

to comfort othersa in any sort of trial# with the comfort that we receive from God.b 5 For just as the sufferings for the Christ abound in us, c so the comfort we receive through the Christ also abounds. 6 Now if we face trials,# it is for your comfort and salvation: and if we are being comforted, it is for your comfort, which acts to help you to endure the same sufferings that we also suffer. 7 And our hope for you is unwavering, knowing as we do that just as you share in the sufferings, so you will also share in the comfort.d

8 For we do not want you to be unaware, brothers, of the

tribulation we experienced in the province of Asia.^a We were under extreme pressure bevond our own strength, so that we were very uncertain even of our lives.b 9 In fact, we felt that we had received the sentence of death. do I purpose things in a fleshly way, so that I am saying "Yes, ves" and then "No. no"? 18 But God can be relied on that what we say to you is not "yes" and yet "no." 19 For the Son of God, Jesus Christ, who was preached among you through us, that is, through me and Sil·va'nus* and Timothy, a did not become "yes" and yet "no," but "yes" has become "yes" in his case. 20 For no matter how many the promises of God are, they have become "yes" by means of him.b Therefore, also through him is the "Amen" said to God,c which brings him glory through us. 21 But the one who guarantees that you and we belong to Christ and the one who anointed us is God.d 22 He has also put his seal on use and has given us the token of what is to come,* that is, the spirit, in our hearts.

23 Now I call on God as a witness against me* that it is to spare you that I have not yet come to Corinth. 24 Not that we are the masters over your faith, but we are fellow workers for your joy, for it is by your faith that you are standing.

Are we starting to an amend ourselves again? surec in earthen vessels.*d so that the power beyond what is normal may be God's and not from us.e 8 We are hardpressed in every way, but not cramped beyond movement: we are perplexed, but not absolutely with no way out;*f 9 we are persecuted, but not abandoned:g we are knocked down. but not destroyed.h 10 Always we endure in our body the death-dealing treatment that Jesus suffered, that the life of Jesus may also be made manifest in our body. 11 For we who live are ever being brought face-toface with death for Jesus' sake. so that the life of Jesus may also be made manifest in our mortal flesh. 12 So death is at work in us, but life in you.

Our Father of tender mercies has himself experienced the loss of loved ones, such as Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, and King David. (Numbers 12:6-8; Matthew 22:31, 32; Acts 13:22) God's Word assures us that Jehovah has eagerly anticipated—has had an earnest longing for—the time when he will bring them back to life. (Job 14:14, 15) They will be happy and in vibrant health. Consider, too, that God's dearly beloved Son—"the one he was especially fond of"—died an agonizing death. (Proverbs 8:22, 30) Words cannot express the pain Jehovah must have suffered.—John 5:20; 10:17.

2 Corinthians 1:4—We comfort others with the comfort Jehovah provides

Understandably, then, it can be difficult to know what to say to someone who is overwhelmed by grief. Nevertheless, the Bible states that "the tongue of the wise is a healing." (Proverbs 12:18) Many have found comforting thoughts to share from the brochure When Someone You Love Dies. Often, though, the most helpful thing you can do is to "weep with those who weep." (Romans 12:15) "Tears have become the language of my heart," admits Gaby, whose husband died. "That is why I get some comfort when friends cry with me. At that moment, I don't feel quite so alone in my grief."

Token: According to one reference work, the Greek term translated "token" at 2 Corinthians 1:22 was "a legal and commercial technical term" meaning "first instalment, deposit, down payment, pledge, that pays a part of

the purchase price in advance, and so secures a legal claim to the article in question, or makes a contract valid." In the case of anointed ones, the full payment, or reward, is described at 2 Corinthians 5:1-5 as involving the putting on of an incorruptible heavenly body. The reward also includes receiving the gift of immortality.—1 Corinthians 15:48-54.

In modern Greek, a related expression is used for an engagement ring. This is a fitting illustration for those who will become part of Christ's figurative wife.—2 Corinthians 11:2; Revelation 21:2, 9.

