12 Let ministerial servants be husbands of one wife, presiding in a fine manner over their children and their own households. 13 For the men who minister in a fine manner are acquiring for themselves a fine standing and great freeness of speech in the faith that is in Christ Jesus.

14 I am writing you these things, though I am hoping to come to you shortly, 15 but in case I am delayed, so that you may know how you ought to conduct yourself in God's household.b which is the congregation of the living God, a pillar and support of the truth. 16 Indeed, the sacred secret of this godly devotion is admittedly great: 'He was made manifest in flesh.c was declared righteous in spirit.d appeared to angels.e was preached about among nations, was believed upon in the world,g was received up in glory."

However, the inspired word* clearly says that in later times some will fall away from the faith, paying attention to misleading inspired statements#h and teachings of demons. 2 by means of the hypocrisy of men who speak lies, whose conscience is seared as with a branding iron. 3 They forbid marriage and command people to abstain from foodsk that God created to be partaken of with thanksgiving by those who have faith^m and accurately know the truth. 4 For every creation of God is fine, n and nothing is to be rejected if it is received with thanksgiving, 5 for it is sanctified through God's word and prayer over it.

6 By giving this counsel to the brothers, you will be a fine

Reach Out for a Fine Work

1 Timothy 3:1, 13

It is best for brothers to begin reaching out when they are young. This allows them to receive training and demonstrate their fitness to be appointed as ministerial servants when they get older. (1 Timothy 3:10) How can a brother reach out? By cultivating and demonstrating the following qualities:

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- Spirituality.—km 7/13 3 paragraph 3
- Reliability and faithfulness.—km 7/13 3 paragraph 4

km 7/13 2-3 paragraphs 2-4

- 2 **Self-Sacrifice:** Remember that you are reaching out for a fine work, not a title. Therefore, cultivate a desire to help your brothers and sisters. One way to do this is by meditating on Jesus' fine example. (Matthew 20:28; John 4:6, 7; 13:4, 5) Ask Jehovah to help you to be interested in others. (1 Corinthians 10:24) Could you give practical assistance to those in the congregation who are elderly or infirm? Do you make yourself available to cut the grass, shovel the snow, or care for other aspects of maintaining the Kingdom Hall? Could you volunteer to give a substitute talk on the Theocratic Ministry School? You will find that giving of yourself in behalf of others will bring you joy.—Acts 20:35.
- 3 **Spirituality**: It is far more important for a servant in the congregation to have spirituality than to have special talents or natural abilities. A spiritual man tries to view things as Jehovah and Jesus do. (1 Corinthians 2:15, 16) He displays "the fruitage of the spirit." (Galatians 5:22, 23) He is a zealous evangelizer who puts Kingdom interests first. (Matthew 6:33) You can develop spiritual qualities by having a good routine of personal study. This would include reading the Bible every day, reading each issue of *The Watchtower* and *Awake!*, and preparing for and attending congregation meetings. (Psalms 1:1, 2; Hebrews 10:24, 25) When encouraging young Timothy to make spiritual advancement, Paul wrote: "Pay constant attention to . . . your teaching." (1 Timothy 4:15, 16) So work hard on your talk assignments in the Theocratic Ministry School. Prepare for the ministry, and share in it regularly. Set and work toward spiritual goals, such as pioneering, Bethel service, or attending the Bible School for Single Brothers. Spirituality will help you to "flee from the desires incidental to youth."—2 Timothy 2:22.

4 **Reliability and Faithfulness:** Because the brothers who were assigned to distribute food to needy Christians in the first century were "certified," evidently known for being reliable and faithful, the apostles did not have to worry about whether the work would be done. This allowed them to focus on other important matters. (Acts 6:1-4) Therefore, when you are given an assignment in the congregation, carry it out to the best of your ability. Imitate Noah, who carefully followed the instructions he was given to build the ark. (Genesis 6:22) Faithfulness is valued by Jehovah and demonstrates spiritual maturity.—1 Corinthians 4:2; see the box "The Benefits of Training."

