Look! The Devil will keep on throwing some of you into prison so that you may be fully put to the test, and you will have tribulation for ten days. Prove yourself faithful even to death, and I will give you the crown of life. ¹¹ Let the one who has an ear hear what the spirit says to the congregations: The one who conquers will by no means be harmed by the second death.'

¹² "To the angel of the congregation in Per'ga-mum write: These are the things that he says who has the sharp, long, two-edged sword: ¹³ 'I know where you are dwelling, that is, where the throne of Satan is; and yet you keep holding fast to my name, and you did not deny your faith in me even in the days of An'ti-pas, my faithful witness, who was killed by your side, where Satan is dwelling.

¹⁴ "Nevertheless, I have a few things against you, that you have there those adhering to the teaching of Ba'laam, who taught Ba'lak to put a stumbling block before the sons of Israel, to eat things sacrificed to idols and to commit sexual immorality. ¹⁵ In the same way, you also have those adhering to the teaching of the sect of

Nic·o·la'us. ¹⁶ So repent. If you do not, I am coming to you quickly, and I will war against them with the long sword of my mouth.

¹⁷ "Let the one who has an ear hear what the spirit says to the congregations: To the one who conquers I will give some of the hidden manna, and I will give him a white pebble, and written on the pebble is a new name that no one knows except the one receiving it."

¹⁸ "To the angel of the congregation in Thy-a-ti'ra write: These are the things that the Son of God says, the one who has eyes like a fiery flame and whose feet are like fine copper: ¹⁹ 'I know your deeds, and your love and faith and ministry and endurance, and that your deeds of late are more than those you did at first.

²⁰ "Nevertheless, I do hold this against you, that you tolerate that woman Jez'e-bel, who calls herself a prophetess, and she teaches and misleads my slaves to commit sexual immorality and to eat things sacrificed to idols. ²¹ And I gave her time to repent, but she is not willing to repent of her sexual immorality. ²² Look! I am about to throw her into a sickbed, and those committing adultery with her into great tribulation, unless they repent of her deeds. ²³ And I will kill her children with deadly plague, so that all the congregations will know that I am the one who searches the innermost thoughts and hearts, and I will give to you individually according to your deeds.

²⁴ "However, I say to the rest of you who are in Thy·a·ti'ra, all those who do not follow this teaching, those who did not get to know the so-called "deep things of Satan": I am not putting on you any other burden. ²⁵ Just the same, hold fast to what you have until I come. ²⁶ And to the one who conquers and observes my deeds down to the end, I will give authority over the nations, ²⁷ and he will shepherd the people with an iron rod so that they will be broken to pieces like clay vessels, just as I have received from my Father.

- ²⁸ And I will give him the morning star. ²⁹ Let the one who has an ear hear what the spirit says to the congregations.'
- **3** "To the angel of the congregation in Sar'dis write: These are the things that he says who has the seven spirits of God and the seven stars: 'I know your deeds, that you have the name that you are alive, but you are dead. ² Become watchful, and strengthen the things remaining that were ready to die, for I have not found your works fully performed before my God. ³ Therefore, continue mindful of how you have received and how you heard, and go on keeping it, and repent. Certainly unless you wake up, I will come as a thief, and you will not know at all at what hour I will come upon you.
- ⁴ "Nevertheless, you do have a few individuals in Sar'dis who did not defile their garments, and they will walk with me in white ones, because they are worthy. ⁵ The one who conquers will thus be dressed in white garments, and I will by no means blot out his name from the book of life, but I will acknowledge his name before my Father and before his angels. ⁶ Let the one who has an ear hear what the spirit says to the congregations.'

