

Only that in every way, whether in pretense or in truth. Christ is being proclaimed, and I rejoice over this. In fact, I will also keep on rejoicing, 19 for I know that this will result in my salvation through your supplication^b and with the support of the spirit of Jesus Christ.c 20 This is in harmony with my eager expectation and hope that I will not be ashamed in any respect, but that with all freeness of speech Christ will now, as always before, be magnified by means of my body, whether through life or through death.d

perior position^a and kindly gave him the name that is above every other name.b 10 so that in the name of Jesus every knee should bend-of those in heaven and those on earth and those under the ground - 11 and every tongue should openly acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father.

12 Consequently, my beloved ones, just as you have always obeved, not only during my presence but now much more readily during my absence, keep working out your own salvation with fear and trembling. 13 For God is the one who for the sake of his good pleasure energizes you, giving you both the desire and the power to act. 14 Keep doing all things free from murmuringe and arguments, 15 so that you may come to be blameless and innocent, children of Godg without a blemish in the midst of a crooked and twisted generation, h among whom you are shining as illuminators in the world, 16 keeping a tight grip on the word of life. Then I may have reason for rejoicing in Christ's day, knowing that I did not run in vain or work hard in vain. 17 However, even if I am being poured out like a drink offeringk on the sacrifice and the holy service* to which your faith has led you, I am glad and I rejoice with all of you. 18 In the same way, you also should be glad and rejoice with me.

22 But you know the proof he gave of himself, that like a childa with a father he slaved with me to advance the good news.
23 Therefore, he is the one I am hoping to send just as soon as I see how things turn out for me.

not base our confidence in the flesh, **4** though I, if anyone, do have grounds for confidence in the flesh.

If any other man thinks he has grounds for confidence in the flesh. I have more: 5 circumcised the eighth day, a of the nation of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born from Hebrews; b regarding law, a Pharisee; 6 regarding zeal, persecuting the congregation;d regarding righteousness based on law, one who proved himself blameless. 7 Yet, the things that were gains to me, I have considered loss* on account of the Christ.e 8 What is more, I do indeed also consider all things to be loss on account of the excelling value of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord. Philippians 4:6—Turn your worries into prayers

Philippians 4:6: Do not be anxious over anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication along with thanksgiving, let your petitions be made known to God;

w17.08 10 paragraph 10

What can help us not to be anxious over anything and to experience "the peace of God"? Paul's words to the Philippians show us that the antidote to worry is prayer. So when we are anxious, we need to turn our worries into prayers. (Read 1 Peter 5:6, 7.) Pray to Jehovah in full faith, knowing that he cares for you. Pray to him "with thanksgiving," remembering your blessings. Our confidence in him will be strengthened when we keep in mind that he can "do more than superabundantly beyond all the things we ask or conceive."—Ephesians 3:20.

Philippians 4:7—Let "the peace of God" safeguard you

Philippians 4:7: and the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and your mental powers by means of Christ Jesus.

w17.08 10 paragraph 7

No doubt when the brothers in Philippi read Paul's letter to them, they remembered what had happened to him and how none of them had expected Jehovah to take action in the way that he did. What lesson was Paul teaching them? Basically: Do not worry. Pray, and then you will receive the peace of God. But notice that "the peace of God . . . surpasses all understanding." What does that mean? Some translators render this expression "surpasses all our dreams" or "excels all human planning." Paul was, in effect, saying that "the peace of God" is more wonderful than can be imagined. So although from a human viewpoint we may not see a way out of our problems, Jehovah does, and he can do the unexpected.—Read 2 Peter 2:9.

What results when we receive this "peace of God that surpasses all understanding"? The Scriptures answer by saying that it 'will guard our hearts and our mental powers by means of Christ Jesus.' (Philippians 4:7) The original-language word for "guard" was a military expression. It referred to a garrison of troops that was

assigned to guard a fortified city in ancient times. Philippi was such a city. The inhabitants of Philippi slept soundly at night, knowing that soldiers were guarding the gates of their city. In a similar manner, when we have "the peace of God," our hearts and minds remain at rest. We know that Jehovah cares for us and wants us to succeed. (1 Peter 5:10) That knowledge guards us from becoming overwhelmed by anxiety or discouragement.

