1 John 1-5

1 That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have observed and our hands have felt, concerning the word of life, ² (yes, the life was made manifest, and we have seen and are bearing witness and reporting to you the everlasting life that was with the Father and was made manifest to us), ³ that which we have seen and heard we are reporting also to you, so that you too may have fellowship with us. And this fellowship of ours is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. ⁴ And we are writing these things so that our joy may be complete.

⁵ This is the message that we heard from him and are announcing to you: God is light, and there is no darkness at all in him. ⁶ If we make the statement, "We are having fellowship with him," and yet we go on walking in the darkness, we are lying and are not practicing the truth. ⁷ However, if we are walking in the light as he himself is in the light, we do have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin.

⁸ If we make the statement, "We have no sin," we are misleading ourselves and the truth is not in us. ⁹ If we confess our sins, he is faithful and righteous so as to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. ¹⁰ If we make the statement, "We have not sinned," we are making him a liar, and his word is not in us.

2 My little children, I am writing you these things so that you may not commit a sin. And yet, if anyone does commit a sin, we have a helper with the Father, Jesus Christ, a righteous one. ² And he is a propitiatory sacrifice for our sins, yet not for ours only but also for the whole world's. ³ And by this we realize that we have come to know him, namely, if we continue observing his commandments. ⁴ The one who says, "I have come to know him," and yet does not observe his commandments is a liar, and the truth is not in this

person. ⁵ But whoever does observe his word, in this person the love of God has truly been made perfect. By this we know that we are in union with him. ⁶ The one who says he remains in union with him is himself under obligation to go on walking just as that one walked.

⁷ Beloved ones, I am writing you, not a new commandment, but an old commandment that you have had from the beginning. This old commandment is the word that you heard. ⁸ Again, I am writing you a new commandment, which is true in his case and in yours, because the darkness is passing away and the true light is already shining.

⁹ The one who says that he is in the light and yet hates his brother is still in the darkness. ¹⁰ The one who loves his brother remains in the light, and in him there is no cause for stumbling. ¹¹ But the one who hates his brother is in the darkness and is walking in the darkness, and he does not know where he is going, because the darkness has blinded his eyes.

¹² I am writing you, little children, because your sins have been forgiven you for the sake of his name. ¹³ I am writing you, fathers, because you have come to know him who is from the beginning. I am writing you, young men, because you have conquered the wicked one. I write you, young children, because you have come to know the Father. ¹⁴ I write you, fathers, because you have come to know him who is from the beginning. I write you, young men, because you are strong and the word of God remains in you and you have conquered the wicked one.

¹⁵ Do not love either the world or the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him; ¹⁶ because everything in the world—the desire of the flesh and the desire of the eyes and the showy display of one's means of life—does not originate with the Father, but originates with the world.

¹⁷ Furthermore, the world is passing away and so is its desire, but the one who does the will of God remains forever.

¹⁸ Young children, it is the last hour, and just as you have heard that the antichrist is coming, even now many antichrists have appeared, from which fact we know that it is the last hour. ¹⁹ They went out from us, but they were not of our sort; for if they had been of our sort, they would have remained with us. But they went out so that it might be shown that not all are of our sort. ²⁰ And you have an anointing from the holy one, and all of you have knowledge. ²¹ I write you, not because you do not know the truth, but because you know it, and because no lie originates with the truth.

Who is the liar but the one who denies that Jesus is the Christ? This is the antichrist, the one who denies the Father and the Son. Everyone who denies the Son does not have the Father either. But whoever acknowledges the Son has the Father also. As for you, what you have heard from the beginning must remain in you. If what you have heard from the beginning remains in you, you will also remain in union with the Son and in union with the Father. Furthermore, this is what he himself promised us—the life everlasting.

²⁶ I write you these things about those who are trying to mislead you. ²⁷ And as for you, the anointing that you received from him remains in you, and you do not need anyone to be teaching you; but the anointing from him is teaching you about all things and is true and is no lie. Just as it has taught you, remain in union with him. ²⁸ So now, little children, remain in union with him, so that when he is made manifest we may have freeness of speech and not shrink away from him in shame at his presence. ²⁹ If you know that he is righteous, you also know that everyone who practices righteousness has been born from him.

3 See what sort of love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are. That is why the world does not know us, because it has not come to know him.

² Beloved ones, we are now children of God, but it has not yet been made manifest what we will be. We do know that when he is made manifest we will be like him, because we will see him just as he is.

