5 What, then, is A-pol'los? Yes, what is Paul? Ministers^b through whom you became believers, just as the Lord granted each one. 6 I planted.c A-pol'los watered.d but God kept making it grow, 7 so that neither is the one who plants anything nor is the one who waters, but God who makes it grow. 8 Now the one who plants and the one who waters are one.* but each person will receive his own reward according to his own work,f 9 For we are God's fellow workers. 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An Introduction to First Corinthians

The Apostle Paul wrote this letter to the Christians living in the busy, cosmopolitan city of Corinth.

Paul stayed in Corinth during his second missionary journey and helped establish a congregation there.

During his third missionary journey, evidently while in Ephesus, Paul received a letter, as well as disturbing reports, about the congregation in Corinth.

It was about 55 C.E. when Paul wrote to the Corinthians to address these matters.

First Corinthians contains 16 chapters.

In chapters 1 to 4, Paul corrects the Corinthians' divisive thinking, and exhorts them to be united.

Paul reasons that it is unimportant who plants, or who waters, because God makes things grow.

In chapters 5 and 6, Paul addresses the serious matter of sexual immorality. There is an unrepentant wrongdoer among them. This man must be removed to protect the congregation. The congregation is urged to flee from sexual immorality.

Chapter 7 provides balanced counsel regarding both singleness and marriage.

In chapters 8 to 10, we learn that, sometimes, we should lovingly refrain from doing what we may have a right to do, so that we do not stumble others, or hinder people from accepting the good news.

Did you know? The Isthmian Games were held every two years near Corinth. Drawing on this familiar situation, Paul used the illustration of running a race to help the congregation in Corinth to understand the need for faithfulness and endurance.

An Introduction to First Corinthians

In chapter 11, Paul gives direction concerning the Lord's Evening Meal.

In chapter 12, Paul likens the congregation to the human body, to show that each member is important. Jehovah is pleased when we cooperate with one another unitedly.

Chapter 13 describes how love acts, and how it does not act.

Chapter 14 explains that congregation meetings should be orderly and harmonious.

In chapter 15, we find confirmation that the resurrection hope is certain. Paul refers to fulfilled prophecy, as well as eyewitness accounts of Jesus' resurrection. He explains that victory over sin and death comes through the ransom sacrifice of Jesus Christ.

In chapter 16, Paul gives direction regarding the collection for the impoverished Christians in Jerusalem.

As you read First Corinthians note how true Christians should remain united; how the congregation should uphold Jehovah's moral standards; and how belief in the resurrection of Jesus is fundamental to our receiving kingdom blessings.

4 Consider first the attitude of a physical individual. The world has a predominant attitude that centers on the flesh. Paul describes it as "the spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience." (Ephesians 2:2) This spirit influences most humans to adopt a common attitude—simply follow the crowd. They are focused on the flesh. As a result, the majority of them do what feels right in their own eyes and make no effort to live up to God's standards. A physical, or fleshly-minded, person is often excessively concerned about prestige and material pursuits or about defending what he feels are his rights.

5 What else might identify a physical person? People who engage in any of "the works of the flesh" fall into that category. (Galatians 5:19-21) Paul's first letter to the Corinthian congregation identifies a number of other characteristics of those who have a fleshly attitude. These include: promoting divisions, taking sides, fostering dissensions, taking one another to court, showing a lack of appreciation for headship, and being self-indulgent in food and drink. When confronted with temptation, the fleshly-minded person weakens and gives in. (Proverbs 7:21, 22) Jude spoke of those who would deteriorate even to the point of "not having spirituality."—Jude 18, 19.

What, then, does it mean to be a "spiritual man"? A spiritual person is inclined toward God, the opposite of the physical person. Spiritually-minded individuals strive to "become imitators of God." (Ephesians 5:1) This means that they make an effort to have Jehovah's thinking on matters and to look at things from his point of view. God is very real to them. In contrast with fleshly-minded individuals, they try to bring all their ways into harmony with Jehovah's standards. (Psalm 119:33; 143:10) Rather than focus on fleshly works, the spiritually-minded person endeavors to show "the fruitage of the spirit." (Galatians 5:22, 23) To clarify the expression "spiritually-minded" further, think of this comparison: An individual who is skillful in commercial affairs is said to be business-minded. Similarly, someone who keenly values spiritual or religious interests is called spiritually-minded.

