Tuesday, September 28

Stop judging that you may not be judged.—Matthew 7:1.

Eliphaz, Bildad, and Zophar did not spend their time thinking about how they could help Job. Instead, they were thinking about how they could prove that Job had done something wrong. They made some accurate statements, but much of what they said about Job and about Jehovah was either unkind or untrue. They judged Job harshly. (Job 32:1-3) How did Jehovah respond? His anger burned hot against those three men. He called them foolish and made them ask Job to pray for them. (Job 42:7-9) We learn a number of lessons from the bad examples set by Eliphaz, Bildad, and Zophar. First, we should not judge our brothers. (Matthew 7:2-5) Instead, we should listen carefully to them before we speak. Only then will we be able to understand their situation. (1 Peter 3:8) Second, when we do speak, we must make sure that our words are kind and our statements accurate. (Ephesians 4:25) And third, Jehovah takes a keen interest in what we say to one another. w20.03 22-23 paragraphs 15-16

Wednesday, September 29

Carry on prayer on every occasion.—Ephesians 6:18.

It is often when we are teaching others about Jehovah that we ourselves come to know him better. For example, we see direct evidence of Jehovah's compassion when he guides us to those who have the right heart condition. (John 6:44; Acts 13:48) We see the power of God's Word at work as we watch those with whom we study break free from bad habits and begin to put on the new personality. (Colossians 3:9, 10) And we see proof of God's patience as he gives many in our territory numerous opportunities to learn about him and be saved. (Romans 10:13-15) However, no matter how long we have been serving Jehovah, we should never take our relationship with him for granted. One of the most obvious ways we can prove that we value our friendship with God is by talking to him in prayer. Good communication is the lifeblood of a strong relationship. So draw close to God by praying often, never being afraid to express your innermost thoughts to him. w19.12 19 paragraph 11, 13-14

What relief that thought brings to us! As King of God's Kingdom, Jesus will undo any damage Satan and his system may inflict on us. (Isaiah 65:17; 1 John 3:8; Revelation 21:3, 4) What hope that inspires in us! And even though Jesus has given us a challenging assignment, he is with us, supporting us through the last days of this system. (Matthew 28:19, 20) What courage that builds in us! Relief, hope, and courage—these are some of the solid foundation stones on which our peace of mind is built. How, then, can you retain your peace of mind when you are shaken by severe trials? You can do so by imitating the things Jesus did. First, pray and persist in prayer. Second, obey Jehovah and preach zealously even when it is difficult to do so. And third, look to your friends to help you through trials. Then the peace of God will guard your mind and heart. The eyes of Jehovah are roving about through all the earth to show his strength in behalf of those whose heart is complete toward him.—2 Chronicles 16:9.

We see abundant evidence that Jehovah protects his people today. Consider: We are preaching and teaching the truth in all parts of the earth. (Matthew 28:19, 20) As a result, we expose the evil works of the Devil. Surely, if Satan were able to, he would stop all our activity, but he cannot. So we do not need to be terrified of wicked spirits. If we are faithful to Jehovah, the demons cannot cause us lasting harm. However, all of us need to resist wicked spirits and trust in Jehovah. If we do that, we will receive many blessings and we will avoid being misled by Satan's lies. Also, we will not be paralyzed by fear of the demons. Your children are a sacred trust, “an inheritance from Jehovah.” It is your responsibility to safeguard that trust. What can you do to protect your children from abuse? First, educate yourself about abuse. Learn about the kind of individuals who abuse children and the tactics they use to deceive them. Be alert to potential dangers. (Proverbs 22:3; 24:3) Remember that in most cases, the abuser is someone the child already knows and trusts. Second, maintain good communication with your children. (Deuteronomy 6:6, 7; James 1:19) Remember that children are often reluctant to report abuse. They may fear that they will not be believed, or they may have been threatened by the abuser to keep the abuse secret. If you sense that something is wrong, kindly draw them out with questions and then patiently listen to their answers. Third, educate your children. Teach them what to say and do if someone tries to touch them in an inappropriate way. w19.05 13 paragraphs 19-22

Why does Jehovah detest proud people? One reason is that those who develop and promote an inflated love of self reflect Satan's own arrogance. Imagine, Satan believed that Jesus—the one whom God used to create all things—should bow down and worship him! (Matthew 4:8, 9; Colossians 1:15, 16) Those with such an inflated view of their own importance confirm that the wisdom of the world is foolishness with God. (1 Corinthians 3:19) The Bible, though, helps us to have a balanced view of ourselves. It acknowledges that a degree of self-love is proper. Jesus said: "Love your neighbor as yourself," which indicates that we should give a reasonable amount of attention to our needs. (Matthew 19:19) However, the Bible does not teach that we should elevate ourselves above others. Rather, it states: "Do nothing out of contentiousness or out of egotism, but with humility consider others superior to you."—Philippians 2:3; Romans 12:3. w19.05 24 paragraphs 13-14