Drink offerings. Drink offerings were presented along with most of the other offerings, especially after the Israelites had settled in the Promised Land. (Numbers 15:2, 5, 8-10) This consisted of wine ("intoxicating liquor") and was poured out on the altar. (Numbers 28:7, 14; compare Exodus 30:9; Numbers 15:10.) The apostle Paul wrote to the Christians at Philippi: "If I am being poured out like a drink offering upon the sacrifice and public service to which faith has led you, I am glad." Here he used the figure of a drink offering, expressing his willingness to expend himself in behalf of fellow Christians. (Philippians 2:17) Shortly before his death, he wrote to Timothy: "I am already being poured out like a drink offering, and the due time for my releasing is imminent."—2 Timothy 4:6.

Philippians 3:11—What is "the earlier resurrection"?

Next, anointed members of "the Israel of God" must join the Lord Jesus Christ in heavenly glory, where they will "always be with the Lord." (Galatians 6:16; 1 Thessalonians 4:17) That event is called "the earlier resurrection" or "the first resurrection." (Philippians 3:10, 11; Revelation 20:6) When that resurrection is completed, the time will be at hand for millions to be resurrected back to the earth with the prospect of gaining everlasting life in Paradise. Hence, whether our hope is heavenly or earthly, we have a keen interest in "the first resurrection." What kind of resurrection is it? When does it occur?

1. What is the good news about the dead?

When Jesus arrived at Bethany near Jerusalem, his friend Lazarus had been dead for four days. Jesus went to the burial place with Martha and Mary, sisters of the deceased man. Soon, a crowd gathered. Can you imagine the joy of Martha and Mary when Jesus raised Lazarus back to life?

**Read John 11:21-24, 38-44.

Martha was already aware of the good news about the dead. She knew that Jehovah will resurrect the dead to live on earth again. \triangle Read Job 14:14, 15.



Humans are made from dust. (Genesis 2:7; 3:19) We are not spirits living in a body of flesh. We are physical creatures, so no part of us survives death. When we die, our brain dies too, and our thoughts perish. Thus, Lazarus said nothing about his experience of death because the dead are unconscious.

Read Psalm 146:4; Ecclesiastes 9:5, 6, 10.

Does God torment people with fire after death? Since the Bible shows that the dead are unconscious, hellfire is clearly a false teaching that slanders God. The very idea of tormenting people with fire disgusts him.

Read Jeremiah 7:31.

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Choose Your Entertainment Wisely

Why must we choose our entertainment wisely? Because when we select a movie to watch, a song to listen to, a website to visit, a book to read, or a video game to play, we are choosing what to fill our mind with. Our choices affect our behavior. Sadly, much of the entertainment available today contains elements of things that Jehovah condemns. (Ps 11:5; Ga 5:19-21) For this reason, the Bible urges us to continue considering things that honor Jehovah.—Php 4:8.

ACTIVE OR PASSIVE ENTERTAINMENT?

Much of today's popular entertainment teaches a person to be passive rather than active. Movies, books, and television programs present another person's creative ideas, not your own. While there is a place for *passive* entertainment, many have found *active* entertainment to be more rewarding. For instance, some enjoy playing a musical instrument or drawing a picture. Others enjoy outdoor recreation, such as playing sports or hiking or camping. Whatever entertainment we choose, let us "do all things for God's glory."—1Co 10:31.

JESUS SENDS 70 DISCIPLES TO PREACH

IUKF 10:1-24

It is now late in the year 32 C.E., about three years since Jesus' baptism. He and his disciples recently were at the Festival of Tabernacles in Jerusalem. They likely are still nearby. (Luke 10: 38; John 11:1) In fact, Jesus spends most of the remaining six months of his ministry in Judea or across the Jordan River in the district of Perea. Preaching is needed in these areas too.

