IMPROVING OUR SKILLS IN THE MINISTRY **Teaching Our Students to Prepare**

WHY IMPORTANT: When they prepare, Bible students can more readily understand and remember what we are teaching them. The more they understand and remember, the faster they will make progress. Even after baptism, they will need to prepare for the meetings and the ministry in order to "keep on the watch." (Mt 25:13) Therefore, knowing how to study and having a good study routine will benefit them throughout their life. Right from the start, we should help our students develop the habit of preparing for their Bible study.


HOW TO DO IT:

MATTHEW 25 | "Keep on the Watch"

25:1-12

Although Jesus directed the parable of the ten virgins to his anointed followers, its basic message applies to all Christians. (*w15* 3/15 12-16) "Keep on the watch, therefore, because you know neither the day nor the hour." (Mt 25:13) Can you explain Jesus' parable?

- Bridegroom (vs. 1)—Jesus
- Discreet, prepared virgins (vs. 2)—Anointed Christians who are prepared to carry out their assignment faithfully and who shine as illuminators until the end (Php 2:15)
- The shout: "Here is the bridegroom!" (vs. 6)
 Evidence of Jesus' presence
- Foolish virgins (vs. 8)—Anointed Christians who go out to meet the Bridegroom but who do not remain watchful and do not maintain their integrity

- The discreet virgins refuse to share their oil (vs. 9)
 —After the final sealing, it is too late for faithful anointed ones to help any who have turned unfaithful
- "The bridegroom came" (vs. 10)—Jesus comes to render judgment near the end of the great tribulation
- The discreet virgins enter the marriage feast with the bridegroom, and the door is shut (vs. 10)
 —Jesus gathers his faithful anointed ones to heaven, but the unfaithful ones lose their heavenly reward

The parable does not teach that a large number of the anointed would prove unfaithful and need to be replaced. Rather, it serves as a warning that each anointed Christian has the full capacity to choose either a course of preparedness and vigilance or a course of folly and unfaithfulness. Jesus exhorted: "Prove yourselves ready." (Mt 24:44) Regardless of our hope, Jesus requires all of us to prepare our heart for faithful service and to meet the same standard of watchfulness.

Digging for Spiritual Gems: (8 minutes)

Matthew 25:31-33—Explain the illustration of the sheep and the goats. (w15 3/15 27 paragraph 7)

Today, we have a clear understanding of the illustration of the sheep and the goats. Regarding the identity of those mentioned, Jesus is "the Son of man," the King. Those referred to as "my brothers" are spirit-anointed men and women, who will rule with Christ from heaven. (Romans 8:16, 17) "The sheep" and "the goats" represent individuals from all nations. These ones are not anointed by holy spirit. What about the timing of the judgment? This judgment will occur toward the end of the great tribulation just ahead. And what of the reason why people will be judged as either sheep or goats? The outcome hinges on how they have treated the remaining ones of Christ's spirit-anointed brothers on earth. With the end of this system so close at hand, how grateful we are that Jehovah has progressively shed light on this illustration and on the related illustrations recorded in Matthew chapters 24 and 25!

Matthew 25:40—How can we express our friendship toward Christ's brothers? (w09 10/15 16 paragraphs 16-18)

16 If you hope to live on earth under God's Kingdom, how can you express your friendship toward Christ's brothers? Let us consider just three ways. First, by wholeheartedly sharing in the preaching work. Christ commanded his brothers to preach the good news worldwide. (Matthew 24:14) However, the remaining ones of Christ's brothers on earth today would be hard-pressed to shoulder that responsibility without the assistance of their other sheep companions. Really, each time members of the other sheep class engage in the preaching work, they help Christ's brothers to fulfill their sacred commission. The faithful and discreet slave class deeply appreciates this act of friendship, as does Christ.

