Godly Devotion Versus Riches

1 Timothy 6:6-10

• Ecclesiastes 5:10: A lover of silver will never be satisfied with silver, nor a lover of wealth with income. This too is futility.

• Ecclesiastes 5:12: Sweet is the sleep of the one serving, whether he eats little or much, but the plenty belonging to the rich one does not permit him to sleep.

• **Matthew 5:3:** "Happy are those conscious of their spiritual need, since the Kingdom of the heavens belongs to them.

1 Timothy 6:6-8: To be sure, there is great gain in godly devotion along with contentment. For we have brought nothing into the world, and neither can we carry anything out. So, having food and clothing, we will be content with these things.

w03 6/1 9 paragraphs 1-2

A major factor that contributed to Paul's happiness and satisfaction was his sense of self-sufficiency. What, though, does it mean to be self-sufficient? Simply stated, it means being content with the basic things. Regarding this, Paul told Timothy, his companion in the ministry: "To be sure, it is a means of great gain, this godly devotion along with self-sufficiency. For we have brought nothing into the world, and neither can we carry anything out. So, having sustenance and covering, we shall be content with these things."—1 Timothy 6:6-8.

Note that Paul associated self-sufficiency with godly devotion. He recognized that true happiness comes from godly devotion, that is, from putting our service to God in first place, and not from material possessions or wealth. "Sustenance and covering" were but the means to the end that he could continue pursuing godly devotion. So for Paul the secret of self-sufficiency was to rely on Jehovah, no matter what the circumstances might be.

1 Timothy 6:9—The consequences of being determined to be rich

1 Timothy 6:9: But those who are determined to be rich fall into temptation and a snare and many senseless and harmful desires that plunge men into destruction and ruin.

Of course, most people do not die as a result of pursuing riches. Yet, life could easily pass them by while they are lost in their quest. Then, too, the quality of their lives may suffer if job stress or financial strain causes panic attacks, sleeplessness, chronic headaches, or ulcers—health problems that can shorten one's life. And even if a person wakes up to the need to change his priorities, it may be too late. His mate may no longer trust him, his children may already be hampered emotionally, and his health may be ruined. Perhaps some of the damage can be repaired, but it will require a great deal of work. Such ones have indeed "stabbed themselves all over with many pains."—1 Timothy 6:10.

1 Timothy 6:10—The pains that result from loving money

1 Timothy 6:10: For the love of money is a root of all sorts of injurious things, and by reaching out for this love some have been led astray from the faith and have stabbed themselves all over with many pains.

As we saw in the opening article of this series, people who avidly chase after riches as the key to success are, in fact, pursuing a mirage. Besides inviting disappointment, they invite many pains. For

example, while ardently pursuing wealth, people often sacrifice relationships with family and friends. Others forgo needed sleep—if not because of work, then because of anxiety or worry. "The sleep of a laboring man is sweet, whether he eats little or much; but the abundance of the rich will not allow him to sleep," says Ecclesiastes 5:12.—*Hebrew Names Version*.

Money is not just a cruel master but a deceitful one as well. Jesus Christ spoke of "the deceptive power of riches." (Mark 4:19) In other words, riches promise happiness, but they do not deliver. They just create a craving for more. "The man who loves money can never have enough," says Ecclesiastes 5:10.—*The New English Bible*.

In short, the love of money is self-defeating and ultimately leads to disappointment, frustration, or even crime. (Proverbs 28:20) More closely linked to happiness and success are generosity, a forgiving attitude, moral cleanness, love, and spirituality.

The apostle Peter wrote: "Maintain a good conscience." (1 Peter 3:16) Sadly, when people keep ignoring Jehovah's principles, eventually their conscience does not warn them anymore. Paul said that such a conscience has been "seared as with a branding iron." (1 Timothy 4:2) Have you ever been badly burned? When that happens, your skin becomes so scarred that you cannot feel anything there. If a person continues to do wrong things, his conscience can become "seared" and, in time, stop working.

