The apostles had direct evidence that Jehovah was with them. He had given them the power to perform miracles. (Acts 5:12-16; 6:8) That is not the case with us today. Thursday, March 24

The apostle Paul was not the first to express the hope of a resurrection. The patriarch Job did too. He was confident that God would remember him and raise him to life again. (Job 14:7-10, 12-15) "The resurrection of the dead" is part of the "foundation," or "primary doctrine," of all Christian teachings. (Hebrews 6:1, 2) Paul's discussion of the resurrection is recorded in 1 Corinthians chapter 15. What he wrote must have built up first-century Christians. And that chapter can build us up and strengthen a hope that we may have long held. The resurrection of Jesus Christ is key to our hope for our dead loved ones. It was part of "the good news" that Paul declared to the Corinthians. (1 Corinthians 15:1, 2) In fact, he said that if a Christian lacked belief in that resurrection, his faith would be useless.—1 Corinthians 15:17. w20.12 2 paragraphs 2-4

Friday, March 25

Peter called to mind what Jesus had said . . . And he went outside and wept bitterly.—Matthew 26:75.

What helped the apostle Peter to recover? For one thing, Jesus had prayed earlier that Peter's faith might not give out. Jehovah answered that heartfelt prayer. We can learn from the experiences of those who failed to keep calm and trust in Jehovah. Studying those bad examples will help us to avoid making the same mistakes they made. 1 SAMUEL 16-17

16 Jehovah eventually said to Samuel: "How long will you mourn for Saul now that I have rejected him from ruling as king over Israel? Fill your horn with oil and go. I will send you to Jes'se the Beth'le-hem-ite, because I have selected from among his sons a king for myself." But Samuel said: "How can I go? When Saul hears about it, he will kill me." Jehovah replied: "Take a young cow with you and say, 'I have come to sacrifice to Jehovah.' Invite Jes'se to the sacrifice; then I will make known to you what to do. You must anoint for me the one whom I designate to you."

⁴ Samuel did what Jehovah said. When he came to Beth'le-hem, the elders of the city were trembling at meeting him, and they said: "Does your coming mean peace?" 5 To this he said: "It means peace. I have come to sacrifice to Jehovah. Sanctify yourselves, and come with me to the sacrifice." Then he sanctified Jes'se and his sons, after which he summoned them to the sacrifice. 6 As they came in and he saw E-li'ab, he said: "Surely here before Jehovah stands his anointed one." ⁷ But Jehovah said to Samuel: "Do not pay attention to his appearance and how tall he is, for I have rejected him. For the way man sees is not the way God sees, because mere man sees what appears to the eyes, but Jehovah sees into the heart." 8 Then Jes'se called A-bin'a-dab and had him pass before Samuel, but he said: "Jehovah has not chosen this one either." 9 Next Jes'se presented Sham'mah, but he said: "Jehovah has not chosen this one either." 10 So Jes'se had seven of his sons pass

before Samuel, but Samuel said to Jes'se: "Jehovah has not chosen any of these."

¹¹ Finally Samuel said to Jes'se: "Are these all of your boys?" To this he said: "The youngest has been left out until now; he is pasturing the sheep." Then Samuel said to Jes'se: "Send for him, because we will not sit down for the meal until he comes here." ¹² So he sent for him and brought him in. Now he was ruddy, with beautiful eyes, and handsome in appearance. Then Jehovah said: "Get up, anoint him, for this is the one!" ¹³ So Samuel took the horn of oil and anointed him in the presence of his brothers. And the spirit of Jehovah began to empower David from that day forward. Samuel later rose and went his way to Ra'mah.

¹⁴ Now the spirit of Jehovah had departed from Saul, and a bad spirit from Jehovah terrorized him. ¹⁵ The servants of Saul said to him: "You see that a bad spirit from God is terrorizing you. ¹⁶ Let our lord, please, command your servants before you to look for a man who is skilled at playing the harp. Whenever a bad spirit from God comes upon you, he will play it, and you will feel better." ¹⁷ So Saul said to his servants: "Find me, please, a man who plays well, and bring him to me."