JOSHUA 6-7

6 Now Jer'i-cho was tightly shut up because of the Israelites; no one was leaving and no one was entering.

² Jehovah then said to Joshua: “See, I have handed over to you Jer'i-cho and its king and its mighty warriors. ³ All you fighting men should march around the city, going around the city once. That is what you should do for six days. ⁴ Have seven priests carry seven ram’s horns before the Ark. But on the seventh day, you should march around the city seven times and the priests should blow the horns. ⁵ When the ram’s horn is sounded—as soon as you hear the sound of the horn—all the people should shout a great war cry. Then the wall of the city will fall down flat, and the people must go up, each one straight ahead.”

⁶ So Joshua the son of Nun called the priests together and told them: “Take up the ark of the covenant, and seven priests should carry seven ram’s horns before the Ark of Jehovah.” ⁷ Then he told the people: “Move on and march around the city, and the armed troops should go ahead of the Ark of Jehovah.” ⁸ And just as Joshua had spoken to the people, the seven priests carrying seven ram’s horns before Jehovah went forward and blew the horns, and the ark of the covenant of Jehovah was following them. ⁹ And the armed troops went ahead of the priests who were blowing the horns, and the rear guard followed the Ark as the horns were blown continuously.

¹⁰ Now Joshua had commanded the people: “Do not shout nor let your voices be heard. Not a word should come out of your mouths until the day I say to you, ‘Shout!’ Then shout.”

¹¹ He had the Ark of Jehovah go around the city, going around it once, after which they returned to the camp and spent the night there.

¹² The next morning Joshua got up early, and the priests took up the Ark of Jehovah, ¹³ and seven priests carrying seven ram’s horns walked before the Ark of Jehovah, continuously blowing the horns. The armed troops were walking ahead of them while the rear guard was following the Ark of Jehovah as the horns were blown continuously.

¹⁴ They marched around the city on the second day once, after which they returned to the camp. That was what they did for six days.

¹⁵ On the seventh day they got up early, as soon as the dawn broke, and they marched around the city in the same manner seven times. It was only on that day that they marched around the city seven times. ¹⁶ And on the seventh time, the priests blew the horns, and Joshua told the people: “Shout, for Jehovah has given you the city! ¹⁷ The city and everything in it is to be devoted to destruction; it all belongs to Jehovah. Only Ra'hab the prostitute may keep living, she and all who are with her in the house, because she hid the messengers we sent out. ¹⁸ But keep away from what is devoted to destruction, so that you do not desire something devoted to destruction and take it, making the camp of Israel something devoted to destruction by bringing disaster on it.

¹⁹ But all the silver and the gold and the articles of copper and iron are holy to Jehovah. They should go into the treasury of Jehovah.”

²⁰ Then the people shouted when the horns were blown. As soon as the people heard the sound of the horn and shouted a great war cry, the wall fell down flat. After that the people went up into the city, each one straight ahead, and they captured the city. ²¹ They devoted all that was in the city to destruction by the sword, man and woman, young and old, bull, sheep, and donkey.

²² Joshua said to the two men who had spied out the land: “Go into the house of the prostitute and bring out the woman and all who belong to her, just as you swore to her.” ²³ So the young spies went in and brought out Ra'hab, along with her father, her mother, her brothers, and all who belonged to her; yes, they brought out her whole family, and they brought them safely to a place outside the camp of Israel.

²⁴ Then they burned the city and everything in it with fire. But the silver, the gold, and the articles of copper and iron, they gave to the treasury of Jehovah's house. ²⁵ Only Ra'hab the prostitute and her father's household and all who belonged to her were spared by Joshua; and she lives in Israel to this day, because she hid the messengers whom Joshua sent out to spy on Jer'i-cho.

²⁶ At that time Joshua pronounced this oath: “Cursed be the man before Jehovah who undertakes to rebuild this city of Jer'i-cho. At the cost of his firstborn he will lay its

foundation, and at the cost of his youngest he will put up its doors.”

²⁷ So Jehovah was with Joshua, and his fame spread through all the earth.