³ And everyone who has this hope in him purifies himself, just as that one is pure.

⁴ Everyone who practices sin is also practicing lawlessness, and sin is lawlessness. ⁵ You know, too, that he was made manifest to take away our sins, and there is no sin in him. ⁶ Everyone remaining in union with him does not practice sin; no one who practices sin has either seen him or come to know him. ⁷ Little children, let no one mislead you; the one who practices righteousness is righteous, just as that one is righteous. ⁸ The one who practices sin originates with the Devil, because the Devil has been sinning from the beginning. For this purpose the Son of God was made manifest, to break up the works of the Devil.

⁹ Everyone who has been born from God does not practice sin, for His seed remains in such one, and he cannot practice sin, for he has been born from God. ¹⁰ The children of God and the children of the Devil are evident by this fact: Whoever does not practice righteousness does not originate with God, nor does the one who does not love his brother. ¹¹ For this is the message that you have heard from the beginning, that we should love one another; ¹² not like Cain, who originated with the wicked one and slaughtered his brother. And for what reason did he slaughter him? Because his own works were wicked, but those of his brother were righteous.

¹³ Do not be surprised, brothers, that the world hates you. ¹⁴ We know that we have passed over from death to life, because we love the brothers. The one who does not love remains in death.

¹⁵ Everyone who hates his brother is a murderer, and you know that

no murderer has everlasting life remaining in him. ¹⁶ By this we have come to know love, because that one surrendered his life for us, and we are under obligation to surrender our lives for our brothers. ¹⁷ But whoever has the material possessions of this world and sees his brother in need and yet refuses to show him compassion, in what way does the love of God remain in him? ¹⁸ Little children, we should love, not in word or with the tongue, but in deed and truth.

- ¹⁹ By this we will know that we originate with the truth, and we will assure our hearts before him ²⁰ regarding whatever our hearts may condemn us in, because God is greater than our hearts and knows all things. ²¹ Beloved ones, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have freeness of speech toward God; ²² and whatever we ask we receive from him, because we are observing his commandments and doing what is pleasing in his eyes. ²³ Indeed, this is his commandment: that we have faith in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he gave us a commandment. ²⁴ Moreover, the one who observes his commandments remains in union with him, and he in union with such one. And by the spirit that he gave us, we know that he remains in union with us.
- **4** Beloved ones, do not believe every inspired statement, but test the inspired statements to see whether they originate with God, for many false prophets have gone out into the world.
- ² This is how you know that the inspired statement is from God: Every inspired statement that acknowledges Jesus Christ as having come in the flesh originates with God. ³ But every inspired statement that does not acknowledge Jesus does not originate with God. Furthermore, this is the antichrist's inspired statement that you have heard was coming, and now it is already in the world.

⁴ You originate with God, little children, and you have conquered them, because the one who is in union with you is greater than the

one who is in union with the world. ⁵ They originate with the world; that is why they speak what originates with the world and the world listens to them. ⁶ We originate with God. Whoever comes to know God listens to us; whoever does not originate with God does not listen to us. By this we distinguish the inspired statement of truth from the inspired statement of error.

⁷ Beloved ones, let us continue loving one another, because love is from God, and everyone who loves has been born from God and knows God. ⁸ Whoever does not love has not come to know God, because God is love. ⁹ By this the love of God was revealed in our case, that God sent his only-begotten Son into the world so that we might gain life through him. ¹⁰ The love is in this respect, not that we have loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as a propitiatory sacrifice for our sins.

¹¹ Beloved ones, if this is how God loved us, then we are also under obligation to love one another. ¹² No one has seen God at any time. If we continue loving one another, God remains in us and his love is made perfect in us. ¹³ By this we know that we are remaining in union with him and he in union with us, because he has given his spirit to us. ¹⁴ In addition, we ourselves have seen and are bearing witness that the Father has sent his Son as savior of the world. ¹⁵ Whoever acknowledges that Jesus is God's Son, God remains in union with such one and he in union with God. ¹⁶ And we have come to know and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and the one who remains in love remains in union with God and God remains in union with him. ¹⁷ In this way love has been made perfect in us, so that we may have freeness of speech in the day of judgment, because just as that one is, so are we ourselves in this world. ¹⁸ There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts fear out, because fear restrains us. Indeed, the one who is

fearful has not been made perfect in love. ¹⁹ We love, because he first loved us.