Earlier, after the Passover of 30 C.E., Jesus spent some months preaching in Judea and traveling through Samaria. Then about the time of the Passover of 31 C.E., Jews in Jerusalem tried to kill him. For the next year and a half, Jesus taught mainly up north, in Galilee. During that time, many became his followers. In Galilee, Jesus trained his apostles and then sent them out with the instruction: "Preach, saying: 'The Kingdom of the heavens has drawn near.'" (Matthew 10:5-7) Now he organizes a witnessing campaign in Judea.

To start this campaign, Jesus chooses 70 disciples and sends them out by twos. Thus, there are 35 teams of Kingdom preachers in the territory, where "the harvest is great, but the workers are few." (Luke 10:2) They are to go in advance into places where Jesus might follow. The 70 are to cure the sick and spread the same message that Jesus has been proclaiming.


These disciples are not to focus on teaching in synagogues. Jesus tells them to go to people's homes. "Wherever you enter into a house," he instructs, "say first: 'May this house have peace.' And if a friend of peace is there, your peace will rest upon him." What is to be their message? Jesus says: "Tell them: 'The Kingdom of God has come near to you.'"—Luke 10:5-9.

The instructions Jesus gives the 70 are sim-

ilar to those he gave when sending out the 12 apostles about a year earlier. He warns them that not all will receive them well. Their efforts, though, will prepare receptive ones so that when Jesus arrives shortly afterward, many will be eager to meet the Master and learn from him.

Before long, the 35 pairs of Kingdom preachers return to Jesus. They tell him joyfully: "Lord, even the demons are made subject to us by the use of your name." This fine report surely thrills Jesus, for he responds: "I see Satan already fallen like lightning from heaven. Look! I have given you the authority to trample underfoot serpents and scorpions."—Luke 10:17-19.

Jesus thus assures his followers that they will be able to prevail over injurious things, symbolically trampling on serpents and scorpions.





Moreover, they can be certain that in the future Satan will fall from heaven. Jesus also helps the 70 to see what is really important in the long run. He says: "Do not rejoice because the spirits are made subject to you, but rejoice because your names have been written in the heavens." —Luke 10:20.

Jesus is overjoyed and publicly praises his







PREVIEW

Jehovah has lovingly warned us about wicked spirits and the harm they can cause. How do wicked spirits try to mislead people? What steps can we take to resist wicked spirits? This article will consider how Jehovah helps us to avoid their influence.

Accept Jehovah's Help to Resist Wicked Spirits

"We have a struggle . . . against the wicked spirit forces in the heavenly places."—EPH. 6:12.

ONE of the most heartwarming ways in which Jehovah shows his concern for us as his servants is by helping us to resist our enemies. Our main enemies are Satan and the demons. Jehovah warns us about these enemies, and he gives us what we need to resist them. (Read Ephesians 6:10-13.) When we accept Jehovah's help and rely on him completely, we can succeed in opposing the Devil. We can have the same kind of confidence that the apostle Paul had. He wrote: "If God is for us, who will be against us?"—Rom. 8:31.

² As true Christians, we are not fascinated with Satan and the demons. We focus most of our attention on learning about Jehovah and serving him. (Ps. 25:5) However, we do need to know the basic ways that Satan operates. Why? So that we can avoid being outwitted by him. (2 Cor. 2:11; ftn.) In this article, we will consider a major way in which Satan and the demons try to mislead people. We will also consider how we can resist them successfully.

