

"The most difficult time of the night to stay awake is just before the dawn of a new day," says a former night worker. Very likely, others who have to remain awake all night would agree. Present-day Christians face a similar challenge because the long night of Satan's wicked system of things is now at the darkest point in its history. (Romans 13:12) How dangerous it would be for us to fall asleep at this late hour! It is imperative that we "be sound in mind" and heed the Scriptural exhortation to "be vigilant with a view to prayers."—1 Peter 4:7.

1 Peter 4:8—"Have intense love for one another"

1 Peter 4:8: Above all things, have intense love for one another, because love covers a multitude of sins.

Finally, keep firmly in mind the apostle Peter's loving admonition: "The end of all things has drawn close. Be sound in mind, therefore, and be vigilant with a view to prayers. Above all things, have intense love for one another, because love covers a multitude of sins." (1 Peter 4:7, 8) It is so easy to let human imperfections—other people's and our own—work their way into our hearts and minds and become obstacles, stumbling blocks. Satan well knows this human weakness. Divide and conquer is one of his wily tactics. We must, therefore, be quick to cover over such sins with intense love for one another and not "allow place for the Devil."—Ephesians 4:25-27.

1 Peter 4:9—"Be hospitable to one another without grumbling"

1 Peter 4:9: Be hospitable to one another without grumbling.

18.03 14-15 paragraphs 2-3

2 Among other things, Peter urged his brothers: "Be hospitable to one another." (1 Peter 4:9) The word "hospitality" in Greek literally means "fondness for, or kindness to, strangers." Note, however, that Peter urged his Christian brothers and sisters to be hospitable "to one another," to those whom they already knew and associated with. How would being hospitable help them?

3 It would draw them together. Consider your own experience. Have you had the pleasure of being invited to someone's home? Did that occasion not leave you with warm memories? When you entertained some from your congregation, was your friendship not deepened? By extending hospitality, we get to know our brothers and sisters in a more personal way than we can in other settings. Christians in Peter's day needed to draw ever closer as conditions grew worse. The same is true for Christians in these "last days."—2 Timothy 3:1.

Questions From Readers

The Bible says that Jesus "preached to the spirits in prison." (1 Peter 3:19) What does this mean?

The apostle Peter identifies these spirits as those who had "once been disobedient when the patience of God was waiting in Noah's days." (1 Peter 3:20) Clearly, Peter was referring to spirit creatures who chose to join Satan's rebellion. Jude mentions the angels who "did not keep their original position but forsook their own proper dwelling place," saying that God "has reserved [them] with eternal bonds under dense darkness for the judgment of the great day."—Jude 6.

In what way were spirit creatures disobedient in Noah's day? Before the Deluge, these wicked spirits materialized in human form—something that God had not purposed for them. (Genesis 6:2, 4) Furthermore, those angels who had sex with women were practicing a perversion. God did not create spirit creatures to engage in sexual relations with women. (Genesis 5:2) These wicked, disobedient angels will be destroyed in God's due time. For now, as Jude notes, they are in a condition of "dense darkness"—a spiritual prison, so to speak.

When and how did Jesus preach to these "spirits in prison"? Peter writes that this occurred after Jesus was "made alive in the spirit." (1 Peter 3:18, 19) Note, too, that Peter says that Jesus "preached." Peter's use of the past tense suggests that the preaching occurred before Peter wrote his

first letter. It seems, then, that sometime after his resurrection, Jesus made a proclamation to the wicked spirits regarding the fully justified punishment they are due to receive. It was not a preaching that held out any hope for them. It was a preaching of judgment. (Jonah 1:1, 2) Once Jesus had demonstrated his faith and loyalty to death and then was resurrected—proving that the Devil indeed had no hold on him—Jesus had the basis for making such a condemnatory proclamation.—John 14:30; 16:8-11.

In the future, Jesus will bind and throw into the abyss both Satan and those angels. (Luke 8:30, 31; Revelation 20:1-3) Until that time, these disobedient spirits are in a condition of dense spiritual darkness, and their final destruction is certain.—Revelation 20:7-10.

These were ones who were 'dead in their trespasses and sins,' or who were spiritually dead, before they heard the good news. (Ephesians 2:1) After putting faith in the good news, though, they began to "live" spiritually.

People think the Bible says that God controls the world. But how could that be? This world is out of control! It's full of pain and suffering, sickness and death, poverty and disaster.