- ²⁰ If anyone says, "I love God," and yet is hating his brother, he is a liar. For the one who does not love his brother, whom he has seen, cannot love God, whom he has not seen. ²¹ And we have this commandment from him, that whoever loves God must also love his brother.
- **5** Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ has been born from God, and everyone who loves the one who caused to be born loves him who has been born from that one. ² By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God and carry out his commandments. ³ For this is what the love of God means, that we observe his commandments; and yet his commandments are not burdensome, ⁴ because everyone who has been born from God conquers the world. And this is the conquest that has conquered the world, our faith.
- ⁵ Who can conquer the world? Is it not the one who has faith that Jesus is the Son of God? ⁶ This is the one who came by means of water and blood, Jesus Christ, not with the water only, but with the water and with the blood. And the spirit is bearing witness, because the spirit is the truth. ⁷ For there are three witness bearers: ⁸ the spirit and the water and the blood; and the three are in agreement.
- ⁹ If we accept the witness of men, the witness of God is greater. Because this is the witness God gives, the witness that he has given about his Son. ¹⁰ The person putting his faith in the Son of God has the witness within himself. The person not having faith in God has made him a liar, because he has not put his faith in the witness given by God concerning his Son. ¹¹ And this is the witness, that God gave us everlasting life, and this life is in his Son. ¹² The one who has the Son has this life; the one who does not have the Son of God does not have this life.

¹³ I write you these things so that you may know that you have life everlasting, you who put your faith in the name of the Son of God. ¹⁴ And this is the confidence that we have toward him, that no matter what we ask according to his will, he hears us. ¹⁵ And if we know that he hears us concerning whatever we are asking, we know that we are to have the things we ask for, since we have asked them of him.

¹⁶ If anyone catches sight of his brother committing a sin that does not incur death, he will ask, and God will give life to him, yes, to those not committing sin that incurs death. There is a sin that does incur death. It is concerning that sin that I do not tell him to make request. ¹⁷ All unrighteousness is sin, and yet there is a sin that does not incur death.

¹⁸ We know that everyone who has been born from God does not practice sin, but the one born from God watches him, and the wicked one cannot take hold of him. ¹⁹ We know that we originate with God, but the whole world is lying in the power of the wicked one. ²⁰ But we know that the Son of God has come, and he has given us insight so that we may gain the knowledge of the one who is true. And we are in union with the one who is true, by means of his Son Jesus Christ. This is the true God and life everlasting. ²¹ Little children, guard yourselves from idols.

An Introduction To 1 John

First John is the longest of the Apostle John's three inspired letters.

John was likely in or near Ephesus when he wrote his letters in about 98 C.E. He also wrote his gospel account at about the same time. John did not address his first letter to any individual but wrote it as a general letter to all Christians.

His purpose was to strengthen the faith of fellow Christians in the truths that God had revealed to the Christian Congregation. The letter addresses three main themes the Antichrist, Sin and Love.

1 John contains 5 Chapters.

In **Chapter 1:** John tells us that God is light and that Christians must walk in the light to walk in the light. We need to recognize that we are sinners and need forgiveness based on Christ's propitiatory sacrifice.

Chapter 2: Warns us about Antichrist. Among other things they claim that Jesus was not the Christ and that the Son of God had not come in the flesh.

Did you know: More than three decades earlier. It was foretold that false teachers would bring in destructive sects and try to draw away the disciples after themselves John's writing showed that this apostasy was well underway.

In **Chapter 3:** John contrast the children of God with the children of the devil. The children of God love one another the children of the devil like Cain hate their brother.

An Introduction To 1 John

The theme of Love continues in Chapter 4: Here John reminds us that we cannot rightly profess to love God if we do not love our fellow Christians.

In the **Final Chapter:** We read this is what the love of God means that we observe his Commandments. Also, John assures us that God hears all our prayerful requests when these harmonize with his will.

As you read 1 John note, How we must reject apostate?, How we can guard against the practice of sin?, And how we should cultivate love for our fellow subjects of God's Kingdom?

Some might reason that not everything in the world is wrong. Even so, the world and its attractions can easily distract us from serving Jehovah. And nothing the world provides is designed to draw us closer to God. Hence, if we grow to love the things in the world, even things that may not in themselves be wrong, we are on a dangerous course. (1 Timothy 6:9, 10) Besides, much in the world truly is bad and can corrupt us. If we watch movies or television programs that highlight violence, materialism, or sexual immorality, those things can become acceptable—and then tempting. If we mix with people whose main interest is in improving their life-style or cultivating business opportunities, those things can become of chief importance to us too.—Matthew 6:24; 1 Corinthians 15:33.