HOW WICKED SPIRITS MISLEAD PEOPLE

³ A major way in which Satan and the demons try to mislead people is through spiritism. Those who prac-

tice spiritism claim to know or control things that humans cannot normally know or control. For example, some claim to be able to know the future by using divination or astrology. Others may act as though they were speaking to those who have died. Some practice witchcraft or magic, and they may try to cast a spell on another person.*

4 How widespread is belief in the power of spiritism? A survey conducted in 18 countries in Latin America and the Caribbean found that about a third of the people surveyed believe in magic, witchcraft, or sorcery, and nearly as many believe that it is possible to communicate with spirits. Another survey was conducted in 18 countries in Africa. There, on average, more than half of the people surveyed say that they believe in witchcraft. Of course, wherever we live, we must be on guard against spiritism. After all, Satan is seeking to mislead "the entire inhabited earth."-Rev. 12:9.

⁵ Jehovah is "the God of truth." (Ps. 31:5) So how does he feel about spiritism? He hates it! Jehovah told the Israelites: "There should not be found in you anyone who makes his son or his daughter pass through the fire, anyone who employs divination, anyone practic-

ing magic, anyone who looks for omens, a sorcerer, anyone binding others with a spell, anyone who consults a spirit medium or a fortune-teller, or anyone who inquires of the dead. For whoever does these things is detestable to Jehovah." (Deut. 18:10-12) Christians are not under the Law that Jehovah gave to the Israelites. However, we know that his feelings about spiritism have not changed. -Mal. 3:6.

⁶ Jehovah warns us against spiritism because he knows that Satan uses it to harm people. Satan uses spiritism to promote lies—including the lie that the dead are alive in some other realm. (Read Ecclesiastes 9:5.) Satan also uses spiritism to keep people in fear and to turn them away from Jehovah. His aim is that people who practice spiritism will trust in wicked spirits instead of in Jehovah.

HOW WE RESIST WICKED SPIRITS

⁷ As noted earlier, Jehovah tells us what we need to know so as to avoid being misled by Satan and the demons. Consider some practical steps that we can take in our fight against Satan and the demons.

8 Read God's Word and meditate on it. This is the main way we reject the lies that wicked spirits promote. God's Word is like a sharp sword that can cut through the lies that Satan promotes. (Eph. 6:17)

^{*} EXPRESSIONS EXPLAINED: Spiritism refers to beliefs and practices connected with the demons. It includes the belief that the spirits of dead humans survive the death of the physical body and that they communicate with the living, especially through a person (a medium). Spiritism also includes such practices as witchcraft and divination. As used in this article, magic refers to practices associated with the occult, or the supernatural. It can include curses and the casting or breaking of spells. It does not refer to tricks using quick hand movements, which some people perform merely for entertainment.

For example, God's Word exposes the lie that the dead can communicate with the living. (Read Psalm 146:4.) It also reminds us that only Jehovah can reliably predict the future. (Isa. 45:21; 46:10) If we read God's Word and meditate on it regularly, we will be equipped to reject and hate the lies that wicked spirits want us to believe.

9 Refuse to do anything connected with spiritism. As true Christians, we never practice spiritism of any kind. For example, we do not visit spirit mediums or try to communicate with the dead in any other way. As discussed in the preceding article, we avoid funeral customs that are based on the belief that the dead are still alive somewhere. And we do not use astrology or fortune-telling to try to learn about the future. (Isa. 8: 19) We know that all such practices are

very dangerous and that they could put us in direct contact with Satan and the demons.

occult. Some of the people who lived in Ephesus during the first century were involved with spiritism. When they learned the truth, they took drastic action. "Quite a number of those who practiced magical arts brought their books together and burned them up before everybody." (Acts 19:19) These individuals were serious about resisting wicked spirits. Their books about magic cost a lot of money. But instead of giving those books away or selling them to others, they destroyed them. They were more concerned about pleasing Jehovah


11 How can we imitate the example of those first-century Christians? It would be wise to get rid of anything we may have that is connected with the occult. This includes amulets, charms, or other objects that people wear or own to try to protect themselves from wicked spirits. -Read 1 Corinthians 10:21.

