Jehovah God took the man and settled him in the garden of E'den to cultivate it and to take care of it. Jehovah God also gave this command to the man: "From every tree of the garden you may eat to satisfaction. ¹⁷ But as for the tree of the knowledge of good and bad, you must not eat from it, for in the day you eat from it you will certainly die."

¹⁸ Then Jehovah God said: "It is not good for the man to continue to be alone. I am going to make a helper for him, as a complement of him." ¹⁹ Now Jehovah God had been forming from the ground every wild animal of the field and every flying creature of the heavens, and he began bringing them to the man to see what he would call each one; and whatever the man would call each living creature, that became its name. ²⁰ So the man named all the domestic animals and the flying creatures of the heavens and every

wild animal of the field, but for man there was no helper as a complement of him. ²¹ So Jehovah God caused the man to fall into a deep sleep, and while he was sleeping, he took one of his ribs and then closed up the flesh over its place. ²² And Jehovah God built the rib that he had taken from the man into a woman, and he brought her to the man.

²³ Then the man said:

"This is at last bone of my bones And flesh of my flesh. This one will be called Woman, Because from man she was taken."

²⁴ That is why a man will leave his father and his mother and he will stick to his wife, and they will become one flesh. ²⁵ And both of them continued to be naked, the man and his wife; yet they were not ashamed.

Genesis 1:3, 4, 6, 9, 11—Creative days one through three

Genesis 1:3, 4: And God said: "Let there be light." Then there was light. After that God saw that the light was good, and God began to divide the light from the darkness.

Genesis 1:6: Then God said: "Let there be an expanse between the waters, and let there be a division between the waters and the waters."

Genesis 1:9: Then God said: "Let the waters under the heavens be collected together into one place, and let the dry land appear." And it was so.

Genesis 1:11: Then God said: "Let the earth cause grass to sprout, seed-bearing plants and fruit trees according to their kinds, yielding fruit along with seed on the earth." And it was so.

When God said on Day One, "Let light come to be," diffused light evidently penetrated the cloud layers even though the sources of that light could not yet be discerned from the earth's surface. It seems that this was a gradual process, as is indicated by translator J. W. Watts: "And gradually light came into existence." (Genesis 1:3, A Distinctive Translation of Genesis) God brought about a division between the light and the darkness, calling the light Day and the darkness Night. This indicates that the earth was rotating on its axis as it revolved around the sun, so that its hemispheres, eastern and western, could enjoy periods of light and darkness.—Genesis 1:3, 4.

On Day Two God made an expanse by causing a division to occur "between the waters and the waters." Some waters remained on the earth, but a great amount of water was raised high above the surface of the earth, and in between these two there came to be an expanse. God called the expanse Heaven, but this was with relation to the earth, as the waters suspended above the expanse are not said to have enclosed stars or other bodies of the outer heavens.— Genesis 1:6-8; see EXPANSE.

On Day Three by God's miracle-working power the waters on the earth were brought together and dry land appeared, God calling it Earth. It was also on this day that, through no chance factors or evolutionary processes, God acted to superimpose the life principle upon atoms of matter, so that grass, vegetation, and fruit trees were brought into existence. Each of these three general divisions was capable of reproducing according to its "kind."—Genesis 1:9-13.

Genesis 1:14, 20, 24, 27—Creative days four through six

Genesis 1:14: Then God said: "Let there be luminaries in the expanse of the heavens to make a division between the day and the night, and they will serve as signs for seasons and for days and years.

Genesis 1:20: Then God said: "Let the waters swarm with living creatures, and let flying creatures fly above the earth across the expanse of the heavens."

Genesis 1:24: Then God said: "Let the earth bring forth living creatures according to their kinds, domestic animals and creeping animals and wild animals of the earth according to their kinds." And it was so.

Genesis 1:27: And God went on to create the man in his image, in

God's image he created him; male and female he created them.

