15 "You will make the panel frames^a for the tabernacle out of acacia wood standing upright.^b 16 Each panel frame is to be ten cubits high and a cubit and a half wide. 17 Each panel frame has two tenons* joined to each other. That is how you should make all the panel frames of the tabernacle. 18 You are to make 20 panel frames for the south side of the tabernacle, facing south.

19 "You will make 40 silver socket pedestals^c under the 20 panel frames: two socket pedestals under the one panel frame for its two tenons and two socket pedestals under each following panel frame for its two tenons.^d 20 For the other side of the tabernacle, the northern side, make 20 panel frames 21 and their 40 silver socket pedestals, two socket pedestals under one panel frame and two socket pedestals under each following panel frame. 22 For the rear section of the tabernacle to the west, you will make six panel frames.^e 23 You will make two panel frames to serve as the two rear corner posts of the tabernacle. 24 They should be doubled from the bottom to the top, up to the first ring. 29 "You will overlay the panel frames with gold,^a and you will make their rings of gold as holders for the bars, and you will overlay the bars with gold. 30 You must set up the tabernacle according to its plan that you were shown in the mountain.^b

31 "You are to make a curtain^c of blue thread, purple wool. scarlet material, and fine twisted linen. It will be made with cherubs embroidered on it. 32 You will hang it on four pillars of acacia overlaid with gold. Their hooks are to be of gold. The pillars are set on four socket pedestals of silver. 33 You will hang the curtain under the clasps and bring the ark of the Testimony^d there within the curtain. Their hooks are to be of gold, and you will cast five socket pedestals of copper for them.

and three cubits high.^a 2 You will make horns^b on its four corners; the horns will be part of the altar, and you will overlay the altar with copper.^c 3 You will make buckets for clearing away its ashes,* along with shovels, bowls, forks, and fire holders, and you will make all its utensils of copper.^d 4 You will make a grating for the altar, a network of copper, and on the network four rings of copper at its four corners. 5 You will set it down below the rim of the altar, and the network will extend partway down into the altar. 6 You will make poles of acacia wood for the altar and overlay them with copper. 7 The poles will be inserted into the rings so that the poles are on the two sides of the altar when it is carried.^e 8 You will make the altar in the form of a hollow chest of planks. 9 "You will make the courtyard^g of the tabernacle. For the south side, facing south, the courtvard will have hanging curtains of fine twisted linen. 100 cubits long for the one side.^h 10 It will have 20 pillars with 20 copper socket pedestals. The hooks of the pillars and their connectors* are of silver. 11 The hanging curtains for the north side will also be 100 cubits long, along with its 20 pillars and their 20 copper socket pedestals, with silver hooks and connectors* for the pillars. 12 There are to be hanging curtains on the west side for 50 cubits across the width of the courtvard, with ten pillars and ten socket pedestals. 13 The width of the courtyard

on the east side toward the sunrise is 50 cubits. **14** There will be 15 cubits of hanging curtains on the one side, with three pillars and three socket pedestals.^a **15** And for the other side, there will be 15 cubits of hanging curtains, with three pillars and three socket pedestals.

15 "You are to have an embroiderer make the breastpiece of judgment.^c It should be made like the eph'od, out of gold, blue thread, purple wool, scarlet material, and fine twisted linen.^d 16 It should be square when doubled, a span* long and a span wide. 17 You should set in it mounted stones, four rows of stones. Exodus 28:30: You will put the Urim and the Thummim into the breastpiece of judgment, and they must be over Aaron's heart when he comes in before Jehovah, and Aaron must carry the means for making judgments of the Israelites over his heart before Jehovah constantly.

A number of Bible commentators believe that the Urim and the Thummim were lots. They are called "the sacred lots" in James Moffatt's translation of Exodus 28:30. Some suppose that they consisted of three pieces, one inscribed with the word "yes," one with "no," and the other blank. These would be drawn, giving the answer to the question propounded, unless the blank piece was drawn, in which case no answer was forthcoming. Others think that they may have been two flat stones, white on one side and black on the other. When thrown down, two white sides up would mean "yes," two black sides "no," and a black and a white would mean no answer. On one occasion, when Saul had inquired through the priest as to whether to resume an attack on the Philistines, he received no answer. Feeling that someone among his men had sinned, he petitioned: "O God of Israel, do give Thummim!" Saul and Jonathan were taken from among those present; after that, lots were cast to decide between the two. In this account the appeal, "Do give Thummim," seems to be separate from the lot casting, though it may give indication that there was some connection between the two.—1 Samuel 14:36-42.