7 But the Israelites were unfaithful with regard to what had been devoted to destruction, for A'chan son of Car'mi, son of Zab'di, son of Ze'rah, of the tribe of Judah, took some of what was devoted to destruction. At this Jehovah's anger blazed against the Israelites.

² Then Joshua sent men out from Jer'i-cho to A'i, which is close by Beth-a'ven and east of Beth'el, telling them: “Go up and spy on the land.” So the men went up and spied on A'i.

³ When they returned to Joshua, they told him: “Not all the people need to go up. About two or three thousand men are enough to defeat A'i. Do not tire out all the people by making them go, for there are only a few of them.”

⁴ So about 3,000 men went up there, but they had to flee from the men of A'i. ⁵ The men of A'i struck down 36 men, and they pursued them from outside the city gate as far as Sheb'a-rim, and they continued striking them down on the descent. So the courage of the people melted and flowed away like water.

⁶ At this Joshua ripped his garments and fell with his face to the ground before the Ark of Jehovah until the evening, he and the elders of Israel, and they kept throwing dust on their heads. ⁷ Joshua said: “Alas, Sovereign Lord Jehovah, why did you bring this people all the way across the Jordan just

to hand us over to the Am'or-ites to be destroyed? If only we had been satisfied to remain on the other side of the Jordan!
⁸ Pardon me, O Jehovah, what can I say now that Israel has retreated before his enemies? ⁹ When the Ca'naan-ites and all the inhabitants of the land hear about it, they will surround us and wipe out our very name from the earth, and what will you do about your great name?"

¹⁰ Jehovah replied to Joshua: "Get up! Why are you lying on your face? ¹¹ Israel has sinned. They have violated my covenant that I commanded them to keep. They took some of what was devoted to destruction, stealing it and secretly putting it among their own possessions. ¹² Therefore, the Israelites will not be able to stand against their enemies. They will turn their backs and flee from their enemies, because they have become something devoted to destruction. I will not be with you again unless you annihilate from your midst what was devoted to destruction. ¹³ Get up and sanctify the people! Tell them, 'Sanctify yourselves tomorrow, for this is what Jehovah the God of Israel says: "What is devoted to destruction is among you, O Israel. You will not be able to stand against your enemies until you remove from your midst the thing devoted to destruction. ¹⁴ You are to present yourselves in the morning, tribe by tribe, and the tribe that Jehovah selects will come near, family by family, and the family that Jehovah selects will come near, household by household, and the household that Jehovah selects will come near, man by man. ¹⁵ And the one who is caught with the thing devoted to destruction will be burned with fire, he and all that belongs to him, because he

has violated the covenant of Jehovah and because he has committed a disgraceful act in Israel.”””

¹⁶ So Joshua rose early the next morning and had Israel come near, tribe by tribe, and the tribe of Judah was selected. ¹⁷ He had the families of Judah come near and the family of the Ze'rah-ites was selected, after which he had the family of the Ze'rah-ites come near, man by man, and Zab'di was selected. ¹⁸ Finally he had the household of Zab'di come near, man by man, and A'chan son of Car'mi, son of Zab'di, son of Ze'rah, of the tribe of Judah, was selected. ¹⁹ Then Joshua said to A'chan: “My son, please, honor Jehovah the God of Israel and make confession to him. Tell me, please, what you have done. Do not hide it from me.”

²⁰ A'chan answered Joshua: “For a fact I am the one who sinned against Jehovah the God of Israel, and this is what I have done. ²¹ When I saw among the spoil a good-looking official garment from Shi'nar and 200 shekels of silver and one gold bar weighing 50 shekels, I desired them, so I took them. They are now hidden in the ground inside my tent, with the money underneath.”

²² At once Joshua sent messengers, and they ran to the tent, and there the garment was hidden in his tent, with the money underneath it. ²³ So they took the things out of the tent and brought them to Joshua and all the Israelites and placed them before Jehovah. ²⁴ Joshua and all Israel with him then took A'chan the son of Ze'rah, the silver, the official garment, and the bar of gold, along with his sons, his daughters, his bull, his donkey, his flock, his tent, and

everything that was his, and they brought them up to the Valley of A'chor. ²⁵ Joshua said: "Why have you brought disaster upon us? Jehovah will bring disaster upon you on this day." With that all Israel stoned him, after which they burned them with fire. Thus they stoned all of them. ²⁶ And they raised a huge pile of stones over him that remains to this day. At this Jehovah's hot anger subsided. That is why the name of that place is Valley of A'chor to this day.