17 A second way that those of the other sheep class can help Christ's brothers is by financially supporting the preaching work. Jesus encouraged his followers to make friends for themselves by means of "the unrighteous riches." (Luke 16:9) Not that we can buy friendship with Jesus or Jehovah. Rather, by using our material assets to further Kingdom interests, we prove our friendship and love, not just in word, but "in deed and truth." (1 John 3:16-18) We provide such financial support when we engage in the preaching work, when we donate money toward the construction and maintenance of our meeting facilities, and when we contribute funds toward the worldwide preaching work. Whether the amount we contribute is small or great, both Jehovah and Jesus certainly appreciate our cheerful giving.—2 Corinthians 9:7.

18 A third way that all of us prove that we are friends of Christ is by cooperating with the direction provided by congregation elders. These men are appointed by holy spirit under Christ's direction. (Ephesians 5:23) "Be obedient to those who are taking the lead among you and be submissive," wrote the apostle Paul. (Hebrews 13:17) At times, we may find it a challenge to obey the Bible-based direction given to us by the local elders. We are likely aware of their imperfections, and this may distort our view of their counsel. Still, Christ, the Head of the congregation, is pleased to use these imperfect men. Therefore, the way we react to their authority directly influences our friendship with Christ. When we overlook the faults of the elders and joyfully follow their direction, we prove our love for Christ.

25:2

discreet: Or "wise."—See study note on Mt 24:45.

25:7

put their lamps in order: Evidently referring to what needed to be done, including trimming the wicks and adding oil so that the lamps would burn brightly.

25:13

Keep on the watch: Lit., "Stay awake." This exhortation to stay awake spiritually is the basic message of the parable of the ten virgins.—See study notes on Mt 24:42; 26:38.

25:15

talents: A Greek talent was, not a coin, but a unit of weight and money. One Greek silver talent equaled 20.4 kg (654 oz t) and was worth approximately 6,000 drachmas or Roman denarii. It was the equivalent of about 20 years' wages for a common laborer.—See App. B14.

25:18

money: Lit., "silver," that is, silver used as money.

25:25

hid your talent in the ground: Evidence of this practice is seen in the large quantities of valuables and coins unearthed by both archaeologists and farmers in Bible lands.

25:27

bankers...interest: During the first century C.E., moneylenders, or bankers, were prominent in Israel and surrounding nations. The Law forbade the Israelites from charging interest on loans to needy fellow Jews (Ex 22:25), but interest was specifically allowed on loans to foreigners, likely for business ventures (De 23:20). In Jesus' day, it was evidently common to receive interest on funds deposited with moneylenders.

25:30

gnashing of his teeth: See study note on Mt 8:12.

25:31

Son of man: See study note on Mt 8:20.

25:33

on his right hand ... on his left: In some contexts, both positions indicate honor and authority (Mt 20:21, 23), but the place of greatest honor is always on the right (Ps 110:1; Ac 7:55, 56; Ro 8:34). However, here and at Mt 25:34, 41, there is a clear contrast between the place of favor at the King's right hand and that of disfavor at his left.— Compare Ec 10:2, ftns.

25:34

inherit: The basic meaning of the Greek verb is for an heir to receive something as a right, often because of relationship, such as a son receiving an inheritance from his father. (Ga 4:30) But here, as in most occurrences in the Christian Greek Scriptures, the term is used in the broader sense of receiving something as a reward from God.—Mt 19:29; 1Co 6:9.

the Kingdom: In the Bible, the term "kingdom" is used in several different ways, including "the region or country governed by a king," "kingly power," "a realm," and "being ruled by a king." Here it is evidently used in the sense of receiving the benefits or blessings of being ruled by God's Kingdom and enjoying life within its realm.

founding of the world: The Greek word for "founding" is rendered "to conceive" at Heb 11:11, where it is used with "offspring." Here used in the expression "founding of the world," it apparently refers to the conception and birth of children born to Adam and Eve. Jesus associates "the founding of the world" with Abel, evidently the first redeemable human of the world of mankind whose name was written in the scroll of life from "the founding of the world."—Lu 11:50, 51; Re 17:8.

naked: Or "not sufficiently dressed." The Greek word *gy·mnos'* can have the meaning "lightly clad; in the undergarment only."—Jas 2:15, ftn.