¹⁸ One of the attendants said: "Look! I have seen how a son of Jes'se the Beth'le-hem-ite plays skillfully, and he is a courageous, mighty warrior. He can speak well, and he is handsome, and Jehovah is with him." ¹⁹ Saul then sent messengers to Jes'se and said: "Send to me your son David, who is with the flock." ²⁰ So Jes'se loaded a donkey with

bread, a skin bottle of wine, and a young goat and sent them to Saul with his son David. ²¹ Thus David came to Saul and began serving him. Saul grew to love him very much, and he became his armor-bearer. ²² Saul sent a message to Jes'se: "Please let David remain in my service, for he has found favor in my eyes." ²³ Whenever a bad spirit from God came upon Saul, David took the harp and played it, and Saul found relief and felt better, and the bad spirit would depart from him.

17 And the Phi-lis'tines assembled their armies for war. They assembled at So'coh, which belongs to Judah, and they camped between So'coh and A-ze'kah, in E'phesdam'mim. ² Saul and the men of Israel assembled and camped in the Valley of E'lah, and they drew up in battle formation to meet the Phi-lis'tines. ³ The Phi-lis'tines occupied the mountain on one side, and the Israelites occupied the mountain on the other side, with the valley between them.

⁴ Then a champion came out from the camps of the Phi-lis'tines; his name was Go-li'ath, from Gath, and his height was six cubits and a span. ⁵ He had a helmet of copper on his head, and he was wearing a coat of mail of overlapping scales. The weight of the copper coat of mail was 5,000 shekels. ⁶ He had shin guards of copper on his legs and a javelin of copper slung between his shoulders. ⁷ The wooden shaft of his spear was like the beam of loom workers, and the iron blade of his spear weighed 600 shekels; and his shield-bearer was marching ahead of him.

⁸ Then he stood and called out to the battle line of Israel and said to them: "Why have you come out to draw up in battle formation? Am I not the Phi-lis'tine, and are you not the servants of Saul? Choose a man for yourselves, and let him come down to me. ⁹ If he is able to fight with me and strike me down, we will then become your servants. But if I prevail against him and strike him down, you will become our servants and serve us." ¹⁰ The Phi-lis'tine then said: "I do taunt the battle line of Israel this day. Give me a man, and let us fight it out!"

¹¹ When Saul and all Israel heard these words of the Phi-lis'tine, they became terrified and greatly afraid.

¹² Now David was the son of the Eph'rath-ite from Beth'le-hem of Judah named Jes'se, who had eight sons and who in the days of Saul was already an old man. ¹³ The three oldest sons of Jes'se had followed Saul to the war. The names of his three sons who went to war were E-li'ab the firstborn, his second son A-bin'a-dab, and the third Sham'mah. ¹⁴ David was the youngest, and the three oldest followed Saul.

¹⁵ David was going back and forth from Saul to tend the sheep of his father at Beth'le-hem. ¹⁶ Meanwhile, the Phi-lis'tine would come forward and take his position each morning and each evening for 40 days.

¹⁷ Then Jes'se said to his son David: "Take, please, this e'phah of roasted grain and these ten loaves of bread, and carry them quickly to your brothers in the camp. ¹⁸ And take these ten portions of cheese to the chief of the thousand;

also, you should check on the welfare of your brothers and bring back some token from them." ¹⁹ They were with Saul and all the other men of Israel in the Valley of E'lah, fighting against the Phi-lis'tines.

²⁰ So David got up early in the morning and left someone in charge of the sheep; then he packed up and went just as Jes'se had commanded him. When he came to the camp enclosure, the army was going out to the battle line, shouting a battle cry. ²¹ Israel and the Phi-lis'tines drew up so that one battle line faced the other battle line. ²² David immediately left his baggage in the care of the baggage keeper and ran to the battle line. When he arrived, he began asking about the welfare of his brothers.