⁷ "To the angel of the congregation in Philadelphia write: These are the things he says who is holy, who is true, who has the key of David, who opens so that no one will shut and shuts so that no one opens: ⁸ 'I know your deeds—look! I have set before you an opened door, which no one can shut. And I know that you have a little power, and you kept my word and did not prove false to my name. ⁹ Look! I will make those from the synagogue of Satan who say they are Jews yet are not, but are lying—look! I will make them come and bow before your feet and make them know that I have loved you. ¹⁰ Because you kept the word about my endurance, I will also keep you from the hour of test, which is to come upon the entire inhabited earth, to put to the test those dwelling on the earth. ¹¹ I

am coming quickly. Keep holding fast to what you have, so that no one may take your crown.

¹² "The one who conquers—I will make him a pillar in the temple of my God, and he will by no means go out from it anymore, and I will write upon him the name of my God and the name of the city of my God, the New Jerusalem that descends out of heaven from my God, and my own new name. ¹³ Let the one who has an ear hear what the spirit says to the congregations."

¹⁴ "To the angel of the congregation in La·o·di·ce'a write: These are the things that the Amen says, the faithful and true witness, the beginning of the creation by God: ¹⁵ 'I know your deeds, that you are neither cold nor hot. I wish you were cold or else hot. ¹⁶ So because you are lukewarm and neither hot nor cold, I am going to vomit you out of my mouth. ¹⁷ Because you say, "I am rich and have acquired riches and do not need anything at all," but you do not know that you are miserable and pitiful and poor and blind and naked, ¹⁸ I advise you to buy from me gold refined by fire so that you may become rich, and white garments so that you may become dressed and that the shame of your nakedness may not be exposed, and eyesalve to rub in your eyes so that you may see.

Revelation 1:20: As for the sacred secret of the seven stars that you saw in my right hand and of the seven golden lampstands: The seven stars mean the angels of the seven congregations, and the seven lampstands mean the seven congregations.

To avoid that kind of spirit, we can remember that Jesus is pictured in the Bible as having "in his right hand seven stars." The "stars" represent the anointed overseers and, by extension, all the overseers in the congregations. Jesus can direct the "stars" in his hand in any way he feels appropriate. (Revelation 1:16, 20) Thus, as Head of the Christian congregation, Jesus has full control of the bodies of elders. If someone on a body truly needs correction, the One who has "eyes as a fiery flame" will see to it that this is done in His own time and way. (Revelation 1:14) In the meantime, we

maintain proper respect for those appointed by holy spirit, for Paul wrote: "Be obedient to those who are taking the lead among you and be submissive, for they are keeping watch over your souls as those who will render an account; that they may do this with joy and not with sighing, for this would be damaging to you."—
Hebrews 13:17.

In the vision recorded in Revelation chapters 2 and 3, the glorified Jesus Christ inspects the seven congregations of Asia Minor. The vision reveals that Christ sees not just general trends but specific situations. In some instances, he even mentions individuals, and in

each case, he gives appropriate commendation or counsel. What does this indicate? In the fulfillment of the vision, the seven congregations represent anointed Christians after 1914, and the counsel given to the seven congregations applies in principle to all the congregations of God's people today earth wide. Thus, it is safe to conclude that Jehovah by means of his Son is actively leading his people. How can we benefit from that guidance?

w01 1/15 20-21 paragraph 20

Keeping in step with Jehovah's progressive organization requires that we recognize the God-assigned role of Jesus Christ as "head of the congregation." (Ephesians 5:22, 23) Noteworthy, too, is Isaiah 55:4, where we are told: "Look! As a witness to the national groups I [Jehovah] have given him, as a leader and commander to the national groups." Jesus certainly knows how to lead. He also knows his sheep and their deeds. In fact, when he inspected the seven congregations in Asia Minor, five times he said: "I know your deeds." (Revelation 2:2, 19; 3:1, 8, 15) Jesus also knows our needs, as does his Father, Jehovah. Before giving the Model Prayer, Jesus stated: "God your Father knows what things you are needing before ever you ask him."—Matthew 6:8-13.

