20 Now Abraham moved his camp from there to the land of the Neg'eb and began dwelling between Ka'desh and Shur. While he was residing at Ge'rar, ² Abraham repeated concerning his wife Sarah: "She is my sister." So A-bim'e-lech king of Ge'rar sent for Sarah and took her.

³ Afterward, God came by night to A-bim'e-lech in a dream and said to him: "Here you are as good as dead because of the woman whom you have taken, since she is married and belongs to another man." ⁴ However, A-bim'e-lech had not gone near her. So he said: "Jehovah, will you kill a nation that is really innocent? ⁵ Did he not say to me, 'She is my sister,' and did she too not say, 'He is my brother'? I did this with an honest heart and innocent hands." ⁶ Then the true God said to him in the dream: "I know that you did this with an honest heart, so I held you back from sinning against me. That is why I did not allow you to touch her. ⁷ Now return the man's wife, for he is a prophet, and he will make supplication for you and you will keep living. But if you are not returning her, know that you will surely die, you and all who are yours."

⁸ A-bim'e-lech got up early in the morning and called all his servants and told them all these things, and they became very frightened. ⁹ Then A-bim'e-lech called Abraham and said to him: "What have you done to us? What sin have I committed against you that you would bring upon me and my kingdom such a great sin? What you have done to me was not right." ¹⁰ And A-bim'e-lech went on to say to Abraham: "What were your intentions when you did this thing?"

¹¹ Abraham said: "It was because I said to myself, 'Surely there is no fear of God in this place, and they will kill me because of my wife.' ¹² And besides, she really is my sister, the daughter of my father but not the daughter of my mother, and she became my wife. ¹³ So when God caused me to wander from the house of my father, I said to her: 'Let this be how you show loyal love to me: Everywhere we go, say of me, "He is my brother.""

¹⁴ A·bim'e·lech then took sheep and cattle and male and female servants and gave them to Abraham, and he returned his wife Sarah to him. ¹⁵ A·bim'e·lech also said: "Here my land is available to you. Dwell wherever you please." ¹⁶ And to Sarah he said: "Here I give 1,000 pieces of silver to your brother. It is a sign of your innocence to all who are with you and before everybody, and you are cleared of reproach." ¹⁷ And Abraham began to make supplication to the true God, and God healed A·bim'e·lech and his wife and his slave girls, and they began having children; ¹⁸ for Jehovah had made all the women of the house of A·bim'e·lech barren because of Sarah, Abraham's wife.

21 Jehovah turned his attention to Sarah just as he had said, and Jehovah did for Sarah what he had promised. ² So Sarah became pregnant and then bore a son to Abraham in his old age at the appointed time God had promised him. ³ Abraham named his newborn son, whom Sarah bore to him, Isaac. ⁴ And Abraham circumcised his son Isaac when

he was eight days old, just as God had commanded him. ⁵ Abraham was 100 years old when his son Isaac was born to him. ⁶ Then Sarah said: "God has brought me laughter; everybody hearing of it will laugh with me." ⁷ And she added: "Who would have said to Abraham, 'Sarah will certainly nurse children'? Yet, I have given birth to a son for him in his old age."

⁸ Now the child grew and was weaned, and Abraham prepared a big feast on the day that Isaac was weaned. ⁹ But Sarah kept noticing that the son of Ha'gar the Egyptian, whom she had borne to Abraham, was mocking Isaac. ¹⁰ So she said to Abraham: "Drive out this slave girl and her son, for the son of this slave girl is not going to be an heir along with my son, with Isaac!" ¹¹ But what she said about his son was very displeasing to Abraham. ¹² Then God said to Abraham: "Do not be displeased by what Sarah is saying to you about the boy and about your slave girl. Listen to her, for what will be called your offspring will be through Isaac. ¹³ As for the son of the slave girl, I will also make a nation out of him, because he is your offspring."