1 Timothy 4:13—Why did Paul encourage Timothy to continue applying himself to public reading?

1 Timothy 4:13: Until I come, continue applying yourself to public reading, to exhortation, to teaching.

it-2 714 paragraphs 1-2

In the Christian Congregation. In the first century, few possessed copies of the many scrolls of the Bible, making public reading essential. The apostle Paul commanded public reading of his letters at the meetings of the Christian congregations and ordered them to be exchanged with his letters to other congregations so that these also might be read. (Colossians 4:16; 1 Thessalonians 5:27) Paul counseled the young Christian overseer Timothy to apply himself to "public reading, to exhortation, to teaching."—1 Timothy 4:13.

Public reading should be done with fluency. (Habakkuk 2:2) Since public reading is for the education of others, a public reader must thoroughly discern what he is reading and have a clear understanding of the writer's intention, being careful in reading to avoid giving the wrong idea or impression to the listeners. According to Revelation 1:3, those who read that prophecy aloud, as well as those who hear the words and observe them, will be happy.

¹⁹ Trust in Jehovah completely. (Read Proverbs 3:5, 6.) We know that God knows exactly what we need and that he cares deeply about us. (Psalm 37: 25; 1 Peter 5:7) His Word tells us: "Let your way of life be free of the love of money, while you are content with the present things. For [God] has said: 'I will never leave you, and I will never abandon you.'" (Hebrews 13:5) Jehovah does not want us to worry constantly about providing for our family. Over and over again, he has shown that he can provide for his people's needs. (Matthew 6:25-32) No matter what our work situation is, we regularly study God's Word, preach the good news, and attend our Christian meetings.—Matthew 24:14; Hebrews 10:24, 25.

²⁰ Keep your eye focused. (Read Matthew 6:22, 23.) This means keeping your life simple so that you can focus on serving Jehovah. We know that it would be foolish to allow money, a nice lifestyle, or the latest gadgets to become more important to us than our friendship with God. So, what will help us to put first things first? We must try our best not to go into debt. If you are already in debt, make a practical plan to lower it or pay it off. If we are not careful, material things could take up a lot of our time and energy, and we may not take time to

pray, study, or preach. Instead of allowing material things to make our life complicated, we want to learn to be content with basics such as "food and clothing." ²¹ Have the right priorities. We need to use our time, energy, and material things wisely. If we are

THE MOST IMPORTANT WORK WE CAN DO

²² The most important work we have is serving Jehovah and preaching the good news to others. (Matthew 24:14; 28:19, 20) Like Jesus, we want to do all we can in this work. Some have moved to serve where there is a greater need for preachers. Others are learning a foreign language so that they can preach to people who speak that language. Talk with those who have done these things, and ask them about it. They will tell you that their lives have become happier and more meaningful.—**Read Proverbs 10:22.**

²³ Today, many of us have to spend long hours at a job or even at several jobs simply to provide for our family's basic needs. Jehovah knows this, and he appreciates everything we do to care for our family. So let us all continue to imitate Jehovah and Jesus by working hard, no matter what kind of work we do. And may we remember that our most important work is serving Jehovah and preaching the good news of God's Kingdom. This will bring us true joy.

IMPROVING OUR SKILLS IN THE MINISTRY Discontinuing Unproductive Bible Studies



WHY IMPORTANT: People must call on the name of Jehovah in order to be saved. (Ro 10:13, 14) Yet, not everyone who agrees to study the Bible wants to live by Jehovah's standards. We make the best use of our precious time in the ministry by helping those who truly want to make changes to please Jehovah. If a Bible student does not make meaningful progress after a reasonable period of time, we wisely redirect our efforts to those whom Jehovah is drawing to him and his organization. (Joh 6:44) Of course, if at a future time the person gives evidence of being "rightly disposed for everlasting life," we gladly resume his Bible study.—Ac 13:48.

HOW TO DO IT:

- Commend the student for wanting to gain accurate knowledge. -1Ti 2:4
- Emphasize the importance of applying what he has learned.—Lu 6:46-49
- Kindly discuss Jesus' illustration of the sower, and ask him to consider what may be holding him back.—Mt 13:18-23
- Tactfully explain why you are discontinuing the study
- Let him know that you will call periodically to encourage him and that the study can resume in the future if he makes progress





Before discontinuing a Bible study, seek Jehovah's direction in prayer. While taking into account the student's age or other limitations, look for indications of meaningful progress.





[We see a brother in a clothing store shopping for a tie.]

Brother:Hi.Salesgirl:Can I interest you in one of our suits?Brother:OK, that sounds good.Salesgirl:I think it would go great with this tie.