25:40

Truly: See study note on Mt 5:18.

brothers: The plural form of the Greek word for "brother" can refer to both men and women.

25:46

cutting-off: That is, from life. The Greek word *ko'la·sis* is used of "pruning" or "lopping off" needless branches from trees. This "cutting-off" would be "everlasting," since the person would be cut off from life with no hope of a resurrection.

w15 3/15 27 paragraphs 7-10

7 Today, we have a clear understanding of the illustration of the sheep and the goats. Regarding the *identity* of those mentioned, Jesus is "the Son of man," the King. Those referred to as "my brothers" are spirit-anointed men and women, who will rule with Christ from heaven. (Romans 8:16, 17) "The sheep" and "the goats" represent individuals from all nations. These ones are not anointed by holy spirit. What about the *timing* of the judgment? This judgment will occur toward the end of the great tribulation just ahead. And what of the reason why people will be judged as either sheep or goats? The outcome hinges on how they have treated the remaining ones of Christ's spirit-anointed brothers on earth. With the end of this system so close at hand, how grateful we are that Jehovah has progressively shed light on this illustration and on the related illustrations recorded in Matthew chapters 24 and 25!

How Does the Illustration Emphasize the Preaching Work?

8 In the illustration of the sheep and the goats, Jesus does not directly mention the preaching work. Why, then, can it be said that it emphasizes the importance of preaching?

9 First, note that Jesus is teaching by means of an illustration. Obviously, he is not talking about separating literal sheep from literal goats. Likewise, he is not saying that each individual judged to be a sheep must literally feed, clothe, nurse, or visit one of his brothers in prison. Rather, he is illustrating the attitude that the figurative sheep display toward his brothers. He describes the sheep as "righteous" because they recognize that Christ has a group of anointed brothers still on earth, and the sheep loyally support the anointed during these critical last days.—Matthew 10:40-42; 25:40, 46; 2 Timothy 3:1-5.

10 Second, consider the context of Jesus' words. He is discussing the sign of his presence and the conclusion of the system of things. (Matthew 24:3) Early in his discourse, Jesus indicated that the sign would include a remarkable feature—the good news of the Kingdom would "be preached in all the inhabited earth." (Matthew 24:14) And just prior to talking about the sheep and the goats, he related the illustration of the talents. As discussed in the preceding article, Jesus gave that illustration to stress to his spirit-anointed disciples, his "brothers," that they must zealously engage in the preaching work. However, the small number of anointed ones left on earth during Jesus' presence face an enormous challenge—that of preaching to "all the nations" before the end comes. The illustration of the sheep and the goats shows that the anointed would have help. Therefore, one of the primary ways that those judged to be sheep show kindness to Christ's brothers is by supporting them in the preaching work. What, though, is involved in providing that support? Does it consist only of material backing and emotional comfort, or is more required?

JESUS BEGINS TO MAKE DISCIPLES

JOHN 1:29-51

After 40 days in the wilderness and before heading back to Galilee, Jesus returns to John, who had baptized him. As Jesus approaches, John points him out and exclaims to those present: "See, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is the one about whom I said: 'Behind me there comes a man who has advanced in front of me, for he existed before me.'" (John 1:29, 30) Though John is a bit older than Jesus, he is aware that Jesus existed before him as a spirit person in heaven.

A few weeks earlier, when Jesus came to be baptized, John did not seem certain that Jesus was to be the Messiah. "Even I did not know him," John acknowledges, "but the reason why I came baptizing in water was so that he might be made manifest to Israel."—John 1:31.

