer's disease. One day, she soiled her clothes. As she was trying to clean up, the doorbell rang. The visitors turned out to be two

Witnesses who regularly called on the woman. The sisters asked if there was anything they could do to help. "It is embarrassing but yes," the woman replied. The visitors helped her to clean up. Then they made her a cup of tea and stayed for a chat. The son was most grateful. "Hats off to these Witnesses," he wrote. "They practice what they preach." Does your compassion for the sick and the elderly move you to do all *you* can to lessen their suffering?—Phil. 2:3, 4.

¹⁵ Help people spiritually. People's problems and worries move us to want to help them spiritually. The best way we can do that is by teaching them about God and about what his Kingdom will do for mankind. Another way is by helping them to see the wisdom of living by godly standards. (Isa. 48:17, 18) Could you increase the share you are having in the ministry, a work that truly honors Jehovah and manifests your compassion for others?—1 Tim. 2: 3, 4.

¹⁶ Mental-health experts say that practicing compassion can improve your health, well-being, and relationships. When you relieve the suffering of oth-

ers, you will feel happier, more optimistic, less lonely, and less inclined to think negative thoughts. Yes, your showing compassion will benefit you. (Eph. 4: 31, 32) Christians who lovingly seek to help others are rewarded with a good conscience, knowing that they are acting in harmony with godly principles. Having such a disposition makes for a more caring parent, a better spouse, and a better friend. Those who are quick to show compassion are, in turn, more likely to receive help and support when they need it.—Read Matthew 5:7; Luke 6:38.

¹⁷ Knowing that compassion is good for you should not be your main reason for wanting to cultivate it. The principal reason should be your desire to imitate and glorify the Source of love and compassion, Jehovah God. (Prov. 14:31) He sets the perfect example for us. May we do all we can, then, to imitate him-to promote warm affection among our brothers and good relations with our neighbors by showing compassion.—Gal. 6:10; 1 John 4:16.