[The brother has a suit fitted and leaves the store with several bags. Next he is seen buying himself an expensive highend new car. He also upgrades the furniture and other items in his home with expensive and lavish alternatives. He invites adult friends over and they play cards.]

[Now the bills have arrived and the brother is thinking out-loud to himself.]

I wish I had listened to the elders. I-I can't believe the interest on these credit cards. There's just no way I can afford this. It didn't seem like it was that much money at the time when I was spending it. Hmm, maybe if I pick up a second job, or, ah, working nights, weekends, I could ... Hold on a second. Wait! No. What did the text say this morning?

"Keep your eyes open and guard against every sort of greed, because even when a person has an abundance, his life does not result from the things he possesses." Luke 12:15

'Guard against greed.' It didn't feel like greed at the time. It seemed like these were all things I needed. But if it's starting to crowd out time for Jehovah . . .

[Next we see the brother returning the expensive car. He also replaces the luxury items in his home with more reasonable items. He invites over Witness friends and their families and participates in spiritually uplifting activities.]

[The brother has returned to the clothing store...]

Salesgirl: Hey. Brother: Hey. Salesgirl: You're back for more suits? Brother: Just this today.

[... but only buys a new tie.]

Salesgirl: All right. Well, you have a good day.

Brother: Thank you.

[Without having to worry and stress about paying for unnecessary things in his life he is happier and has more time for field service.]

What You Should Know About Sports

Sports—they can be good for you. In fact, at 1 Timothy 4:8, the Bible says that "physical exercise is beneficial." (Ftn.)

Sports can teach you vital skills, including how to cooperate and communicate with others. But sports can also be bad for you. It all depends on what you play, how you play, and how much you play.

Consider what you play. At Psalm 11:5, the Bible reminds us that God "hates anyone who loves violence." And some sports are clearly violent. So ask yourself, 'Does it make sense to be entertained by watching others get knocked around?'

Next, consider how you play. At Philippians 2:3, the Bible says: "Do nothing out of contentiousness or out of egotism, but with humility consider others superior to you."

Of course, nearly every sport involves a degree of competition. But a win-at-all-costs attitude will just take the fun out of the game. And besides, at Proverbs 16:18, the Bible says that "pride is before a crash." So ask yourself: 'Do I enjoy playing with overly competitive and prideful people? Then why would I want to be like that?'

Finally, consider how much you play sports—or even watch. At Philippians 1:10, the Bible says: "Make sure of the more important things." That's good advice because, let's face it, putting too much emphasis on sports is like putting too much salt on your food. If you spend too much time watching or playing sports, other things in your life will suffer. That includes your family life, school grades, and the time you need to devote to worship.

In the end, sports shouldn't be the most important thing in your life. Instead, think of it as the reward you get for taking care of your responsibilities first. That way, you really get the benefits of sports and avoid the pitfalls.

JESUS GIVES COUNSEL ABOUT RICHES

LUKE 12:1-34

As Jesus dines at the Pharisee's house, thousands gather outside awaiting him. He has had similar experiences with the crowds in Galilee. (Mark 1:33; 2:2; 3:9) Here in Judea, many want to see and hear him, showing an attitude quite different from that of the Pharisees at the meal.

What Jesus says first has special meaning for his disciples: "Watch out for the leaven of the Pharisees, which is hypocrisy." Jesus has given this warning before, but what he saw at the meal shows how urgent this counsel is. (Luke 12:1; Mark 8:15) The Pharisees may try to conceal their wickedness with a show of piety, but they are a danger that needs to be exposed. Jesus explains: "There is nothing carefully concealed that will not be revealed, and nothing secret that will not become known." —Luke 12:2.

Perhaps many of the people crowding around Jesus are Judeans who had not heard him teach in Galilee. Thus, he repeats key thoughts that he expressed earlier. He urges all who are listening: "Do not fear those who kill the body and after this are not able to do anything more." (Luke 12:4) As he has done before, he stresses the need for his followers to trust that God will care for them. They also need to acknowledge the Son of man and realize that God can help them.—Matthew 10:19, 20, 26-33; 12: 31, 32.