1 Timothy 3:1—Brothers are encouraged to reach out to be an overseer

1 Timothy 3:1: This statement is trustworthy: If a man is reaching out to be an overseer, he is desirous of a fine work.

w16.08 21 paragraph 3

Read 1 Timothy 3:1. The Greek verb translated "reaching out" means stretching to grasp something, perhaps something beyond your normal reach. In using that word, the apostle Paul stressed that spiritual progress requires effort. Imagine a brother thinking about his future in the congregation. He may not now be serving as a ministerial servant, but he realizes that he needs to cultivate spiritual qualities. First, he strives to qualify as a ministerial servant. In time, he hopes to be spiritually qualified to serve as an overseer. In each case, he works hard to meet the qualifications needed to care for added responsibility in the congregation.

1 Timothy 3:13—Brothers who serve in a fine manner receive blessings

1 Timothy 3:13: For the men who minister in a fine manner are acquiring for themselves a fine standing and great freeness of speech in the faith that is in Christ Jesus.

It is easy to see, then, why Paul said of such men that they "are acquiring . . . a fine standing." This is not, as some suggest, an advancement in a church hierarchy. Rather, ministerial servants who "minister in a fine manner" are assured of a blessing from Jehovah and Jesus, and they have the respect and support of the whole congregation. Rightfully they acquire "great freeness of speech in the faith in connection with Christ Jesus." Being true to their position, they are appreciated for their fine service; they have firmness of faith and can declare their faith without cowardice or fear of reproach.

Digging for Spiritual Gems

1 Timothy 1:4—Why did Paul warn Timothy against paying attention to genealogies?

1 Timothy 1:4: nor to pay attention to false stories and to genealogies. Such things end up in nothing useful but merely give rise to speculations rather than providing anything from God in connection with faith.

To engage in studying and discussing such matters was pointless, and it was even more so at the time Paul wrote to Timothy. It was no longer vital to have the genealogical records maintained to prove one's ancestry, since God did not now recognize any distinction between Jew and Gentile in the Christian congregation. (Galatians 3:28) And the genealogical records had already established the descent of Christ through the line of David. Also, it would not be long after Paul wrote this admonition that Jerusalem would be destroyed, and along with it the Jewish records. God did not preserve them. Accordingly, Paul was anxious that Timothy and the congregations should not be sidetracked into spending time in research and in controversy over matters of personal pedigree, which contributed nothing to Christian faith. The genealogy furnished by the Bible is sufficient to prove Christ's Messiahship, the genealogical matter of prime importance to Christians. The other Biblical genealogies stand as a testimony to the authenticity of the Scriptural record, manifesting clearly that it is a genuinely historical account.

1 Timothy 1:17—Why is Jehovah the only one who can be called "the King of eternity"?

1 Timothy 1:17: Now to the King of eternity, incorruptible, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.

cl 12 paragraph 15

Another title applied exclusively to Jehovah is "King of eternity." (1 Timothy 1:17; Revelation 15:3) What does this mean? It is difficult for our limited minds to comprehend, but Jehovah is eternal in both directions—past and future. Psalm 90:2 says: "Even from time indefinite to time indefinite you are God." So Jehovah never began; he has always been. He is rightly called "the Ancient of Days"—he existed for an eternity before anyone or anything else in the universe came into being! (Daniel 7:9, 13, 22) Who can validly question his right to be the Sovereign Lord?

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Second Return Visit

- P: The last time, we left off with the question, How will God undo the damage caused by his enemy, the Devil. What are your thoughts?
- H: Well, I'm wondering if it maybe will happen when we go to heaven.
- P: You know, that's a common viewpoint. And it's true that for those who go to heaven, all suffering will end. But did you know that we can expect the same thing here on earth in the future?
- H: What do you mean?
- P: Well, consider what Jesus said when he taught his followers the Lord's Prayer. The opening words of it are found here at Matthew 6:9, 10: "You must pray, then, this way: 'Our Father in the heavens, Let your name be sanctified. Let your Kingdom come. Let your will take place, as in heaven, also on earth." Did you notice the last part of the verse? We pray for God's will to take place where?
- H: In heaven and on earth.
- P: Isn't that interesting? We know that God's will is already taking place in heaven. There's no suffering or death in heaven. But here, Jesus is teaching us that God will also cause such problems to be eliminated here on earth.
- H: I never realized that.
- P: It's a simple but profound Bible teaching. And the key to how God will do this is found in Jesus' words in the previous sentence: "Let your kingdom come." The next time we talk, I can show you from the Bible what that kingdom is. In the meantime, I have this publication that I think you might enjoy reading.