Joshua 7:1: But the Israelites were unfaithful with regard to what had been devoted to destruction, for Achan son of Carmi, son of Zabdi, son of Zerah, of the tribe of Judah, took some of what was devoted to destruction. At this Jehovah's anger blazed against the Israelites.

Joshua 7:20, 21: Achan answered Joshua: "For a fact I am the one who sinned against Jehovah the God of Israel, and this is what I have done. When I saw among the spoil a good-looking official garment from Shinar and 200 shekels of silver and one gold bar weighing 50 shekels, I desired them, so I took them. They are now hidden in the ground inside my tent, with the money underneath."

w10 4/15 20 paragraph 5

Centuries later, the Israelite Achan's eyes seduced him into stealing some items from the captured city of Jericho. God had commanded that all things in that city should be destroyed except for certain things that were to be given to the treasury of Jehovah. The Israelites were warned: "Keep away from the thing devoted to destruction, for fear you may get a desire" and take some items from the city. When Achan disobeyed, the people of Israel suffered defeat at the city of Ai, and a number of them died. Achan did not admit to his theft until he was exposed. "When I got to see" the items, Achan said, "then I wanted them, and I took them." The desire of his eyes led to his destruction, along with "everything that was his." (Joshua 6:18, 19; 7:1-26) Achan desired in his heart what was forbidden to him.

Achan's actions affected his family and the whole nation of Israel

Joshua 7:4, 5: So about 3,000 men went up there, but they had to flee from the men of Ai. The men of Ai struck down

36 men, and they pursued them from outside the city gate as far as Shebarim, and they continued striking them down on the descent. So the courage of the people melted and flowed away like water.

Joshua 7:24-26: Joshua and all Israel with him then took Achan the son of Zerah, the silver, the official garment, and the bar of gold, along with his sons, his daughters, his bull, his donkey, his flock, his tent, and everything that was his, and they brought them up to the Valley of Achor. Joshua said: "Why have you brought disaster upon us? Jehovah will bring disaster upon you on this day." With that all Israel stoned him, after which they burned them with fire. Thus they stoned all of them. And they raised a huge pile of stones over him that remains to this day. At this Jehovah's hot anger subsided. That is why the name of that place is Valley of Achor to this day.

w97 8/15 28 paragraph 2

One reason for reporting wrongdoing is that it works to preserve the cleanness of the congregation. Jehovah is a clean God, a holy God. He requires all those who worship

him to be spiritually and morally clean. His inspired Word admonishes: "As obedient children, quit being fashioned according to the desires you formerly had in your ignorance, but, in accord with the Holy One who called you, do you also become holy yourselves in all your conduct, because it is written: 'You must be holy, because I am holy.'" (1 Peter 1:14-16) Individuals who practice uncleanness or wrongdoing can bring defilement and Jehovah's disfavor upon an entire congregation unless action is taken to correct or remove them.—Compare Joshua, chapter 7.

We must exercise self-discipline

1 John 2:15-17: Do not love either the world or the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him; because everything in the world—the desire of the flesh and the desire of the eyes and the showy display of one's means of life—does not originate with the Father, but originates with the world. Furthermore, the world is passing away and so is its desire, but the one who does the will of God remains forever.

w10 4/15 21 paragraph 8

True Christians are not immune to the desire of the eyes and of the flesh. Therefore, God's Word encourages us to exercise self-discipline in connection with what we look at and long for. (1 Corinthians 9:25, 27; read 1 John 2:15-17.) The upright man Job was one who recognized the strong link between seeing and desiring. He stated: "A covenant I have concluded with my eyes. So how could I show myself attentive to a virgin?" (Job 31:1) Not only did Job refuse to touch a woman in an immoral way but he would not even allow his mind to entertain such a thought. Jesus emphasized that the mind must be kept clean of immoral thoughts when he said: "Everyone that keeps on looking at a woman so as to have a passion for her has already committed adultery with her in his heart."—Matthew 5:28.

In ancient times, it was common for attackers to besiege a fortified city. Regardless of how long a successful siege lasted, the victors would plunder the city's riches, including any remaining provisions. In Jericho's ruins, however, archaeologists found large supplies of food. In this regard, *Biblical Archaeology Review* states: "The most abundant item found in the destruction, apart from pottery, was grain. . . .

This is unique in the annals of Palestinian archaeology. Perhaps a jar or two might be found, but to find such an extensive amount of grain is exceptional.”

