EXODUS 29-30 | A Contribution to Jehovah



30:11-16

When the tabernacle was constructed, individuals had the privilege of contributing financially to support Jehovah’s worship, regardless of whether they were rich or poor. How can we make a contribution to Jehovah today? One way is by financially supporting Kingdom Halls, Assembly Halls, remote translation offices, and Bethel complexes, as well as other buildings that are dedicated to the worship of Jehovah.

Exodus 29-30

29 "This is what you are to do to sanctify them to serve as priests to me: Take a young bull, two unblemished rams, ² unleavened bread, unleavened ring-shaped loaves mixed with oil, and unleavened wafers spread with oil. You are to make them with fine wheat flour ³ and put them in a basket and present them in the basket, along with the bull and the two rams.

⁴ "You will present Aaron and his sons at the entrance of the tent of meeting and wash them with water. ⁵ Then you are to take the garments and clothe Aaron with the robe, the sleeveless coat of the eph'od, the eph'od, and the breastpiece, and you are to tie the woven belt of the eph'od securely around his waist. ⁶ You will put the turban on his head and put the holy sign of dedication on the turban; ⁷ and take the anointing oil and pour it on his head and anoint him.

⁸ "Then bring his sons forward and clothe them with the robes ⁹ and wrap the sashes around them, Aaron as well as his sons, and put on their headgear; and the priesthood will become theirs as a permanent statute. This is how you should install Aaron and his sons to serve as priests.

¹⁰ "You are now to present the bull before the tent of meeting, and Aaron and his sons will lay their hands on the bull's head. ¹¹ Slaughter the bull before Jehovah, at the entrance of the tent of meeting. ¹² Take some of the bull's blood on your finger and put it on the horns of the altar, and pour out all the rest of the blood at the base of the altar.

¹³ Then take all the fat that covers the intestines, the appendage on the liver, and the two kidneys and the fat that is on them, and burn them so that they smoke on the altar.

¹⁴ But the bull's flesh and its skin and its dung, you will burn with fire outside the camp. It is a sin offering.

¹⁵ "Then take the one ram, and Aaron and his sons are to lay their hands on the ram's head. ¹⁶ Slaughter the ram and take its blood and sprinkle it on all sides of the altar. ¹⁷ Cut the ram into its pieces, and wash its intestines and its shanks, and arrange the pieces together with its head. ¹⁸ You must burn the entire ram, making it smoke on the altar. It is a burnt offering to Jehovah, a pleasing aroma. It is an offering made by fire to Jehovah.

¹⁹ "Next you are to take the other ram, and Aaron and his sons are to lay their hands on the ram's head. ²⁰ Slaughter the ram and take some of its blood and put it on Aaron's right earlobe and on his sons' right earlobe and on the thumb of their right hand and the big toe of their right foot,

and sprinkle the blood on all sides of the altar. ²¹ Then take some of the blood that is on the altar and some of the anointing oil and spatter it on Aaron and his garments and on his sons and his sons' garments, so that he and his garments and his sons and their garments may be holy.

²² "Then take from the ram the fat, the fat tail, the fat that covers the intestines, the appendage of the liver, the two kidneys and the fat that is on them, and the right leg, for it is a ram of installation. ²³ Take also a round loaf of bread and a ring-shaped loaf of oiled bread and a wafer out of the basket of unleavened bread that is before Jehovah. ²⁴ You must place them all in the hands of Aaron and in the hands of his sons, and you are to wave them back and forth as a wave offering before Jehovah. ²⁵ Then you will take them out of their hands and burn them on the altar, on top of the burnt offering, as a pleasing aroma before Jehovah. It is an offering made by fire to Jehovah.

²⁶ "Then take the breast of the ram of installation, which is offered in behalf of Aaron, and wave it back and forth as a wave offering before Jehovah, and it will become your portion. ²⁷ You are to sanctify the breast of the wave offering and the leg of the sacred portion that was waved and that was taken from the ram of installation, from what was offered for Aaron and for his sons. ²⁸ It is to become Aaron's

and his sons' by a permanent regulation to be carried out by the Israelites, for it is a sacred portion, and it will become a sacred portion to be given by the Israelites. It is their sacred portion for Jehovah from their communion sacrifices.

²⁹ "The holy garments that belong to Aaron will be used by his sons after him when they are anointed and installed as priests. ³⁰ The priest from among his sons who succeeds him and who comes into the tent of meeting to minister in the holy place will wear them for seven days.