¹⁴ So Abraham got up early in the morning and took bread and a skin bottle of water and gave it to Ha'gar. He set these on her shoulder and then sent her away along with the boy. So she departed and wandered about in the wilderness of Be'er-she'ba. ¹⁵ Finally the water in the skin bottle was used up, and she pushed the boy under one of the bushes. ¹⁶ Then she went on and sat down by herself, about the distance of a bowshot away, because she said: "I do not want to watch the boy die." So she sat down at a distance and began to cry aloud and to weep.

¹⁷ At that God heard the voice of the boy, and God's angel called to Ha'gar from the heavens and said to her: "What is the matter with you, Ha'gar? Do not be afraid, for God has heard the voice of the boy there where he is. ¹⁸ Get up, lift the boy and take hold of him with your hand, for I will make him a great nation." ¹⁹ Then God opened her eyes and she saw a well of water, and she went and filled the skin bottle with water and gave the boy a drink. ²⁰ And God was with the boy as he grew up. He lived in the wilderness and became an archer. ²¹ He took up dwelling in the wilderness of Pa'ran, and his mother took a wife for him from the land of Egypt.

²² At that time A-bim'e-lech together with Phi'col the chief of his army said to Abraham: "God is with you in everything you are doing. ²³ So now swear to me here by God that you will not deal falsely with me and with my offspring and with my descendants, and that you will deal with me and with the land where you have been residing with the same loyal love that I have shown you." ²⁴ So Abraham said: "I swear to this."

²⁵ However, Abraham complained to A-bim'e-lech about the well of water that the servants of A-bim'e-lech had violently seized. ²⁶ A-bim'e-lech replied: "I do not know who did this; you did not tell me about it, and I heard nothing about it until today." ²⁷ At that Abraham took sheep and

cattle and gave them to A-bim'e-lech, and the two of them made a covenant. ²⁸ When Abraham set seven female lambs apart from the flock by themselves, ²⁹ A-bim'e-lech said to Abraham: "Why have you set these seven female lambs here by themselves?" ³⁰ Then he said: "You are to accept the seven female lambs from my hand as a witness that I dug this well." ³¹ That is why he called that place Be'ershe'ba, because there both of them had taken an oath. ³² So they made a covenant at Be'er-she'ba, after which A-bim'e-lech got up together with Phi'col the chief of his army, and they returned to the land of the Phi-lis'tines. ³³ After that he planted a tamarisk tree at Be'er-she'ba, and there he called on the name of Jehovah, the everlasting God. ³⁴ And Abraham stayed in the land of the Phi-lis'tines for a long time.

Genesis 21:1-3: Jehovah turned his attention to Sarah just as he had said, and Jehovah did for Sarah what he had promised. So Sarah became pregnant and then bore a son to

Abraham in his old age at the appointed time God had promised him. Abraham named his newborn son, whom Sarah bore to him, Isaac.

wp17.5 14-15

Was Sarah's laughter evidence that she lacked faith? Not at all. The Bible says: "By faith also Sarah received power to conceive offspring, even when she was past the age, since she considered Him faithful who made the promise." (Hebrews 11:11) Sarah knew Jehovah; she knew that he could fulfill any promise that he made. Who of us does not need more faith of that kind? We do well to get to know the God of the Bible better. As we do, we will see that Sarah was right to have the faith that she did. Jehovah truly is faithful and carries out his every promise—at times, he might even do so in ways that surprise us into amazed or incredulous laughter!

"Listen to Her"

At 90 years of age, Sarah finally got to relish the moment she had longed for all her adult life. She bore a son to her beloved husband, now a century old! Abraham named the

baby Isaac, or "Laughter," just as God had said. We may picture Sarah's weary but glowing smile as she explained: "God has brought me laughter; everybody hearing of it will laugh with me." (Genesis 21:6) This miraculous gift from Jehovah surely delighted her till the end of her days. However, it also brought her great responsibilities.