1 John 2:17—The world and its desire are passing away

1 John 2:17: Furthermore, the world is passing away and so is its desire, but the one who does the will of God remains forever.

w13 8/15 27 paragraph 18

Another factor that helps us to resist "the things in the world" is that we keep in mind John's inspired words: "The world is passing away and so is its desire, but he that does the will of God remains forever." (1 John 2:17) Satan's system seems to be permanent and real. Nevertheless, one day it will come to an end. Nothing that Satan's world has to offer has permanence. Remembering that fact will help us not to be seduced by the Devil's enticements.

Digging for Spiritual Gems

1 John 2:7, 8—How is the commandment referred to by John both old and new?

w13 9/15 10 paragraph 14

The Christian Greek Scriptures are replete with reminders for us to show love for one another. Jesus said that the second greatest commandment is to "love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:39) Similarly, Jesus' half brother James called love "the kingly law." (James 2:8) The apostle John wrote: "Beloved ones, I am writing you, not a new commandment, but an old commandment which you have had from the beginning." (1 John 2:7, 8) To what was John referring as the "old commandment"? He was referring to the command to love. It was "old" in the sense that Jesus had given it decades earlier, "from the beginning." But it was also "new" in that it called for self-sacrificing love, which the disciples might need as they faced new circumstances. As disciples of Christ, do we not appreciate warnings that help us to guard against developing the selfish spirit so characteristic of this world, which can erode our love of neighbor?

1 John 5:16, 17—What is "a sin that does incur death"?

1 John 5:16, 17: If anyone catches sight of his brother committing a sin that does not incur death, he will ask, and God will give life to him, yes, to those not committing sin that incurs death. There is a sin that does incur death. It is concerning that sin that I do not tell him to make request. All unrighteousness is sin, and yet there is a sin that does not incur death.

it-1 862 paragraph 5

It is proper to pray for God's forgiveness in behalf of others, even for an entire congregation. Moses did so respecting the nation of Israel, confessing their national sin and asking forgiveness, and he was favorably heard by Jehovah. (Numbers 14:19, 20) Also, Solomon, at the dedication of the temple, prayed that Jehovah might forgive his people when they sinned and then turned back from their wrong course. (1 Kings 8:30, 33-40, 46-52) Ezra acted representatively in confessing publicly the sins of the repatriated Jews. His heartfelt prayer and exhortation had the result that the people took action in order to receive Jehovah's forgiveness. (Ezra 9:13–10:4, 10-19, 44) James encouraged the spiritually sick one to call for the older men of the congregation to pray over him, and "if he has committed sins, it will be forgiven him." (James 5:14-16) However, there is "a sin that does incur death," sin against the holy spirit, a deliberate practice of sin for which there is no forgiveness. A Christian should not pray for those sinning in this way.—1 John 5:16; Matthew 12:31; Hebrews 10:26, 27; see SIN, I; SPIRIT.

Express enthusiasm primarily when teaching main points and motivating your listeners to take action. Do not tire your listeners by projecting a high level of enthusiasm throughout your presentation.

Questions From Readers

When the apostle John wrote that "perfect love throws fear outside," what did he mean by "perfect love," and what "fear" is thus thrown outside?

"There is no fear in love," wrote the apostle John, "but perfect love throws fear outside, because fear exercises a restraint. Indeed, he that is under fear has not been made perfect in love."—1 John 4:18.

The context shows that John was discussing freeness of speech—specifically the relationship between love of God and freeness of speech toward Him. This can be seen from what we read in verse 17: "This is how love has been made perfect with us, that we may have freeness of speech in the day of judgment." The degree to which a Christian loves God and senses God's love for him has a direct effect on his freeness of speech—or the lack of it—when he approaches God in prayer.

The expression "perfect love" is significant. As used in the Bible, the word "perfect" does not always mean perfection in the absolute sense, that is, to the infinite degree, but often in a relative sense. For example, in his Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said: "You must accordingly be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect." Jesus was telling his followers that if they loved only those loving them, their love would be incomplete, deficient, defective. They should perfect, or bring to full measure, their love by including even their enemies. Similarly, then, when John wrote about "perfect love," he was speaking about love of God that is wholehearted, fully developed, and embracing all aspects of one's life.—Matthew 5:46-48: 19:20, 21.