12 Examine your entertainment carefully. Ask yourself: 'Do I read books, magazines, or articles on the Internet about the occult? What about the music I listen to, the movies and TV shows I watch, or the video games I play? Does any of my entertainment involve spiritism? Does it feature such things as vampires, zombies, or the paranormal? Does it portray magic, spells, or

curses as harmless fun?' Of course, not all entertainment that features fantasies or fairy tales is necessarily related to spiritism. When evaluating your entertainment, be determined to make choices that will help you stay far away from anything Jehovah hates. We want to do our best to "maintain a clear conscience" before our God.—Acts 24:16.*

¹³ Avoid telling stories about the demons. In this regard, we want to imitate the example set by Jesus. (1 Pet. 2:21) Before he came to earth. Jesus lived in heaven, and he knew a lot about Satan

We have nothing to fear from wicked spirits. Jehovah, Jesus, and the angels are far more powerful (See paragraphs 14-15)

and the demons. But he did not relate stories about what those wicked spirits had done. Jesus wanted to be a witness of Jehovah, not a publicity agent for Satan. We can imitate Jesus by not spreading stories about the demons. Instead, we show by our words that our "heart is stirred by something good," that is, the truth.—Ps. 45:1.

14 Do not be terrified of wicked spirits. In this imperfect world, bad things may happen to us. Accidents, sickness, or even death may come without warning. But we should not think that invisible spirits are responsible. The Bible explains that "time and unexpected events" can overtake anyone. (Eccl. 9: 11) As for the demons, Jehovah has shown that he is far more powerful than they are. For example, God did not allow Satan to kill Job. (Job 2:6) In the days of Moses, Jehovah demonstrated his

power over the magic-practicing priests of Egypt. (Ex. 8:18; 9:11) Empowered by Jehovah, the glorified Jesus showed his power over Satan and the demons when they were cast down from heaven to the earth. And in the near future, they will be cast into the abyss, where they will not be able to harm anyone.—Rev. 12:9; 20:2, 3.

15 We see abundant evidence that Jehovah protects his people today. Consider: We are preaching and teaching the truth in all parts of the earth. (Matt. 28:19, 20) As a result, we expose the evil works of the Devil. Surely, if Satan were able to, he would stop all our activity, but he cannot. So we do not need to be terrified of wicked spirits. We know that "the eyes of Jehovah are roving about through all the earth to show his strength in behalf of those whose heart is complete toward him." (2 Chron. 16:9) If we are faithful to Jehovah, the demons cannot cause us lasting harm.

BLESSINGS FOR THOSE WHO ACCEPT JEHOVAH'S HELP

¹⁶ It takes courage to resist wicked spirits, especially when well-meaning friends or relatives oppose us. But Jehovah blesses those who show such courage. Consider the example of a sister named Erica, who lives in Ghana. Erica was 21 years old when she accepted a Bible study. As the daughter of a fetish priest, she was expected to comply with a spiritistic custom that involved eating meat offered in ritual sacrifices to her father's gods. When Erica refused, her family considered it an insult to the gods. The family believed that the gods would punish them with mental and physical illnesses.

¹⁷ Erica's family tried to force her to follow the custom, but she would not give in, even though it meant that she had to leave her home. Some Witnesses allowed her to stay with them. In that sense, Jehovah blessed Erica with a new family—fellow believers who became like brothers and sisters to her. (Mark 10:29, 30) Although her relatives disowned her

and even burned her belongings, Erica stayed loyal to Jehovah, got baptized, and is now a regular pioneer. She is not terrified of the demons. And regarding her family, Erica says, "I pray daily that my family will experience the blessing of knowing Jehovah and having the freedom that comes from serving our loving God."

18 Not all of us will have to face such a dramatic test of our faith. However, all of us need to resist wicked spirits and trust in Jehovah. If we do that, we will receive many blessings and we will avoid being misled by Satan's lies. Also, we will not be paralyzed by fear of the demons. Above all, we will strengthen our friendship with Jehovah. "Subject yourselves to God," wrote the disciple James, "but oppose the Devil, and he will flee from you. Draw close to God, and he will draw close to you."—Jas. 4:7, 8.