When Isaac was five years old, the family held a feast to mark the occasion of the weaning of the child. But not all was well. We read that Sarah "kept noticing" a troubling pattern of behavior. Ishmael, the 19 year old son of Hagar, kept mocking little Isaac. This was not mere playful teasing. The apostle Paul was later inspired to call Ishmael's behavior persecution. Sarah saw this bullying for what it was: a serious threat to the well-being of her son. Sarah knew well that Isaac was more than just her son; he was assigned a key role in Jehovah's purpose. So she mustered up courage and spoke forthrightly to Abraham. She asked him to send Hagar and Ishmael away.—Genesis 21:8-10; Galatians 4:22, 23, 29.

How did Abraham respond? We read: "What she said about his son was very displeasing to Abraham." He was fond of Ishmael, and he could not see past his own fatherly emotions on this issue. However, Jehovah saw the matter clearly, so he

intervened. We read: "Then God said to Abraham: 'Do not be displeased by what Sarah is saying to you about the boy and about your slave girl. Listen to her, for what will be called your offspring will be through Isaac.'" Jehovah assured Abraham that Hagar and the boy would be provided for. Faithful Abraham complied.—Genesis 21:11-14.

* Sarah was the half sister of Abraham. Terah was father to both of them, but they had different mothers. (Genesis 20:12) While such a marriage is improper today, it is important to keep in mind how different things were back then. Humans were closer to the perfection that Adam and Eve had enjoyed but lost. For such robust people, marriage between close relatives evidently did not present genetic dangers to offspring. Some 400 years later, though, life spans were similar to ours. At that time, the Mosaic Law outlawed all sexual unions between close relatives.—Leviticus 18:6.

Genesis 21:33—How did Abraham call "on the name of Jehovah"?

Genesis 21:33: After that he planted a tamarisk tree at Beersheba, and there he called on the name of Jehovah, the everlasting God.

w89 7/1 20 paragraph 9

Abram responded with another act of faith. As the account says: "He built an altar there to Jehovah." (Genesis 12:7) Likely, this included offering up an animal sacrifice, for the Hebrew word for "altar" means "place of sacrifice." Later, Abram repeated these acts of faith in other parts of the land. In addition, he 'called on the name of Jehovah.' (Genesis 12:8; 13:18; 21:33) The Hebrew phrase "call on the name" also means "declare (preach) the name." Abram's household as well as the Canaanites must have heard him boldly declare the name of his God, Jehovah. (Genesis 14:22-24) Likewise, all who seek God's friendship today must call upon his name in faith. This would include sharing in public preaching, "always offer[ing] to God a sacrifice of praise, that is, the fruit of lips which make public declaration to his name."—

Hebrews 13:15; Romans 10:10.

Dear Brothers:

We are pleased to share encouraging highlights from the 2019 service year report of Jehovah's Witnesses worldwide. The peak number of publishers was 8,683,117. Jehovah's people spent a total of 2,088,560,437 hours in the ministry. An outstanding highlight is the 303,866 who were baptized! For the first time since 1999, the number baptized exceeded 300,000; this is evidence that Jehovah's people are taking seriously the commission to "make disciples." (Matt. 28:19) The worldwide Memorial attendance figure was 20,919,041. Other aspects of the service year report are available on jw.org and in *JW Library, Watchtower ONLINE LIBRARY*, and *Watchtower Library*.

We continue to see encouraging progress in many areas. There is steady growth in the multi-language field, with groups and congregations starting in several additional languages for the first time. This includes indigenous languages such as Irish Gaelic, Scottish Gaelic and Welsh. Significant progress is being made in specialized forms of ministry, such as in prisons and harbours. In addition, many publishers are enthusiastically taking part in special witnessing initiatives to reach people wherever they may be found. It has been especially heartwarming to note the level of support for the field ministry, while so many have also been busy in other aspects of sacred service. The Local Design/Construction Department continues to expand the Kingdom Hall construction activity and the branch relocation project reached its peak during the last service year. We rejoice to see the way Jehovah is blessing those who work so hard in various aspects of his service.