The good news is: The Bible says things will not always be like this! It tells us why we're in this situation, how God will fix it, and how we can deal with it in the meantime.

A CHANGE FOR THE RICH MAN AND FOR LAZARUS

LUKF 16:14-31

Jesus has been giving his disciples fine counsel about the use of material riches. But his disciples are not the only ones listening. Pharisees are also present, and they ought to take to heart Jesus' counsel. Why? Because they are "money lovers." On hearing what Jesus is saying, they 'begin to sneer at him.'—Luke 15:2; 16: 13. 14.

That does not intimidate Jesus, though. He says to them: "You are those who declare yourselves righteous before men, but God knows your hearts. For what is considered exalted by men is a disgusting thing in God's sight."—Luke 16:15.

The Pharisees have long been "exalted by men," but this is a time of change, a time for the tables to turn. The highly exalted ones who are rich in worldly goods, political power, and religious influence are to be brought down. The common people who recognize their spiritual need are to be raised up. Jesus makes it clear that a major change is taking place, saying:

"The Law and the Prophets were until John. From then on, the Kingdom of God is being declared as good news, and every sort of person is pressing forward toward it. Indeed, it is easier for heaven and earth to pass away than for one stroke of a letter of the Law to go unfulfilled." (Luke 3:18; 16:16, 17) How do Jesus' words indicate that a change is occurring?

The Jewish religious leaders proudly profess adherence to the Law of Moses. Recall that when Jesus restored sight to a man in Jerusalem, the Pharisees pridefully said: "We are disciples of Moses. We know that God has spoken to Moses." (John 9:13, 28, 29) One purpose of the Law given through Moses was to lead humble ones to the Messiah, that is, to Jesus.



John the Baptist identified Jesus as the Lamb of God. (John 1:29-34) Starting with John's ministry, humble Jews, especially among the poor, have been hearing about "the Kingdom of God." Yes, there is "good news" for all wanting to be subjects of God's Kingdom and benefit from it.

The Mosaic Law is not going unfulfilled; rather, it has led to the Messiah. Moreover, the obligation to keep it is ending. For example, the Law allowed for divorce on various grounds, but now Jesus explains that "everyone who divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery, and whoever marries a woman divorced from her husband commits adultery." (Luke 16:18) How such pronouncements enrage the legalistically minded Pharisees!


Jesus now relates an illustration that underscores the magnitude of the change that is taking place. It features two men—each of whose status, or situation, changes dramatically. In considering the illustration, bear in mind that among those hearing it are money-loving Pharisees who are being exalted by men.

"There was a rich man," Jesus says, "who used to dress in purple and linen, enjoying himself day after day with magnificence. But a beggar named Lazarus used to be put at his gate, covered with ulcers and desiring to be filled with the things dropping from the table of the rich man. Yes, even the dogs would come and lick his ulcers."—Luke 16:19-21.

The Pharisees are money lovers, so is there any doubt whom Jesus is illustrating by this "rich man"? These Jewish religious leaders also like to deck themselves out in costly, fancy clothing. And beyond whatever actual wealth they might have, they seem rich in the privileges they enjoy and opportunities they have. Yes, illustrating them by a man clothed in royal purple reflects their favored position, and the white linen reflects their self-righteousness.—Daniel 5:7.

How do these rich, proud leaders view the poor, the common people? They contemptuously consider them 'am ha-'a'rets, or people of the land (earth), who neither know the Law nor deserve to be taught it. (John 7:49) That reflects the situation of the "beggar named Lazarus," who hungers for even the meager "things

dropping from the table of the rich man." Like Lazarus covered with ulcers, the common people are looked down on, as if they are spiritually diseased.

That sad situation has existed for some time, but Jesus knows that the time has come for a great change in the condition of both those who are like the rich man and those who are like Lazarus.

THE CHANGE FOR THE RICH MAN AND FOR LAZARUS

Jesus goes on to describe this dramatic change in circumstances. "Now in the course of time," he says, "the beggar died and was carried off by the angels to Abraham's side. Also, the rich man died and was buried. And in the Grave he lifted up his eyes, being in torment, and he saw Abraham from afar and Lazarus by his side."—Luke 16:22, 23.

Those listening to Jesus know that Abraham is long dead and in the Grave. The Scriptures make it clear that no one in the Grave, or Sheol, can see or speak, including Abraham. (Ecclesiastes 9:5, 10) What, then, do these religious leaders think that Jesus means with this illustration? What might he be indicating about the common people and the money-loving religious leaders?