WHY WE RESPECT JEHOVAH'S AUTHORITY

⁶ We respect direction from Jehovah because we love him. Because we love Jehovah more than anything or anyone else, we want to make him happy. (Read Proverbs 27:11; Mark 12:29, 30.) From the time the first human couple lived in the garden of Eden, Satan has wanted people to question Jehovah's authority. The Devil wants us to think that Jehovah does not have the right to tell us what to do. But we know this is a lie. We agree with these words: "You are worthy, Jehovah our God, to receive the glory and the honor and the power, because you created all things."—Revelation 4:11.

⁷ When you were a child, you were probably taught to obey your parents even when you didn't want to. In a similar way, as servants of Jehovah,


⁸ Today, Jehovah directs us in different ways. For example, he has given us the Bible. He has also given us the congregation elders. We show that we respect Jehovah's authority when we respect those he uses to direct us. If we reject their help, in a sense we are rejecting Jehovah. When the Israelites rejected Moses, Jehovah viewed it seriously. He viewed it as if they were rejecting him.—Numbers 14:26, 27; see Endnote 12.


⁹ When we respect authority, it shows that we also love our brothers and sisters. Think of it this way. When there is a natural disaster, often a relief team works together to save as many people as possible. For the team to be effective, someone needs to organize it and each member of the team needs to follow direction. But what if one person ignores the direction and simply does what he wants? Even if his motives are good, his refusal to listen could cause problems for his teammates, possibly causing them to get seriously hurt. In a similar way,

Young Workers at Warwick Honor Jehovah

Earlier in the program, we saw some examples of how young ones are building a future with Jehovah. But what impact are such efforts having on the organization? Let's look at one example: the construction of the new world headquarters at Warwick, New York.

Jehovah's Witnesses built 1.6 million square feet (149,000 sq m) in less than four years.

Of the 27,035 volunteers, 3,247 were between the ages of 19 and 25.

I thought this was a project that was going to strictly need very experienced brothers and sisters. Early on, I realized I was wrong. It was also going to take youthful energy because of the volume of work.

The mix of older and younger ones was really a helpful thing on the Warwick project. The older ones brought skill and experience. The younger ones brought the energy, the muscle, and the diligence to stay with hard physical tasks all the way through the project.

Whether it was in the kitchen or night watch or the early 5:00 a.m. start with the concrete crew at 10 degrees Fahrenheit (-12°C), their joy and their humility was outstanding to accept any work that needed to be done.

And a lot of young ones, brothers and sisters, moved into the area so they could commute. And they would work day after day tirelessly, into the evenings even, to have the project ready for the next day. Their energy was just astonishing.

Jehovah loves young ones, and he's willing to invest in them and train them and make them a part of his organization. And I saw that so much.

We had a lot of young people who offered themselves with technical skills.

But if the humility of these very technically-skilled young people didn't match or exceed their abilities, then, really, Jehovah couldn't use them. And they were willing to adjust, and we really saw the benefit.

We knew and they knew that they were building not just a project at Warwick —they were building a spiritual project for Jehovah.

You could see Jehovah's spirit operating on them. You could see them mature so quickly.

These young brothers are the next generation of elders and traveling overseers. They're to be commended and highly respected for the contribution they made as young men.

They all talk about the effect that their Bethel service has had on their outlook and how they don't want to get caught up in this world and its daily pursuits.

Use the skills you've learned here on this project and in Bethel. You are needed. Continue to keep your spirituality up and to keep your association at a high level.

The highest quality of life is when, as clay, we put ourselves in the hands of the Great Potter, Jehovah, and we say: "Here I am! Send me!". And I'm fully confident they will have no regrets building their future with Jehovah.

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Respect Experienced Men

Before the meeting starts, I need to get things ready.

I'm Ben. And as a ministerial servant, I can do a lot to help the congregation. And that night I was given another assignment. Brother Richards asked if I could help him update the territory maps and organize our schedules for public witnessing.

I think the brothers know I can modernize all of this.

Brother Richards said to talk to Brother Bello, first. He was the service overseer for years. Great idea! But I can already imagine the possibilities.