A FIG TREE IS USED TO TEACH A LESSON ABOUT FAITH

MATTHEW 21:19-27 MARK 11:19-33 LUKE 20:1-8

- THE WITHERED FIG TREE—A LESSON ABOUT FAITH
- JESUS' AUTHORITY IS CHALLENGED

Leaving Jerusalem on Monday afternoon, Jesus returns to Bethany on the eastern slope of the Mount of Olives. He likely spends the night at the home of his friends Lazarus, Mary, and Martha.

Now it is the morning of Nisan 11. Jesus and his disciples are on the road again, heading back to Jerusalem where he will be at the temple for the last time. And it is the final day of his public ministry before he celebrates the Passover, institutes the Memorial of his death, and then faces trial and execution.

En route from Bethany over the Mount of Olives toward Jerusalem, Peter notices the tree that Jesus cursed the previous morning. "Rabbi, see!" he ex-JESUS-THE WAY, THE TRUTH, THE LIFE



claims, "the fig tree that you cursed has withered." —Mark 11:21.

But why did Jesus cause the tree to wither? He reveals the reason in his response: "Truly I say to you, if you have faith and do not doubt, not only will you do what I did to the fig tree, but even if you say to this mountain, 'Be lifted up and thrown into the sea,' it will happen. And all the things you ask in prayer, having faith, you will receive." (Matthew 21: 21, 22) He is thus repeating the point he made earlier about faith being able to move a mountain. —Matthew 17:20.

So by causing the tree to wither, Jesus provides an object lesson on the need to have faith in God. He states: "All the things you pray and ask for, have faith that you have received them, and you will have them." (Mark 11:24) What an important lesson for all of Jesus' followers! It is especially appropriate for the apostles in view of the difficult tests they will soon face. There is yet another connection between the withering of the fig tree and the quality of faith.

A FIG TREE IS USED TO TEACH A LESSON ABOUT FAITH

Like this fig tree, the nation of Israel has a deceptive appearance. The people of this nation are in a covenant relationship with God, and they might outwardly appear to observe his Law. However, the nation as a whole has proved to be both lacking faith and barren of good fruitage. They even reject God's own Son! Hence, by causing the unproductive fig tree to wither, Jesus demonstrates what the end will be for this fruitless, faithless nation.

Shortly, Jesus and his disciples enter Jerusalem. As is his custom, Jesus goes to the temple and begins teaching. The chief priests and elders of the people, likely having in mind what Jesus did the day before to the money changers, challenge him: "By what authority do you do these things? Or who gave you this authority to do these things?"—Mark 11:28.

Jesus replies: "I will ask you one question. Answer me, and I will tell you by what authority I do these things. Was the baptism by John from heaven or from men? Answer me." Now his opponents are the ones being challenged. The priests and elders JESUS-THE WAY, THE TRUTH, THE LIFE consult one another about how to answer: "If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say, 'Why, then, did you not believe him?' But dare we say, 'From men'?" They reason this way because they are in fear of the crowd, "for these all held that John had really been a prophet."—Mark 11:29-32.

Those opposing Jesus cannot come up with an appropriate answer. So they reply: "We do not know." Jesus, in turn, says: "Neither am I telling you by what authority I do these things."—Mark 11:33.

SONG 134 Children Are a Trust From God

PREVIEW

Should a married couple have children? If they do, how many children should they have? And how can they train their children to love and serve Jehovah? This article presents modern-day examples and points to Bible principles that can help us answer those questions. JEHOVAH created the first couple with the desire to have children. The Bible rightly says: "Children are an inheritance from Jehovah." (Ps. 127:3, ftn.) What does that mean? Imagine that a close friend asks you to look after a large amount of money for him. How would you feel? Likely, you would be honored that he trusts you. But you might worry about how you will keep the fortune safe. Jehovah, our closest Friend, gives parents something to look after that is far more valuable than money. He entrusts them with the welfare and happiness of their children.