How can we personally imitate Christ? The Bible at 1 Corinthians 2:16 speaks of having "the mind of Christ." And Romans 15:5 refers to having "the same mental attitude that Christ Jesus had." Therefore, to be like Christ, we need to know his pattern of thinking and the full range of his personality. Then we need to follow in his footsteps. Jesus' mind is focused on his relationship with God. So being like Jesus makes us more like Jehovah. For these reasons, it becomes clear how important it is to learn to think as Jesus does.

Digging for Spiritual Gems

So the world in its wisdom rejected God's provision through Christ as foolishness; its rulers, though they may have been able and judicious administrators, even "impaled the glorious Lord." (1 Corinthians 1:18; 2:7, 8) But God, in turn, was now proving the wisdom of the worldly wise to be foolishness, putting their wise men to shame by using what they considered "a foolish thing of God," as well as persons they deemed 'foolish, weak, and ignoble,' to accomplish His invincible purpose. (1 Corinthians 1:19-28) Paul reminded the Corinthian Christians that "the wisdom of this system of things [and] that of the rulers of this system of things" would come to nothing; hence such wisdom was not part of the apostle's spiritual message. (1 Corinthians 2:6, 13) He warned Christians in Colossae against being ensnared by "the philosophy [philosophi'as, literally, love of wisdom] and empty deception according to the tradition of men."—Colossians 2:8; compare verses 20-23.

While witnessing in Corinth, a center of Greek philosophy and learning, Paul may have been concerned about whether he would be able to persuade his listeners. However, he did not allow any weakness or fear he might have had to interfere with the carrying out of his God-given ministry. Likewise, we should not permit unusual circumstances to hold us back from declaring the good news of God's Kingdom. We can confidently look to Jehovah for help as did Paul.



Writing Good Letters

WHY IMPORTANT: The book of 1 Corinthians is one of 14 letters written by the apostle Paul to encourage fellow Christians. A letter allows the writer to choose his words carefully, and it can be read repeatedly by the recipient. Letters are a good way to witness to relatives and acquaintances. They are also an effective means of giving a witness to those we are unable to speak to in person. For example, someone may have shown interest but is hard to find at home. Some in our territory may be difficult to reach because they live in high-security apartment buildings, gated communities, or isolated places. What are some things to keep in mind, especially when writing to a stranger?





HOW TO DO IT:

- Say what you would have said in person. Introduce
 yourself in the beginning of the letter, and state clearly
 why you are writing. Perhaps pose a question for the person to think about, and refer him to our website. Then tell
 him about the Online Bible Study Lessons, outline our
 home Bible study program, or cite some of the chapter titles from one of our study aids. Literature, such as a contact card, an invitation, or a tract, can be enclosed
- Be brief. Conclude your letter before the recipient might tire of reading it.—See the sample letter on page 8
- Proofread it for errors and legibility. Make sure it sounds friendly, tactful, and positive. Affix sufficient postage

Sample Letter

- Use your own return address.
 If you feel that it would be unwise to give your own address, you may use the Kingdom Hall address if the elders give you permission to do so. However, you should NEVER use the address of the branch office as your return address.
- Use the person's name if you know it. This will avoid giving the impression that the letter is a commercial advertisement.
- Give attention to proper spelling, grammar, and punctuation. The letter should look neat, not messy. If it is handwritten, it should be easy to read. The wording should be neither too casual nor too formal.

The included sample letter illustrates these points. It is not meant to be copied word for word each time you write someone in your territory. Tailor your letter according to its purpose and local circumstances and customs.



Ed (Publisher 1): I'm Ed, and this is my friend Chris.

Householder: I'm Pete.

Publisher 1: Perhaps the next time we talk I can show you what the Bible says about why Jesus died. Are you usually home at this time?

WHO IS THE SON OF MAN?

MATTHEW 16:13-27 MARK 8:22-38 LUKE 9:18-26

Jesus and his disciples arrive at Bethsaida. The people then bring a blind man to him and beg Jesus to touch the man to heal him.

Taking the man by the hand, Jesus leads him outside the village. After spitting on the man's eyes, Jesus asks him: "Do you see anything?" The man replies: "I see people, but they look like trees walking about." (Mark 8:23, 24) Laying his hands on the man's eyes, Jesus restores his sight. He then sends home the man who can now see clearly, instructing him not to enter into the village.