Seal: In the past, a seal was used as a signature to prove ownership, authenticity, or agreement. In the case of the anointed, they are "sealed," or branded, figuratively by holy spirit as God's possession. (Ephesians 1:13, 14) This seal is not made permanent, though, until either sometime before the person dies faithful or sometime before the outbreak of the great tribulation.—Ephesians 4:30; Revelation 7:2-4.

2 Corinthians 2:14-16: But thanks be to God, who always leads us in a triumphal procession in company with the Christ and through us spreads the fragrance of the knowledge of him in every place! For to God we are a sweet fragrance of Christ among those who are being saved and among those who are perishing; to the latter ones an odor of death leading to death, to the former ones a fragrance of life leading to life. And who is adequately qualified for these things?

w10 8/1 23

Paul wrote: "God . . . leads us in a triumphal procession in company with the Christ and makes the odor of the knowledge of him perceptible through us in every place! For to God we are a sweet odor of Christ among those who are being saved and among those who are perishing; to the latter ones an odor issuing from death to death, to the former ones an odor issuing from life to life."—2 Corinthians 2:14-16.

The apostle was referring to the Roman practice of holding a celebratory procession to honor a general for his victory over enemies of the State. At such events, both the spoils and the prisoners of war were put on display and bulls were led to the sacrifice while the victorious general and his army received public acclaim. At the end of the procession, the bulls were sacrificed and many of the prisoners were likely executed.

The metaphor of the "sweet odor of Christ" signifying life for some and death for others is "probably drawn from the Roman practice of burning incense along the way of the procession," says The International Standard Bible Encyclopedia. "The fragrance that signified triumph to the victors reminded the captives of the execution that likely awaited them."*

THE RANSOM —GOD'S GREATEST GIFT

WHAT is the best gift you have ever received? A gift doesn't have to be expensive to be valuable to you. When a gift makes you happy or is something you really need, you feel grateful for it.

² Of all the gifts that God has given us, there is one gift that we need more than anything else. It is God's greatest gift to humans. In this chapter, we will learn that Jehovah sent his Son, Jesus Christ, so that we can live forever. (**Read Matthew 20:28.**) By sending Jesus to the earth as a ransom, Jehovah has proved that he really loves us.

WHAT IS THE RANSOM?

- ³ The ransom is Jehovah's way of freeing humans from sin and death. (Ephesians 1:7) To understand why the ransom was needed, we have to know what happened thousands of years ago in the garden of Eden. Our first parents, Adam and Eve, sinned. Because they sinned, they died. We also die because we inherited sin from Adam and Eve.—See Endnote 9.
 - 4 When Jehovah created the first man, Adam, He

gave him something very precious. He gave Adam perfect human life. He had a perfect mind and a perfect body. He would never get sick, would never grow old, and would never die. Because Jehovah created Adam, He was like a father to him. (Luke 3: 38) Jehovah regularly talked to him. God clearly explained to Adam what he expected from him and gave him enjoyable work to do.—Genesis 1:28-30; 2: 16, 17.

⁵ Adam was created "in God's image." (Genesis 1: 27) Jehovah gave him qualities like His own, including love, wisdom, justice, and power. He gave Adam free will. Adam was not a robot. God created him so that he could choose to do right or wrong. If Adam had chosen to obey God, he could have lived forever in Paradise.

⁶ When he disobeyed God and was sentenced to death, Adam paid a very high price. He lost his special friendship with Jehovah, his perfect life, and his Paradise home. (Genesis 3:17-19) Adam and Eve chose to disobey God, so there was no hope for them. Because of what Adam did, "sin entered into the world and death through sin, and so death spread to all men because they had all sinned." (Romans 5:12) When Adam sinned, he "sold" himself and us into slavery to sin and death. (Romans 7:14) Is there any hope for us? Yes, there is.

Live Jacobsen - Norway: I have an illness that affects my level of energy, so I didn't feel that I could accept just any kind of assignment.

Miyuki Ikeda - Japan: Since the end of this system is near, I want to do whatever I can that Jehovah wants, down to the very end. So I applied.

