ly cursed,* for you are robbing me—yes, the entire nation is doing so. 10 Bring the entire tithe* into the storehouse,* so that there may be food in my house;* and test me out, please, in this regard," Jehovah of armies says, "to see whether I will not open to you the floodgates of the heavens* and pour out* on you a blessing until there is nothing lacking."

11 "And I will rebuke the devouring one" for you, and it will not ruin the fruit of your land, nor will the vine in your field be fruitless," says Jehovah of armies.

Treasures From God's Word

Malachi 2:13, 14—Jehovah despises marital treachery

Reference: jd 125-126 paragraphs 4-5.

4 During Malachi's day in the fifth century B.C.E., divorce was rampant among the Jews. Malachi told them: "Jehovah himself has borne witness between you and the wife of your youth, with whom you yourself have dealt treacherously." Because of treacherous dealings on the part of husbands, the altar of Jehovah was covered with the tears of betrayed wives, "with weeping and sighing." And corrupt priests condoned such cruelty!—Malachi 2:13, 14.

5 How did Jehovah view the deplorable attitude toward marriage in Malachi's time? "'He has hated a divorcing,' Jehovah the God of Israel has said," wrote Malachi. He also affirmed that Jehovah 'has not changed.' (Malachi 2:16; 3:6) Do you see the point? God had earlier taken a position against divorce. (Genesis 2:18, 24) He did so in Malachi's day. And he still does today. Some people may decide to walk out of their marriage simply because they are not satisfied with their mate. Treacherous though their heart may be, Jehovah searches through it. (Jeremiah 17:9, 10) He is aware of any deceit or malicious scheming behind a divorce, however one may rationalize it. Yes, "all things are naked and openly exposed to the eyes of him with whom we have an accounting."—Hebrews 4:13.

Malachi 2:1516—Stay loyal to your marriage mate

Reference: w02 5/1 18 paragraph 19.

On the positive side, Malachi shows that some husbands were not dealing treacherously with their wives. They 'had what was remaining of God's holy spirit.' (Verse 15) Happily, God's organization today abounds with such men who 'assign honor to their wives.' (1 Peter 3:7) They do not abuse their wives physically or verbally, do not insist on degrading sexual practices, and do not dishonor their wives by flirting with other women or by viewing pornography. Jehovah's organization is also blessed by having an abundance of faithful Christian wives who are loyal to God and his laws. All such men and women know what God hates, and they think and act accordingly. Continue to be like them, 'obeying God as ruler' and being blessed by his holy spirit.—Acts 5:29.

Digging for Spiritual Gems

Jehovah took no pleasure in the offerings of the greedy priests, who would charge a fee even for such simple services as shutting doors or lighting altar fires. How important it is that our acts of worship, including what we do in the Christian ministry, be motivated by unselfish love for God and neighbor, never for monetary gain!—Matthew 22:37-39; 2 Corinthians 11:7.

A Messenger 'Clears up a Way'

5 Centuries before Jesus gave the illustration of the wheat and the weeds, Jehovah inspired his prophet Malachi to foretell events that are reflected in Jesus' illustration. (Read Malachi 3:1-4.) John the Baptizer was the 'messenger who cleared up the way.' (Matthew 11:10, 11) When he came in 29 C.E., a time of judgment for the nation of Israel had drawn close. Jesus was the second messenger. He cleansed the temple in Jerusalem twice—first at the start of his ministry and second toward the end. (Matthew 21:12, 13; John 2:14-17) Hence, Jesus' cleansing work involved a period of time.

6 What is the larger fulfillment of Malachi's prophecy? During the decades leading up to 1914, C. T. Russell and his close associates did a work like that of John the Baptizer. That vital work involved restoring Bible truths. The Bible Students taught the true meaning of Christ's ransom sacrifice, exposed the hellfire lie, and proclaimed the coming end of the Gentile Times. Still, there were numerous religious groups who claimed to be Christ's followers. So a crucial question needed to be answered: Who among those groups were the wheat? To settle that question, Jesus began to inspect the spiritual temple in 1914. That inspection and cleansing work involved a period of time—from 1914 to the early part of 1919.

Malachi 3:10—Does the bringing in of "all the tenth parts," or tithing, represent giving our all to Jehovah? The Mosaic Law was abolished on the basis of Jesus' death, so monetary tithing is not a requirement. Yet, tithing has a symbolic meaning. (Ephesians 2:15) It does not represent the giving of our all. While the tenth part was brought year after year, we bring our all to Jehovah only once—when we dedicate ourselves to him and symbolize our dedication by undergoing water baptism. From that time on, everything we have belongs to Jehovah. Still, he allows us to choose a portion of what we have—a symbolic tithe—to use in his service. It is whatever our circumstances allow and our heart impels us to use. The offerings we bring to Jehovah include the time, energy, and resources used in the Kingdom-preaching and disciple-making work. Also included are attending Christian meetings, visiting sick and elderly fellow believers, and rendering financial support to true worship.