Next, Jesus and his disciples travel northward to the region of Caesarea Philippi. It is a long ascent, covering about 25 miles. The village is at an elevation of 1,150 feet above sea level, with snowcapped Mount Hermon rising to the northeast. The trip probably takes a couple of days.

At one point along the way, Jesus goes off to pray alone. Only about nine or ten months remain before his death, and Jesus is concerned about his disciples. Many have recently left off following him, and others apparently are confused or disappointed. They may be wondering why he rejected the people's efforts to make him king or why he would not provide a sign to show unquestionably who he really is.

When the disciples come to where he is praying, Jesus asks: "Who are men saying the Son of man is?" They reply: "Some say John the Baptist, others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." Yes, people think that Jesus may actually be one of those men raised from the dead. To draw out their thinking, Jesus asks his disciples: "You, though, who do you say I am?" Peter quickly replies: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God."—Matthew 16:13-16.

Jesus says that Peter can be happy that God revealed this to him, adding: "I say to you: You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my congregation, and the gates of the Grave will not overpower it." Jesus means that he himself will build a congregation and that even the Grave will not hold captive its members if they maintain a faithful course on earth. He promises Peter: "I will give you the keys of the Kingdom of the heavens."—Matthew 16:18, 19.

Jesus does not give Peter first place among the apostles, nor does Jesus make him the foundation of the congregation. Jesus himself is the Rock upon which his congregation will be built. (1 Corinthians 3:11; Ephesians 2:20) Peter, though, is to receive three keys. He will have the privilege of opening, as it were, the opportunity for groups of people to enter the Kingdom of the heavens.




Peter would use the first key at Pente-cost 33 C.E., showing repentant Jews and proselytes what they must do to be saved. He would use the second to open to believing Samaritans the opportunity to enter God's Kingdom. Then, in 36 C.E., Peter would use the third to extend that opportunity to uncircumcised Gentiles, Cornelius and others.—Acts 2:37, 38; 8: 14-17: 10:44-48.

In this discussion, Jesus' apostles are troubled when he foretells the sufferings and death that he will soon face in Jerusalem. Not grasping that Jesus is to be resurrected to heavenly life, Peter takes him aside and rebukes him, saying: "Be kind to yourself, Lord; you will not have this happen to you at all." But Jesus turns his back and answers: "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me, because you think, not God's thoughts, but those of men." —Matthew 16:22, 23.

Jesus now calls others besides the apostles and explains that it will not be easy to be his follower. He says: "If anyone wants to come after me, let him disown himself and pick up his torture stake and keep following me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and for the sake of the good news will save it."—Mark 8:34, 35.

Yes, to prove worthy of Jesus' favor, his followers must be courageous and self-sacrificing. Jesus states: "Whoever becomes ashamed



of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, the Son of man will also be ashamed of him when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels." (Mark 8:38) Yes, when Jesus thus comes, "he will repay each one according to his behavior."—Matthew 16:27.





We Guard Our Hearts

PREVIEW

Will we remain faithful to Jehovah, or will we allow Satan to lure us away from our God? The answer depends, not on how severely we are tested, but on how well we safeguard our heart. What is meant by the word "heart"? How does Satan try to corrupt our heart? And how can we safeguard it? This article will answer those important questions.

How Can You Safeguard Your Heart?

"Above all the things that you guard, safeguard your heart."—PROV. 4:23.

SOLOMON became king of Israel when he was just a young man. In the early part of his reign, Jehovah appeared to him in a dream and said: "Ask what you would like me to give you." Solomon replied: "I am just a youth and I am inexperienced.... So grant your servant an obedient heart to judge your people." (1 Ki. 3:5-10) "An obedient heart"—what a modest request that was! No wonder Jehovah loved Solomon! (2 Sam. 12:24) Our God was so pleased with the young king's answer that he gave Solomon "a wise and understanding heart."—1 Ki. 3:12.

- ² As long as he was faithful, Solomon enjoyed many blessings. He had the honor of building a temple "for the name of Jehovah the God of Israel." (1 Ki. 8:20) He became famous for his God-given wisdom. And the things he said when he was inspired by God are recorded in three books of the Bible. One of these is the book of Proverbs.
- ³ The heart is mentioned about a hundred times in the book of Proverbs. For example, at Proverbs 4:23, we read: "Above all the things that you guard, safeguard your heart." In this verse, what does the word "heart" refer to? We will answer that question in this article. We will also consider the answers to two other questions: How does Satan try to infect, or corrupt, our heart? And what can we do to safeguard our heart? To remain faith-

ful to God, we need to understand the answers to those important questions.