Bianca Kaese - Namibia: Before attending SKE, when I received my invitation, all of a sudden I had challenges or worries about myself. I felt unworthy, even unqualified.

Bridgett Harris – United States: Being a single sister, going into the class with so many couples, I thought I would be out of place.

Sadao Ikeda - Japan: I used all my abilities. I felt like my head was swelling up. Even so, I felt that I was really being refined and ended each day feeling fulfilled.

Bianca Kaese - Namibia: Something that I really enjoyed about SKE was Friday afternoons. That's when we had a talk from one of the Governing Body members. That was special.

David Jacobsen - Norway: During the eight weeks of school, such an emphasis was placed on serving where the need is greater. So this way of thinking became more important to us.

Live Jacobsen - Norway: After eight weeks attending the school, you are even ready to be sent to the moon.

Bridgett Harris – United States: When I was told that my next assignment would be in Mesa, Arizona, I thought, "Where is that?" And then I thought, "Oh, no, scorpions!" And then I thought, "Okay. This is where Jehovah thinks I should be, so I'm ready to go."

Bianca Kaese - Namibia: One of the challenges in my new assignment was finding suitable accommodation. There was a couple in the congregation. They had two rooms that they rented in the back of their property, but it needed some renovations. So the brothers very quickly came together,

Live Jacobsen - Norway: One of the things that really helped me was an experienced brother who gave an encouraging comment about whether my health would permit me to attend the school. He said, "If she can pioneer, then it's also possible for her to attend the school."

Bianca Kaese - Namibia: The education that we received at SKE especially it helped us with our qualities, our personality, putting on a new personality. That really will help us not only now in our assignment but right through into the new world.

Sadao Ikeda - Japan: I think there are many who could meet the qualifications with just a little more effort. Please know that there is a wonderful education program, and we were able to experience it in our 60's. We could get through it. So, if others are thinking of applying, I want to tell them that we were able to do it, and by all means, I want them to taste the same joy that we experienced.

Live Jacobsen - Norway: You could be nervous and have performance anxiety and worry about, "How will I handle answering, and how about all of the student assignments, and the tests?" Worries like that. But for my own part, it was two months with an incredible amount of joy. And you have to focus on that. It is a gift. It is a wonderful gift from Jehovah.

Bridgett Harris – United States: I wasn't sure if I was going to put in the application because it thought maybe I wanted to do it as a couple rather than as a single person. But I prayed to Jehovah about it, and I put my application

THE NEED TO FORGIVE

MATTHFW 18:21-35

Peter has heard Jesus' advice on how to handle a difficulty between brothers by trying to settle it one-on-one. Yet, Peter seems to want to quantify the number of times one should make such an effort.


Peter asks: "Lord, how many times is my brother to sin against me and am I to forgive him? Up to seven times?" Some religious leaders teach that one should grant forgiveness up to three times. So Peter may feel that he would be very generous if he forgave a brother "up to seven times."—Matthew 18:21.

However, the idea of keeping such a record of wrongs is not in the spirit of Jesus' teaching. So he corrects Peter: "I say to you, not up to seven times, but up to 77 times." (Matthew 18:22) That, in other words, means indefinitely. There should be no limit to the number of times Peter forgives his brother.

Jesus then tells Peter and the others an illustration to impress on them their obligation to be forgiving. It is about a slave who fails to imitate his merciful master. The king wants to settle accounts with his slaves. One slave who owes the enormous debt of 10,000 talents [60,000,000 denarii] is brought to him. There is no possible way he can pay that debt. So the king orders that the slave, his wife, and his children be sold and payment be made. At that, the slave falls down at his master's feet and begs: "Be patient with me, and I will pay back everything to you."—Matthew 18:26.