Exodus 28:36—We must remain holy

Exodus 28:36: "You are to make a shining plate of pure gold and engrave on it as one would engrave a seal: 'Holiness belongs to Jehovah.'

Israel's High Priest. In Israel the high priest's turban had on its front, over the priest's forehead, a gold plate, "the holy sign of dedication," upon which were inscribed "with the engravings of a seal" the words "Holiness belongs to Jehovah." (Exodus 28:36-38; 39:30) As Israel's chief representative of

Jehovah's worship, it was fitting that the high priest keep his office holy, and this inscription would also serve as a reminder to all Israel of the need of constant holiness in the service of Jehovah. It also served as a suitable picture of the great High Priest, Jesus Christ, and his being dedicated by Jehovah to this priestly service that upholds God's holiness.—Hebrews 7:26.

Exodus 28:42, 43—We must uphold the godly standard of dignity

Exodus 28:42, 43: Also make linen shorts for them to cover their naked flesh. These are to extend from the hips to the thighs. These must be worn by Aaron and his sons when they come into the tent of meeting or when they approach the altar to minister in the holy place, so that they may not incur guilt and die. It is a permanent statute for him and his offspring after him.

w08 8/15 15 paragraph 17

Special attention should be given to displaying dignity when we approach Jehovah in worship. "Guard your feet whenever you go to the house of the true God," says Ecclesiastes 5:1. Both Moses and Joshua were commanded to remove their sandals when in a holy place. (Exodus 3:5; Joshua 5:15) They were to do this as a gesture of respect or reverence. Israelite priests were obliged to wear linen drawers "to cover the naked flesh." (Exodus 28:42, 43) This prevented indecent exposure when they served at the altar. Every member of a priest's family was to uphold the godly standard of dignity.

w12 8/1 26 paragraphs 1-3

After the Israelites left Egypt and entered the wilderness, God gave them orders to make this breastpiece. (Exodus 28:15-21) The breastpiece had stones of ruby, topaz, emerald, turquoise, sapphire, jasper, *leshem*, agate, amethyst, chrysolite, onyx, and jade. Did the Israelites really have access to those types of gems?

In Bible times, people prized precious stones and traded them. The ancient Egyptians, for example, obtained gemstones from as far away as what is now modern-day Iran, Afghanistan, and possibly even India. Egyptian mines produced a number of different precious stones. The Egyptian monarchs had a monopoly on mineral extraction in the territories they controlled. The patriarch Job described how his contemporaries used shafts and underground galleries to search for treasures. Among other items dug from the ground, sapphire and topaz are specifically mentioned by Job.—Job 28:1-11, 19.

The Exodus account states that the Israelites "stripped the Egyptians" of their valuables when leaving the land. (Exodus 12:35, 36) So it is possible that the Israelites obtained from Egypt the stones used on the high priest's breastpiece.

Exodus 28:38—What were "the holy things"?

Exodus 28:38: It will be on Aaron's forehead, and Aaron will bear responsibility when someone commits an error against the holy things, which the Israelites sanctify when they offer them as holy gifts. It must always remain on his forehead, so that they may gain approval before Jehovah.

it-1 1130 paragraph 2

Animals and Produce. The firstborn males of cattle, sheep, and goats were counted as holy to Jehovah and were not to be redeemed. They were to be sacrificed, and a portion went to the sanctified priests. (Numbers 18:17-19) The firstfruits and the tithe were holy, as were all sacrifices and all gifts sanctified to the service of the sanctuary. (Exodus 28:38) All things holy to Jehovah were sacred and could not be considered lightly or used in a common, or profane, way. An example is the law regarding the tithe. If a man set aside the portion to be tithed, say, of his wheat crop, and then he or one of his household unintentionally took some of it for home use, such as cooking, the man was guilty of violating God's law respecting holy things. The Law required that he make compensation to the sanctuary of an equal amount plus 20 percent, besides offering up a sound ram of the flock as a sacrifice. Thus, great respect was engendered for the holy things belonging to Jehovah.—Leviticus 5:14-16.

Yes, Jehovah will love us as a father does his children if we avoid anything that would make us unclean or impure to him.

IMPROVING OUR SKILLS IN THE MINISTRY Witnessing Through a Camera or an Intercom



WHY IMPORTANT: Advances in technology and the increase of crime have made home security cameras and intercoms more common. We may feel intimidated when trying to share the good news with someone that we cannot see but who can see us. The following reminders will help us to witness through a camera or an intercom with more confidence.