Pronouncement of judgment. All enemies of God's Kingdom will then be forced to witness an event that will intensify their agony. Jesus states: "They will see the Son of man coming in the clouds with great power and glory." (Mark 13:26) This supernatural display of power will signal that Jesus has come to pronounce judgment. In another part of this same prophecy about the last days, Jesus gives more details about the judgment that will be pronounced at this time. We find that information in the parable of the sheep and the goats. (Read Matthew 25:31-33, 46.) Loyal supporters of God's Kingdom will be judged as "sheep" and will "lift up [their] heads," realizing that their "deliverance is getting near." (Luke 21:28) However, Kingdom opposers will be judged as "goats" and will "beat themselves in grief," realizing that "everlasting cutting-off" awaits them.—Matthew 24:30; Revelation 1:7.

Revelation 2:7—What does eating of "the tree of life" in "the paradise of God" mean?

2017 Teaching Committee Report

It's a pleasure to relate to you two aspects of the Teaching Committee's work.

First, what does it take to put a regional convention together these days? And second, what can we expect with regard to our midweek meetings?

The Teaching Committee is very grateful to every Bethel department. Each of you has contributed in some way to the spiritually festive events that we enjoy at our conventions and our midweek meetings.

Our conventions have come a long way since 1889. But as you'll see, the improvements must be attributed to Jehovah.

This convention is so beautiful. It moves you to the core. It's a very spiritually enriching experience for all of us. We really see the Governing Body is caring for us. It's amazing!

This sentiment has been echoed for over a century. How is it that year after year people who have been in the truth for decades can say that the most recent convention has surpassed all preceding ones? And how do the brothers who prepare convention programs feel when they hear comments like that? If this were merely the work of humans, they might feel like Caleb as depicted in the 2017 regional conventions. Thankfully, this is not the work of one man. All praise goes to Jehovah for the timely conventions we enjoy. His spirit is working through many willing volunteers. Let's take a brief look at how our conventions are made. It all begins with the theme.

As Brother Morris pointed out at the 2017 regional convention, one-word themes are determined years in advance. That one word will guide those preparing the program.

Dramas—the most labor-intensive part of a program—are developed five years in advance.

To prepare scripts, the Teaching Committee cooperates closely with the Writing Department in working with a team known as the Drama Review Group. These experienced writers develop Scriptural plots that teach lessons in harmony with the convention theme.

Scripts are extensively researched and then sent to Audio/Video Services, or AVS, for production. All of this work has to begin early. But how is the rest of a convention program developed?

Each year, the Teaching Committee carefully considers reports from around the world

from Branch Committees and world headquarters representatives. Often, such reports indicate topics that could be addressed on a convention. The Teaching Committee

then selects a more specific theme that will serve as the basis for addressing the needs

of our worldwide brotherhood. The theme is submitted to the entire Governing Body for approval. Then, work begins on Scripture themes for each day of the convention.

The Friday program lays the foundation: What is the central truth under discussion? Why should we give attention to it now?

Saturday brings admonition on personal conduct, field ministry, and family life.

Sunday often highlights what the Bible says about our future and encourages us to maintain our hope. Once this general framework is established, talks are conceived and additional lines of reasoning are chosen.

Attention is given to how to present ideas in a variety of ways:

Could a Scriptural discussion reach the heart more effectively by means of an interview or a video? This detailed sketch is all worked out before the Teaching Committee assigns teams of writers.

AVS collaborates with the writers in the development of brief videos. The Art Department brainstorms ideas for convention branding. The compiler follows the written content through 70 steps of research, fact-checking, and proofreading.

Then, all of these outlines and scripts have to be translated into the 343 languages in which we hold regional conventions. Translation Services helps teams around the world to overcome challenges with the text.

Composers and arrangers make music tracks for the 18 songs that have been selected and the 6 music-video preludes. Music services also produces and records musical scores for the feature film, the audio drama, and some 40 other brief videos that are used on the program.