Jesus has just pointed to a change by saying that 'the Law and the Prophets were until John the Baptist, but from then on the Kingdom of God is being declared as good news.' Hence, it is with the preaching of John and Jesus Christ that both Lazarus and the rich man die to their former circumstances, or condition, and they experience new positions relative to God.

Specifically, those of the humble or poor class have long been spiritually deprived. But



they are being helped by and are responding to the message about the Kingdom presented first by John the Baptist and then by Jesus. Formerly, they had to get by with what amounted to little 'things dropped from the spiritual table' of the religious leaders. Now they are being fed with essential Scriptural truths, particularly the wonderful things Jesus is explaining. It is as if they finally are in the favored position in the eyes of Jehovah God.

In contrast, those in the rich and influential class of religious leaders refuse to accept the Kingdom message that John proclaimed and that Jesus has been preaching throughout the land. (Matthew 3:1, 2; 4:17) In fact, they are angered, or tormented, by that message, which points to a coming fiery judgment from God. (Matthew 3:7-12) It would be a relief to the



PREVIEW

At times, brothers and sisters in full-time service may have to leave their assignment, or they may receive a new assignment. This article discusses the challenges they face and what can help them to make a successful transition. It also considers what others can do to encourage and support them, as well as principles that can help all of us to deal with changes.

Adjusting to a New Assignment

"God is not unrighteous so as to forget your work and the love you showed for his name."—HEB. 6:10.

"AFTER we had spent 21 wonderful years in our missionary assignment, all four of our parents had become infirm," recall Robert and Mary Jo. "We were happy to take care of them. Still, it was painful to leave what had become the home of our hearts."

- ² "When we learned that our health would not permit us to return to our assignment, we wept," relate William and Terrie. "Our dream of serving Jehovah in a foreign land was over."
- ³ "We knew that our persecutors wanted to close the branch office where I was serving," says Aleksey. "But it was still a shock when it happened and we had to leave Bethel."
- 4 Add to these the experiences of thousands of Bethel family members and others who have received new assignments.* These faithful brothers and sisters may find it challenging to leave a cherished assignment. What can help them to deal with the change? How can you assist them? The answers to those questions can help all of us to deal with changing circumstances in life.

HOW TO DEAL WITH A CHANGE

⁵ Whether we serve in the field or at Bethel, we can develop deep affection for people and even for the place where we serve. If for any reason we have to leave, our heart feels torn. We miss those who stay behind, and we worry about them, especially if we had to leave because of persecution. (Matt. 10: 23; 2 Cor. 11:28, 29) Further, taking up a new assignment—or even returning home-often means experiencing culture shock. "We had become unfamiliar with our own culture and even with preaching in our native language," say Robert and Mary Jo. "We felt as if we didn't fit in anymore." Some who get a change of assignment may suddenly face unexpected financial challenges. They may feel uncertain, insecure, and discouraged. What can help?

6 Stay close to Jehovah. (Jas. 4:8) How

can we do that? By trusting in him as the "Hearer of prayer." (Ps. 65:2) "Pour out your hearts before him," says Psalm 62:8. Jehovah can do "more than superabundantly beyond all the things we ask or conceive." (Eph. 3:20) He does not limit himself to what we specifically ask for in our prayers. He may do the unexpected, beyond anything that we could ever think of, to solve our problems.

⁷ To remain close to Jehovah, read the Scriptures daily and ponder on them. One former missionary says: "Maintain a regular schedule of family worship and meeting preparation, just as you did in your former assignment." Also, continue to be fully involved in preaching the good news in your new congregation. Jehovah remembers those who continue to serve him faithfully, even if they cannot do all they did before.—**Read Hebrews 6:10-12.**

It is essential that we draw close to Jehovah and trust in him (See paragraphs 6-7)

- 8 Keep your life simple. Do not let the anxieties of Satan's world "choke" your spiritual activity. (Matt. 13:22) Reject pressure from the world or from well-meaning friends or relatives to seek financial security in Satan's system. (Read 1 John 2:15-17.) Trust in Jehovah, who promises to provide for all our spiritual, emotional, and material needs "at the right time."—Heb. 4:16; 13:5, 6.
- ⁹ Avoid unnecessary debt. (Read Proverbs 22:3, 7.) A move can be surprisingly costly, and it is easy to get into debt. To minimize the debt, beware of buying on credit things you do not really need.