³¹ "You will take the ram of installation and boil its flesh in a holy place. ³² Aaron and his sons will eat the flesh of the ram and the bread that is in the basket at the entrance of the tent of meeting. ³³ They are to eat the things with which atonement was made to install them as priests and to sanctify them. But an unauthorized person may not eat them, for they are something holy. ³⁴ If any of the flesh of the installation sacrifice and of the bread is left over until the morning, then you must burn what is left with fire. It must not be eaten, for it is something holy.

³⁵ "You are to do this way to Aaron and his sons, according to all that I have commanded you. You will take seven days to install them as priests. ³⁶ You will offer the bull of the sin offering daily for an atonement, and you are to purify the altar from sin by making atonement for it, and you must

anoint it to sanctify it. ³⁷ You will take seven days to make atonement for the altar, and you must sanctify it so that it may become a most holy altar. Anyone who touches the altar is to be holy.

³⁸ "This is what you will offer on the altar: two one-year-old rams each day, continually. ³⁹ Offer the one young ram in the morning and the other ram at twilight. ⁴⁰ A tenth part of an e'phah measure of fine flour mixed with a fourth of a hin of beaten oil, and a drink offering of a fourth of a hin of wine, will go for the first young ram. ⁴¹ You will offer the second young ram at twilight, along with the same grain and drink offerings as in the morning. You will render it as a pleasing aroma, an offering made by fire to Jehovah. ⁴² It is to be a regular burnt offering throughout your generations at the entrance of the tent of meeting before Jehovah, where I will present myself to you to speak to you there.

⁴³ "I will present myself there to the Israelites, and it will be sanctified by my glory. ⁴⁴ I will sanctify the tent of meeting and the altar, and I will sanctify Aaron and his sons so that they may serve as priests to me. ⁴⁵ I will reside among the people of Israel, and I will be their God. ⁴⁶ And they will certainly know that I am Jehovah their God, who brought them out of the land of Egypt so that I may reside among them. I am Jehovah their God.

30 "You are to make an altar as a place for burning incense; you will make it of acacia wood. ² It should be square, one cubit long, one cubit wide, and two cubits high. Its horns will be one piece with it. ³ You are to overlay it with pure gold: its top surface, its sides all around, and its horns; and you are to make a gold border around it. ⁴ You will also make two rings of gold for it below its border on two opposite sides, and these will hold the poles used to carry it. ⁵ Make the poles of acacia wood and overlay them with gold. ⁶ You are to put it before the curtain that is near the ark of the Testimony, before the cover that is over the Testimony, where I will present myself to you.

⁷ "Aaron will burn perfumed incense on it, making it smoke on the altar when he maintains the lamps each morning. ⁸ Also, when Aaron lights the lamps at twilight, he will burn the incense. It is a regular incense offering before Jehovah throughout your generations. ⁹ You must not offer on it unauthorized incense or a burnt offering or a grain offering, and you must not pour a drink offering on it. ¹⁰ Aaron must make atonement on its horns once a year. With some of the blood of the sin offering of the atonement, he will make atonement for it once a year throughout your generations. It is most holy to Jehovah."

¹¹ Then Jehovah said to Moses: ¹² "Whenever you take a census and count the sons of Israel, each one must give a ransom for his life to Jehovah at the time of the census. This is so that no plague may be brought upon them when they are registered. ¹³ This is what all those who are registered will give: a half shekel by the standard shekel of the holy place. Twenty ge'rahs equal a shekel. A half shekel is the contribution to Jehovah. ¹⁴ Everyone registered who is 20 years old and up will give Jehovah's contribution. ¹⁵ The rich should not give more and the poor should not give less than the half shekel as a contribution to Jehovah to make atonement for your lives. ¹⁶ You are to take the silver money of the atonement from the Israelites and give it in behalf of the service of the tent of meeting, that it may serve as a remembrance before Jehovah for the Israelites, to make atonement for your lives."

¹⁷ Jehovah spoke further to Moses, saying: ¹⁸ "Make a copper basin and its stand for washing; then place it between the tent of meeting and the altar and put water into it. ¹⁹ Aaron and his sons will wash their hands and their feet there. ²⁰ When they go into the tent of meeting or when they approach the altar to minister and to make offerings of fire and smoke to Jehovah, they will wash with water so that they do not die. ²¹ They must wash their hands and their feet so

that they may not die, and it must serve as a permanent regulation for them, for him and his offspring, throughout their generations."