² Who should decide if and when a married couple will have children? And what can parents do to help their children have a happy life? Consider just some of the principles found in God's Word that can help Christian couples to make wise decisions.

RESPECT A COUPLE'S DECISION

³ In some cultures, newly married couples are expected to start having children as soon as possible. They may even feel pressure from their family and others to follow that custom. Jethro, a brother in

Asia, says, "In the congregation, some who have children pressure the childless couples to start a family." Jeffrey, another brother in Asia, observes, "Some tell childless couples that they will have no one to take care of them when they grow old." However, each couple should decide for themselves whether to have children. That is for them to decide; it is their responsibility. (Gal. 6:5, ftn.) Understandably, friends and family want a newly married couple to be happy. But all need to remember that the decision whether to have children or not belongs to the couple.—1 Thess. 4:11.

⁴ A couple who decide to have children do well to discuss two important questions: First, *when* do they want to have children? Second, *how many* children do they want? When is the best time for a couple to have such a discussion? And why are those two subjects so important?

⁵ In most cases, before they get married, a couple do well to address the subject of having children. Why then? One good reason is that being of the same mind on this matter is important. Also, they will need to consider whether they are ready for that responsibility. Some couples have decided to

wait at least a year or two after their wedding before having children because becoming parents will consume much time and energy. They reason that by waiting for a while, they will give themselves time to adjust to married life and draw closer to each other.—Eph. 5:33.

⁶ Other Christians have chosen to consider the pattern set by Noah's three sons and their wives. Those three couples did not have children immediately. (Gen. 6:18; 9:18, 19; 10:1; 2 Pet. 2:5) Jesus likened our time to "the days of Noah," and there is no doubt that we are living in "critical times hard to deal with." (Matt. 24:37; 2 Tim. 3:1) With that reality in mind, some couples have concluded that they would like to postpone having children so that they can devote more time to sharing in the Christian ministry.

⁷ When deciding whether to have children and how many children to have, wise couples "calculate the expense." (Read Luke 14:28, 29.) Experienced parents confirm that raising children not only costs money but also costs time and energy. Thus, it is important for a couple to consider such questions as:

When deciding whether to have children and how many to have, wise couples "calculate the expense" (See paragraph 7)

'Would both of us have to work to supply the family's basic needs? Do we agree on what our "basic needs" are? If we both would have to work, who would look after our children? Who would influence their thinking and actions?' Couples who calmly discuss those questions take to heart the words of **Proverbs 21:5.—Read.**

and energy from each parent. So if a couple have a number of children who are close in age, the parents may find it challenging to give each child the needed attention. Some couples who had a number of young children confessed that they felt overwhelmed. A mother may struggle with feeling drained physically and emotionally. Could that have an impact on her being able to study, pray, and share in the ministry regularly? A related challenge is being able to pay attention during Christian meetings and to benefit from them. Of course, a loving husband will do what he can to support his wife when their children need attention, both at meetings and at home. For example, he could help his wife with household chores. He will work hard to ensure that all benefit from a regular Family Worship program. And Christian fathers will regularly accompany the family in field service.

TEACHING CHILDREN TO LOVE JEHOVAH

⁹ What are some things that parents can do to help their children learn to love Jehovah? How can they protect their children from moral dangers? Consider some steps that parents can take.

¹⁰ *Pray for Jehovah's help.* Note the example set by Manoah and his wife, who became the parents of Samson. When Manoah found out that he and his wife were going to have a son, he pleaded with Jehovah for guidance on how to raise their child.