TWO MESSAGES FROM GOD

LUKF 1:5-33

We can consider the entire Bible to be, in effect, a message from God. Our heavenly Father has provided it for our instruction. Consider, though, two special messages that were delivered over 2,000 years ago. They were delivered by an angel named Gabriel, who "stands near before God." (Luke 1:19) What were the circumstances under which the angel provided those important messages?

It is about the year 3 B.C.E. Where does Gabriel deliver the first message? In the Judean hills, probably not far from Jerusalem, there lives a priest of Jehovah by the name of Zechariah. He and his wife, Elizabeth, are no longer young, and they have no children. It is Zechariah's turn to serve as a priest at God's temple in Jerusalem. While Zechariah is at the temple, Gabriel suddenly appears near the incense altar.

Understandably, that frightens Zechariah. But the angel calms Zechariah's fears, saying: "Do not be afraid, Zechariah, because your supplication has been favorably heard, and your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you are to name him John." Gabriel adds that John "will be great in the sight of Jehovah" and will "get ready for Jehovah a prepared people."—Luke 1: 13-17.

To Zechariah, that seems unbelievable. Why? Because of his and Elizabeth's age. So Gabriel tells him: "You will be silent and unable to speak

until the day these things take place, because you did not believe my words."—Luke 1:20.

Meanwhile, the people outside are wondering why Zechariah is taking so long inside. Finally he comes out, but he cannot speak. Zechariah can only make signs with his hands. It is evident that he has seen something supernatural while in the temple.

After Zechariah finishes his service at the temple, he returns to his home. Soon thereafter, Elizabeth becomes pregnant! For five months, while awaiting the birth of her child, Elizabeth stays at home away from people.


Then Gabriel appears a second time. To whom? To a young unmarried woman named Mary, who lives up north in the region called Galilee, in the city of Nazareth. What does the angel tell her? He says: "You have found favor with God." Gabriel goes on to tell Mary: "Look! you will become pregnant and give birth to a son, and you are to name him Jesus." Gabriel adds: "This one will be great and will be called Son of the Most High, . . . and he will rule as King over the house of Jacob forever, and there will be no end to his Kingdom."—Luke 1:30-33.


You can appreciate how privileged Gabriel must feel to deliver these two messages. As we read more about John and Jesus, it will be clear why these messages from heaven are so important.

Praise Jehovah Our God!







Make a Joyful Sound!

"It is good to sing praises to our God."—PS. 147:1.

A POPULAR lyricist once said: "Words make you think thoughts. Music makes you feel a feeling. But a song makes you feel a thought." What better thoughts could we "feel" than those that express praise and love for our heavenly Father, Jehovah? It is no wonder that singing is a prominent aspect of pure worship, whether we are alone when we sing or we are with the congregation of God's people.

- ² How, though, do you feel about singing aloud with the congregation? Do you find it embarrassing? In some cultures, men may feel uncomfortable singing in public. This view can affect the whole congregation, especially if those taking the lead find reasons to hold back or to engage in other activities while the rest of the congregation is singing.—Ps. 30:12.
- ³ If we truly consider singing as part of our worship, we certainly will not want to walk out on or be absent from that part of the meeting program. Thus, each one of us should ask himself: 'How do I view the singing at our meetings for worship? How can I overcome any apprehension that may hold

SINGING—AN INTEGRAL PART OF TRUE WORSHIP

- 4 Faithful worshippers of Jehovah have long used music as a way to praise Jehovah. It is noteworthy that when the ancient Israelites were faithfully serving Jehovah, singing was prominent in their worship. For example, in preparation for service at the temple, King David organized 4,000 Levites to provide music of praise. Among these, 288 were "trained in song to Jehovah, all experts."—1 Chron. 23:5; 25:7.
- 5 At the inauguration of the temple, music and singing played a prominent role. The account tells us: "At the moment when the trumpeters and the singers were praising and thanking Jehovah in unison, and as the sound ascended from the trumpets, the cymbals, and the other musical instruments as they were praising Jehovah, . . . the glory of Jehovah filled the house of the true God." What a faith-strengthening occasion that must have been!—2 Chron. 5: 13, 14; 7:6.
- ⁶ When Nehemiah led the faithful Israelites in rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem, he also organized the Levite singers with full instrumental accompaniment. When the rebuilt walls were dedicated, the special music presentation contributed greatly to the joy of the occasion. This time, there were "two large thanksgiving choirs." Walking in opposite di-

rections, the choirs met on the wall close to the temple area to create a sound that could be heard from far away. (Neh. 12:27, 28, 31, 38, 40, 43) Jehovah was no doubt pleased to hear his worshippers enthusiastically praising him in song.

- ⁷ With the establishment of the Christian congregation, music continued to be a prominent feature of true worship. On the most important night in human history, Jesus included the singing of songs after the institution of the Lord's Evening Meal.—**Read Matthew 26:30.**
- 8 First-century Christians set a pattern of praising God together in song. Even though they often met in private homes, the modest surroundings for worship did not diminish their zeal for singing to Jehovah. Under inspiration, the apostle Paul directed his Christian brothers: "Keep on teaching and encouraging one another with psalms, praises to God, spiritual songs sung with gratitude, singing in your hearts to Jehovah." (Col. 3: 16) The songs in our songbook are truly "spiritual songs [to be] sung with gratitude." They are a part of the spiritual food provided by "the faithful and discreet slave."-Matt. 24:45.