²² Jehovah continued to speak to Moses: ²³ "Next, take the choicest perfumes: 500 units of solidified myrrh, and half that amount, 250 units, of sweet cinnamon, 250 units of sweet calamus, ²⁴ and 500 units of cassia, measured by the standard shekel of the holy place, along with a hin of olive oil. ²⁵ Then make out of it a holy anointing oil; it should be skillfully blended together. It is to be a holy anointing oil.

²⁶ "You are to anoint the tent of meeting and the ark of the Testimony with it, ²⁷ as well as the table and all its utensils, the lampstand and its utensils, the altar of incense, ²⁸ the altar of burnt offering and all its utensils, and the basin and its stand. ²⁹ You must sanctify them that they may become most holy. Anyone touching them is to be holy. ³⁰ And you will anoint Aaron and his sons and sanctify them to serve as priests to me.

³¹ "You will speak to the Israelites, saying, 'This is to continue as a holy anointing oil to me during your generations. ³² It is not to be applied to the flesh of mankind, and you must not make anything with a composition like it. It is something holy. It is to continue as something holy for you. ³³ Anyone who makes an ointment like it and who puts

some of it on an unauthorized person must be cut off from his people.”

³⁴ Then Jehovah said to Moses: “Take equal portions of these perfumes: stacte drops, onycha, perfumed galbanum, and pure frankincense. ³⁵ Make it into an incense; the spice mixture should be skillfully blended, salted, pure, and holy. ³⁶ You are to pound some of it into fine powder and put some of it before the Testimony in the tent of meeting, where I will present myself to you. It should be most holy to you. ³⁷ You must not make for your own use the incense that you make with this composition. You are to regard it as something holy to Jehovah. ³⁸ Whoever makes any like it to enjoy its smell must be cut off from his people.”

What do we learn from the following scriptures about making financial contributions to support true worship?

- 1 Chronicles 29:5

1 Chronicles 29:5: the gold for the goldwork and the silver for the silverwork, and for all the work to be done by the craftsmen. Now who volunteers to come forward today with a gift in hand for Jehovah?"

- Mark 12:43, 44

Mark 12:43, 44: So he called his disciples to him and said to them: "Truly I say to you that this poor widow put in more than all the others who put money into the treasury chests. For they all put in out of their surplus, but she, out of her want, put in everything she had, all she had to live on."

1 Corinthians 16:2: On the first day of every week, each of you should set something aside according to his own means, so that collections will not take place when I arrive.

Exodus 30:11, 12—Jehovah told Moses to take a census

Exodus 30:11, 12: Then Jehovah said to Moses:

“Whenever you take a census and count the sons of Israel, each one must give a ransom for his life to Jehovah at the time of the census. This is so that no plague may be brought upon them when they are registered.

At Sinai. At Jehovah’s command the first registration took place during the encampment at Sinai in the second month of the second year following the Exodus from Egypt. To assist Moses in this undertaking, a chieftain was selected out of each tribe to take the responsibility and oversight of the registration in his tribe. Not only were all males listed who were 20 years old and upward—eligible for service in the army—but the Law also placed on the registered ones a head tax of half a shekel (1 dollar 10 cents) for the service of the tabernacle. (Exodus 30:11-16; Numbers 1:1-16, 18, 19)

The total number listed amounted to 603,550, excluding the Levites, who would have no inheritance in the land. These paid no tabernacle tax and were not required to serve in the army.—Numbers 1:44-47; 2:32, 33; 18:20, 24.

Exodus 30:13-15—Everyone who was registered gave a contribution to Jehovah

Exodus 30:13-15: This is what all those who are registered will give: a half shekel by the standard shekel of the holy place. Twenty gerahs equal a shekel. A half shekel is the contribution to Jehovah. Everyone registered who is 20 years old and up will give Jehovah's contribution. The rich should not give more and the poor should not give less than the half shekel as a contribution to Jehovah to make atonement for your lives.

Some contributions were required under the Law. When Moses took a census of the Israelites, each male 20 years old and upward was to give a ransom for his soul, "a half

shekel [probably 1 dollar 10 cents] by the shekel of the holy place." It was "Jehovah's contribution" in order to make atonement for their souls and "in behalf of the service of the tent of meeting." (Exodus 30:11-16)

According to the Jewish historian Josephus (*The Jewish War*, VII, 218 [vi, 6]), this "sacred tax" was thereafter paid annually.—2 Chronicles 24:6-10; Matthew 17:24; see TAXATION.