¹¹ Nihad and Alma, from Bosnia and Herzegovina, learned from Manoah's example. They explain: "Like Manoah, we pleaded with Jehovah to instruct us how to be good parents. And Jehovah answered our prayers in various ways—through the Scriptures, Bible literature, congregation meetings, and conventions."—**Read Judges 13:8.**

¹² Teach by example. What you say is important; however, what you do will likely have a bigger impact on your child. We can be sure that Joseph and Mary set an excellent example for their children, including Jesus. Joseph worked hard to support his family. In addition, Joseph encouraged his household to appreciate spiritual things. (Deut. 4:9, 10) Though Joseph was not required by the Law to take his family with him to Jerusalem "from year to year" to celebrate the Passover, he did. (Luke 2:41, 42) Some fathers in his day may have viewed such a family trip as inconvenient, time-consuming, and expensive. Yet, Joseph obviously appreciated spiritual things and taught his children to do the same. Also, Mary knew the Scriptures well. By her words and actions, she no doubt taught her children to love God's Word.

¹³ Nihad and Alma, mentioned earlier, wanted to follow the example set by Joseph and Mary. How did that help them to raise their son to love and serve God? They say, "By our way of life, we tried to show our son how good it is to live according to Jehovah's principles." Nihad adds, "Be the kind of person you want your child to be."

¹⁴ Help your children to choose good associates. Both mother and father need to know whom their children are associating with and what they are doing. That includes the parents' knowing whom their children are communicating with through social media and on their mobile phone. Those associates can impact how the children think and act.—1 Cor. 15:33.

¹⁵ What can parents do if they are unfamiliar with computers or mobile devices? Jessie, a father in the Philippines, says: "We knew little about technology. But that did not stop us from making our children aware of the possible dangers of electronic devices." Jessie did not ban his children from using such devices just because he was unfamiliar with them. He explains: "I encouraged my children to use their electronic devices to learn a new language, to study for the meetings, and to read the Bible daily." If you are parents, have you read and discussed with your children the balanced advice about texting and online photo sharing that you can find on the "Teenagers" section of jw.org®? Have you reviewed with them the videos *Who's in Control—You or Your*

Devices? and *Be Social-Network Smart?** That material can be valuable as you teach your children how to use electronic devices wisely.—Prov. 13:20.

¹⁶ Many parents exert themselves to arrange opportunities for their children to associate with those who set a good example in serving God. For instance, N'Déni and Bomine, a couple in Côte d'Ivoire, often invited the circuit overseer to stay in their home. N'Déni relates: "This had a very good effect on our son. He began pioneering and now serves as a substitute circuit overseer." Can you arrange similar association for your children?

¹⁷ Start training children as early as possible. The earlier parents begin training their children, the better. (Prov. 22:6) Consider Timothy, who in time traveled with the apostle Paul. Timothy's mother, Eunice, and his grandmother Lois trained him "from infancy."—2 Tim. 1:5; 3:15.

¹⁸ Another couple in Côte d'Ivoire, Jean-Claude and Peace, were able to raise all six of their children to love and serve Jehovah. What helped them to be

successful? They followed the example of Eunice and Lois. They say, "We inculcated God's Word in our children from infancy, starting shortly after they were born."—Deut. 6:6, 7.

¹⁹ What does it mean to "inculcate" Jehovah's Word in your children? "To inculcate" means "to teach and impress by frequent repetitions." To do so, parents need to spend time regularly with their young ones. It could at times seem frustrating to have to repeat instructions to the children. However,

parents can strive to see this as a way to help their children understand God's Word and apply it.

²⁰ *Be discerning.* Psalm 127 compares children to arrows. (Read Psalm 127:4.) Just as arrows can be made from different materials and can vary in size, no two children are precisely alike. So parents need to determine how to train each of their children. A couple in modern-day Israel who successfully raised two children to serve Jehovah tell what they found to be helpful, "We conducted a Bible study with each child separately." Of course, each family head will decide whether studying in that way is necessary or possible.