Then a man in the crowd brings up his immediate concern: "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me." (Luke 12:13) The Law says that the firstborn son receives two parts of the inheritance, so there should be no dispute. (Deuteronomy 21:17) It seems, though, that this man wants more than his legal share. Jesus wisely refuses to take sides. "Man, who appointed me judge or arbitrator between you two?" he asks.—Luke 12:14.

Jesus then gives this admonition to all: "Keep your eyes open and guard against every sort of greed, because even when a person has an abundance, his life does not result from the things he possesses." (Luke 12:15) No matter how much wealth a man may have, will he not at some point die and leave everything behind? Jesus emphasizes that point with a memorable illustration that also shows the value of having a good name with God:

"The land of a rich man produced well. So he began reasoning within himself, 'What should I do now that I have nowhere to gather my crops?' Then he said, 'I will do this: I will tear down my storehouses and build bigger ones, and there I will gather all my grain and all my goods, and I will say to myself: "You have many good things stored up for many years; take it easy, eat, drink, enjoy yourself."' But God said to him, 'Unreasonable one, this night they are demanding your life from you. Who, then, is to have the things you stored up?' So it goes with the man who stores up treasure for himself but is not rich toward God."—Luke 12:16-21.


Both Jesus' disciples and the others hearing him could become ensnared by seeking or piling up wealth. Or the cares of life could distract them from serving Jehovah. So Jesus repeats the fine counsel he gave about a year and a half earlier in the Sermon on the Mount:

"Stop being anxious about your lives as to what you will eat or about your bodies as to what you will wear. . . . Consider the ravens: They neither sow seed nor reap; they have neither barn nor storehouse; yet God feeds them.

• ILLUSTRATION OF THE RICH MAN • JESUS SPEAKS OF RAVENS AND LILIES • A "LITTLE FLOCK" TO BE IN THE KINGDOM

Are you not worth much more than birds? ... Consider how the lilies grow: They neither toil nor spin; but I tell you that not even Solomon in all his glory was arrayed as one of these.... So stop seeking what you will eat and what you will drink, and stop being in anxious suspense ... Your Father knows you need these things.... Keep seeking his Kingdom, and these things will be added to you."—Luke 12:22-31; Matthew 6: 25-33.

Who will be seeking God's Kingdom? Jesus reveals that a relatively small number, a "little flock," of faithful humans will be doing so. Later it will be revealed that their number is just 144,000. What is in store for them? They have Jesus' assurance: "Your Father has approved of giving you the Kingdom." These will not concentrate on gaining treasures on earth, which thieves could steal. Rather, their heart will be on "never-failing treasure in the heavens," where they will reign with Christ.—Luke 12:32-34.

PREVIEW

Jehovah generously gives us an abundance of material to watch, to read, and to study. This article will help you decide what to study, and it offers practical suggestions on how to get the most out of your study sessions.

Improve Your Study Habits!

"Make sure of the more important things."-PHIL. 1:10.

IT TAKES a great deal of effort to earn a living these days. Many of our brothers work long hours just to provide the necessities of life for their families. Countless others spend several hours each workday traveling to and from their place of employment. Many support themselves by doing hard physical labor. By the end of the day, these hardworking brothers and sisters are exhausted! The last thing many are inclined to do is study.

² The fact is, though, that we *must* find time to study —really study—God's Word and our Christian publications. Our relationship with Jehovah and our everlasting life depend on it! (1 Tim. 4:15) Some rise early every day and study when their home is quiet and their mind is fresh after a night's rest. Others set aside a few tranquil minutes at the end of the day to take in spiritual food and meditate on it.

³ No doubt you agree that it is important to find time to study. But *what* should we study? 'There is so much to read,' you may say. 'I find it hard to keep up.' Some manage to take full advantage of every spiritual provision, but many of our brothers struggle to find the time to do so. The Governing Body is aware of this. For that reason, direction was recently given to reduce the amount of material provided both in print and in digital form.

⁴ For example, we no longer publish the Yearbook of Je-

hovah's Witnesses, since many encouraging experiences are available on jw.org[®] as well as on the monthly programs of JW Broadcasting[®]. The public edition of the Watchtower and Awake! magazines are now published just three times a year. These adjustments have not been made so that we will have more time to pursue other activities. They have been put in place to enable us to give careful attention to "the more important things." (Phil. 1:10) Let us discuss how you can set priorities and how you can benefit fully from personal Bible study.