John goes on to relate to his listeners what happened when he baptized Jesus: "I viewed the spirit coming down as a dove out of heaven, and it remained upon him. Even I did not know him, but the very One who sent me to baptize in water said to me: 'Whoever it is upon whom you see the spirit coming down and remaining, this is the one who baptizes in holy spirit.' And I have seen it, and I have given witness that this one is the Son of God."—John 1: 32-34.

John is with two of his disciples the next day when Jesus again approaches. John says: "See, the Lamb of God!" (John 1:36) At this, these two disciples of John the Baptist follow Jesus. One of the two is named Andrew. Likely the other is the very person who recorded this event, who is also named John. It seems that this John is a cousin of Jesus, being a son of Salome. She is probably Mary's sister, and her husband is Zebedee.



Turning and seeing Andrew and John following him, Jesus asks: "What are you looking for?"

"Rabbi," they ask him, "where are you staying?"

"Come, and you will see," answers Jesus.

—John 1:37-39.

It is about four o'clock in the afternoon, and Andrew and John stay with Jesus the rest of the day. Andrew is so excited that at one point he finds his brother Simon, also called Peter, and tells him: "We have found the Messiah." (John 1:41) Andrew takes Peter to Jesus. Later events suggest that John similarly finds his brother James and brings him to Jesus; yet, John does not include this personal detail in his record of events.

The next day, Jesus finds Philip, who is from Bethsaida. It is near the north shore of the Sea



of Galilee and is the home city of Andrew and Peter. Jesus invites Philip: "Be my follower." —John 1:43.

Philip then finds Nathanael, also called Bartholomew, and says: "We have found the one of whom Moses, in the Law, and the Prophets wrote: Jesus, the son of Joseph, from Nazareth." Nathanael is doubtful and says to Philip: "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?"

"Come and see," Philip urges him. Jesus notices Nathanael approaching and says: "See, truly an Israelite in whom there is no deceit."

"How do you know me?" Nathanael asks.

Jesus answers: "Before Philip called you, while you were under the fig tree, I saw you."

Nathanael replies in amazement: "Rabbi, you are the Son of God, you are King of Israel."


"Do you believe because I told you I saw you under the fig tree?" Jesus asks. "You will see

things greater than these." Then Jesus promises: "Most truly I say to you men, you will see heaven opened up and the angels of God ascending and descending to the Son of man." —John 1:45-51.

Very soon after this, Jesus, along with his newly acquired disciples, leaves the Jordan Valley and travels to Galilee.



See the Difference in People

"You will . . . see the distinction between a righteous person and a wicked person."—MAL. 3:18.

MANY health-care professionals work among those infected with contagious diseases. They care for their patients because they want to help them. In doing so, however, they need to protect themselves so that they do not become infected with the disease they are seeking to treat. Likewise, many of us live and work with those who are infected with attitudes and characteristics that run counter to godly qualities. This presents a challenge for us.

² These last days are a time of moral chaos. The apostle Paul's second letter to Timothy describes the characteristics of people who are alienated from God, characteristics that will become more pronounced in the days ahead. (Read 2 Timothy 3:1-5, 13.) Though we may be shocked by the prevalence of such qualities, we could be influenced by the behavior and attitudes of those who display them. (Prov. 13: 20) In this article, we will consider how the qualities that characterize people of the last days stand in contrast with the qualities of God's people. We will also see how we can protect

ourselves from being infected with negative traits while at the same time helping others spiritually.

³ "The last days," wrote the apostle Paul, would bring "critical times hard to deal with." He then listed 19 negative traits, or qualities, that would characterize people in this time period. The list is similar to the one found at Romans 1:29-31, though the list in Paul's letter to Timothy includes terms that are not mentioned elsewhere in the Christian Greek Scriptures. Paul introduces his list of ungodly qualities with the words "for men will be . . ." The term "men" should be understood to mean "people," since both men and women display such qualities. However, these are not qualities exhibited by all people. Christians have far different traits.—Read Malachi 3:18.