By that weekend, I had almost finished. I couldn't believe the outdated ways our records were kept.

This is going to be way better for the congregation. And who knows what else could be improved?

I thought I had everything ready to show Brother Richards. He liked the new ideas, but then he asked me, "What did Brother Bello think?"

Oh, Brother Bello! I forgot. I should have asked him, but at this point, did it really matter?

Brother Richards suggested we read about Elisha. When the older Elijah's work was ending, Elisha stuck close to his teacher. Urged to stay behind, Elisha repeatedly said:

"As surely as Jehovah is living and as you are living, I will not leave you."

Until the moment Elijah left, Elisha wanted to learn from him.

Like a son asking his father, he wanted a double portion of Elijah's spirit to continue the work he started. And Elisha's first miracle was the same as Elijah's last: dividing the Jordan with Elijah's official garment.

Everything Elisha did revealed his respect for the experienced man Elijah. I wasn't finished with my new assignment after all. There was a lot I needed to learn from Brother Bello.

He really understood our preaching territory and the people who live here. He liked my ideas, but everything he showed me made them even better.

I can do a lot to help the congregation. And I pray that Jehovah lets me do even more with the gifts he gave me and with the wisdom of experienced men.

DINING WITH A PHARISEE

LUKF 11:37-54

While in Judea, Jesus accepts a meal invitation from a Pharisee. It is likely during the day, rather than an evening meal. (Luke 11:37, 38; compare Luke 14:12.) Before eating, the Pharisees carry out ritual washing of their hands up to the elbow. But Jesus does not. (Matthew 15: 1, 2) It would not violate God's Law to wash to that extent, yet it is not something God requires.

The Pharisee is surprised that Jesus does not follow that tradition. Jesus detects this and says: "Now you Pharisees, you cleanse the outside of the cup and dish, but inside you are full of greediness and wickedness. Unreasonable ones! The one who made the outside made also the inside, did he not?"—Luke 11:39, 40.

Having clean hands before eating is not the issue, but religious hypocrisy is. The Pharisees and others who ritualistically wash their hands fail to cleanse their hearts from wickedness. So Jesus counsels them: "Give as gifts of mercy the things that are from within, and look! everything about you will be clean." (Luke 11:41) How true! Giving should spring from a loving heart, not from a desire to impress others by a pretense of righteousness.

It is not that these men do not give. Jesus points out: "You give the tenth of the mint and of the rue and of every other garden herb, but you disregard the justice and the love of God! These things you were under obligation to do, but not to disregard those other things." (Luke 11:42) God's Law called for the paying of tithes (a tenth part) of crops. (Deuteronomy 14:22) That included the mint and the rue, herbs or plants used to flavor food. The Pharisees scrupulously paid a tenth of these herbs, but what of the more important requirements of the Law,

such as to exercise justice and to be modest before God?—Micah 6:8.

Jesus goes on to say: "Woe to you Pharisees, because you love the front seats in the synagogues and the greetings in the marketplaces! Woe to you, because you are as those graves that are not clearly visible, that men walk on and do not know it!" (Luke 11:43, 44) Yes, people could stumble on such graves and become ceremonially unclean. Jesus uses that fact to underscore that the uncleanness of the Pharisees is not apparent.—Matthew 23:27.


One man who is well-versed in God's Law complains: "Teacher, in saying these things, you insult us also." Yet such men need to realize that they are failing to help the people. Jesus says: "Woe also to you who are versed in the Law, because you load men down with loads hard to carry, but you yourselves do not touch the loads with one of your fingers! Woe to you, because you build the tombs of the prophets, but your forefathers killed them!"—Luke 11: 45-47.

The loads that Jesus refers to are the oral traditions and the Pharisees' interpretation of the Law. These men are not making life easier for the people. Rather, they insist that all must keep what become heavy burdens. Their ancestors killed God's prophets, from Abel onward. Now they, who make it seem as if they are honoring the prophets by building tombs for them, are imitating the attitude and actions of their forefathers. They are even seeking to kill God's foremost Prophet. Jesus says that God will hold an accounting with this generation. And that became a reality about 38 years later, in 70 C.E.

Jesus continues: "Woe to you who are versed in the Law, because you took away the

key of knowledge. You yourselves did not go in, and you hinder those going in!" (Luke 11: 52) These men, who should be unlocking the meaning of God's Word, are instead taking away the opportunity for people to know and understand it.