Exodus 30:16—The contribution was used "in behalf of the service of the tent of meeting"

Exodus 30:16: You are to take the silver money of the atonement from the Israelites and give it in behalf of the service of the tent of meeting, that it may serve as a remembrance before Jehovah for the Israelites, to make atonement for your lives."

How were the services at Jehovah's temple in Jerusalem financed?

The various temple services were maintained through taxation, mainly obligatory tithing. But other forms of taxation were also used. For example, at the time of the construction of the tabernacle, Jehovah instructed Moses to collect half a silver shekel from every registered Israelite, as a "contribution to Jehovah."—Exodus 30:12-16.

Apparently, it became customary for each Jew to contribute this fixed amount as an annual temple tax. It was this tax that Jesus instructed Peter to pay with a coin taken from a fish's mouth.—Matthew 17:24-27.

Digging for Spiritual Gems

Exodus 29:10—What is the significance of the expression "lay their hands on the bull's head"?

Exodus 29:10: "You are now to present the bull before the tent of meeting, and Aaron and his sons will lay their hands on the bull's head.

Laying On of Hands. Aside from mere handling, *hands*

were laid on a person or object for various purposes. The general meaning of the act, however, was that of a designation, a pointing out of the person or thing as being acknowledged, or recognized, in a certain way. During the ceremony at the installation of the priesthood, Aaron and his sons laid their hands on the head of the bull and the two rams to be sacrificed, thereby acknowledging that these animals were being sacrificed for them for the sake of their becoming priests of Jehovah God. (Exodus 29:10, 15, 19; Leviticus 8:14, 18, 22) When appointing Joshua as his successor at God's command, Moses laid his hand on Joshua, who consequently was "full of the spirit of wisdom" and so was able to lead Israel properly. (Deuteronomy 34:9) Hands were laid on persons when designating them as receivers of a blessing. (Genesis 48:14; Mark 10:16) Jesus Christ touched, or laid his hands on, some persons he healed. (Matthew 8:3; Mark 6:5; Luke 13:13) The gift of the holy spirit was granted in some instances through the laying on of the hands of the apostles.—Acts 8:14-20; 19:6.

Exodus 30:31-33—Why was it a capital offense to make holy anointing oil and to put it on an unauthorized person?

Exodus 30:31-33: “You will speak to the Israelites, saying, ‘This is to continue as a holy anointing oil to me during your generations. It is not to be applied to the flesh of mankind, and you must not make anything with a composition like it. It is something holy. It is to continue as something holy for you. Anyone who makes an ointment like it and who puts some of it on an unauthorized person must be cut off from his people.’

it-1 114 paragraph 1

In the Law Jehovah gave to Moses, he prescribed a formula for the anointing oil. It was of a special composition of the choicest ingredients—myrrh, sweet cinnamon, sweet calamus, cassia, and olive oil. (Exodus 30:22-25) It was a capital offense for anyone to compound this mixture and to use it for any common or unauthorized purpose. (Exodus 30:31-33) This figuratively demonstrated the importance and

sacredness of an appointment to office that had been confirmed by anointing with sacred oil.

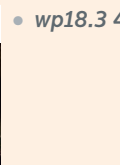
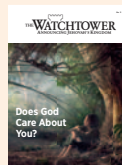

17 What else did the Christians in Ephesus need to do? They lived in a city full of demonism. So Paul told them: “Carry on prayer on every occasion.” (Ephesians 6:18) They needed to ask Jehovah for his protection at all times. What about us? We also live in a world that is full of demonism. So we too need to ask Jehovah for his protection, and we need to use his name when we pray. schedule, we now have this evening to worship Jehovah as a family. Therefore, we need not limit our Family Worship evening to just one hour. Rather, we should think about the needs and limitations of our family and set the time period accordingly.

⁵ Must the Entire Time Be Spent in Group Discussion? When married couples and families with children discuss Scriptural topics together, they encourage one another. (Rom. 1:12) The family draws closer together. Therefore, Scriptural discussions should be the centerpiece of the Family Worship evening. However, each family member could also spend time in personal study. For example, after the group discussion, the family might remain together while each individual continues to study separately, perhaps finishing his preparation for the meetings or reading the magazines. Some families choose to keep the television off the entire evening.