According to the Scriptural account, the Israelites had good reason not to plunder Jericho’s grain. Jehovah had commanded them not to do so. (Joshua 6:17, 18) The Israelites attacked in the spring of the year, just after harvesttime when grain supplies were abundant. (Joshua 3:15-17; 5:10) The fact that much grain remained in Jericho indicates that the Israelite siege was of short duration, just as the Bible describes it.



‘Not One Word Has Failed’—Excerpt

Raw transcript

Jericho fell, and Rahab and her family were spared. Jehovah had decreed that everything in the city be destroyed, though all the silver and gold were to be delivered to his treasury. No one was to take anything for himself. Achan, what is it? Why are you looking so smug? We are rich, dear one! Rich? What are you talking about? See for yourselves! Give that to me! That’s mine! You have done well, my husband! I took it from the rich, selfish, ungodly Canaanites! Did anyone see you? No. I was careful. Are you sure? Yes. No one could possibly know. Father, this will give us a good start in the Promised Land. But—We must hide all of these treasures. Yes, keep them hidden! What no one sees, no one knows. Agreed? Uh-huh. Hmm. Come then! Let us hide all of it. When we attacked the city of Ai, we suffered defeat. Jehovah then revealed that someone had taken something that was to be destroyed and had stolen gold and silver meant for Jehovah’s treasury. The next morning, Jehovah had all Israel come near, tribe by tribe, family by family, household by household, man by man. Finally, Jehovah revealed the disobedient man. My son. My lord. Please, honor Jehovah the God of Israel and make confession to him. Tell me, please, what you have done. Do not hide it from me. For a fact, I am the one who sinned against Jehovah the God of Israel. When I saw among the spoil of Jehovah an official garment

from Shinar—such a good looking one—And? Yes, and 200 shekels of silver—Go on. Yes, and one gold bar weighing 50 shekels. Achan, why did you take them? I desired them, so I took them. But why? Look at me. Did you not hear the same words we all heard? The instructions were clear—the city was to be devoted to destruction. Were you not aware that it and everything in it belonged to Jehovah? Yes, I was. And yet you stole these things? Yes. Why? What does this garment from Shinar mean to you? It was—You have to see it, Joshua. It is beautiful. It is one whole piece. The finest material. Fit for a king. I have never seen such brilliant colors. Enough, my son, enough! Tell me, where is it? It is hidden in the ground inside my tent, with the money underneath it. Go, Ishbak! See if these words are true! Nedabiah, go and find his family. Achan, did you not know that Jehovah would see you? I didn't think of that. You had no need of these things. You have a bull and a donkey and a flock. I—I don't know what to say. For a fact, I have sinned against Jehovah, the God of Israel. Why have you brought disaster upon us? Jehovah will bring disaster upon you on this day! Nedabiah, take them away. Jehovah warned that willful disobedience brings bad consequences. Achan's case shows that in this way too, Jehovah's word never fails.

prostitution and the carcasses of their kings far away from me, and I will dwell among them forever.” (Ezek. 43:9) “The carcasses of their kings” likely referred to idolatry. So Jehovah used that wide perimeter in Ezekiel’s visionary temple to say, in effect: “Keep all such filth far away. Do not even let it near.” If they thus kept their worship pure, Jehovah would bless them with his presence.

⁸ *Strong counsel to responsible men.* Jehovah also gave strong but loving counsel to the men who bore great responsibility among the people. He forcefully corrected the Levites who strayed far from him when the people lapsed into idolatry, whereas he commended the sons of Zadok, “who took care of the responsibilities of [his] sanctuary when the Israelites strayed.” He dealt justly and mercifully with each group, according to their actions. (Ezek. 44:10, 12-16) Similarly, the chieftains of Israel received powerful correction.—Ezek. 45:9.

⁹ Jehovah thus clearly revealed that men in positions of authority and oversight had to answer to him

for the way they handled their responsibilities. They were not above counsel, correction, and discipline. On the contrary, they were to take the lead in upholding Jehovah's standards!

¹⁰ Did the returning exiles apply the lessons of Ezekiel's vision? Of course, we cannot know exactly what faithful men and women back then were thinking about this remarkable vision. However, God's Word does tell us a great deal about what the returning exiles did and how they came to view the pure worship of Jehovah. Did they apply the principles conveyed in Ezekiel's vision? To some extent, they did—especially in comparison with their rebellious ancestors prior to the exile in Babylon.

¹¹ Such faithful men as the prophets Haggai and Zechariah, the priest and copyist Ezra, and the governor Nehemiah all worked hard to teach the people principles like those conveyed in Ezekiel's temple vision. (Ezra 5:1, 2) They taught the people that pure worship must be exalted and must take precedence over material concerns and selfish pursuits. (Hag. 1:

10, 11. What evidence suggests that some of the returning exiles learned the lessons conveyed in Ezekiel's vision?