HOW WE VIEW OURSELVES

- 4 After stating that many would be lovers of themselves and of money, Paul wrote that people would also be boastful, haughty, and puffed up with pride, traits that often reflect a feeling of superiority because of one's abilities, appearance, wealth, or rank. People with such traits crave to be admired and adored. One scholar wrote the following about the person who has an all-consuming pride: "In his heart there is a little altar where he bows down before himself." Some have said that inordinate pride is so distasteful that even the proud dislike it in others.
 - ⁵ Jehovah certainly detests pride. He

hates "haughty eyes." (Prov. 6:16, 17) Pride hinders approach to God. (Ps. 10:4) It is a characteristic of the Devil. (1 Tim. 3:6) Sadly, though, even some loyal servants of Jehovah have become infected with pride. Uzziah, a king of Judah, proved faithful for years. "However," the Bible states, "as soon as he was strong, his heart became haughty to his own ruin, and he acted unfaithfully against Jehovah his God by entering the temple of Jehovah to burn incense on the altar of incense." Later, King Hezekiah too fell prey to haughtiness, though only temporarily.—2 Chron. 26:16; 32: 25, 26.

⁶ Some people become proud because of their good looks, popularity, musical ability, physical prowess, or exalted position. David had not just one of these assets but all of them; yet, he remained humble throughout his life. After he killed Goliath and was offered the daughter of King Saul to be his wife, David said: "Who am I and who are my relatives, my father's family in Israel, for me to become son-in-law to the king?" (1 Sam. 18:18) What helped David remain humble? The qualities, abilities, and privileges David had were because God 'stooped down,' or humbled himself, to pay attention to him. (Ps. 113: 5-8) David knew that he did not possess anything good that he had not received from Jehovah.—Compare 1 Corinthians 4:7.

⁷ Like David, Jehovah's people today strive to show humility. We are awed by the knowledge that Jehovah, the greatest Person in the universe, manifests the

appealing quality of humility. (Ps. 18:35) We take to heart the inspired counsel: "Clothe yourselves with the tender affections of compassion, kindness, humility, mildness, and patience." (Col. 3:12) We also know that love "does not brag, does not get puffed up." (1 Cor. 13:4) When we show humility, people may be drawn to Jehovah. Just as husbands can be won without a word by the conduct of their wives, others can be drawn to God by the humility shown by his people. -1 Pet. 3:1.

HOW WE RELATE TO OTHERS

8 Paul described how people living in the last days would relate to one another. He wrote that in the last days, children would be disobedient to parents. While such behavior is sometimes accepted and even encouraged in books. movies, and television programs today, disobedience undermines the stability of the most important social unit in society—the family. This principle has long been understood. Interestingly, in ancient Greece, if a man struck his parents, he would lose all his civil rights; in Roman law, to strike a father was as serious as murder. Both the Hebrew Scriptures and the Christian Greek Scriptures admonish children to honor their parents. -Ex. 20:12; Eph. 6:1-3.

⁹ Children can protect themselves from being infected with the spirit of disobedience by reflecting on what their parents have done for them. An appreciative attitude is bolstered by the understanding that obedience is required by God, the Father of us all. By speaking positively about their parents. young ones can help other youths view their own parents in a positive light. Of course, if parents have no natural affection for their children, it might be difficult for those children to obey from the heart. On the other hand, when a youngster senses his parents' genuine love, he is moved to please them even when he is tempted to disobey. "Though I often felt inclined to try to get away with things," admits Austin, "my parents set reasonable guidelines, explained the reasons for rules, and kept the lines of communication wide open. This helped me to be obedient. I could see that they cared for me, and that made me want to please them."