When approaching God in prayer, a Christian is well aware that he is sinful and imperfect. However, if his love for God and his feeling of God's love for him are fully developed, he is not hampered by fear of condemnation or rejection. Rather, he enjoys freeness of speech in expressing what is in his heart and in asking for forgiveness on the basis of the ransom sacrifice, which God has lovingly provided through Jesus Christ. He feels assured that his petitions are favorably heard by God.

How can one be "made perfect in love" and thus 'throw outside' fear of condemnation or rejection? "Whoever does observe his [God's] word, truthfully in this person the love of God has been made perfect," said the apostle John. (1 John 2:5) Consider: If God loved us when we were yet sinners, would he not love us all the more if we are truly repentant and diligently "observe his word"? (Romans 5:8; 1 John 4:10) Indeed, as long as we remain faithful, we can have the same assurance that the apostle Paul had when he said about God: "He who did not even spare his own Son but delivered him up for us all, why will he not also with him kindly give us all other things?"—Romans 8:32.



Weddings That Honor Jehovah

Nick: Juliana and I have been friends for a few years, and we have been getting to know each other better for several months.

Juliana: Things were going really well between us. I must say, when Nick asked me to join some friends for a little get-together at the park, I was getting suspicious when both our families were there. (Nick proposes) I said, "Yes!"

Nick: I couldn't believe she didn't see it coming. We were both so excited, and word spread fast!

Juliana: At the meeting the next day, everyone was congratulating us—my friend Natalie especially. She was full of ideas.

Nick: I couldn't wait to start making plans.

Juliana: I never realized how much goes into a wedding. And everyone had their own ideas of what we needed—even Dad! We had to think about who we would invite, pick out flowers, decorations, a suit for Nick and, of course, a dress! This was going to be so much fun—or so I thought. I soon found out there's a whole wedding-related industry out there. They were trying to be helpful but, at the same time, this is how they make money. It seemed like nothing they had was modest. And the cost for something I would only wear for one day—I couldn't afford that! Everyone was so happy for me, but inside I was really starting to feel the pressure.

Nick: When we met back at Juliana's home, I was pretty confused. She had been so happy a few days ago, but now she was so stressed out. It was like nobody was listening to what we wanted. But to be honest, I'm not sure we knew what we wanted either. I thought it would be good if maybe we could just take some time and think about what a Christian wedding should really be like. We had a meeting with Brother Grey and Brother Sharp the next day to discuss using the Kingdom Hall for our wedding. They gave us some helpful reminders, and I'm so glad they did. First Corinthians 10:31 says: "Whether you are eating or drinking or doing anything else, do all things for God's glory." Brother Sharp helped us to see that a wedding is a spiritual occasion, and we need to keep Jehovah's standards in mind when we plan for what we will or won't choose to include.

Juliana: Brother Grey showed us 1 John 2:15, 16: "Do not love either the world or the things in the world. "... Because everything in the world—the desire of the flesh and the desire of the eyes and the showy display of one's means of life— ... originates with the world." He reminded us that what the world views as normal is far different from Christian standards and that we can be a good example by making sure our choices please Jehovah.

Nick: They even gave us a few articles about wedding arrangements to review. They wanted to make sure we would have a happy occasion with nothing to regret. I asked Brother Sharp if he would be our director of the feast to help keep things coordinated, and he suggested that we talk about it over dinner that night.

Juliana: On the way there, we passed by a photography studio. I couldn't believe how lavish and showy some weddings are. It looked more like an excuse to party instead of something that's supposed to honor God.

Nick: It reminded me of the book of Galatians: "Now the works of the flesh are . . . drunkenness, wild parties, and things like these." We didn't want to do anything like that. We each took the time to prayerfully consider the material the brothers gave us.

Juliana: We saw that Scriptural principles can even help us plan a wedding that's affordable, enjoyable for everyone, and a day that honors Jehovah. It looked like we needed to make some adjustments. We couldn't include everything we originally thought—some things were just too expensive.

Nick: And we wanted to make sure that none of our choices reflected the spirit of the world.

Juliana: So we decided to start over and make sure we were doing things Jehovah's way. First Timothy 2:9 says that a Christian "should adorn themselves in appropriate [or "respectable"] dress, with modesty and soundness of mind." It took some work, but we were able to find something affordable, appropriate, and beautiful.

Nick: I was able to find a nice suit—something I could even wear later. And of course, the girls came by to make sure that everything matched. Time went by so fast. I called Brother Sharp so he could help us follow through on the day of the wedding.