How do the Pharisees and scribes react? As Jesus departs, they begin to oppose him angrily and to assail him with questions. They are not asking out of a desire to learn. Instead, they want to trick Jesus into saying something for which they can have him arrested.



PREVIEW

This article will help us strengthen our conviction that Jehovah is the only reliable Source of guidance. Also, it will show that following the world's wisdom has tragic consequences, whereas applying the wisdom of God's Word is beneficial.

Do Not Be Fooled by "the Wisdom of This World"

"The wisdom of this world is foolishness with God." –1 COR. 3:19.

WE CAN face any challenge—all because Jehovah is our Grand Instructor. (Isa. 30:20, 21) His Word gives us everything we need to be "fully competent" and "completely equipped for every good work." (2 Tim. 3:17) When we live by Bible teachings, we become wiser than those who promote "the wisdom of this world."—1 Cor. 3: 19; Ps. 119:97-100.

² As we will see, the wisdom of the world often appeals to our fleshly desires. So we might find it difficult to resist thinking and acting like those who are part of the world. For good reason, the Bible says: "Look out that no one takes you captive by means of the philosophy and empty deception according to human tradition." (Col. 2:8) In this article, we will examine the history of how two empty deceptions, or lies, became popular. In each case, we will see why the wisdom of the world is foolishness and how the wisdom of God's Word is far superior to anything the world offers.

CHANGES IN VIEWPOINT TOWARD MORALITY

³ In the United States, the early part of the 20th century saw a big change in people's viewpoints about morality. Previously, many believed that sex was reserved only for those who are married and was not a topic to be discussed in public. But those standards crumbled, and permissive views spread.

- 4 The third decade of the 20th century became known as the Roaring Twenties, and it was characterized by far-reaching social changes. "Motion pictures, plays, songs, novels, and advertising all reflected the market for sexually-themed entertainment," says one researcher. During that decade, dancing styles became more sexually suggestive and clothing styles became less modest. As the Bible foretold about the last days, people would to a remarkable degree become "lovers of pleasures."—2 Tim. 3:4.
- ⁵ In the 1960's, issues such as living together without being married, homosexual conduct, and easy divorce became prominent. Many forms of entertainment featured increasingly explicit depictions of sex. In recent decades, the bad effects of loose moral standards have been felt in many ways. One author wrote that the cause of broken families, single-parent families, emotional wounds, pornography addiction, and similar woes is related to "the deregulation of sexual norms now shaping soci-

- ety." The prevalence of sexually transmitted diseases, such as AIDS, is just one indication that the wisdom of the world is foolishness.—2 Pet. 2:19.
- 6 The world's view of sex serves Satan's purpose. No doubt, he delights to see people abuse God's gift of sex and degrade God's gift of marriage. (Eph. 2:2) Not only does sexual immorality tarnish Jehovah's beautiful gift of procreation but it can prevent those who engage in it from inheriting everlasting life.—1 Cor. 6:9, 10.

THE BIBLE'S VIEW OF SEXUAL MORALITY

⁷ People who adopt the wisdom of this world ridicule the Bible's moral standards, claiming that they are unrealistic. Such people might ask, 'Why would God create us with sexual desires and then tell us not to act on them?' That question is founded on the flawed belief that humans must act on every urge they feel. But the Bible states otherwise. It dignifies us by

teaching that we can choose to control improper impulses. (Col. 3:5) In addition, Jehovah has provided the gift of marriage, an arrangement in which proper sexual desires can be honorably satisfied. (1 Cor. 7:8, 9) Within that arrangement, a husband and wife can enjoy sex without the regrets and insecurities that so often result from immorality.

8 In contrast with the wisdom of this world, the Bible promotes a healthy view of sexuality. It acknowledges that sex can be a source of pleasure. (Prov. 5:18, 19) However, the Bible says: "Each one of you should know how to control his own body in holiness and honor, not with greedy, uncontrolled sexual passion like the nations have that do not know God." -1 Thess. 4:4, 5.