⁶ How May the Discussion Be Conducted? The format need not always be a question-and-answer discussion. In order to make the Family Worship evening lively and interesting, many families have a program that is similar to our midweek meeting. They divide their discussion into several parts and handle them in a variety of ways. For example, they might read the Bible together, prepare for a portion of the meetings, and have practice sessions for the ministry. Page 6 provides some suggestions.

⁷ What Atmosphere Should Parents Strive For? Your family will learn best in a loving, relaxed atmosphere. You might sometimes study outdoors if the weather is favorable. Feel free to take breaks when needed. Some families include refreshments after the program. While parents will avoid using the Family Worship evening to scold or discipline, they may need to devote some of the time to address a specific trend or problem that has come to their attention. However, it may be best to discuss sensitive personal issues privately with a child at another time during the week so as to avoid embarrassing him in front of his siblings. The Family Worship evening should not be a dry, somber occasion but should reflect the happy God whom we worship. —1 Tim. 1:11.

⁸ How Can the Family Head Prepare? The family will benefit most if the family head prepares in advance for each Family Worship evening by determining what should be discussed and how best to consider it. (Prov. 21:5) A husband does well to consult with his wife regarding this. (Prov. 15:22) Family heads, why not also occasionally ask your children for their recommendations? If you do, you will gain valuable insight into their interests and concerns.

⁹ On most weeks the family head will not have to spend extensive time preparing. Likely, the family will enjoy having certain regular features each week, and the family head will not

Some Ideas for the Family Worship Evening

Bible:

- Read a portion of the weekly Bible reading together. If the material lends itself to doing so, one person can read the narration, and others can read the words of the different characters.
- Reenact a portion of the Bible reading.
- Assign each member of the family to read the designated Bible chapters in advance and to make note of one or two questions that he has on the material. Then research everyone's questions together.
- Each week prepare a flash card with a Bible verse on it and try to memorize and explain it. Build up a collection of cards, and review them weekly to see how many scriptures you remember.
- Listen to an audio recording of the Bible reading while following along in the Bible.

Meetings:

- Prepare together for a portion of the meetings.
- Practice the Kingdom songs scheduled for the coming week.
- If someone has a talk on the Theocratic Ministry School or a demonstration on the Service Meeting, discuss ideas for presenting it or rehearse it in front of the family.

Needs of the Family:

- Consider material from the *Young People Ask* or *Learn From the Great Teacher* books.
- Have a practice session on how to handle a situation that is likely to arise at school.
- Have a practice session where the parents and children reverse roles. The

children research a subject and then reason with the parents.

Ministry:

- Have practice sessions to prepare presentations for the weekend.
- Discuss realistic goals the family can set to expand their share in the ministry during the Memorial season or vacation time.
- Allow each family member a few minutes to research how to answer different questions that may arise in the ministry, and then have practice sessions.

Additional Suggestions:

- Read together an article from the current magazines.
- Have each family member read in advance an article that intrigues him from the current magazines, and then have him give a report on it.
- Occasionally invite a publisher or couple to join you for your Family Worship evening, and perhaps interview them.
- Watch and discuss one of our videos.
- Discuss together "Young People Ask" or "For Family Review" from *Awake!*
- Discuss together "Teach Your Children" or "For Young People" from *The Watchtower*.
- Read and discuss a portion of the current *Yearbook* or a release from the last district convention.
- After attending a convention or assembly, review the highlights.
- Observe Jehovah's creation firsthand, and discuss what it teaches us about Jehovah.
- Work on a project together, such as a model, a map, or a chart.

Can You Contribute Your Time and Energy?

After their construction, such buildings need maintenance, and some must eventually be renovated. What opportunities does this give us to contribute our time and energy to Jehovah?

AN EMPTY TOMB —JESUS IS ALIVE!

MATTHEW 28:3-15 MARK 16:5-8
LUKE 24:4-12 JOHN 20:2-18

- JESUS IS RESURRECTED

 - HE APPEARS TO VARIOUS WOMEN

What a shock it is for the women to discover what appears to be an empty burial place! Mary Magdalene runs off to “Simon Peter and to the other disciple, for whom Jesus had affection”—the apostle John. (John 20:2) However, the other women at the tomb see an angel. And inside the memorial tomb is another angel, who is “clothed in a white robe.” —Mark 16:5.

One of the angels tells them: “Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus who was executed on the stake. He is not here, for he was raised up, just as he said. Come, see the place where he was lying. Then go quickly and tell his disciples that he was raised up from the dead, for look! he is

going ahead of you into Galilee.” (Matthew 28:5-7) So “trembling and overwhelmed with emotion,” the women run to report to the disciples.—Mark 16:8.