SET YOUR PRIORITIES

⁵ What should our priorities include? We should certainly spend time each day studying God's Word. The amount of material now scheduled for the congregation's weekly Bible reading has been reduced in order to give us more time to meditate on what we read and to do extra research. Our goal should be, not merely to cover the assigned material, but to allow the Bible's message to touch our hearts and to draw us closer to Jehovah. —Ps. 19:14.

⁶ What else should we study carefully? Of course, we want to prepare the material for the *Watchtower* Study and the Congregation Bible Study as well as other material for the midweek meeting. We should also keep up with each issue of *The Watchtower* and *Awake*!

⁷ 'Fine,' you may say, 'but what about

all the features that appear on our website, jw.org, as well as the material that is presented on JW Broadcasting? There is so much!' Consider an illustration: A great variety of delicious food is available on a buffet at a restaurant. The patrons of the restaurant could never sample everything that is offered. So they choose just a few dishes. Similarly, if you are unable to keep up with everything that is supplied electronically, do not be discouraged. Read or watch what you can. Let us now discuss what is involved in study and how to derive the most benefit from our study.

STUDY IS WORK!

⁸ To study is to read with sustained, purposeful concentration. It is not just a matter of skimming the assigned material and underlining the answers. When preparing for the Watchtower Study, for example, first take note of the preview at the beginning of the article. Next, consider the title of the article. as well as the subheadings and the review questions. Then, read the article slowly and carefully. Take note of the topic sentence, which is usually the first sentence of every paragraph. The topic sentence will often alert you to the direction in which the paragraph will be taking you. As you read through the article, think about the way each paragraph supports the subheading and ties in with the general theme of the article. Make a note of any unfamiliar words and of points that you would like to clarify through further research.

Parents, teach your children how to study (See paragraph 10)

• The Watchtower Study is a study of the Bible. Therefore, pay particular attention to the scriptures, especially those that will be read when the congregation considers the material. Take special note of how the key words or phrases in the scriptures support the point being made in the paragraph. Moreover, take time to meditate on the scriptures that you read, and reflect on how you can personally apply them in your life.—**Read Joshua 1:8.**

¹⁰ Understandably, parents want the weekly Family Worship period to be a pleasant experience for their children. However, although parents should always have something definite in mind for family worship, there is no need for them to feel that they must organize special activities or exciting projects each week. While the Family Worship period may be spent watching a monthly program on JW Broadcasting or occasionally working on a special project, such as assembling a model of Noah's ark, it is also important for children to be taught how to study. They need to learn how to prepare for congregation meetings, for example, or how to do research on an issue that has arisen at school. (Read Hebrews 5:14.) If they spend some time on study projects at home, they will be better equipped to focus on the material presented at congregation meetings, assemblies, and conventions, which may not always feature a video. Of course, the length of each study period will depend on the age and temperament of the children.

¹¹ Our Bible students also need to learn how to study. When they are new, we are happy to see them simply underline the answers in preparation for their Bible study or for congregation meetings. But we do need to teach our Bible students how to do research and how to do meaningful study on their own. In that way, when problems arise, instead of immediately turning to others in the congregation for help, they will know

how to get practical advice for themselves by doing research in our publications.

STUDY WITH A PURPOSE

¹² If you are not a studious person, you may not think it possible to learn to enjoy studying. But you can. Start out with shorter periods, and then gradually increase the time you spend. Have a goal in mind. Of course, our ultimate goal should be to draw ever closer to Jehovah. A more immediate goal may be to answer a question that someone has asked or to do research on a problem that we are facing.

¹³ As an example, are you a young person in school? Your classmates may all believe in the theory of evolution. You would like to defend the Bible's teaching, but perhaps you do not feel qualified to do so. That calls for a study project! Your aim could be twofold: (1) to strengthen your own conviction that God created all things and (2) to improve in your ability to defend the truth. (Rom. 1:20; 1 Pet. 3: 15) You might first ask yourself, 'What arguments have my classmates used in support of evolution?' Then using our publications, do careful research. Defending your beliefs may not be as hard as you think. Most people believe in evolution simply because someone they respect told them that it is true. If you find just a point or two that you can share, you may provide a satisfactory answer to a sincere inquirer.-Read Colossians 4:6.