HOW TO DO IT:

- Be positive. Many householders who have a camera or an intercom are willing to converse with us
- Remember that some cameras begin recording before you ring the bell and that the householder may be watching and listening to you as soon as you enter the property
- When the householder answers, talk to the intercom or camera as if you were talking to him in person. Smile and gesture naturally. Say the same thing you had planned to say if he had come to the door. If there is a camera, do not put your face too close. If the householder does not answer, do not leave a message
- After the conversation concludes, remember that the householder may still be observing or listening to you

JESUS' BODY IS PREPARED AND BURIED

MATTHEW 27:57-28:2 MARK 15:42-16:4 LUKE 23:50-24:3 JOHN 19:31-20:1

It is getting late on Friday afternoon, Nisan 14. At sundown, the Sabbath of Nisan 15 will begin. Jesus is already dead, but the two robbers alongside him are still alive. According to the Law, dead bodies "should not remain all night on the stake" but, rather, should be buried "on that day."—Deuteronomy 21:22, 23.

Furthermore, Friday afternoon is called Preparation because people prepare meals and complete any other tasks that cannot wait until after the Sabbath. At sunset, a double, or "great," Sabbath will begin. (John 19:31) This is so because Nisan 15 will be the first day of the seven-day Festival of Unleavened Bread, the first day of which is always a Sabbath. (Leviticus 23:5, 6) This time that first day coincides with the weekly Sabbath, the seventh day.

So the Jews ask Pilate to hasten the death of Jesus and the two robbers alongside him. How? By having their legs broken. That will make it impossible for them to use their legs to raise their bodies so as to breathe. The soldiers come and break the legs of the two robbers. But Jesus appears to be dead, and thus they do not break his legs. This fulfills Psalm 34:20: "He is guarding all his bones; not one of them has been broken."

To remove any doubt that Jesus is truly dead, a soldier jabs a spear into his side, piercing the



region of his heart. 'Immediately blood and water come out.' (John 19:34) This fulfills another scripture: "They will look to the one whom they pierced."—Zechariah 12:10.

Joseph from the city of Arimathea, "a rich man" and reputable member of the Sanhedrin, is also present at the execution. (Matthew 27: 57) He is described as "a good and righteous man," who is "waiting for the Kingdom of God." In fact, as "a disciple of Jesus but a secret one because of his fear of the Jews," he did not support the court's judgment of Jesus. (Luke 23:50; Mark 15:43; John 19:38) Joseph takes courage and asks Pilate for Jesus' body. Pilate summons the army officer in charge, who confirms that Jesus is dead. Thereupon, Pilate grants Joseph's request.

Joseph buys clean, fine linen and takes Jesus' body down from the stake. He wraps the corpse in the linen in preparation for burial. Nicodemus, "who had come to [Jesus] in the night the first time," helps with the preparation. (John 19:39) He brings about a hundred Roman pounds (72 modern pounds) of a costly mixture of myrrh and aloes. Jesus' body is wrapped in bandages containing these spices, according to the Jews' burial custom.

Joseph owns an unused tomb carved in rock

nearby, and Jesus' body is laid in it. Then a large stone is rolled in front of the tomb. This is hastily done, before the Sabbath begins. Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of James the Less may have been helping with the preparation of Jesus' body. They now hurry home "to prepare spices and perfumed oils" to treat Jesus' body further after the Sabbath.—Luke 23:56.

The next day, the Sabbath, the chief priests and Pharisees go to Pilate and say: "We recall what that impostor said while he was still alive, 'After three days I am to be raised up.' Therefore, command that the grave be made secure until the third day, so that his disciples may not come and steal him and say to the people, 'He was raised up from the dead!' Then this last deception will be worse than the first." Pilate replies: "You may have a guard. Go make it as secure as you know how."—Matthew 27:63-65.

Very early Sunday morning, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and other women bring spices to the tomb to treat Jesus' body. They say to one another: "Who will roll the stone away from the entrance of the tomb for us?" (Mark 16:3) But an earthquake has occurred. Moreover, God's angel has rolled the stone away, the guards are gone, and the tomb appears empty!

PREVIEW

We live in a world dominated by the father of the lie, Satan. So we face a constant struggle to walk in the truth. Christians living at the end of the first century C.E. had the same challenge. In order to help them and us, Jehovah inspired the apostle John to write three letters. The contents of those letters will help us identify the obstacles we face and learn how to overcome them.

Keep Walking in the Truth

"No greater joy do I have than this: that I should hear that my children go on walking in the truth."-3 JOHN 4.