It is also noteworthy that at Genesis 1:16 the Hebrew verb bara", meaning "create," is not used. Instead, the Hebrew verb 'asah', meaning "make," is employed. Since the sun, moon, and stars are included in "the heavens" mentioned in Genesis 1:1, they were created long before Day Four. On the fourth day God proceeded to "make" these celestial bodies occupy a new relationship toward earth's surface and the expanse above it. When it is said, "God put them in the expanse of the heavens to shine upon the earth," this would indicate that they now became discernible from the surface of the earth, as though they were in the expanse. Also, the luminaries were to "serve as signs and for seasons and for days and years," thus later providing guidance for man in various ways.—Genesis 1:14.

Day Five was marked by the creation of the first nonhuman souls on earth. Not just *one* creature purposed by God to evolve into other forms, but literally *swarms* of living souls were then brought forth by divine power. It is stated: "God proceeded to create the great sea monsters and every living soul that moves about, which the waters swarmed forth according to their kinds, and every winged flying creature according to its kind." Pleased with what He had produced, God blessed them and, in effect, told them to "become many,"

which was possible, for these creatures of many different family kinds were divinely endowed with the ability to reproduce "according to their kinds."—Genesis 1:20-23.

On Day Six "God proceeded to make the wild beast of the earth according to its kind and the domestic animal according to its kind and every moving animal of the ground according to its kind," such work being good, as were all of God's previous creative works.—

Genesis 1:24, 25.

Toward the end of the sixth day of creative activity, God brought into existence an entirely new kind of creature, superior to the animals even though lower than the angels. This was man, created in God's image and after his likeness. While Genesis 1:27 briefly states concerning humankind "male and female he [God] created them," the parallel account at Genesis 2:7-9 shows that Jehovah God formed man out of the dust of the ground, blew into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man came to be a living soul, for whom a paradise home and food were provided. In this case Jehovah used the elements of the earth in creative work and then, having formed man, He created the female of humankind using one of Adam's ribs as a base. (Genesis 2:18-25) With the creation of the woman, man was complete as a "kind."—Genesis 5:1, 2.

Age of the earth and the universe

Scientists estimate that the earth is about 4 billion years old and that the universe was born some 13 to 14 billion years ago. The Bible sets no date for the creation of the universe. In no place does it affirm that the earth is only a few thousand years old. The very first verse in the Bible reads: "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." (Genesis 1:1) That general statement allows scientists to determine the age of the physical world according to sound scientific principles.

Genesis 1:26—Was Jesus a co-Creator?

Genesis 1:26: Then God said: "Let us make man in our image, according to our likeness, and let them have in subjection the fish of the sea and the flying creatures of the heavens and the domestic animals and all the earth and every creeping animal that is moving

on the earth."

Not a co-Creator. The Son's share in the creative works, however, did not make him a co-Creator with his Father. The power for creation came from God through his holy spirit, or active force. (Genesis 1:2; Psalm 33:6) And since Jehovah is the Source of all life, all animate creation, visible and invisible, owes its life to him. (Psalm 36:9) Rather than a co-Creator, then, the Son was the agent or instrumentality through whom Jehovah, the Creator, worked. Jesus himself credited God with the creation, as do all the Scriptures.— Matthew 19:4-6; see CREATION.

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Study 13—Practical Value Made Clear

"I'm not interested."

Have you ever had someone tell you that in the ministry? Some people may simply want us to go away. Others, however, may end the conversation if they can't see how our message affects them personally. So we need to present information that will help our listeners, and then show them how to apply what they just heard.

For instance, imagine that a natural disaster has recently affected part of your territory. How might you include this in your presentation? Let's watch an example:

Hello. It's good to meet you. I'm glad to see that this neighborhood wasn't affected by the recent heavy rains and mudslide.

Yeah, it wasn't too bad here. But we did have a few trees fall behind the house.

Well I don't want to take a lot of your time. We're calling to talk about hope for loved ones who've died. Do you think we'll ever see them again?

Thanks, but I'm not really interested.

What just happened? Would you say that the publisher made clear the practical value of his information? Although he mentioned the recent storm, he failed to notice its effect on the householder. And when he learned how the householder felt, he didn't tailor his presentation to the man's needs. True, all of the good news of the kingdom is valuable, but some aspects may appeal to people more at specific times in their life. Moreover, if we ignore topics that are on people's minds they might think we're inconsiderate, or rude.