Juliana: Before we knew it, we were sending out invitations and finalizing all the details. When my dad walked me down the aisle that day, I was so excited.

Nick: Juliana was so beautiful! And the ceremony was just perfect. After all that planning we did, we were sure to make it legal.

Juliana: When looking back at our photos, it brings back so many good memories.

Nick: I was so happy with how nice everything turned out. And when we saw what a great job our friends had done decorating the reception, I couldn't believe my eyes.

Juliana: It was perfect—simple, dignified. Our friends all told us that it was one of the nicest weddings they've been to. Everything that day was just what we wanted. It even stayed on budget.

Nick: And most importantly, we got our marriage off to a good start with Jehovah's help.

Juliana: I'm so happy we found each other.

Nick: I'm so happy I found you too, Love. And I know we'll stay happy if we keep Jehovah first.

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TEACHING IN PEREA ON THE WAY TO JUDEA

LUKE 17:1-10 JOHN 11:1-16

- SERIOUSNESS OF STUMBLING
- FORGIVE AND SHOW FAITH

For a while, Jesus has been in the area "across the Jordan" called Perea. (John 10:40) He now travels south toward Jerusalem.

Jesus is not alone. His disciples are traveling with him, as well as "large crowds," including tax collectors and sinners. (Luke 14:25; 15:1) Pharisees and scribes, who are critical of what Jesus is saying and doing, are also there. They have much to think about after hearing Jesus relate the illustrations about the lost sheep, the lost son, and the rich man and Lazarus.—Luke 15:2; 16:14.

Perhaps with the criticism and sneering of his opposers fresh in mind, Jesus turns his attention to his disciples. He touches on some points that he earlier taught in Galilee. For example, Jesus says: "It is unavoidable that causes for stumbling should come. Nevertheless, woe to the one through whom they come! . . . Pay attention to yourselves. If your brother commits a sin, rebuke him, and if he repents, forgive him. Even if he sins seven times a day against you and he comes back to you seven times, saying, 'I repent,' you must forgive him." (Luke 17:1-4) That last comment may remind Peter of the question he had asked about forgiving up to seven times.—Matthew 18:21.

Will the disciples be able to act in harmony with Jesus' words? When they say to Jesus, "Give us more faith," he assures them: "If you had faith the size of a mustard grain, you would say to this black mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea!' and it would obey you." (Luke 17:5, 6) Yes, even a degree of faith can accomplish great things.

Jesus goes on to teach the importance of having a humble, balanced view of oneself, saying to the apostles: "Which one of you who has a slave plowing or shepherding would say to him when he



comes in from the field, 'Come here at once and dine at the table'? Rather, will he not say to him, 'Get something ready for me to have my evening meal, and put on an apron and serve me until I finish eating and drinking, and afterward you can eat and drink'? He will not feel gratitude to the slave because he did what was assigned, will he? Likewise, when you have done all the things assigned to you, say: 'We are good-for-nothing slaves. What we have done is what we ought to have done.'"—Luke 17:7-10.

Each servant of God should understand the importance of putting God's interests first. Furthermore, each should remember the privilege that he has to worship God as a member of his household.

Apparently soon after this, a messenger sent by Mary and Martha arrives. They are the sisters of Lazarus, and they live in Bethany of Judea. The messenger relates: "Lord, see! the one you have affection for is sick."—John 11:1-3.

Though learning that his friend Lazarus is very ill, Jesus is not paralyzed by grief. Instead, he says:

"This sickness is not meant to end in death, but is for the glory of God, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it." He remains where he is for two days then tells his disciples: "Let us go into Judea again." They protest: "Rabbi, just lately the Judeans were seeking to stone you, and are you going there again?"—John 11:4, 7, 8.

Jesus responds: "There are 12 hours of daylight, are there not? If anyone walks in daylight, he does not stumble into anything, because he sees the light of this world. But if anyone walks in the night, he stumbles, because the light is not in him." (John 11: 9, 10) He apparently means that the time God has allotted for Jesus' ministry is not yet completed. Until it is, Jesus needs to use to the full the short time left for him.

Jesus adds: "Lazarus our friend has fallen asleep, but I am traveling there to awaken him." Evidently thinking that Lazarus is simply resting and that he will recover, the disciples say: "Lord, if he is sleeping, he will get well." Jesus tells them outspokenly: "Lazarus has died . . . But let us go to him."—John 11:11-15.

Aware that Jesus could be killed in Judea, yet desiring to support him, Thomas urges his fellow disciples: "Let us also go, so that we may die with him."—John 11:16.