But the Teaching Committee's involvement doesn't end here. It provides direction regarding the assigning of speakers, the design of sound systems, the securing of contracts for hotels and venues, the operation of convention departments, and the training of volunteers. Thousands of willing workers are involved, each submitting to the inspired direction in God's Word and the influence of his holy spirit.

The benefits of such collaboration are felt not only at our annual conventions but also at our weekly meetings. It's been two years since the inception of the Our Christian Life and Ministry midweek meeting. How have things been going on that front?

Everything got better: how the brothers and sisters feel about the meeting and how they participate.

There are more videos at the meetings, so I feel closer to the worldwide brotherhood.

I really enjoy what it does for young ones, especially the two-minute parts. You see young ones, even very young children, do a demonstration.

Instead of just underlining to prepare, now I get excited looking for gems.

We really dig into a Bible account. I learn a whole lot more.

After the meeting, we enjoy discussing the gems we discovered.

Every meeting gives you something practical that you can apply the next weekend right away.

Now we don't just read the Bible as a family, but we pay more attention to Jehovah's qualities.

Young ones and new publishers are now less hesitant about sharing their beliefs at the door because they simply do what they learned at the meetings.

Regarding production of the meeting, methods of the Gilead School are employed in the approach to study.

The Gilead approach to study considers context, explanation, and application. Analyzing the context considers the time period, the historical setting, and the writer's intent.

These are built into the Treasures from God's Word and the Introductions to the Bible Books Videos we see at the midweek meetings.

The explanations for the verses are all based on the publications of "the faithful and discreet slave" to ensure accuracy and correct understanding. After all, at Gilead School, students aren't allowed to guess. Once a scripture is explained accurately, then it can be applied properly.

This method of context and explanation followed by application leads to meaningful Bible study.

The Service Committee Office provides input on field service presentations and Living as Christians. The Writing Department gives insight on how to feature our publications.

What will change after January? As announced at the 2017 annual meeting, the public edition of The Watchtower will be published three times a year instead of six. The same will be true for Awake! Also, specific monthly literature offers have been discontinued. Thus, we will enjoy some adjustments in our field service

presentations. As you will see, the new focus will be not so much on publications but on conversations.

Clearly, the production of our midweek meetings and regional conventions takes a lot of planning and the cooperation of many willing workers in a variety of Bethel departments. But the positive effects are felt around the world.

All I can say to Jehovah is, "Thank you, Jehovah, for letting me be here."

I feel very grateful to Jehovah for the meetings.

Thank you, Jehovah.

Sometimes Bethel receives letters that go something like this:

"Thank you for your tireless efforts."

Actually, the brothers and sisters working on all these projects are tired. But they never tire of trusting in and cooperating with the One who truly is tireless: the Source of all divine instruction, Jehovah. He alone can replace copper with gold, so that each segment of divine education truly is the best ever.

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LAZARUS IS RESURRECTED

JOHN 11:38-54

- THE RESURRECTION OF LAZARUS
- THE SANHEDRIN PLAN TO KILL JESUS

After Jesus meets Martha and then Mary near Bethany, they go to the memorial tomb of Lazarus. It is a cave with a stone covering the entrance. "Take the stone away," Jesus directs. Martha expresses concern, not understanding what Jesus intends to do. "Lord," she says, "by now he must smell, for it has been four days." But Jesus tells her: "Did I not tell you that if you would believe you would see the glory of God?"—John 11:39, 40.

So the stone is removed. Jesus then raises his eyes and prays: "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. True, I knew that you always hear me; but I spoke on account of the crowd standing around, so that they may believe that you sent me." Jesus' public prayer shows to observers that what he is about to do is by means of power from God. Then Jesus



cries out with a loud voice: "Lazarus, come out!" And Lazarus does come out, with his hands and feet still bound with burial wrappings and his face covered with a cloth. "Free him and let him go," Jesus says.—John 11:41-44.