In the example we just watched what Bible account might have made the person think? Let's watch again:

My heart goes out to those who've lost their homes in the recent heavy rains and mudslide.

Me too. We've been helping a family member try to recover some personal belongings. We're just happy that no one was hurt.

Well that's a relief for sure! And it's nice to see the community coming together to help one another. Did you know that the Bible promises a time when we'll no longer experience devastation from so-called natural disasters.

Really? What do you mean?

Well think about the power Jesus displayed when he lived on the earth. Notice what it says here at Mark chapter 4 verse 39. "With that he got up and rebuked the wind and said to the sea: Hush! Be quiet! And the wind abated,"

The publisher used a local topic of interest, and the Bible account that the householder could relate to. We can also make practical application of our material when giving a talk. However, when teaching an audience what to do, be careful not to burden them with guilt. Instead, strengthen their love and faith, and express confidence in their good motives.

If you're preparing a public talk, consider the needs of newly interested ones. Ask yourself: "How can I help this audience to draw close to Jehovah and overcome obstacles that could hinder them from making progress?" Let's watch a brief excerpt from a public talk:

Hebrews 10:24 and 25 says: "And let us consider one another so as to incite to love and fine works, not *forsaking* our meeting together, as some *have the custom*, but encouraging one another, and all the more so as you see the day drawing near."

So if it's your custom to miss meetings here at the kingdom hall you need to change. Jehovah knows when you're here, and when you're not. Armageddon's coming, and you don't want to miss out on everlasting life.

Was that encouraging? Was it motivating to those attending their first congregation meeting? Although the speaker clearly showed what the audience needed to do, how mighty have strengthened their motivation?

Hebrews 10:24 and 25 says: "And let us consider one another so as to *incite* to *love and fine works*, not forsaking our meeting together, as some have the custom, but *encouraging* one another, and *all the more so* as you see the day drawing near."

Within these verses we find important reasons to attend congregation meetings regularly. For instance; we receive encouragement. Who doesn't need that? This is true all the more so since we're living in *critical* times, and Jehovah's day *is* drawing near. Moreover, attending congregation meetings gives us the opportunity to *incite* others, to love and find works. Yes, even your presence here is motivating. How so? Because you've shown that no matter what else is happening in your life, there is nothing more important to you than praising and honoring Jehovah *here*, *with* the congregation. So just seeing you here fills us with strength.

By making the practical value of our message clear to our listeners, we help them to understand how the information affects their lives. And we motivate them to action.

Knowing that "every family . . . on earth owes its name" to God alters the way we view other people. (Ephesians 3:15) Having such knowledge also influences how we view ourselves and our problems. Our thinking will be affected in the following ways.

When faced with difficult decisions, we will not become unduly worried about man's conflicting opinions. Instead, we will confidently rely on the Bible's counsel. Why? Because "all Scripture is inspired of God and beneficial for teaching, for reproving, for setting things straight, for disciplining in righteousness, that the man of God may be fully competent, completely equipped for every good work."—2 Timothy 3:16, 17.

True, applying the Bible's counsel involves effort and self-discipline. Sometimes its guidance may even require that we act in ways that seem contrary to our inclinations. (Genesis 8:21) However, if we accept that we were created by a loving heavenly Father, it is only

logical to conclude that he knows the best course for us to take. (Isaiah 55:9) His Word thus assures us: "Trust in Jehovah with all your heart and do not lean upon your own understanding. In all your ways take notice of him, and he himself will make your paths straight." (Proverbs 3:5, 6) If we apply that counsel, much of the anxiety we experience when facing challenges and decisions will be removed.

When confronted by prejudice, we will not be burdened by feelings of inferiority, thinking that we are somehow less valuable than people of a different race or another cultural background. Instead, we will develop a healthy sense of self-respect. Why? Because our Father, Jehovah God, "is not partial, but in every nation the man that fears him and works righteousness is acceptable to him."—Acts 10:34, 35.