"They gathered them together to . . . Armageddon." —REV. 16:16.

PREVIEW

Jehovah's people have long awaited Armageddon. In this article, we discuss what Armageddon is, what events will lead up to it, and how we can remain faithful as the end draws near.

HAVE you heard people apply the word "Armageddon" to a nuclear war or an environmental disaster? In contrast, what the Bible says about Armageddon involves good news, a cause for happiness! (Rev. 1:3) The war of Armageddon will not destroy but save mankind! How so?

² The Bible shows that the war of Armageddon will save mankind by ending human rule. That war will save mankind by removing the wicked and preserving the righteous. And it will save mankind by protecting our planet from ruin. (Rev. 11:18) To help us understand these points more clearly, let us consider four questions: What is Armageddon? What events will lead up to it? How can we be among those who will be saved at Armageddon? How can we remain faithful as Armageddon draws near?

WHAT IS ARMAGEDDON?

³ Read Revelation 16:14, 16. The word "Armageddon" appears just once in the Scriptures, and it

comes from a Hebrew term that means "Mountain of Megiddo." (Rev. 16:16; ftn.) Megiddo was a city in ancient Israel. (Josh. 17:11) But Armageddon does not refer to any literal place on earth. Strictly speaking, it refers to the situation to which "the kings of the entire inhabited earth" are gathered in opposition to Jehovah. (Rev. 16:14) However, in this article, we will also use the term "Armageddon" to refer to the war that immediately follows the gathering of the kings of the earth. How do we know that Armageddon refers to a symbolic place? First, there is no literal mountain of Megiddo. Second, the area around Megiddo is far too small to hold "the kings of the entire inhabited earth" and their armies and war machines. Third, as we will see later in this article, the war of Armageddon will begin when the world's "kings" attack God's people, who are scattered throughout the earth.

⁴ Why did Jehovah connect the final great war with Megiddo? Megiddo and the nearby Jezreel Valley were the sites of many battles. On occasion, Jehovah directly intervened in those battles. For example, "by the waters of Megiddo," God helped Israelite Judge Barak defeat a Canaanite

army led by a chief named Sisera. Barak and the prophetess Deborah thanked Jehovah for their miraculous victory. They sang: "From heaven the stars fought . . . against Sisera. The torrent of Kishon washed them away."—Judg. 5:19-21.

- ⁵ Barak and Deborah ended their song with the words: "So let all your enemies perish, O Jehovah, but let those who love you be like the sun rising in its glory." (Judg. 5:31) At Armageddon, God's enemies will likewise perish, while those who love God will be saved. But there is one important difference between the two conflicts. At Armageddon, God's people will not fight. They will not even be armed! Their "strength will be in keeping calm and showing trust" in Jehovah and his heavenly armies.—Isa. 30:15; Rev. 19:11-15.
- ⁶ How will God defeat his enemies at Armageddon? He may use any number of ways. For example, he may use earthquakes, hail, and lightning. (Job 38:22, 23; Ezek. 38:19-22) He may turn his enemies against one another. (2 Chron. 20:17, 22, 23) And he may use his angels to slay the wicked. (Isa. 37:36) Whatever means God uses, his victory

will be complete. All his enemies will be destroyed. And all the righteous will be saved.—Prov. 3:25, 26.

WHAT EVENTS WILL LEAD UP TO ARMAGEDDON?

⁷ The proclamation of "peace and security" precedes "Jehovah's day." (Read 1 Thessalonians 5: 1-6.) At 1 Thessalonians 5:2, "Jehovah's day" refers to "the great tribulation." (Rev. 7:14) How will we know when that tribulation is about to begin? The Bible tells us about a most unusual proclamation. It will serve as a signal announcing the great tribulation.

8 That will be the foretold proclamation of "peace and security." Why will world leaders say that? Will religious leaders participate? Possibly. Nevertheless, the proclamation will be just another demon-inspired lie. But this lie will be especially dangerous because it will give people a false sense of security just before the greatest tribulation in human history begins. Yes, "sudden destruction is to be instantly on them, just like birth pains on a pregnant woman." What about Jeho-

vah's loyal servants? They may be surprised by the sudden start of Jehovah's day, but they will not be caught off guard.