While he was speaking with them, there came the champion named Go-li'ath, the Phi-lis'tine from Gath. He came out from the battle line of the Phi-lis'tines, and he spoke the same words as before, and David heard him.

When all the men of Israel saw the man, they fled from him, terrified. The men of Israel were saying: "Have you seen this man who is coming out? He comes to taunt Israel. The king will give great riches to the man who strikes him down, he will give him his own daughter, and he will give the house of his father exemption in Israel."

David began to say to the men who were standing near him: "What will be done for the man who strikes down that Phi-lis'tine over there and takes away reproach from Israel? For who is this uncircumcised Phi-lis'tine that he should taunt the battle line of the living God?" Then the people told him

the same thing as before: "This is what will be done for the man who strikes him down." ²⁸ When his oldest brother E-li'ab heard him speak to the men, he became angry with David and said: "Why have you come down? And with whom did you leave those few sheep in the wilderness? I well know your presumptuousness and the bad intentions of your heart; you came down just to see the battle." ²⁹ To this David said: "What have I done now? I was only asking a question!" ³⁰ So he turned from him toward someone else and asked the same thing as before, and the people gave him the same reply as before.

³¹ The words that David had spoken were overheard and reported to Saul. So he sent for him. 32 David said to Saul: "Let no one lose heart because of him. Your servant will go and fight with this Phi-lis'tine." 33 But Saul said to David: "You are not able to go fight against this Phi-lis'tine, for you are but a boy, and he has been a soldier from his youth." ³⁴ David then said to Saul: "Your servant became a shepherd of his father's flock, and a lion came, also a bear, and each carried off a sheep from the flock. 35 I went out after it and struck it down and rescued it from its mouth. When it rose up against me, I grabbed it by its fur and struck it down and put it to death. ³⁶ Your servant struck down both the lion and the bear, and this uncircumcised Phi-lis'tine will become like one of them, for he has taunted the battle lines of the living God." ³⁷ Then David added: "Jehovah, who rescued me from the claws of the lion and the bear, he is the one who will rescue me from the hand of this Phi-lis'tine." At this Saul said to David: "Go, and may Jehovah be with you."

³⁸ Saul now clothed David with his garments. He put a copper helmet on his head, after which he clothed him with a coat of mail. ³⁹ Then David strapped on his sword over his garments and tried to go but could not, for he was not used to them. David said to Saul: "I am unable to go in these things, for I am not used to them." So David took them off. ⁴⁰ He then took his staff in his hand and chose five smooth stones from the streambed and placed them in the pouch of his shepherd's bag, and his sling was in his hand. And he began approaching the Phi-lis'tine.

⁴¹ The Phi-lis'tine came closer and closer to David, and his shield-bearer was ahead of him. ⁴² When the Phi-lis'tine looked and saw David, he sneered at him in contempt because he was just a ruddy and handsome boy. ⁴³ So the Phi-lis'tine said to David: "Am I a dog, so that you are coming against me with sticks?" With that the Phi-lis'tine cursed David by his gods. ⁴⁴ The Phi-lis'tine said to David: "Just come to me, and I will give your flesh to the birds of the heavens and to the beasts of the field."

⁴⁵ David replied to the Phi-lis'tine: "You are coming against me with sword and spear and javelin, but I am coming against you in the name of Jehovah of armies, the God of the battle line of Israel, whom you have taunted. ⁴⁶ This very day Jehovah will surrender you into my hand, and I will strike you down and cut off your head; and on this day I will give the corpses of the camp of the Phi-lis'tines to the birds of the heavens and to the wild beasts of the earth; and people of all the earth will know that there is a God in Israel. ⁴⁷ And all

those gathered here will know that it is not with the sword or the spear that Jehovah saves, for the battle belongs to Jehovah, and he will give all of you into our hand."