This realization will also prevent us from allowing prejudice to warp our attitude toward others. We will appreciate that there is no legitimate basis for feeling superior to people of another race, since God "made out of one man every nation of men, to dwell upon the entire surface of the earth."—Acts 17:26.

Certainly, knowing that we were created and that our Creator cares for us lays the foundation for gaining real peace of mind. But more is needed if we are to maintain inner peace.

Irene Hof Laurenceau:

An Orthopedic Surgeon Explains Her Faith

My name is Irene Hof Laurenceau. I studied medicine at the University of Zurich in Switzerland. And afterward, I specialized in orthopedic surgery.

I didn't believe in a creator because I believed that the species came into existence through evolution. By comparing the anatomies of various organisms we recognized similarities. To me it was logical that there was a link between these similarities, that it indicated that we descend from a common ancestor.

After my studies in medicine I worked in hospitals in surgical departments. In orthopedics a large part of orthopedics involves the insertion of prosthetics to replace joints that are sick or no longer work. Because the knee not only bends and straightens, there is also a sliding movement, a small rotation. With a prosthetic knee, we cannot achieve the complete mobility of a normal healthy knee.

If we see someone skating or dancing we have to believe that there is a designer who is superior to us. For a foot to function properly, there has to be harmony between the joints, the tendons, the muscles, and the nervous system. It's difficult to imagine that it could be the result of evolution. When someone came to my home to speak about the Bible, I found the arguments in favor of creation more logical. Also I learned there renowned scientists who have doubts themselves about the theory of evolution. By studying the Bible, I came to better know who God is. It's like food. You have to taste it to know if it's good. Likewise, you have to study the Bible to realize that what it says *is* true.

Yaroslav Dovhanych: A Zoologist Explains His Faith

My name is Yaroslav Dovhanych. I received my degree from the biology department of the Uzhgorod State University and specialized in zoology. I love nature very much and want to protect it.

The evolutionary theory, and my opinion, quite reasonably argued that there is no creator—that everything was shaped by a series of random changes and combinations. I was unable to prove this, but I believed it. And that is why I was an evolutionist. I was a staunch evolutionist.

While working in the Carpathian Biosphere Reserve and studying how ecological systems function, I studied nature through the lens of the evolution theory. When I studied nature through this lens, I began to notice things that contradicted the theory of evolution. I found things that couldn't have been formed by natural selection.

As I started to wonder about this—whether there is a Creator—I began to discover more facts contradicting the theory of evolution. Can anyone say that some computer programs appeared simply by chance? In contrast, evolutionists would like us to believe that DNA was formed by evolution.

To illustrate: say you take some letter blocks, pour them on to the table, and the Encyclopedia Brittanica is formed. There is an even smaller probability that DNA originated by evolution. When I started to seriously consider the possibility that the world might have been created, I began to meditate about the following: I knew that religion explains that the world was created by God. So I decided to examine different religious teachings, including what the Bible says about how God created the world. The Bible is very old, thousands of years old, and yet its contents are accurate and authentic to this day. And the Bible contains many prophecies; these are the foretelling of events. They were to occur in the distant future, sometimes many centuries in the future. History confirms that they have been fulfilled exactly as the Bible foretold.

So these predictions must have been made by someone whose abilities are far greater than man's. This proves that the author of the Bible is not man, but someone who is far wiser and has abilities which man lacks.

98 THE APOSTLES AGAIN SEEK PROMINENCE

MATTHEW 20:17-28 MARK 10:32-45 LUKE 18:31-34

- JESUS AGAIN FORETELLS HIS DEATH
- DEALING WITH THE APOSTLES' DESIRE FOR PROMINENCE

As Jesus and his disciples complete their journey southward in Perea toward Jerusalem, they cross the Jordan River near Jericho. Others are traveling with them for the Passover of 33 C.E.

Jesus is walking on ahead of the disciples, determined to be in the city on time for the Passover. But the disciples are afraid. Earlier, when Lazarus died and Jesus was about to go from Perea into Judea, Thomas told the others: "Let us also go, so that we may die with him." (John 11:16, 47-53) So going to Jerusalem is risky, and the disciples' fear is understandable.