HOW TO IMPROVE YOUR SINGING

(See paragraphs 11-14)



With the availability of modern technology, you may enjoy listening to professional singers. Yet, you may feel embarrassed or disappointed when comparing your voice with productions from the entertainment world. That, however, should not interfere with your responsibility to sing praises to Jehovah. Rather, hold your songbook up high, lift your head, and sing with heartfelt expression! (Ezra 3:11; read Psalm 147:1.) Today, in many Kingdom Halls, the words of the songs are shown on screens, which helps us to sing out. It is also of interest that the singing of Kingdom songs has been made part of the Kingdom Ministry School curriculum for elders. This emphasizes the need for elders to take the lead in congregation singing.

- ¹¹ Perhaps we are apprehensive about singing because we are unsure of how to sing. Yet, we can improve our singing by applying some basic suggestions.*
- 12 You can learn to sing with power and volume by breathing properly. Much as electricity powers a light bulb, breathing energizes your voice when you speak or

singing with a full voice is fear. It may be fear of standing out or of possibly sounding unpleasant to others. However, we should keep in mind that when we speak, "we all stumble many times." (Jas. 3:2) Yet, that does not stop us from speaking. So why should we let our imperfect singing voices stop us from praising Jehovah in song?

In fact, within the context of singing praises, the Scriptures sometimes direct Jehovah's worshippers to "shout joyfully." —Ps. 33:1-3.

¹³ During family worship or even on your own, try the following: Choose one of your favorite songs from our songbook. Read the lyrics out loud in a strong, confident voice. Next, using the same volume, say all the words from a single phrase of the song *in one breath*. Then sing the phrase, using the same vibrant voice. (Isa. 24:14) Your singing voice will become fuller, and that is a good thing. Do not let it scare you or embarrass you!

14 You will not produce a full singing voice unless you make space in your mouth. So another suggestion is to open your mouth wider than you do for normal speaking. What should you do if you feel that you have a weak voice or perhaps a voice that is too highpitched? SING PRAISES FROM THE HEART

Governing Body announced that a new songbook, entitled "Sing Out Joyfully" to Jehovah, would soon be available for use at the meetings. Brother Lett explained that one objective of the revision was to bring the songs into harmony with the revised New World Translation of the Holy Scriptures. This required removing or revising lyrics that used expressions no longer found in the New World Translation as a result of the 2013 revision. Further, new songs about our preaching work and songs that express our appreciation for the ransom have been included. Also, because singing is an integral part of our worship, the Governing Body wanted to produce a high-quality book that matches the cover of the revised New World Translation.

16 To make "Sing Out Joyfully" to Jehovah easier to use, the songs are arranged by subject matter. For example, the first 12 songs relate to Jehovah, the next 8 songs are about Jesus and the ransom, and so on. There is a subject index that will be helpful, for instance, when choosing a song for a public talk.

17 To help everyone to sing from the heart, some lyrics have been revised to improve clarity of thought and to remove words that are no longer in common use. For example, the word "shall" is not widely used today, so it has been replaced. Similarly, the title "Long-Suffering" has been changed to "Exercise Patience," and the lyrics have been adjusted accordingly. The change of the title "Guard Your Heart" to "We Guard Our Hearts" was most considerate. Why? In the audience at our meetings, assemblies, and conventions are

many new ones, interested ones, young ones, and sisters who by singing the words would be put in the awkward position of telling others what to do. So the title and the lyrics were modified.

18 Many of the songs from "Sing Out Joyfully" to Jehovah are in the form of a prayer. With these songs, you can express your personal feelings to Jehovah. Other songs will help "to incite [us] to love and fine works." (Heb. 10:24) Surely we want to become familiar with the melodies, rhythms, and lyrics of our songs. You can do so by listening to the vocal renditions available on jw.org. By practicing the songs at home, you can learn to sing them with confidence and heartfelt expression.*

19 Remember that singing is an important feature of our worship. It is a powerful way to show our love and appreciation for Jehovah. (Read Isaiah 12:5.) When you sing out joyfully, you will also encourage others to sing with confidence. Indeed, all in the congregation—young, old, and newly interested ones—can join in this form of direct worship of Jehovah. So do not hold back in expressing yourself in song. Instead, obey the clear direction from the inspired psalmist: "Sing to Jehovah!" Yes, make a joyful sound!—Ps. 96:1.

^{*} To help us get into the spirit of singing, each of the convention and assembly program sessions opens with a ten-minute music presentation. These orchestral arrangements are composed in such a way that they will prepare our heart and mind for the program to follow. Therefore, we are encouraged to be in our seats from the start and to listen attentively to these music programs.