The king is moved with pity and mercifully cancels the slave's huge debt. Once the king has done so, this slave goes and finds a fellow slave who owes him 100 denarii. He grabs the other slave and begins choking him, saying: "Pay back whatever you owe." But that fellow slave





you in the same way if each of you does not forgive your brother from your heart."—Matthew 18:32-35. What a lesson that should teach us about for-

What a lesson that should teach us about forgiveness! God has forgiven us a large debt of sin. Whatever transgression a Christian brother commits against us is small in comparison. And Jehovah forgives us not once but thousands of times. Can we not forgive our brother a number of times, even if we have a cause for complaint? As Jesus taught in the Sermon on the Mount, God will "forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors."—Matthew 6:12.

falls at the feet of the slave to whom he is in debt, begging: "Be patient with me, and I will pay you back." (Matthew 18:28, 29) However, the slave whose debt the king forgave does not imitate his master. He has his fellow slave, who owes much less, thrown into prison until he can pay what he owes.

Jesus then relates that other slaves who see this unmerciful treatment go and tell the master, who angrily summons the slave and says: "Wicked slave, I canceled all that debt for you when you pleaded with me. Should you not also have shown mercy to your fellow slave as I showed mercy to you?" The angry king delivers the unmerciful slave over to the jailers until he repays all that he owes. Jesus concludes: "My heavenly Father will also deal with



Love and Justice in Ancient Israel

"He loves righteousness and justice. The earth is filled with Jehovah's loyal love."—Ps. 33:5.

ALL of us want to be loved. And all of us want to be treated fairly. If we are repeatedly denied love and justice, we may feel worthless and hopeless.

- ² Jehovah knows that we long for love and yearn for justice. (Ps. 33:5) We can be sure that our God loves us dearly and wants us to be treated fairly. This becomes evident when we look closely at the Law that Jehovah gave to the nation of Israel through Moses. If you have a heart starved for affection or a spirit crushed by injustice, please consider how the Mosaic Law* reveals Jehovah's concern for his people.
- ³ When we study the Mosaic Law, we discover the warm feelings of our loving God, Jehovah. (Read Romans 13: 8-10.) In this article, we will examine just a few of the laws given to Israel and answer these questions: Why can we say that the Law was built on love? Why can we say that the Law promoted justice? How were those with authority required to administer the Law? And whom did the Law specifically protect? The answers to those questions can bring us comfort, give us hope, and draw us closer to our loving Father.—Acts 17:27; Rom. 15:4.

^{*} EXPRESSION EXPLAINED: The 600 and more laws that Jehovah gave to the Israelites through Moses are referred to as "the Law," "the Law of Moses," "the Mosaic Law," and "the commandments." In addition, the first five books of the Bible (Genesis through Deuteronomy) are often referred to as the Law. Sometimes this term is used with reference to the entire inspired Hebrew Scriptures.

A LAW CODE BUILT ON LOVE

- 4 We can say that the Mosaic Law was built on love because love motivates all that Jehovah does. (1 John 4:8) Jehovah founded that entire code of laws on two basic commands—love God, and love your neighbor. (Lev. 19:18; Deut. 6:5; read Matthew 22:36-40.) So we can expect that each of the 600 and more commandments that make up the Law reveals a facet of Jehovah's love. Let us look at some examples.
- ⁵ Be loyal to your marriage mate, and care for your children. Jehovah wants married couples to develop a love so strong that it lasts for life. (Gen. 2: 24; Matt. 19:3-6) Adultery is one of the most unloving crimes a person can commit. With good reason, the seventh of the Ten Commandments prohibited adultery. (Deut. 5:18) It is a sin "against God" and a cruel blow to a marriage mate. (Gen. 39:7-9) A victim of adultery might feel the pain of betrayal for decades.
- 6 Jehovah is keenly aware of how marriage mates treat each other. He particularly wanted Israelite wives to be treated well. A husband who respected the Law would love his wife and would not divorce her for trivial reasons. (Deut. 24: 1-4; Matt. 19:3, 8) But if a serious problem arose and he did divorce her, he had to give her a certificate of divorce. This certificate protected a woman from false accusations of immorality. In addition,