- ⁹ Jehovah will not wipe out Satan's entire world all at once, as he did in Noah's day. Rather, he will destroy it in two main stages. First, he will destroy Babylon the Great, the world empire of false religion. Then, at Armageddon, he will destroy the rest of Satan's world, including its political, military, and commercial systems. Let us take a closer look at those two major events.
- 10 "The judgment on the great prostitute." (Read Revelation 17:1, 6; 18:24.) Babylon the Great has brought much reproach on God's name. She has taught lies about God. She has prostituted herself spiritually by forming alliances with earth's rulers. She has used her power and influence to exploit her flocks. And she has spilled much blood, including the blood of God's servants. (Rev. 19:2) How will Jehovah destroy Babylon the Great?

exposing her wickedness. (Rev. 17:3, 16) That swift destruction—as if in one day—will come as a shock to those who supported her. After all, she has long boasted: "I sit as queen, and I am not a widow, and I will never see mourning."—Rev. 18:7, 8.

¹² God will not allow the nations to destroy his people. They proudly bear his name, and they have obeyed his command to flee from Babylon the Great. (Acts 15:16, 17; Rev. 18:4) They have also worked hard to help others flee from her. So Jehovah's servants will not "receive part of her plagues." Still, their faith will be tested.

^{12.} What will Jehovah not allow the nations to do, and why not?

¹³ The attack of Gog. (Read Ezekiel 38:2, 8, 9.) After the destruction of all false religious organizations, God's people will stand out like a lone tree that survived a fierce storm. Satan, of course, will be enraged. He will vent that rage by using demonic propaganda—"unclean inspired expressions"—to cause a coalition of nations to turn on Jehovah's servants. (Rev. 16:13, 14) That coalition is called "Gog of the land of Magog." When the nations launch their attack, they will have arrived at the symbolic place called Armageddon.—Rev. 16:16.

¹⁴ Gog will trust in his "arm of flesh"—his military might. (2 Chron. 32:8) We will trust in Jehovah our God—a stand that will seem foolish to the nations. After all, the gods of the once powerful Babylon the Great did not save her from "the wild beast" and its "ten horns"! (Rev. 17:16) So Gog will expect an easy victory. "Like clouds covering the land," he will attack Jehovah's people. (Ezek. 38:16) But Gog will soon see that he has marched into a trap. Like Pharaoh at the Red Sea, Gog will learn that he is fighting against Jehovah.—Ex. 14:1-4; Ezek. 38:3, 4, 18, 21-23.

(Rev. 19:11, 14, 15) But what about Jehovah's chief enemy, Satan, whose lying propaganda led the nations to Armageddon? Jesus will hurl him and his demons into an abyss, where they will be locked away for a thousand years.—Rev. 20:1-3.

HOW CAN YOU BE SAVED AT ARMAGEDDON?

16 Whether we have been in the truth for many years or not, to be saved at Armageddon, we must show that we "know God" and that we "obey the good news about our Lord Jesus." (2 Thess. 1:7-9) We "know God" when we know his likes, dislikes, and standards. We also show that we know him when we love and obey him and give him our exclusive devotion. (1 John 2:3-5; 5:3) When we show that we know God, we have the honor of being "known by him," which will be lifesaving at Armageddon! (1 Cor. 8:3) How so? Because to be "known by him" can mean having God's approval.

17 "The good news about our Lord Jesus" includes all the truths that Jesus taught, as found in God's Word. We obey the good news when we apply it in our lives. That obedience includes keeping Kingdom interests in first place, living by God's righteous standards, and announcing God's Kingdom. (Matt. 6:33; 24:14) It also includes supporting Christ's anointed brothers as they care for their weighty responsibilities.—Matt. 25:31-40.

¹⁸ God's anointed servants will soon be able to return the kindness shown them by those of the "other sheep." (John 10:16) How so? Before the war of Armageddon begins, all of the 144,000 will have been raised to heaven as immortal spirits. They will then be part of the heavenly armies that will crush Gog and safeguard "a great crowd" of sheeplike ones. (Rev. 2:26, 27; 7:9, 10) Yes, what a privilege the great crowd will have had to support Jehovah's anointed servants while these were still on earth!

HOW CAN WE REMAIN FAITHFUL AS THE END DRAWS NEAR?

¹⁹ During these difficult last days, many of Jehovah's people are experiencing trials. Even so, we can endure with joy. (Jas. 1:2-4) A key is to persevere in heartfelt prayer. (Luke 21:36) We must also follow up our prayers by studying God's Word daily and meditating on it, including its amazing prophecies concerning our times. (Ps. 77:12) These activities, along with a full share in the ministry, will keep our faith strong and our hope alive!