"YOUR HEART"—WHAT IS IT?

- ⁴ At Proverbs 4:23, the term "heart" is used to refer to "the inner person" or "secret self." (**Read Psalm 51:6 and footnote.**) In other words, "heart" refers to our private thoughts, feelings, motives, and desires. It is who we really are on the inside, not just who we appear to be on the outside.
- ⁵ Consider how our physical health illustrates the importance of who we are on the inside. First, to keep ourselves in good condition on the inside, we must choose a healthy diet, and we need to exercise regularly. Likewise, to keep ourselves in good spiritual condition, we must choose a healthy diet of spiritual food and regularly exercise our faith in Jehovah. That form of exercise in-

volves applying what we learn and speaking about our faith. (Rom. 10:8-10; Jas. 2:26) Second, based on outward appearance, we might think that we are healthy even though we are actually diseased on the inside. In a similar way, based on our theocratic routine, we may think that our faith is strong, but wrong desires could be growing in us. (1 Cor. 10:12; Jas. 1:14, 15) We must remember that Satan would like to infect us with his thinking. How, specifically, might he try to do that? And how can we protect ourselves?

HOW SATAN TRIES TO INFECT OUR HEART

- 6 Satan wants us to become like him—a rebel who ignores Jehovah's standards and is motivated by selfishness. Satan cannot force us to reason and act as he does. So he tries to achieve his goal in other ways. For example, he surrounds us with people who are already corrupted by him. (1 John 5:19) He


hopes that we will choose to spend time with them, even though we know that bad associations will "spoil" or "corrupt" the way we think and act. (1 Cor. 15:33; ftn.) That tactic worked with King Solomon. He married many pagan women, and they eventually "had a powerful influence over him" and "gradually inclined his heart" away from Jehovah. —1 Ki. 11:3; ftn.

⁷ Satan uses movies and television shows to spread his way of thinking. He understands that storytelling does much more than entertain us; it teaches us how to think, feel, and act. Jesus made good use of this method of teaching. Take, for example, his parables of the neighborly Samaritan and of the son who left home and wasted his inher-

itance. (Matt. 13:34; Luke 10:29-37; 15:11-32) However, those who are infected with Satan's thinking can use storytelling to corrupt us. We need to be balanced. Movies and TV shows can entertain and educate us without contaminating our thinking. But we must be cautious. When choosing entertainment, we do well to ask ourselves, 'Is this movie or TV show teaching me that it is all right to give in to my fleshly desires?' (Gal. 5:19-21; Eph. 2:1-3) What should you do if you detect that a program is promoting satanic thinking? Avoid it as you would a contagious disease!

8 Parents, you have a special responsibility to safeguard your children from Satan's efforts to infect their heart. You no doubt do all you can to protect your children from literal diseases. You keep

your home clean, and you throw out anything that might cause you or your children to get sick. In the same way, you need to protect your children from movies, TV shows, electronic games, and websites that are likely to infect them with Satan's thinking. Jehovah has given you the authority to care for the spiritual health of your children. (Prov. 1:8; Eph. 6:1, 4) So do not be afraid to set household rules that are based on Bible standards. Tell your young children what they can and cannot watch, and help them to understand the reasons for your decisions. (Matt. 5:37) As your children get older, train them to discern for themselves what is right and what is wrong according to Jehovah's standards. (Heb. 5: 14) And remember, your children will learn a lot from what you say but even more from what you do.—Deut. 6:6, 7; Rom. 2:21.

9 Satan also tries to infect our heart by getting us to trust human wisdom rather than Jehovah's thinking. (Col. 2:8) Consider just one idea promoted by Satan —that getting rich should be a primary goal in life. Those who think this way might become wealthy, or they might not. Either way, they are in danger. Why? Because they may become so focused on making money that they will sacrifice their health, their family relationships, and even their friendship with God just to reach their goal. (1 Tim. 6:10) We can be grateful that our wise heavenly Father helps us to have a balanced view of money.—Eccl. 7:12; Luke 12:15.

HOW CAN WE SAFEGUARD OUR HEART?