Many Jews who have come to comfort Mary and Martha see this miracle and put faith in Jesus. But others go off and tell the Pharisees what Jesus has done. The Pharisees and the chief priests hold a meeting of the Jewish high court, the Sanhedrin. That body includes the high priest, Caiaphas. Some of them lament: "What are we to do, for this man performs many signs? If we let him go on this way, they will all put faith in him, and the Romans will come and take away both our place and our nation." (John 11:47, 48) Though having heard eyewitness testimony that Jesus "performs many signs," these men are not rejoicing over what God is doing through him. Their prime concern is their own position and authority.

That Lazarus has been raised from the dead is a real blow to the Sadducees, who do not believe in

the resurrection. Caiaphas, a Sadducee, now speaks up, saying: "You do not know anything at all, and you have not reasoned that it is to your benefit for one man to die in behalf of the people rather than for the whole nation to be destroyed."—John 11:49, 50; Acts 5:17; 23:8.

In view of Caiaphas' sacred office, God causes him to say this—he does not do so "of his own originality." Caiaphas means that Jesus should be killed to prevent him from further undermining the authority and influence of the Jewish religious leaders. Yet, Caiaphas' prophecy points to the fact that by his death, Jesus would provide a ransom, not just for the Jews, but for all "the children of God who were scattered about."—John 11:51, 52.

Caiaphas succeeds in influencing the Sanhedrin to make plans to kill Jesus. Might Nicodemus, a member of the Sanhedrin who is friendly to Jesus, reveal these plans to him? In any event, Jesus leaves the immediate Jerusalem area, thus avoiding death before God's appointed time.

"I Want To"

PREVIEW

Jesus invites us to come to him. What is involved in accepting his invitation? This article will answer that question, and it will remind us of how we can be refreshed by working along with Christ.

JESUS made a beautiful promise to a crowd that was listening to him. "Come to me," he said, "and I will refresh you." (Read Matthew 11:28-30.) This was not an empty promise. Think, for example, of what he did for a woman who was suffering from a terrible sickness.

² The woman desperately needed help. She had gone to many physicians, hoping to find relief. After 12 years of misery, she still had not been healed. According to the Law, she was unclean. (Lev. 15:25) Then she heard that Jesus could cure those who were suffering, so she went to find him. When she found him, she touched the fringe of his outer garment, and immediately she was cured! But Jesus did more than heal her body—he restored her dignity. For example, when talking with her, he used the warm yet respectful term "daughter." How truly refreshed, or energized, that woman must have felt!—Luke 8:43-48.

³ Notice that the woman went to Jesus. She took the initiative. The same is true today—we must make the effort to "come to" Jesus. At present, Jesus will not miraculously cure the physical sicknesses of those who "come to" him. But he still extends the invitation: "Come to me, . . . and I will refresh you." In this article, we will answer five questions: How can we "come

to" Jesus? What did Jesus mean when he said: "Take my yoke upon you"? What can we learn from Jesus? Why is the work that he has given us to do refreshing? And how can we continue to find refreshment under Jesus' yoke?

"COME TO ME"

⁴ One way to "come to" Jesus is by learning as much as we can about the things he said and did. (Luke 1:1-4) Nobody else can do this for us—we must study these accounts for ourselves. We also "come to" Jesus by making the decision to get baptized and become a disciple of Christ.

⁵ Another way to "come to" Jesus is by going to the congregation elders if we need help. Jesus uses these "gifts in men" to care for his sheep. (Eph. 4:7, 8, 11; John 21:16; 1 Pet. 5:1-3) We must take the initiative to ask for their help. We cannot expect the elders to read our minds and know what we need. Consider what a brother named Julian says: "I had to leave my Bethel assignment for health reasons, and one of my friends recommended that I request a shepherding call. At first, I did not think I needed it. But later I asked for help, and that shepherding visit turned out to be one of the best gifts I have ever received." Loyal elders,

such as the two who visited Julian, can help us to know "the mind of Christ," that is, to understand and imitate his thinking and attitude. (1 Cor. 2:16; 1 Pet. 2:21) This really is one of the best gifts they can give us.