3, 4) They insisted that the standards for participating in pure worship be respected. For instance, Ezra and Nehemiah forcefully counseled the people to put away their foreign wives, who were weakening the people spiritually. (**Read Ezra 10:10, 11; Neh. 13:23-27, 30**) What about idolatry? It seems that after the exile, the nation finally developed a hatred for that sin, which had ensnared them so often during their history. And what about the priests and chieftains, or princes? As Ezekiel's vision indicated, they were among those who received counsel and correction from Jehovah. (Neh. 13:22, 28) Many humbly complied with that counsel.—Ezra 10:7-9, 12-14; Neh. 9:1-3, 38.

¹² In response, Jehovah did bless his people. The land enjoyed a measure of spiritual prosperity, health, and order that it had not seen in a long time. (Ezra 6:19-22; Neh. 8:9-12; 12:27-30, 43) And why? Because the people finally began to follow Jehovah's righteous standards for pure worship. The lessons of the visionary temple found their way into many responsive hearts. In summary, then, we could say that

12. In what ways did Jehovah bless the exiles after their return?

Ezekiel’s vision of the temple benefited the exiles in two vital ways. (1) It taught them practical lessons about the standards for pure worship and about how they should uphold those standards. (2) It provided prophetic reassurance. It foretold that pure worship would be restored, and it further foretold how Jehovah would bless his people as long as they practiced pure worship. However, we today want to know: Does this vision have a fulfillment now?

What Ezekiel’s Vision Teaches Us Today

¹³ Can we be sure that Ezekiel’s temple vision applies to us today? Yes! Recall the similarity between Ezekiel’s vision of God’s sacred house on “a very high mountain” and Isaiah’s prophecy that “the mountain of the house of Jehovah” would be “firmly established above the top of the mountains.” Isaiah specifically tells us that his prophecy would see fulfillment during “the final part of the days,” or “the last days.” (Ezek. 40:2; Isa. 2:2-4; ftn.; see also Micah 4:1-4.) These prophecies apply to the time in the last days

ever since 1919 when pure worship is lifted up, restored, as if placed on a lofty mountain.*[2]

¹⁴ Most decidedly, then, Ezekiel's vision does apply to pure worship today. Much as it benefited the Jewish exiles in ancient times, this vision benefits us today in two ways. (1) It provides practical lessons about how we can uphold Jehovah's standards for pure worship. (2) It gives prophetic reassurances of the restoration of pure worship and of Jehovah's blessings.

Standards for Pure Worship Today

¹⁵ Let us now consider some specific features of Ezekiel's vision. Imagine that we are joining Ezekiel on his tour of that impressive visionary temple. Keep in mind that we are not seeing the great spiritual temple; rather, we are simply drawing lessons that apply to our worship today. What are some lessons that we might learn?

*[2] Ezekiel's temple vision also ties in with other restoration prophecies that have seen fulfillment during the last days. Note, for example, the similarities between Ezekiel 43:1-9 and Malachi 3:1-5; Ezekiel 47:1-12 and Joel 3:18.

PREVIEW

In order for a family to function well, each member must know what is expected of him and must cooperate with other family members. The father lovingly takes the lead, the mother supports him, and the children obediently work along with their parents. It is similar with Jehovah's family. Our God has a purpose for us, and if we cooperate with that purpose, we will belong to Jehovah's family of worshippers forever.

WHEN we ponder the vast universe that Jehovah has created, we may feel as did the psalmist David, who prayerfully asked: “When I see your heavens, the works of your fingers, the moon and the stars that you have prepared, what is mortal man that you keep him in mind, and a son of man that you take care of him?” (Ps. 8:3, 4) Like David, we may look at the small place we occupy in the universe and marvel that Jehovah keeps us in mind at all. Yet, as we shall see, Jehovah not only took notice of the first humans, Adam and Eve, but also made them part of his family.

² Adam and Eve were Jehovah’s first earthly children, and Jehovah was their loving heavenly Father. He expected this couple to be productive family members. God told them: “Be fruitful and become many, fill the earth and subdue it.” (Gen. 1:28) They were to have children and take good care of their earthly home. If they had obediently cooperated with Jehovah’s purpose for them, Adam and Eve and their offspring would have remained members of God’s family forever.