DEVELOP YOUR INTEREST

¹⁴ Suppose that at an upcoming congregation meeting we are scheduled to explore the writings of one of the so-called minor prophets, perhaps one with whom you are not very familiar. The first step might be to develop an interest in what that prophet wrote. How might you accomplish that?


¹⁵ First, ask yourself: 'What do I know about the writer of the book? Who was he, where did he live, what was his occupation?' The background of the writer may also explain his choice of words or the type of illustrations he used. As you read the Bible, look for phrases that reflect the personality of the writer.

¹⁶ Next, you will find it helpful to place the writing of the book in the stream of time. You can easily do that by checking the "Table of the Books of the Bible" in the back of the New World Translation of the Holy Scriptures. In addition, you could review the chart of prophets and kings in Appendix A6. If the Bible book you are studying is prophetic, you would do well to find out about conditions that existed at the time of writing. What bad attitudes or practices did the prophet hope to correct? Who were his contemporaries? To get a complete overview, you may need to consult more than one source. For example, to understand more fully what was taking place when the prophet Amos lived,

Bring the Bible to Life!

By careful study of the Scriptures, we come to see Bible characters as real people who had thoughts and feelings just like ours. Consider some details about Amos.

- He "took care of sycamore fig trees" and was a sheep raiser who came from a humble background.—Amos 1:1; 7:14.
- He willingly left his home in Judah to carry out his assignment as a prophet in Israel. –Amos 7:15.
- He was ordered to stop his preaching work. —Amos 7:10-13.

Can you relate to Amos? You may have much in common with other Bible characters too. Bring them all to life through diligent study!

you will benefit by consulting passages in the books of 2 Kings and 2 Chronicles, which are listed in the marginal references to Amos 1:1. In addition, you might review the writings of Hosea, who may have been a contemporary of Amos. All these sources would help shed light on the period in which Amos lived.—2 Ki. 14:25-28; 2 Chron. 26:1-15; Hos. 1:1-11; Amos 1:1.

PAY ATTENTION TO DETAIL

¹⁷ It is good to read the Bible with a healthy dose of curiosity. Suppose, for example, that you are reading the 12th chapter of Zechariah's prophecy, which foretells the death of the Messiah. (Zech.

12:10) When you come to verse 12, you read that "the family of Nathan's house" would grieve bitterly at the Messiah's death. Instead of quickly passing over that detail, you pause and ask yourself: 'What is the connection between the house of Nathan and the Messiah? Is there any way to get more information?' You do a little "detective" work. A marginal reference leads you to 2 Samuel 5: 13, 14, where you learn that Nathan was one of King David's sons. A second marginal reference, Luke 3:23, 31, reveals that Jesus was a direct descendant of Nathan through Mary. (See "Joseph, son of Heli," study note on Luke 3:23.) Suddenly, you are intrigued! You knew that Jesus was forefold to be a descendant of David. (Matt. 22:42) But David had more than 20 sons. Is it not amazing that Zechariah pinpoints the household of Nathan

¹⁸ Consider another example. In the first chapter of Luke, we read that the angel Gabriel visited Mary and announced regarding the son she was to bear: "This one will be great and will be called Son of the Most High, and Jehovah God will give him the throne of David his father, and he will rule as King over the house of Jacob forever." (Luke 1:32, 33) We might be inclined to focus on the first part of Gabriel's message, namely, that Jesus would be called "Son of the Most High." But Gabriel also prophesied that Jesus would "rule as King." So we ask ourselves what those words of Gabriel might have meant to Mary. Did she take Gabriel's words to mean that Jesus would replace King Herod—or one of his successors as the ruler in Israel? If Jesus did become king, Mary would be the queen mother, and her family would live in the royal palace. Yet, there is no record that Mary even raised such a possibility with Gabriel; nor do we ever read that Mary asked for a position of favor in the Kingdom, as two of Jesus' disciples did. (Matt. 20:20-23) This detail reinforces our picture of Mary as an extremely humble woman!

¹⁹ Let us remember that our ultimate goal in studying God's Word and our Christian publications is to draw closer to Jehovah. We also want to see more clearly "what sort of person" we are and what changes we need to make in order to please God. (**Read James 1:22-25; 4:8.)** At the beginning of each study period, then, we should ask Jehovah for his spirit. We should beg him to help us to benefit fully from the material and to see ourselves as he sees us.