CAN you imagine how happy the apostle John felt when he heard that those whom he had helped to learn the truth were continuing to serve Jehovah faithfully? They faced many problems, and John was working hard to strengthen the faith of these loyal Christians whom he viewed as his spiritual children. Similarly, we feel happy when our children, whether natural or spiritual, dedicate themselves to Jehovah and persevere in serving him. —**Read 3 John 3, 4.**

² In 98 C.E., John was likely living in or near Ephesus. He may have moved there after being released from exile on the island of Patmos. About that time, Jehovah's holy spirit moved him to write three letters. The purpose of those letters was to motivate loyal Christians to maintain their faith in Jesus and to keep on walking in the truth.

³ John was the last living apostle, and he was concerned about the effect that false teachers were having on the congregations.* (1 John 2:18, 19, 26) Those apostates claimed to know God, but they did not obey Jehovah's commands. Let us consider the inspired counsel John gave. As we do, we will answer three questions: What does it mean to walk in the truth? What obstacles

do we face? And how can we help one another to remain in the truth?

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO WALK IN THE TRUTH?

⁴ To walk in the truth, we need to know the truth found in God's Word, the Bible. In addition, we must "observe [Jehovah's] commandments," that is, we need to obey them. (**Read 1 John 2:3-6; 2 John 4, 6.)** Jesus set the perfect example of obeying Jehovah. So one important way that we obey Jehovah is by following Jesus' steps as closely as possible. —John 8:29; 1 Pet. 2:21.

⁵ To keep walking in the truth, we must be convinced that Jehovah is the God of truth, that everything he tells us in his Word, the Bible, is true. And we must also be convinced that Jesus is the promised Messiah. Many today doubt that Jesus has been anointed as King of God's Kingdom. John warned that there were "many deceivers," who could mislead those who were not prepared to defend the truth about Jehovah and Jesus. (2 John 7-11) John wrote: "Who is the liar but the one who denies that Jesus is the Christ?" (1 John 2:22) The only way we can avoid being deceived is by studying God's Word. Only if we do that will we come to know Jehovah and Jesus. (John 17:3) And only then will we be convinced that we have the truth.

WHAT OBSTACLES DO WE FACE?

⁶ All Christians must be on guard

The Background to John's Letters

When the apostle John wrote his letters, he was concerned about false teachers who had come into the congregations and were trying to mislead Christ's followers. Both the apostle Paul and the apostle Peter had warned that this would happen. (Acts 20:29, 30; 2 Pet. 2:1-3) These false teachers may have been influenced by Greek philosophy. Some apparently claimed to have received a special, mystical knowledge from God.* But their teaching contradicted Jesus' message and encouraged selfishness and a lack of love. So John calls these teachers antichrists, or those who teach against Christ. -1 John 2:18.

against being misled by *human philosophy.* (1 John 2:26) Young Christians in particular need to beware of this trap. Alexia,* a 25-year-old French sister, says: "When I was younger, I was troubled by the world's reasonings, such as the theory of evolution and human philosophy. At times, those teachings appealed to me. But I felt that I could not just listen to what I was being taught in school and not give Jehovah a chance

to speak." Alexia studied the book *Life* —*How Did It Get Here? By Evolution or by Creation?* Within a few weeks, her doubts vanished. Alexia says: "I proved to myself that the Bible contains the truth. And I realized that living by its standards would give me joy and peace."

⁷ All Christians, young and old, must resist the pressure to live a double life. John pointed out that we cannot be walking in the truth and at the same time be living an immoral life. (1 John 1:6) If we are to have God's approval now and in the future, we need to behave as if everything we do were under a spotlight. In a sense, there is no such thing as a secret sin because everything we do is visible to Jehovah.—Heb. 4:13.

8 We have to reject the world's view

of sin. The apostle John wrote: "If we make the statement, 'We have no sin,' we are misleading ourselves." (1 John 1:8) In John's day, apostates claimed that a person could deliberately follow a course of sin and still have a relationship with God. Today, we are living among people who have a similar view. Many claim to believe in God, but they do not agree with Jehovah's view of sin, especially when it involves the subject of sex. What Jehovah views as sinful conduct they call a personal preference, or an alternative lifestyle.

9 Young Christians in particular may feel pressured to adopt their classmates' or workmates' views of immoral conduct. That is what happened to Aleksandar. He recalls: "Some girls at school

tried to pressure me into having sex with them. They said that since I did not have a girlfriend, I must be a homosexual." If you face similar tests, remember that when you stick to your Bible-based convictions, you protect your self-respect, your health, your emotional well-being, and your relationship with Jehovah. And each time you resist temptation, it will get easier for you to do what is right. Remember, too, that this world's twisted view of sex originates with Satan. So when you refuse to compromise, you 'conquer the wicked one.'—1 John 2:14.