before the husband could give his wife

- cares deeply about the welfare of children. Jehovah commanded parents to provide not only for their children's physical needs but also for their spiritual needs. Parents were to take every opportunity to help their children appreciate Jehovah's Law and learn to love him. (Deut. 6:6-9: 7:13) One of the reasons the Israelites were punished by Jehovah was that they mistreated some of their children in a shocking way. (Jer. 7:31, 33) Parents were to view their children. not as mere property that they could neglect or mistreat, but as an inheritance, a gift from Jehovah to be cherished.—Ps. 127:3.
- 8 Lessons: Jehovah pays close attention to how marriage mates treat each other. He wants parents to love their children, and he holds parents accountable for the way they treat them.
- 9 Do not covet. The last of the Ten Commandments prohibited coveting, or developing a wrong desire for what belongs to another. (Deut. 5:21; Rom. 7:7)

the certificate of divorce, he apparently had to consult the city elders. In this way, the elders would have the opportunity to try to help the couple save their marriage. When an Israelite man divorced his wife for selfish reasons, Jehovah did not always intervene. Nevertheless, he saw the tears that the wife shed, and he felt her pain.—Mal. 2:13-16. ⁷ The Law also reveals that Jehovah

Jehovah gave this law to teach a valuable lesson—his people must guard their heart, that is, their thoughts, feelings, and reasonings. He knows that wicked acts begin as wicked thoughts and feelings. (Prov. 4:23) If an Israelite allowed wrong desires to grow in his heart, he would likely treat others in an unloving way. King David, for example, fell into that trap. Normally, he was a good man. But on one occasion, he coveted another man's wife. His desire led to sin. (Jas. 1:14, 15) David committed adultery. tried to deceive the woman's husband, and then had him killed.—2 Sam. 11:2-4; 12:7-11.

¹⁰ Jehovah knew when an Israelite broke the law about coveting—He can read hearts. (1 Chron. 28:9) The law against coveting told his people that they should avoid thoughts that lead to bad behavior. What a wise and loving Father Jehovah is!

¹¹ *Lessons*: Jehovah sees beyond a person's outward appearance. He sees what we really are inside, in our heart. (1 Sam. 16:7) No thought, no feeling, no action can be kept secret from him. He looks for and encourages the good in us. But he wants us to identify and control wrong thoughts before they become wrong actions.—2 Chron. 16:9: Matt. 5:27-30.

A LAW CODE THAT PROMOTED JUSTICE

12 The Mosaic Law also emphasizes that Jehovah loves justice. (Ps. 37:28; Isa. 61:8) He set the perfect example of how to treat others fairly. When the Israelites obeyed the laws that Jehovah gave, he blessed them. When they ignored his just

and righteous standards, they suffered. Consider two more laws from the Ten Commandments.

13 Worship Jehovah exclusively. The first two of the Ten Commandments required that the Israelites devote themselves exclusively to Jehovah and warned against the worship of idols. (Ex. 20:3-6) Those commandments were not for Jehovah's benefit. Rather, they were for the benefit of his people. When his people remained loyal to him, they prospered. When they worshipped the gods of other nations, they suffered.

14 Think about the Canaanites. They worshipped lifeless idols rather than the true and living God. As a result, they degraded themselves. (Ps. 115:4-8) As part of their worship, they engaged in defiling sexual acts and horrifying child sacrifices. Likewise, when the Israelites ignored Jehovah and chose to worship idols, they degraded themselves and hurt their families. (2 Chron. 28:1-4) Those in authority abandoned Jehovah's standards of justice. They abused their power and oppressed weak and vulnerable ones. (Ezek. 34:1-4) Jehovah warned the Israelites that he would execute judgment on those who victimized defenseless women and children. (Deut. 10:17, 18; 27:19) By contrast, Jehovah blessed his people when they were loyal to him and treated one another justly. -1 Ki. 10:4-9.

nore his standards and harm his people. However, Jehovah loves us and knows when we suffer injustice. He feels our pain more keenly than a mother feels the suffering of her baby. (Isa. 49:15) Although he may not intervene immediately, in due time he will hold unrepentant wrongdoers to account for the way they have treated others.