By now, Mary has found Peter and John. Breathlessly, she reports: “They have taken away the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.” (John 20:2) Peter and John take off running. John is faster and reaches the tomb first. He peers into it and sees the bandages, but he remains outside.

When Peter arrives, he goes right in. He sees the linen cloths and the cloth used to wrap Jesus’ head. John now enters, and he believes Mary’s report. Despite what Jesus said earlier, neither of them understands that he has been raised up. (Matthew 16:21) Puzzled, they head home. But Mary, who has come back to the tomb, remains there.

Meanwhile, the other women are on their way to tell the disciples that Jesus has been raised. While they are running to do so, Jesus meets them and says: “Good day!” They fall at his feet and ‘do obeisance to him.’ Then Jesus says: “Have no fear! Go,



report to my brothers so that they may go to Galilee, and there they will see me.”—Matthew 28:9, 10.

Earlier, when the earthquake occurred and the angels appeared, the soldiers at the tomb “trembled and became as dead men.” After recovering, they entered the city and “reported to the chief priests all the things that had happened.” The priests then consulted with elders of the Jews. The decision was made to bribe the soldiers to hide the matter and to claim: “His disciples came in the night and stole him while we were sleeping.”—Matthew 28:4, 11, 13.

Roman soldiers can be put to death if they fall asleep at their post, so the priests promise: “If this [their lie about having been asleep] gets to the governor’s ears, we will explain the matter to him and you will not need to worry.” (Matthew 28:14) The soldiers take the bribe and do what the priests say. Thus the false story of Jesus’ body being stolen spreads widely among the Jews.

Mary Magdalene is still grieving at the tomb. Stooping forward to look into it, she sees two an-

gels in white! One sits at the head of where Jesus' body had been lying and the other at the foot. "Woman, why are you weeping?" they ask. Mary answers: "They have taken my Lord away, and I do not know where they have laid him." Turning around, Mary sees someone else. He repeats the angels' question and adds: "Whom are you looking for?" Thinking that he is the gardener, she says: "Sir, if you have carried him off, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away."—John 20:13-15.

Actually, Mary is speaking to the resurrected Jesus, but at the moment she does not recognize him. However, when he says, "Mary!" she knows that it is Jesus, recognizing him by the familiar way he speaks to her. "*Rabboni!*" (meaning, "Teacher!"), Mary exclaims joyfully. Yet, afraid that he is about to ascend to heaven, she grabs hold of him. Hence, Jesus urges her: "Stop clinging to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father and to my God and your God.'"—John 20:16, 17.

Mary runs to the place where the apostles and other disciples are gathered. She tells them: “I have seen the Lord!” adding her account to what they have heard from the other women. (John 20:18) Yet, the reports ‘seem like nonsense to them.’—Luke 24:11.

PREVIEW

Waiting for the fulfillment of a promise can test our patience—and in some cases, our faith. What lessons can we learn from Abraham that will strengthen our determination to wait patiently for the fulfillment of Jehovah’s promises? And what good example have some modern-day servants of Jehovah set?

MILLIONS of God’s people today have made sacrifices. Many brothers and sisters have chosen to remain single. Married couples have postponed having children. Families have kept their lives simple. All have made these decisions for one important reason—they want to serve Jehovah as fully as possible. They are content and trust that Jehovah will provide all the things they truly need. Will they be disappointed? No! Why can we be certain of that fact? One reason is that Jehovah blessed Abraham, “the father of all those having faith.”—Rom. 4:11.

² Abraham willingly left the comfortable lifestyle available to him in the city of Ur. Why? Because he was awaiting “the city having real foundations.” (Read Hebrews 11:8-10, 16.) What is that “city”? What challenges did Abraham face while he waited for that city to be built? And how can we be like Abraham and those in our day who have followed his example?

WHAT IS “THE CITY HAVING REAL FOUNDATIONS”?

³ The city that Abraham awaited is God’s Kingdom. That Kingdom is made up of Jesus Christ and 144,000

anointed Christians. Paul refers to the Kingdom as “a city of the living God, heavenly Jerusalem.” (Heb. 12: 22; Rev. 5:8-10; 14:1) Jesus taught his disciples to pray for this same Kingdom, asking that it come so that God’s will can take place on earth as it does in heaven.—Matt. 6:10.