"TAKE MY YOKE UPON YOU"

⁶ When Jesus said: "Take my yoke upon you," he may have meant "Accept my authority." He could also have meant "Get under the yoke with me, and together we will work for Jehovah." Either way, the yoke entails work.

⁷ We accept Jesus' invitation when we dedicate our lives to Jehovah and get baptized. That invitation is open to all—Jesus will never reject anyone who sincerely wants to serve God. (John 6:37, 38) All of Christ's followers have been given the privilege of sharing in the work that Jehovah has asked Jesus to do. We can be certain that Jesus will always be there to help us do that work.—Read Matthew 28:18-20.

"LEARN FROM ME"

⁸ Humble people were drawn to Jesus. (Matt. 19:13,

14; Luke 7:37, 38) Why? Consider the contrast between Jesus and the Pharisees. Those religious leaders were cold and arrogant. (Matt. 12:9-14) Jesus was warm and humble. The Pharisees were ambitious and proud of their high position in society. Jesus discouraged undue ambition, and he taught his disciples to view themselves as lowly servants. (Matt. 23:2, 6-11) The Pharisees dominated others through fear and intimidation. (John 9:13, 22) Jesus refreshed others by loving acts and kind words.

⁹ Have you learned these lessons from Jesus? Ask yourself: 'Do I have a reputation for being mildtempered and humble? Do I willingly do menial jobs to serve others? Am I kind to others?'

¹⁰ Jesus created a peaceful, inviting environment for his fellow workers, and he enjoyed training them. (Luke 10:1, 19-21) He encouraged his disciples to ask questions, and he wanted to hear their opinions. (Matt. 16:13-16) Much like plants in a greenhouse, the disciples flourished. They absorbed the lessons that Jesus taught and produced fruit in the form of good works.

¹¹ Do you have a position of authority? If so, ask yourself: 'What kind of environment do I create

at work or at home? Do I promote peace? Do I encourage others to ask questions? And am I willing to hear their opinions?' Never would we want to be like the Pharisees, who resented those who questioned them and persecuted those who expressed an opinion contrary to their own.—Mark 3:1-6; John 9:29-34.

"YOU WILL FIND REFRESHMENT"

¹² Why is it refreshing for us to do the work Jesus has given us? There are many reasons, but consider just a few.

13 We have the best overseers. Jehovah, our Supreme Overseer, is not a thankless or harsh master. He appreciates the work we do. (Heb. 6:10) And he gives us the power that we need to carry our load of responsibility. (2 Cor. 4:7; Gal. 6:5, ftn.) Jesus, our King, leads by example. (John 13:15) And the elders who shepherd us try to imitate Jesus, "the great shepherd." (Heb. 13:20; 1 Pet. 5:2) They strive to be kind, encouraging, and courageous as they feed and protect us.

¹⁴ We have *the best companions*. No other people have a sense of purpose or a bond of love like ours. Just think: We have the privilege of working with people who have the highest moral standards but who are

not self-righteous. They are talented but modest, and they consider others superior to them. They view us not only as fellow workers but also as friends. And that bond is so close that they are willing to give their lives for us!

¹⁵ We have *the best work*. We teach people the truth about Jehovah and expose the lies told by the Devil. (John 8:44) Satan loads people down with burdens they cannot carry. For example, he wants us to believe that Jehovah will not forgive us for our sins and that we are unlovable. What a crushing burden, and what a terrible lie! When we "come to" Christ, our sins are forgiven. And the truth is that Jehovah loves all of us deeply. (Rom. 8:32, 38, 39) How rewarding it is to help people learn to rely on Jehovah and to see them improve their lives!