10 If we are to succeed in safeguarding our heart, we must be able to identify dangers and react quickly to protect ourselves. The word translated "safeguard" at Proverbs 4:23 reminds us of the work done by a watchman. In King Solomon's day, watchmen stood guard on the walls of a city and sounded an alarm if they saw danger approaching. That mental picture helps us understand what we must do to stop Satan from corrupting our thinking.

¹¹ In ancient times, watchmen worked closely with city gatekeepers. (2 Sam. 18:24-26) Together, they helped protect the city by making sure that the gates were closed whenever an enemy came near. (Neh. 7:1-3) Our Bible-trained conscience* can act as our watchman and warn us when Satan tries to invade our heart—in other words, when he tries to influence our thoughts, feelings, motives, or desires. Whenever our conscience sounds the alarm, we need to listen and shut the gate, so to speak.

¹² Consider an example of how we can protect ourselves from being influenced by Satan's thinking. Jehovah has taught

^{*} EXPRESSION EXPLAINED: Jehovah gave us the ability to examine our own thoughts, feelings, and actions and then to judge ourselves. The Bible calls that ability the conscience. (Rom. 2:15; 9:1) A Bible-trained conscience is one that uses Jehovah's standards, as explained in the Bible, to judge if what we think, do, or say is good or bad.

us that "sexual immorality and every sort of uncleanness [should] not even be mentioned among [us]." (Eph. 5:3) But what will we do if peers at work or at school start talking about sexually immoral topics? We know that we should "reject ungodliness and worldly desires." (Titus 2:12) The watchman, our conscience, might sound an alarm. (Rom. 2:15) But will we listen to it? We might be tempted, instead, to listen to our peers or to look at pictures they might be sharing. But this is the time to close the city gates, so to speak, by changing the conversation or by walking away.

13 It takes courage to resist pressure from our peers to think about or to do wrong things. We can be sure that Jehovah sees the effort we make, and he will give us the strength and wisdom we need to resist satanic thinking. (2 Chron. 16:9; Isa. 40:29; Jas. 1:5) How, though, can we continue to do our part in safeguarding our heart?

STAY ON GUARD

14 To safeguard our heart, we must not only close it to wrong influences but also open it to positive influences. Think again about the illustration of a walled city. A gatekeeper closed the gates of the city to stop an enemy invasion, but at other times he opened the gates to allow food and other supplies to be brought in. If the gates were never open, the inhabitants of the city would starve. Similarly,

we need to open our heart regularly to the influence of God's thinking.

15 The Bible contains Jehovah's thinking, so each time we read it, we allow Jehovah's thoughts to affect the way we think, feel, and act. How can we get the most from our Bible reading? Prayer is vital. One Christian sister says: "Before I read the Bible, I pray to Jehovah, asking that he help me 'see clearly the wonderful things' in his Word." (Ps. 119:18) We also need to meditate on what we read. When we pray, read, and meditate, God's Word reaches "deep within [our] heart," and we come to love Jehovah's thinking.

Read Proverbs 4:20-22; Ps. 119:97.

16 Another way we allow God's thinking to influence us is by watching the material available on JW Broadcasting®. One couple says: "The monthly programs have truly been an answer to our prayers! They have strengthened us and lifted us up when we feel sad or lonely. And the original songs are a constant feature in our house. We play them while cooking, cleaning, or just having tea." These programs help us to safeguard our heart. They teach us to think the way Jehovah does and to resist the pressure to adopt Satan's thinking.

¹⁷ Each time we see the benefits of doing what is right, our faith grows stronger. (Jas. 1:2, 3) We feel good because we have made Jehovah proud to call us one of his children, and our

desire to please him becomes stronger. (Prov. 27:11) Each test becomes an opportunity to show that we are not halfhearted about serving our caring Father. (Ps. 119:113) Instead, we prove that we love Jehovah with a complete heart, one that is fully resolved to obey his commandments and to do his will.

-Read 1 Kings 8:61.

¹⁸ Will we make mistakes? Yes; we are imperfect. If we do stumble, remember King Hezekiah's example. He made mistakes. But he repented and kept on serving Jehovah "with a complete heart." (Isa. 38:3-6; 2 Chron. 29:1, 2; 32:25, 26)

Let us, then, reject Satan's attempts to infect us with his thinking. Let us pray that we develop "an obedient heart." (1 Ki. 3:9; **read Psalm 139:23, 24.)** We can remain faithful to Jehovah if, above all else, we safeguard our heart.