HOW WAS THE LAW TO BE ADMINISTERED?

16 The Mosaic Law covered many aspects of an Israelite's life, so it was vital that the appointed older men judge Jehovah's people with righteous judgment. They were responsible for handling not only spiritual matters but also civil and criminal cases. Note the following examples.

¹⁷ If an Israelite killed someone, he was not arbitrarily executed. The elders of his city would investigate the circumstances before deciding if the death penalty was appropriate. (Deut. 19:2-7, 11-13) The elders also judged numerous aspects of daily life-from resolving public controversies over property to settling private marital disputes. (Ex. 21:35; Deut. 22:13-19) When the elders were fair and the Israelites obeyed the Law, everyone benefited, and the nation brought honor to Jehovah.-Lev. 20:7, 8; Isa. 48:17, 18.

¹⁸ Lessons: Every aspect of our life is important to Jehovah. He wants us to be just and loving when dealing with others. And he takes notice of what we say and do, even in the privacy of our home. -Heb. 4:13.

¹⁹ Jehovah wanted to save his people from the corrupting influence of neighboring nations. So he required that the elders and judges enforce the Law impartially. However, those doing the judging were not to treat his people in a harsh or rigid manner. Instead, they were to love justice.—Deut. 1:13-17; 16:18-20.

²⁰ Jehovah has compassion for his people, so he put safeguards in place to prevent individuals from being treated unfairly. For example, the Law limited the possibility that a person would be falsely accused of a crime. A defendant had the right to know who was accusing him. (Deut. 19:16-19; 25:1) And before he could be convicted, at least two witnesses had to give evidence. (Deut. 17:6; 19:15) What about an Israelite who committed a crime that was seen by only one witness? He could not

assume that he would get away with his wrongdoing. Jehovah saw what he did. In the family, fathers were given authority, but that authority had limits. In some family disputes, the elders of the city had the responsibility to become involved and render a final judgment. —Deut. 21:18-21.

²¹ *Lessons*: Jehovah sets the perfect example; nothing he does is unfair. (Ps. 9:7) He rewards those who loyally uphold his standards, but he punishes those who abuse their power. (2 Sam. 22:21-23; Ezek. 9:9, 10) Some may act wickedly and seem to escape punishment, but when Jehovah determines that the time is right, he brings them to justice. (Prov. 28:13) And if they do not re-

pent, they soon learn that "it is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God."—Heb. 10:30, 31.

WHOM DID THE LAW SPECIFICALLY PROTECT?

²² The Law specifically protected those who could not protect themselves, such as orphans, widows, and foreign residents. The judges in Israel were told: "You must not pervert the judgment of the foreign resident or of the fatherless child, and you must not seize the garment of a widow as security for a loan." (Deut. 24:17) Jehovah showed tender

personal interest in the most vulnerable in the community. And he held those who mistreated them to account.—**Read Exodus 22:22-24.**

²³ The Law also protected family members from sex crimes by forbidding all forms of incest. (Lev. 18:6-30) Unlike the people of the nations surrounding Israel, who tolerated or even condoned this practice, Jehovah's people were to view this type of crime as Jehovah did—as a detestable act.

²⁴ Lessons: Jehovah wants those he places in positions of responsibility to take a loving interest in all whom they oversee. He hates sex crimes and wants to ensure that all, especially the most vulnerable, receive protection and justice.

²⁵ Love and justice are like breath and life; on earth, one does not exist without

the other. When we are convinced that Jehovah is treating us justly, our love for him grows. And when we love God and love his righteous standards, we feel impelled to love others and treat them justly.

²⁶ The Mosaic Law covenant breathed life into the relationship between Jehovah and the Israelites. However, the Law was done away with after Jesus fulfilled the Law, and it was replaced with something even better. (Rom. 10:4) The apostle Paul described the Law as "a shadow of the good things to come." (Heb. 10:1) The next article in this series will discuss some of those good things and the role that love and justice play in the Christian congregation.