CONTINUE TO FIND REFRESHMENT UNDER JESUS' YOKE

¹⁶ The load that Jesus asks us to carry is different from other loads that we must bear. For example, at the end of a day of secular work, many feel not only exhausted but also unfulfilled. By contrast, after spending time serving Jehovah and Christ, we feel a

deep sense of satisfaction. We may be exhausted at the end of a workday and have to push ourselves to attend a congregation meeting that night. But often we come home from that meeting refreshed and energized. The same is true when we make the effort to preach and to do our personal Bible study. The reward we receive is far greater than the energy we expend!

¹⁷ We must be realistic. Each of us has a certain amount of energy. So we must be careful about what we take on. For example, we could waste energy trying to gather material possessions. Note what Jesus said to a rich young man who asked him: "What must I do to inherit everlasting life?" The young man was already obeying the Law. He must have been a decent man because Mark's Gospel account specifically states that Jesus "felt love for him." Jesus presented the young ruler with an invitation. "Go, sell what things you have," Jesus said, "and come be my follower." The man was torn, but it appears that he could not let go of his "many possessions." (Mark 10:17-22) As a result, he rejected the yoke that Jesus had offered him and continued to slave "for Riches." (Matt. 6:24) What choice would you have made?

¹⁸ From time to time, it is good for us to reassess

our priorities in life. Why? So that we can make sure that we are using our energy wisely. Consider what a young man named Mark says: "For many years, I thought I was living a simple life. I was pioneering, but I was always thinking about money and about making my life more comfortable. I wondered why my life had become a burden. Then I realized that I was mostly seeking my own interests first and giving Jehovah the time and energy that was left over." Mark adjusted his thinking and lifestyle and made himself available to do more in Jehovah's service. "I feel anxious at times," Mark says, "but with Jehovah's help and Jesus' backing, I have overcome my challenges."

yoke if we do three things. First, *keep the right perspective*. We are doing Jehovah's work, so it must be done Jehovah's way. We are the workers, and Jehovah is the Master. (Luke 17:10) If we try to do his work our way, we will find ourselves fighting against the yoke. Even a powerful bull is likely to injure and exhaust itself if it constantly tries to go in its own direction and fights against the yoke that its master controls. On the other hand, we can do extraordinary things and overcome any obstacle if we follow Jehovah's guidance. Remember that nobody can stop his

will from being accomplished!—Rom. 8:31; 1 John 4:4.

²⁰ Second, act with the right motive. Our goal is to bring glory to our loving Father, Jehovah. Those in the first century who were motivated by greed or selfinterest soon became unhappy and abandoned Jesus' yoke. (John 6:25-27, 51, 60, 66; Phil. 3:18, 19) By contrast, those who were motivated by an unselfish love of God and love of neighbor happily carried that yoke throughout their life on earth, with the prospect of serving with Christ in heaven. Like them, we will remain happy by carrying Jesus' yoke with the right motive.

²¹ Third, have the right expectations. We have chosen a life of self-sacrifice and hard work. Jesus warned us that we would be persecuted. But we can expect that Jehovah will give us the strength to endure any challenge. The more we endure, the stronger we will become. (Jas. 1:2-4) We can also expect that Jehovah will provide for us, that Jesus will shepherd us, and that our brothers and sisters will encourage us. (Read Matthew 6:31-33; John 10:14; 1 Thess. 5:11) What more do we really need?

^{20.} What should be our motive for coming under Jesus' yoke?

^{21.} According to Matthew 6:31-33, what can we expect Jehovah to do?

The woman whom Jesus cured was refreshed on the very day that she was healed. But she would receive lasting refreshment only if she became a loyal disciple of Christ. What do you think she did? If she did choose to come under Jesus' yoke, imagine the reward—serving with Jesus in heaven! Any sacrifices she had made to follow Christ would pale in comparison with that blessing. No matter what our hope is —living forever in heaven or on earth—how thankful we can be that we have accepted Jesus' invitation: "Come to me!"