⁴⁸ Then the Phi-lis'tine rose and drew steadily closer to meet David, but David ran quickly toward the battle line to meet the Phi-lis'tine. ⁴⁹ David thrust his hand into his bag and took a stone from there and slung it. He struck the Phi-lis'tine in the forehead, and the stone sank into his forehead and he fell facedown on the ground. ⁵⁰ So David prevailed over the Phi-lis'tine with a sling and a stone; he struck down the Phi-lis'tine and put him to death, though there was no sword in David's hand. ⁵¹ David continued running and stood over him. Then he took hold of the Phi-lis'tine's sword and pulled it out of its sheath and made sure that he was dead by cutting off his head with it. When the Phi-lis'tines saw that their mighty one had died, they fled.

At that the men of Israel and of Judah rose and broke into shouting and pursued the Phi-lis'tines all the way from the valley to the gates of Ek'ron, and the slain of the Phi-lis'tines lay fallen along the road from Sha'a-ra'im, as far as Gath and Ek'ron. ⁵³ After the Israelites returned from hotly pursuing the Phi-lis'tines, they pillaged their camps.

Then David took the head of the Phi-lis'tine and brought it to Jerusalem, but he put the Phi-lis'tine's weapons in his own tent.

⁵⁵ At the moment that Saul saw David go out to meet the Phi-lis'tine, he said to Ab'ner, the chief of the army: "Whose son is this boy, Ab'ner?" Ab'ner replied: "As surely as you

live, O king, I do not know!" ⁵⁶ The king said: "Find out whose son the young man is." ⁵⁷ So as soon as David returned from striking down the Phi-lis'tine, Ab'ner took him and brought him before Saul with the head of the Phi-lis'tine in his hand. ⁵⁸ Saul now said to him: "Whose son are you, boy?" to which David said: "The son of your servant Jes'se the Beth'le-hem-ite."

Then David added: "Jehovah, who rescued me from the claws of the lion and the bear, he is the one who will rescue me from the hand of this Philistine." At this Saul said to David: "Go, and may Jehovah be with you."

David reassured Saul by recounting what had happened with the lion and the bear. Was he boasting? No. David knew how he had won those battles. He said: "Jehovah, who rescued me from the claws of the lion and the bear, he is the one who will rescue me from the hand of this Philistine." Resigned at last, Saul responded: "Go, and may Jehovah be with you."—1 Samuel 17:37.

Would you like to have faith like David's? Note, then, that David's faith was not mere idealism or wishful thinking. He had faith in his God because of knowledge and experience. He knew Jehovah as a loving Protector and a Keeper of promises. If we want to acquire such faith, we need to keep learning about the God of the Bible. As we live by what we learn, we will find that the good results will likewise strengthen our faith.—Hebrews 11:1.

David looked at Goliath in comparison to Jehovah, not himself

1 Samuel 17:45-47: David replied to the Philistine: "You are coming against me with sword and spear and javelin, but I am coming against you in the name of Jehovah of armies, the God of the battle line of Israel, whom you have taunted. This very day Jehovah will surrender you into my hand, and I

will strike you down and cut off your head; and on this day I will give the corpses of the camp of the Philistines to the birds of the heavens and to the wild beasts of the earth; and people of all the earth will know that there is a God in Israel. And all those gathered here will know that it is not with the sword or the spear that Jehovah saves, for the battle belongs to Jehovah, and he will give all of you into our hand."

To this day, David's response stands as a great statement of faith. Just imagine the young man calling out to Goliath: "You are coming against me with sword and spear and javelin, but I am coming against you in the name of Jehovah of armies, the God of the battle line of Israel, whom you have taunted." David knew that human power and weaponry mattered little. Goliath had shown disrespect for Jehovah God, and Jehovah would respond. As David put it, "the battle belongs to Jehovah."—1 Samuel 17:45-47.

David was not blind to Goliath's size or his weapons. Yet David refused to let such things daunt him. He did not make the mistake that Saul and the members of his army did.

David did not compare himself to Goliath. Instead, he looked at Goliath in comparison with Jehovah. Standing some nine and a half feet (2.9 meters) tall, Goliath towered over other men, but how big was he compared to the Sovereign of the universe? Really, like any human, he was barely more than an insect—in this case, one that Jehovah was ready to exterminate!