³ Adam and Eve had an honorable place in

Jehovah's family. As recorded at Psalm 8:5 and footnote, David said this about Jehovah's creation of man: "You made him a little lower than angels, and you crowned him with glory and splendor." True, humans were not given the same power, intelligence, and abilities as the angels. (Ps. 103:20) Yet, mankind is only "a little lower" than those mighty spirit creatures. Imagine that! Jehovah truly gave our first parents a wonderful start.

⁴ Sadly, Adam and Eve lost their place in Jehovah's family. This has had disastrous consequences for their descendants, as we will see later in this article. But Jehovah's purpose has not changed. He wants obedient humans to be his children forever. First, let us discuss how Jehovah has honored us. Then, we will discuss what we can do now to show that we want to be part of God's family. Finally, we will consider the blessings that Jehovah's earthly children will enjoy forever.

HOW JEHOVAH HAS HONORED HUMANS

⁵ *Jehovah honored us by making us in his image.* (Gen. 1:26, 27) Because we are made in God's image, we can develop and manifest many of his wonderful qualities, such as love, compassion, loyalty, and righ-

teousness. (Ps. 86:15; 145:17) As we cultivate such qualities, we honor Jehovah and prove that we are grateful to him. (1 Pet. 1:14-16) When we behave in a way that pleases our heavenly Father, we are happy and satisfied. And by making us in his image, Jehovah gave us the ability to become the kind of people he wants in his family.

⁶ *Jehovah prepared a special home for us.* Long before he created the first man, Jehovah prepared the earth for humans. (Job 38:4-6; Jer. 10:12) Because he is thoughtful and generous, Jehovah provided an abundance of good things for us to enjoy. (Ps. 104: 14, 15, 24) At times, he reflected on his creative work, and he “saw that it was good.” (Gen. 1:10, 12, 31) He honored humans by giving them “dominion over” all his marvelous works on earth. (Ps. 8:6) God’s purpose is that perfect humans have the joy of caring for these grand works forever. Do you regularly thank Jehovah for that wonderful promise?

⁷ *Jehovah has given us the gift of free will.* We can choose which course we will take in life. (Read Joshua 24:15.) The ability to choose is called free will. Our loving God rejoices when we choose to serve him. (Ps. 84:11; Prov. 27:11) We can use our free will

properly in many areas. Consider the example set by Jesus.

⁸ Following the example of Jesus, we can choose to put the interests of others ahead of our own. Once when Jesus and his apostles were very tired, they traveled to a quiet place where they hoped to get some rest. However, that was not to be. A crowd found them, and they were eager to be taught by Jesus. But Jesus did not become irritated. Instead, he

felt pity for the people. So, what did Jesus do? “He started to teach them *many* things.” (Mark 6:30-34) When we imitate Jesus by sacrificing our time and energy to help others, we bring glory to our heavenly Father. (Matt. 5:14-16) We also show Jehovah that we want to be part of his family.

⁹ *Jehovah has given humans the ability to have children, as well as the responsibility to teach them to love and to serve him.* If you are a parent, do you appreciate this special gift? Although the angels are highly blessed by Jehovah, they have not been granted this privilege. With that in mind, those who are raising children should treasure their opportunity to do so. Parents have been given a trust, a sacred duty to raise their children in “the discipline and admonition of Jehovah.” (Eph. 6:4; Deut. 6:5-7; Ps. 127:3) In order to help parents, God’s organization provides many Bible-based tools, such as publications, videos, music, and online resources. Clearly, both our heavenly Father and his Son cherish our young ones. (Luke 18:15-17) When parents rely on Jehovah and do their very best to care for their precious children, Jehovah is pleased. And such parents give their children the prospect of becoming part of Jehovah’s family forever!

9. What should parents keep in mind?

¹⁰ *Jehovah gave his most precious Son so that we can once again become members of His family.* As we mentioned in paragraph 4, Adam and Eve lost their place in Jehovah's family, and they lost a place for their children. (Rom. 5:12) Adam and Eve deliberately disobeyed God, so they deserved to be disinherited by him. But what of their offspring? Jehovah lovingly made a provision for deserving ones among them to be adopted into his family. He did this by means of the sacrifice of his only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ. (John 3:16; Rom. 5:19) As a result of Jesus' sacrifice, 144,000 integrity-keeping humans are adopted as God's sons.—Rom. 8:15-17; Rev. 14:1.