⁹ During the early 20th century, Jehovah's people were not swayed by the empty deception of those who had "gone past all moral sense." (Eph. 4:19) They tried to stick closely to Jehovah's standards. The May 15, 1926, Watch Tower stated that "a man or a woman should be chaste and pure in thought and in act, particularly with reference to the opposite sex." Regardless of what was happening in the world around them, Jehovah's people followed the superior wisdom of God's Word. (Read 1 John 2:15, 16.) How grateful we are for God's Word! We are also thankful that Jehovah provides timely spiritual food to help us resist adopting the wisdom of this world regarding morality.*—Read Romans 1: 24-27.

CHANGES IN VIEWPOINT TOWARD LOVE OF SELF

¹⁰ The Bible warned that during the last days, people would become "lovers of themselves." (2 Tim. 3:1, 2) Not surprisingly, the world has encouraged an inflated view of self. One reference work says that during the 1970's "self-help books proliferated." Some books "urged readers to know and accept themselves and to celebrate who they were." Consider, for example, the statement made in one such book: "Be in love with the most beautiful, exciting, worthy person ever—you." The book advocates a "religion of the self in which an individual determines his own behavior based upon his own conscience and the laws of his culture that work for him."

¹¹ Does that idea sound familiar to you? Satan encouraged Eve to do something similar. He said that she could "be like God, knowing good and bad." (Gen. 3:5) Today, many think so highly of themselves that in their opinion no one—not even God—can tell them what is right and what is wrong. For example, that attitude has become especially evident in the way people view marriage.

marriage vows. It encourages marriage mates to have a deep sense of commitment to each other, stating: "A man will leave his father and his mother and he will stick to his wife, and they will become one flesh." (Gen. 2:24) In contrast, those influenced by the wisdom of the world promote a different view, saying that each spouse should focus on his or her own needs. "In some ceremonies." notes one book about divorce. "the traditional pledge to marry for 'as long as we both shall live' was replaced with the more limited promise to marry for 'as long as we both shall love." Such a casual view of marriage has led to countless broken families and has caused immeasurable emotional harm. Without a doubt, the world's disrespectful view of marriage is a foolish teaching.

13 The Bible says: "Everyone proud in

heart is detestable to Jehovah." (Prov. 16:5) Why does Jehovah detest proud people? One reason is that those who develop and promote an inflated love of self reflect Satan's own arrogance. Imagine, Satan believed that Jesus—the one whom God used to create all things—should bow down and worship him! (Matt. 4:8, 9; Col. 1:15, 16) Those with such an inflated view of their own importance confirm that the wisdom of the world is foolishness with God.

THE BIBLE'S VIEW OF SELF-IMPORTANCE

¹⁴ The Bible helps us to have a balanced view of ourselves. It acknowledges that a degree of self-love is proper. Jesus said: "Love your neighbor as yourself," which indicates that we should give a reasonable amount of attention to our needs. (Matt. 19:19) However, the Bible does not teach that we should elevate

^{14.} How does Romans 12:3 help us to have a balanced view of ourselves?

ourselves above others. Rather, it states: "Do nothing out of contentiousness or out of egotism, but with humility consider others superior to you."—Phil. 2:3; read Romans 12:3.

15 Today, many people who are considered wise would ridicule the Bible's counsel about self-importance. They would say that considering others superior to you would make you vulnerable and that others would take advantage of you. Really, though, what fruitage has the self-centered attitude promoted by Satan's world produced? What have you observed? Are selfish people happy? Do they have happy families? Do they have genuine friends? Do they have a close friendship with God? From what you have seen, which produces the best results—following the wisdom of this world or the wisdom found in God's Word?

¹⁶ People who follow the advice of those whom the world views as wise are like a tourist who asks a fellow tourist for directions when both of them are lost.

Jesus said regarding the "wise" men of his day: "Blind guides is what they are. If, then, a blind man guides a blind man, both will fall into a pit." (Matt. 15:14) Truly, the wisdom of this world is foolishness with God.

17 The Bible's wise counsel has always proved to be "beneficial for teaching, for reproving, for correcting, for disciplining in righteousness." (2 Tim. 3:16, ftn.) How thankful we can be that Jehovah, through his organization, has protected us from the wisdom of this world! (Eph. 4:14) The spiritual food he has provided gives us the strength we need to cling to the standards of his Word. What a privilege it is to be guided by the infallible wisdom found in the Bible!