⁴ Did Abraham know the details of how God’s Kingdom would be structured? No. For many centuries, those details were a “sacred secret.” (Eph. 1:8-10; Col. 1:26, 27) But Abraham did know that some of his offspring would become kings. Jehovah had specifically made that promise to him. (Read Genesis 17:1, 2, 6.)

4. According to Genesis 17:1, 2, 6, how much did Abraham know about the city, or Kingdom, that God promised?

How did Abraham show his faith in Jehovah’s promises?

(See paragraph 5)



Abraham had such strong faith in God's promises that it was as if he could see the Anointed One, or Messiah, who would be King of God's Kingdom. For this reason, Jesus could tell the Jews in his day: "Abraham your father rejoiced greatly at the prospect of seeing my day, and he saw it and rejoiced." (John 8:56) Clearly, Abraham knew that his descendants would form a Kingdom that had Jehovah's backing, and he was willing to wait for Jehovah to fulfill that promise.

⁵ How did Abraham show that he was waiting for the city, or Kingdom, designed by God? First, Abraham did not join himself to any earthly kingdom. He remained a nomad, choosing not to settle down and give his support to a human king. In addition, Abraham did not try to set up his own kingdom. Instead, he kept obeying Jehovah and waited for Him to fulfill His promise. In doing so, Abraham showed extraordinary faith in Jehovah. Let us examine some of the challenges he faced and see what we can learn from his example.

WHAT CHALLENGES DID ABRAHAM FACE?

⁶ The city Abraham left was relatively safe, sophisticated, and comfortable. It was protected by massive fortifications and a moat on three sides. People in Ur

were proficient in both writing and arithmetic. And the city apparently was a center for business; many business documents have been found at the site. Private houses were made of brick; the walls were coated with plaster and then whitewashed. Some of these homes had 13 or 14 rooms surrounding a paved courtyard.

⁷ Abraham had to trust that Jehovah would protect him and his family. Why? Recall that Abraham and Sarah left the safety and comfort of living in a house in the city of Ur to dwell in tents in the open fields of Canaan. No longer were he and his family protected by thick walls and deep moats. Instead, they were now vulnerable to attack by enemy forces.

⁸ Abraham did God's will, but at one time he struggled to feed his family. He had to deal with a severe famine that struck the very land to which Jehovah had sent him. That famine was so bad that Abraham decided to move his family to Egypt temporarily. However, while he was in Egypt, Pharaoh, the ruler of the country, took his wife from him. Imagine the anxiety that Abraham must have felt until Jehovah persuaded Pharaoh to return Sarah to Abraham.—Gen. 12:10-19.

⁹ Abraham's family life was difficult. His beloved

wife, Sarah, could not have children. For decades they had to deal with that bitter disappointment. Eventually, Sarah gave her servant girl, Hagar, to Abraham so that she could bear children for Abraham and Sarah. But when Hagar became pregnant with Ishmael, she began to despise Sarah. The situation became so difficult that Sarah chased Hagar away from home.—Gen. 16:1-6.

¹⁰ Sarah finally became pregnant and gave Abraham a son whom he named Isaac. Abraham loved both of his sons, Ishmael and Isaac. But because of the bad way that Ishmael treated Isaac, Abraham was forced to send Ishmael and Hagar away. (Gen. 21:9-14) Later, Jehovah asked Abraham to offer Isaac as a sacrifice. (Gen. 22:1, 2; Heb. 11:17-19) In both cases, Abraham had to trust that Jehovah would eventually make things turn out well for his sons.

¹¹ Throughout this time, Abraham had to learn to wait patiently on Jehovah. He was likely over 70 when he and his family left Ur. (Gen. 11:31–12:4) And for some one hundred years, he lived in tents, roaming the land of Canaan. Abraham died when he was 175. (Gen. 25:7) But he did not see Jehovah fulfill His promise to give the land he walked on to his

descendants. And he did not live to see the city, God's Kingdom, established. Even so, Abraham is described as dying "old and satisfied." (Gen. 25:8) Despite all the challenges he had to deal with, Abraham maintained strong faith and was content to wait on Jehovah. Why was he able to endure? Because throughout Abraham's life, Jehovah protected him and treated him as a friend.—Gen. 15:1; Isa. 41:8; Jas. 2:22, 23.