10 Paul lists other negative qualities that show that people lack love for one another. Fittingly, unthankful follows "disobedient to parents" because it describes the attitude of those who lack appreciation for the kindnesses shown to them by others. People would also be disloyal. They would not be open to any agreement, displaying an unwillingness to become reconciled to other people. They would be blasphemers and betrayers, directing abusive, injurious speech against humans and even against God. And there would be slanderers, people who voice damaging reports meant to destroy the good reputation of others.*

the widespread lack of love today, those who worship Jehovah have genuine love for their fellow man. This has always been true. Jesus said that love of neighbor, a form of *a-ga'pe*, was the second most important commandment in the Mosaic Law, second only to love of God. (Matt. 22:38, 39) Jesus also said that love for one another would be the quality that would identify true Christians. (Read John 13:34, 35.) Such Christian love would even be extended to one's enemies. —Matt. 5:43, 44.

12 Jesus showed great love for others. He went from city to city, telling people the good news about the Kingdom of God. He cured the blind, the lame, the lepers, and the deaf. He raised the dead. (Luke 7:22) Jesus even gave his own life in behalf of mankind, though many hated him. Jesus' love perfectly reflected the love his Father shows. Throughout the earth, Jehovah's Witnesses express godly love toward others.

12. How did Jesus show love for others?

13 The love we show for others draws people to our heavenly Father. A man in Thailand, for example, was touched by the love he saw among the brothers at a regional convention. Upon returning home, he asked to have a Bible study twice a week. He preached to all his relatives, and just six months after the convention, he gave his first Bible reading at the Kingdom Hall. To analyze how well we are doing in showing love for others, we might ask ourselves: 'Am I reaching out to help others in my family, in my congregation, and in my ministry? Do I strive to see others as Jehovah sees them?'

tance from such people. Godless ones would be without love of goodness, or as some translations render the expression, "haters of good" or "hostile to all goodness." They would be without self-control, fierce. Some would be headstrong, or impulsive and reckless.

¹⁵ Many who formerly displayed such animalistic qualities have changed for the better. This transformation was beautifully foretold in a Bible prophecy. (Read Isaiah 11:6, 7.) There we read about wild animals, such as wolves and lions, that live in peace with domestic animals, such as lambs and calves. Notice that this tranquil state of affairs will prevail "because the earth will certainly be filled with the knowledge of Jehovah." (Isa. 11:9) Since animals cannot learn about Jehovah, the spiritual fulfillment of this prophecy applies to people.

16 There are many who were once as fierce as wolves but who now live in peace with others. You can read some of their experiences in the series "The Bible Changes Lives," found on jw.org. Those who have come to know and serve Jehovah are not like those who have an appearance of godliness but prove false to its power, who behave as if they worship God but belie that claim by their conduct. Rather, formerly fierce people have "put on the new personality that was created according to God's will in true righteousness and loyalty." (Eph. 4: 23, 24) As people learn about God, they see the need to conform to his standards. They are then moved to make changes in their beliefs, attitudes, and conduct. Such changes are not easy but can be made because God's spirit will help those who sincerely desire to do God's will.

"FROM THESE TURN AWAY"

17 The distinction between those serving God and those not serving him is becoming increasingly evident. We who serve God must be careful that we do not become influenced by the unrighteous attitudes of others. Wisely, we heed the inspired counsel to turn away from those described at 2 Timothy 3:2-5. Of course, we cannot completely avoid people with ungodly traits. We might have to work with them, go to school with them, or live with them. But we can avoid being drawn into their thinking and imitating their characteristics. We do this by strengthening our spirituality through Bible study and close association with those who are determined to serve Jehovah.


¹⁸ We should also strive to help others spiritually. Look for opportunities to witness, asking Jehovah to help you say the right thing at the right time. We should let others know that we are Jehovah's Witnesses. That way, our fine conduct will bring glory to God and not to us. We have been trained "to reject ungodliness and worldly desires and to live with soundness of mind and righteousness and godly devotion amid this present system of things." (Titus 2:11-14) If we conduct ourselves in a godly way, others will observe us, and some may even say: "We want to go with you, for we have heard that God is with you people."—Zech. 8:23.