To prepare them for what lies ahead, Jesus takes the apostles aside and tells them: "We are going up to Jerusalem, and the Son of man will be handed over to the chief priests and the scribes. They will condemn



him to death and hand him over to men of the nations to be mocked and scourged and executed on a stake; and on the third day he will be raised up."—Matthew 20:18, 19.

This is the third time that Jesus has told his disciples about his death and resurrection. (Matthew 16: 21; 17:22, 23) However, this time he says that he will be executed on a stake. They listen to him, yet they do not comprehend the meaning. Perhaps they are expecting the restoration on earth of the kingdom of Israel, wanting to enjoy glory and honor in an earthly kingdom with Christ.

The mother of the apostles James and John, who is apparently Salome, is among the travelers. Jesus has given these two apostles a name meaning "Sons of Thunder," no doubt because of their fiery disposition. (Mark 3:17; Luke 9:54) For some time, these two have had the ambition of being prominent in Christ's Kingdom. Their mother is aware of that. She now approaches Jesus in their behalf, bows before him, and asks for a favor. Jesus replies: "What do you want?" She says: "Give the word that these two sons of mine may sit down, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your Kingdom."—Matthew 20:20, 21.

The request is really coming from James and John. Having just outlined the shame and humiliation he will experience, Jesus says to them: "You do not know what you are asking for. Can you drink the cup that I am about to drink?" They reply: "We can." (Matthew 20:22) Still, they likely do not really comprehend what this means for them.

Nevertheless, Jesus tells them: "You will indeed drink my cup, but to sit down at my right hand and at my left is not mine to give, but it belongs to those for whom it has been prepared by my Father."—Matthew 20:23.

On learning about James and John's request, the other ten apostles are indignant. Might James and John have been outspoken in the earlier argument among the apostles about who is the greatest? (Luke 9:46-48) Regardless, the present request reveals that the Twelve have not applied the counsel Jesus has given about conducting oneself as a lesser one. Their desire for prominence persists.

Jesus decides to deal with this latest controversy and the ill will it is creating. He calls the Twelve together and counsels them lovingly, saying: "You know that those who appear to be ruling the nations lord it over them and their great ones wield authority over them. This must not be the way among you; but whoever wants to become great among you must be your minister, and whoever wants to be first among you must be the slave of all."—Mark 10:42-44.

Jesus brings up the example they should imitate—his example. He explains: "The Son of man came, not to be ministered to, but to minister and to give his life as a ransom in exchange for many." (Matthew 20: 28) For some three years, Jesus has been ministering in behalf of others. And he will yet do so to the extent of dying for mankind! The disciples need that same Christlike disposition of desiring to serve rather than to be served, to be a lesser one rather than to be in a position of prominence.



God's Gift of Holy Spirit

PREVIEW

This article highlights how God's holy spirit can help us to endure. It also considers what we can do to benefit fully from holy spirit. "WHEN I think about the trial I have gone through, I know that I could not have faced it on my own." Have you ever said something like that? Many of us have. Perhaps you said it after reflecting on how you were able to cope with a serious illness or the death of a loved one. Looking back, you feel that you were able to go on from day to day only because Jehovah's holy spirit provided you with "power beyond what is normal."—2 Cor. 4:7-9.

² We also rely on holy spirit to deal with the influence of this wicked world. (1 John 5:19) In addition, we have to struggle against "wicked spirit forces." (Eph. 6:12) With all these pressures in mind, we will consider two ways in which holy spirit helps us. Then we will discuss what we can do to benefit fully from holy spirit.

HOLY SPIRIT GIVES US POWER

³ Jehovah's holy spirit helps us by giving us the power, or strength, to fulfill our responsibilities despite trials. The apostle Paul felt that he was able to keep working despite his trials because he relied on "the power of the Christ." (2 Cor. 12:9) During his second missionary tour, Paul not only worked hard

in preaching but also supported himself financially. He stayed in Corinth in the home of Aquila and Priscilla. They were tentmakers. Since Paul practiced the same trade, he worked with them part-time. (Acts 18: 1-4) Holy spirit gave Paul the power both to work secularly and to accomplish his ministry.