When we are under emotional pressure, as when caring for sick loved ones, we may find it difficult to decide how much debt to take on. In such situations, remember that "prayer and supplication" can help you to make wise decisions. In response to your prayers, Jehovah can grant you the peace that will "guard your hearts and your mental powers," helping you to think things through calmly. —Phil. 4:6, 7; 1 Pet. 5:7.

¹⁰ Maintain good relationships. Share your feelings and experiences with good friends, especially those who may have experienced similar joys and challenges. Doing so can promote emotional healing. (Eccl. 4:9, 10) The friends you made in your former assignment will remain your friends. Now, in your new assignment, you need to make new friends. Remember that to have a friend, you need to be a friend. How can you cultivate new friendships? Share the rich experiences Jehovah has given you, and let others sense your joy in Jehovah's service. Even if some in the congregation do not understand your enthusiasm for full-time service, others may be drawn to your example and become good friends. Be mindful, though, not to draw undue attention to your own accomplishments, and do not focus on negative feelings.

¹¹ If you had to leave your assignment because of your mate's health, do not blame him or her. On the other hand, if you yourself had health problems, do not feel guilty, thinking that

you let your mate down. Remember, you are "one flesh," and you promised before Jehovah to care for each other under all circumstances. (Matt. 19:5, 6) If you left an assignment because of an unplanned pregnancy, make sure your child knows that he is more important to you than your assignment was. Reassure your child that you view him as "a reward" from God. (Ps. 127:3-5) At the same time, tell him about the rewarding experiences you had in your assignment. Doing so can motivate your child to use his life in Jehovah's joyful service just as you have done.

HOW OTHERS CAN HELP

12 Commendably, many congregations and individuals do what they can to enable those in full-time service to remain in their assignments. They do so by encouraging them to continue their work, by giving them financial or other material support, or by helping them to care for their family members back home. (Gal. 6:2) If those in full-time service receive a new assignment to your congregation, do not view the change of assignment as an indication that they somehow failed or were disciplined.* Instead, help them to make the transition easier. Give them a warm welcome and commend them for the work they have done, even if poor health limits what they can do at present. Get to know

them. Learn from their wealth of knowledge, training, and experience.

13 Initially, those receiving a new assignment may need your help to obtain housing, transportation, work, and other basic necessities. They may also need current information about everyday matters, such as paying taxes and obtaining insurance. Most important, they need, not pity, but understanding. They may be struggling to deal with their own health problems or those of their relative. They may be grieving over the death of a loved one.* And they also may grieve, even if in private, over the loss of association with their spiritual family in their former assignment. It takes time to process such deep and often very mixed emotions.

14 In the meantime, your support and example can help them to adjust. "In my previous assignment, I conducted Bible studies every day," says a sister who served for many years in a foreign land. "In my new one, it was difficult even to get the opportunity to open the Bible or to show a video in the ministry. But local publishers invited me on their calls and studies. Seeing those zealous and courageous brothers and sisters conduct progressive Bible studies gave me a more positive outlook. I learned to start conversations in the new territory. All of this helped me to regain joy."

for Jehovah's hand in your life and keep preaching. Imitate the faithful Christians of the first century. Wherever they were, they "went through the land declaring the good news of the word." (Acts 8:1, 4) Your efforts to keep on preaching may yield good results. For example, pioneers who were expelled from one country moved to a neighboring land where there also was a great need in their language. Within months, new rapidly growing groups were formed.

16 "The joy of Jehovah is your strength." (Neh. 8:10, ftn.) We must find our joy primarily in Jehovah and not in our assignment, no matter how much we treasure it. Therefore, keep walking with Jehovah, looking to him for wisdom, guidance, and support. Remember that you came to love your former assignment because you put your heart into helping the people there. Put your heart into your present assignment and see how Jehovah helps you to love it too. —Eccl. 7:10.

¹⁷ We must remember that our ser-

vice to Jehovah is eternal, but our present assignment is temporary. In the new world, all of us may have a change of assignment. Aleksey, mentioned at the outset, believes that his current experiences are preparing him for that. "I always knew that Jehovah and the new world are real, but somehow they seemed a little distant," Aleksey says. "Now I see Jehovah right in front of my eyes and the new world as the next stop on my journey." (Acts 2:25) No matter what our assignment is, let us keep walking with Jehovah. He will never leave us, but he will help us to find joy in doing whatever we can in his service-wherever that may be.—Isa. 41:13.