¹⁰ We acknowledge that Jehovah has the right to define what is sinful conduct. And we do our best not to commit a sin. But when we do sin, we confess our wrongdoing to Jehovah in prayer. (Read 1 John 1:9.) And if we commit a serious sin, we seek the help of the elders, whom Jehovah has appointed to care for us. (Jas. 5:14-16) However, we should not be consumed by feelings of guilt over past mistakes. Why not? Because our loving Father provided the ransom sacrifice of his Son so that our sins can be forgiven. When Jehovah says that he will forgive repentant sinners, he means what he says. So there is nothing to stop us from serving Jehovah with a clean conscience.—1 John 2:1, 2, 12; 3:19, 20.

¹¹ We must reject *apostate teachings*. Since the beginning of the Christian congregation, the Devil has been using many deceivers to plant doubts in the

minds of God's faithful servants. As a result, we need to know how to discern the difference between facts and lies.* Our enemies may use the Internet or social media to try to undermine our trust in Jehovah and our love for our brothers. Remember who is behind such propaganda, and reject it!—1 John 4:1, 6; Rev. 12:9.

¹² To resist Satan's attacks, we need to deepen our trust in Jesus and in the role he plays in God's purpose. We also need to trust in the only channel that Jehovah is using today. (Matt. 24:45-47) We deepen our trust by regularly studying God's Word. Then our faith will be like a tree that has roots that go deep into the ground. Paul made a similar point when writing to the Colossian congregation. He said: "Just as you have accepted Christ Jesus the Lord, go on walking in union with him, being rooted and built up in him and being stabilized in the faith." (Col. 2:6, 7) There is nothing that Satan or those influenced by him can do that will destabilize a Christian who has strengthened his own faith. -2 John 8, 9.

¹³ We must expect to be hated by the world. (1 John 3:13) John reminds us that "the whole world is lying in the power of the wicked one." (1 John 5:19) As this system draws to an end, Satan's anger grows hotter. (Rev. 12:12) He uses more than subtle forms of attack, such

as the lure of immorality or the lies of apostates. He will also use brute force. Satan knows that he has only a short period of time left to try to stop our preaching work or to break our faith. It is no surprise, then, that our work is restricted or banned in a number of countries. Even so, our brothers and sisters in those lands are enduring. They are proving that no matter what the wicked one throws at us, we can be victorious!

HELP ONE ANOTHER TO REMAIN IN THE TRUTH

¹⁴ To help our brothers and sisters to remain in the truth, we must show compassion. (1 John 3:10, 11, 16-18) We need to love one another not only when things are going well but also when problems arise. For example, do you know someone who has lost a loved one in death and needs to be comforted or helped in practical ways? Or have you heard that fellow believers suffered loss from a natural disaster and need help to rebuild their Kingdom Halls or homes? We show the depth of our love and compassion for our brothers and sisters not only by what we say but, more important, by what we do.

¹⁵ We imitate our loving heavenly Father when we show love for one another. (**Read 1 John 4:7, 8.)** An important way that we show love is by *forgiving one another*. For example, someone might hurt us but then apologize. We show love by forgiving him and putting his error be-

hind us. (Col. 3:13) A brother named Aldo faced this test when he heard a brother whom he respected make a hurtful comment about his ethnic background. Aldo says, "I constantly prayed to Jehovah to help me not to have negative feelings toward this brother." But Aldo did something else. He decided to ask the brother to go out in service with him. As they worked together, Aldo explained how he was affected by the remark. "When the brother heard how I felt about his hurtful comment," says Aldo, "he apologized. From the tone of his voice. I could sense how much he regretted what he had said. We parted as friends and put the problem behind us."

¹⁶ The apostle John felt a deep, loving concern for the spiritual welfare of his brothers, and that feeling is clearly reflected in the counsel he gave in his three inspired letters. How encouraging it is to know that men and women, like

¹⁷ May we take to heart the counsel we have discussed. Let us be determined to walk in the truth, obeying Jehovah in all aspects of our life. Study his Word, and put your trust in it. Build strong faith in Jesus. Reject human philosophies and apostate teachings. Resist the pressure to live a double life and to give in to sin. Live by Jehovah's high moral standards. And let us help our brothers remain strong by forgiving those who hurt us and helping those in need. Then, despite the struggles we face, we will keep walking in the truth.