¹² Like Abraham, we are awaiting the city having real foundations. We are not waiting for it to be built, however. God's Kingdom was established in 1914 and has already taken complete control of heaven. (Rev. 12:7-10) But we are waiting for it to take complete control of the earth. While we wait for that to happen, there are many situations that we must deal with that are similar to those that Abraham and Sarah faced. Have Jehovah's modern-day servants been able to imitate Abraham's example? The life stories published in *The Watchtower* show that, like Abraham and Sarah, many today have had faith and patience. Let us consider just a few of those stories and see what we can learn.

IMITATING ABRAHAM'S EXAMPLE

Like Abraham and Sarah, how do God's servants show faith and patience?

Abraham, who willingly made sacrifices to please God. (Matt. 6:33; Mark 10:28-30) Note the example of a brother named Bill Walden.* In 1942, Bill was about to graduate from a U.S. university with a degree in architectural engineering when he started studying with Jehovah's Witnesses. Bill's professor had arranged for Bill to have a job after graduation, but Bill declined. He explained that he had decided to give up the promise of a secular career in order to serve God more fully. Shortly afterward, Bill was drafted for military service. He respectfully refused and as a result was fined

\$10,000 and sentenced to five years in prison. He was released after three years. Later, he was invited to attend Gilead School and served as a missionary in Africa. Then Bill married Eva, and they served together in Africa, which called for sacrifices. Eventually they returned to the United States to care for Bill's mother. Summarizing his life story, Bill says: "Tears come to my eyes when I think of the awesome privilege of having been used by Jehovah for more than 70 years in his service. I often thank him for guiding me toward making his service my career." Are you able to make the full-time ministry your career?

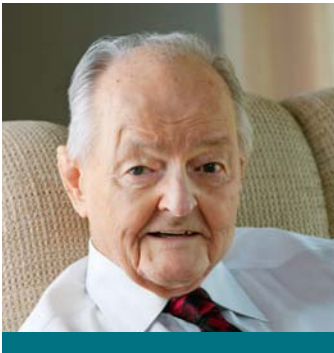
¹⁴ *Do not expect your life to be trouble-free.* From Abraham's example we learn that even those who devote their entire life to serving Jehovah must still deal with problems. (Jas. 1:2; 1 Pet. 5:9) Consider how this proved true in the experience of Aristotelis Apostolidis.* He got baptized in 1946 in Greece, and in 1952 he got engaged to a sister named Eleni, who had the same goals as he did. However, Eleni fell ill and was diagnosed with a brain tumor. The tumor was removed, but just a few years after the couple got married, the tumor came back. The doctors operated

again, but Eleni was left partially paralyzed, and her speech was impaired. She remained a zealous minister despite her illness and despite the government persecution at the time.

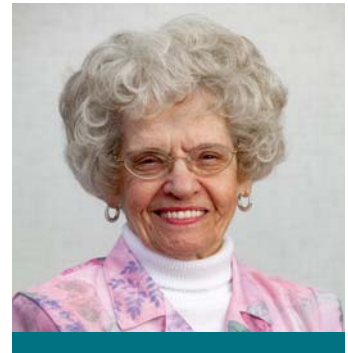
¹⁵ For 30 years, Aristotelis cared for his wife. During this time he served as an elder, worked on assembly committees, and helped to build an Assembly Hall. Then, in 1987, Eleni was hurt in an accident while she was preaching. She was in a coma for three years, and then she died. Aristotelis sums up his experience by saying: “Over the years, trying circumstances, difficult challenges, and unforeseen occurrences have called for an inordinate amount of tenacity and perseverance. Yet, Jehovah has always given me the needed

strength to overcome these problems.” (Ps. 94:18, 19)
How Jehovah loves those who do all they can for him despite dealing with trials!

¹⁶ ***Focus on the future.*** Abraham focused on the future rewards that Jehovah would give him, and this helped him to overcome his immediate challenges. Sister Audrey Hyde tried to keep this positive outlook, even though her first husband, Nathan H. Knorr, died of cancer and her second husband, Glenn Hyde, became afflicted with Alzheimer’s disease.* She says that she was helped by something Brother Knorr told her just a few weeks before his death. She says: “Nathan reminded me: ‘After death, our hope is sure, and we will never have to suffer pain again.’ Then he urged me: ‘Look ahead, for there is where your reward is.’ . . . He added: ‘Keep busy—try to use your life doing something for others. This will help you to find joy.’” What practical advice it is to stay busy in doing good for others and to “rejoice in the hope”—Rom. 12:12.

¹⁷ Today, we have more reason than ever to focus on the future. World events clearly show that we are in