⁴ Read 2 Corinthians 12:7b-9. In this passage, what did Paul mean when he said that he struggled with "a thorn in the flesh"? If you had a thorn stuck in your body, you would be in a lot of pain. So Paul was saying that he faced a painful personal trial of some sort. He called this trial "an angel of Satan" that kept "slapping" ("beating," ftn.) him. Satan or his demon angels may not directly have caused Paul's trials, as if driving a thorn into his flesh. But when those wicked spirits noticed the "thorn," they may have been eager to push it in deeper, so to speak, to increase Paul's pain. What did Paul do?

⁵ At first, Paul wanted to be rid of the "thorn." He admits: "Three times I begged the Lord [Jehovah] . . . that it would depart from me." Yet, despite Paul's prayers, the thorn in the flesh remained. Does this mean that Jehovah did not answer Paul's

prayers? Not at all. He did answer them. Jehovah did not remove the problem, but he did give Paul the strength to endure it. Jehovah said: "My power is being made perfect in weakness." (2 Cor. 12:8, 9) And with God's help, Paul was able to maintain his joy and inner peace!—Phil. 4:4-7.

⁶ Like Paul, have you ever begged Jehovah to deliver you from a trial? If despite your earnest pleadings the problem persisted—or even got worse—did you worry that perhaps Jehovah was displeased with you? If so, remember Paul's example. Just as Jehovah answered his prayers, He will certainly respond to your prayers! Jehovah may not remove the problem. But by means of holy spirit, he will give you the strength you need to endure the trial. (Ps. 61:3, 4) You may be "knocked down," but Jehovah will not abandon you.—2 Cor. 4:8, 9; Phil. 4:13.

HOLY SPIRIT MOVES US FORWARD

⁷ What is yet another way in which holy spirit helps us? Like a favorable wind on a stormy sea, holy spirit moves us forward through stormy trials to the haven of God's promised new world.

⁸ As a fisherman, the apostle Peter was accustomed to sailing. So it is worth noting that he described the working of holy spirit by using an expression that apparently is related to sailing. He wrote: "Prophecy was at no time brought by man's will, but men spoke from God as they were moved by holy spirit." The Greek word translated "moved" literally means "carried along; borne along."—2 Pet. 1: 21: ftn.

⁹ What word picture did Peter draw with the expression "borne along"? A similar form of the same Greek word was used by Luke, the writer of Acts, to describe a ship that is "driven along" by the wind. (Acts 27:15) So when Peter wrote that Bible writers were "borne along," he used "a fascinating maritime metaphor," as one Bible scholar put it. Peter said, in effect, that just as a ship is carried along by the wind to accomplish its journey, so Bible prophets and writers were borne along by holy spirit to accomplish their task. The same scholar said: "The prophets raised their sails, so to speak." Jehovah did his part. He provided "the wind," or holy spirit. The Bible writers did their part. They worked in harmony with the direction of that spirit.

^{9.} What word picture did Peter draw by using the expression "borne along"?

¹⁰ Of course, the time for recording inspired writings has passed for now. However, holy spirit is still exerting power on God's people. Jehovah is still doing his part. How can we benefit from God's holy spirit? We need to make sure that we keep doing our part. How do we do that?

¹¹ Think of this comparison. To benefit from the wind, a sailor must do two things. First, he has to put his boat in the path of the wind. After all, his boat will not move forward if the sailor remains in a harbor far away from where the wind is blowing. Second, he needs to raise and unfurl his sails as fully as possible. Obviously, even with the wind blowing, his boat will move forward only if the sails catch the wind. Similarly, we will endure in Jehovah's service only if we have the help of holy spirit. To benefit from that spirit, we must take two steps. First, we must put ourselves squarely in the path of God's spirit by sharing in activities that bring us under its influence. Second, we need to "raise our sails" as fully as possible by being fully engaged in these activities to the best of our ability. (Ps. 119:32) When we take these steps, holy spirit will push us forward through waves of opposition and trials and will help us to endure faithfully on the course to God's new world.