¹¹ Additionally, untold millions of other faithful ones are obediently doing God's will. They have the prospect of full membership in God's family after the final test at the end of the Millennium. (Ps. 25:14; Rom. 8:20, 21) With that prospect in mind, even now they address Jehovah, their Creator, as "Father." (Matt. 6:9) Resurrected ones too will be given the opportunity to learn what Jehovah expects of them. Those who respond well to his direction will eventually also become members of his family.

10-11. What has Jehovah made possible for us by means of the ransom?

¹² As we have seen, Jehovah has taken the initiative to honor humans in many ways. He has already adopted anointed ones as his sons, and he has granted those of the “great crowd” the prospect of full sonship in the new world. (Rev. 7:9) What can we do now to show Jehovah that we want to be part of his family forever?

SHOW JEHOVAH THAT YOU WANT TO BE PART OF HIS FAMILY

¹³ *Show your love for Jehovah by serving him with your whole heart.* (Read Mark 12:30.) Of all the things that we have been kindly given by God, perhaps one of the greatest gifts is the ability to worship him. We show Jehovah that we love him by ‘observing his commandments.’ (1 John 5:3) Speaking for his Father, Jesus commanded us to make disciples, baptizing them. (Matt. 28:19) He also commanded us to love one another. (John 13:35) Jehovah will make obedient ones a part of his worldwide family of worshippers.—Ps. 15:1, 2.

¹⁴ *Show love for others.* Love is Jehovah’s foremost

quality. (1 John 4:8) Jehovah showed love for us before we ever knew him. (1 John 4:9, 10) We imitate him when we show love for others. (Eph. 5:1) One of the best ways we can show love for people is by helping them learn about Jehovah while there is still time. (Read Matthew 9:36-38.) In doing so, we give them an opportunity to become prospective members of God's family. After a person gets baptized, we must continue to love and respect him. (1 John 4:20, 21) What does this involve? For one thing, we give him the benefit of the doubt whenever possible. For example, we would not impute bad or selfish motives to him. Instead, we would show honor for our brother, considering him to be superior to us.—Read Romans 12:10; Phil. 2:3.

¹⁵ *Show mercy and kindness to all people.* If we want to be among those who can rightly call Jehovah their Father forever, we must apply God's Word in our lives. For instance, Jesus taught that we should show mercy and kindness to all people, even our enemies. (Luke 6:32-36) We may find that at times this is difficult for us to do. If so, we must learn to think and act like Jesus. When we do our best to obey Jehovah and imitate Jesus, we show our heavenly Father that we want to be part of his family forever.

15. To whom should we show mercy and kindness?

16 *Protect the reputation of Jehovah's family.* In a literal family, it is not uncommon for a little boy to copy his older brother. If the older sibling applies Bible principles in his life, he will serve as a good example for his younger brother. If the older one turns to doing what is wrong, the younger brother may follow his bad example. It is similar in Jehovah's family. If a once faithful Christian later adopts apostate thinking or chooses an immoral or a corrupt way of life, others may be tempted to join him in doing what is bad. Those who do so harm the reputation of Jehovah's family of worshippers. (1 Thess. 4:3-8) We must avoid following bad examples and not allow anything to pull us away from our loving heavenly Father.

17 *Trust in Jehovah instead of in material things.* Jehovah promises that he will provide us with food, clothing, and shelter if we seek his Kingdom first and live by his righteous standards. (Ps. 55:22; Matt. 6:33) With that in mind, we avoid thinking that the material things this world offers will bring us security and lasting happiness. We know that the only way we can gain real peace of mind is by doing Jehovah's will. (Phil. 4:6, 7) Even if we can afford to buy many things, we must consider whether we really have the

time or the energy to use and care for such things. Might we become too attached to our possessions? We must remember that God expects us to be productive members of his family. That means we should not allow ourselves to be distracted. We certainly do not want to be like the young man who turned down the opportunity to serve Jehovah as well as the potential to be adopted as one of his sons—all because he was attached to a few earthly possessions!—Mark 10:17-22.

¹⁸ Obedient humans will enjoy the greatest honor of all—the privilege of loving and worshipping Jehovah forever! Those with an earthly hope will also have the joy of caring for this beautiful planet that Jehovah so perfectly designed to be their home. Soon the earth and all life on it will be renewed under Kingdom rule. Jesus will undo the conditions that resulted when Adam and Eve decided to leave God's family. Jehovah will resurrect millions and give them the opportunity for everlasting life in perfect health on an earth transformed into a paradise. (Luke 23:42, 43) As the earthly part of Jehovah's

Live each day with God’s promises in your mind and heart. Appreciate your privilege of worshipping our dear heavenly Father, and cherish the prospect of praising him forever!