¹² So far we have discussed two ways in which holy spirit helps us. Holy spirit gives us power and helps us to stay faithful while facing trials. Holy spirit also moves us forward and helps us to remain on the path to life everlasting. Now we will consider four things we must do to benefit fully from holy spirit.

HOW TO BENEFIT FULLY FROM HOLY SPIRIT

¹³ First, study God's Word. (Read 2 Timothy 3:16, 17.) The Greek word translated "inspired of God"

"breathe" his thoughts into the minds of Bible writers. When we read the Bible and meditate on what we read, God's instructions enter our mind and heart. Those inspired thoughts move us to bring our life in line with God's will. (Heb. 4:12) But to benefit fully from holy spirit, we must set aside time to study the Bible regularly and to think deeply about what we read. Then God's Word will influence all that we say and do.

¹⁴ Second, worship God together. (Ps. 22:22) In a sense, our Christian meetings are events where "the wind is blowing." Jehovah's spirit is present at meetings. (Rev. 2:29) Why can we say that? Because when we meet for worship with fellow Christians, we pray for holy spirit, we sing Kingdom songs based on God's Word, and we listen to Bible-based instruction presented by brothers who have been appointed by holy spirit. And that same holy spirit helps sisters prepare and deliver their parts. To benefit fully from holy spirit, however, we need to come prepared to participate in the meetings. That way, we attend the meetings with "unfurled sails."

¹⁵ Third, share in the preaching work. When we use

the Bible in the preaching and teaching work, we allow holy spirit to be involved in our ministry. (Rom. 15:18, 19) To benefit fully from God's spirit, though, you must have a regular share in the preaching work and use the Bible whenever possible. One way you can make your ministry more meaningful is by using the sample conversations from the Life and Ministry Meeting Workbook.

¹⁶ Fourth, pray to Jehovah. (Matt. 7:7-11; Luke 11:13) The most direct way to obtain holy spirit is to ask Jehovah for it in prayer. Nothing can stop our prayers from reaching Jehovah or block the good gift of God's spirit from reaching us-not any prison wall and not even Satan. (Jas. 1:17) How should we pray so that we benefit fully from holy spirit? To answer, let us examine the subject of prayer in more detail by considering an illustration found only in Luke's Gospel.*

PRAY WITH PERSISTENCE

¹⁷ Read Luke 11:5-9, 13. Jesus' illustration shows


^{*} Luke, more than any other Gospel writer, highlights that prayer was a prominent part of Jesus' life.—Luke 3:21; 5:16; 6:12; 9:18, 28, 29; 18:1; 22:41, 44.

Benefit Fully From Holy Spirit

We need holy spirit to push us forward through waves of opposition and trials. Here are four essential activities that put us in the path of God's spirit (See paragraphs 13-16)



how we should pray for holy spirit. In the illustration, the man received what he needed "because of his bold persistence." He was not afraid to ask his friend for help even though it was late at night. (See study note on Luke 11:8.) How did Jesus apply this illustration to prayer? He said: "Keep on asking, and it will be given you; keep on seeking, and you will find; keep on knocking, and it will be opened to you." So, what is the lesson for us? To receive the help of holy spirit, we must pray for it with persistence.

¹⁸ Jesus' illustration also helps us to see why Jehovah will give us holy spirit. The man in the illustration wanted to be a good host. He felt compelled to serve food to his late-night visitor but had nothing to offer him. Jesus said that the neighbor responded because of the man's bold persistence in asking for bread. What was Jesus' point? If an imperfect human is willing to help a persistent neighbor, how much more so will our kind heavenly Father help those who persistently ask him for holy spirit! Therefore, we can pray with confidence that Jehovah will respond to our urgent request for holy spirit.—Ps. 10:17; 66:19.

^{18.} According to Jesus' illustration, why can we be confident that Jehovah will give us his holy spirit?

¹⁹ We can be sure that in spite of Satan's relentless efforts to defeat us, we will be victorious. Why? Because holy spirit helps us in two ways. First, it gives us the power we need to overcome trials. Second, it is the force that "fills our sails," helping us to move forward in serving Jehovah with life in God's new world in view. Let us be determined to benefit fully from the help of holy spirit!