1 Samuel 17:48-50: Then the Philistine rose and drew steadily closer to meet David, but David ran quickly toward the battle line to meet the Philistine. It was after this and after the anointing of David as Israel's future king that Jehovah's spirit left Saul. From then on "a bad spirit from Jehovah terrorized him." Having withdrawn his spirit from Saul, Jehovah made it possible for a bad spirit to gain possession of him, depriving Saul of his peace of mind and stirring up his feelings, thoughts, and imaginations in a wrong way. Saul's failure to obey Jehovah indicated a bad inclination of mind and heart, against which God's spirit offered Saul no protection or resistive force. However, since Jehovah had permitted the "bad spirit" to replace his spirit and terrorize Saul, it could be termed a "bad spirit from Jehovah," so that Saul's servants spoke of it as "God's bad

spirit." On the recommendation of one of his attendants, Saul requested that David be his court musician to calm him when he was troubled by the "bad spirit."—1 Samuel 16:14-23; 17:15.

No Reason to Fear Persecution

Please watch the following video that contains heartfelt comments from persecuted brothers and sisters in Russia, and see why we have no reason to fear persecution. I was horrified when several masked officers broke down two doors and burst into the home where the meeting was being held. Everything happened at once—loud sounds, noise, the order: "Everyone sit on the floor!" I was overcome with fear when they put me in handcuffs, placed me in the police van, and took me to jail. I was afraid because I didn't know how long I would be there and what was awaiting me. When I was being interrogated, I was afraid that I might be unfaithful to Jehovah and let my brothers down. After being detained, I was mostly afraid about what I would face in prison—whom I would encounter, how to act, how others would treat me—the unknown. When one of the officers began to describe how bad life is behind bars, I imagined that behind the officer stood an angel just like the one who supported Daniel in the illustration. This helped me to calm down and not to panic or be afraid. That's how Jehovah supported me. At the first court appearance, when I was brought out, the brothers' feelings impelled them to show support somehow, and they began applauding. How that encouraged me that they were with me! Fervent and sincere prayers to Jehovah helped me to cope with these fears. Isaiah 30:15 gave me much support. I realized that tranquility and trust in Jehovah are now the most important things. Understanding this made things much easier for me. We took the elevator down to the first floor, the doors opened, and there stood a large crowd of our brothers and sisters—and they all began clapping. When I saw that, my emotions just welled up, and I

got a lump in my throat. I felt as if I had wings; I felt the "great cloud of witnesses." I prayed to Jehovah for calmness, courage, and wisdom and that he help me not to bring reproach on his holy name. Almost immediately, "the peace of God" came over me, and I was calm. The unpleasant sensations did not go away, but I was no longer afraid. While overcoming our fear, my wife and I tried to go out in service every day. When you don't concentrate on yourself but focus on helping others, fear disappears. Something that helped me to cope with my fears is hope, looking at the situation through Jehovah's eyes, seeing what will happen next that this is not the end of the situation, but only a difficult phase through which you can pass. I was helped to cope with my fear by the words of the song: "Take one day at a time; "leave tomorrow until tomorrow; peace is what I find." I understood that it was important to solve problems as they came up and not to be troubled by what might never happen. Fear is interesting; that is, in principle, fear can be inside a person, and if someone is afraid, that is not shameful. But the question is, Can you overcome this fear? Can you get the fear under your control? Can you overcome this surge of negativity? And when my heart persuaded me to get scared, then I started to pray. I prayed to Jehovah to give me courage and not be afraid of anyone or anything. I still say to myself, 'Feliks, do not fear anybody or anything except Jehovah!' Dear brothers and sisters, I really appreciate your support. I'm very happy for all your letters, for all your thoughts, for all your prayers. I really appreciate it a lot. I try to do my best, and I try to serve Jehovah in the best way that I can. I will do that forever!

be erasing the tragic story and giving the resurrected ones the opportunity to write a better story. On the basis of the ransom sacrifice, he will undo all the harm caused by sickness, war, disease, and famine. More than that, he will help us dig out and destroy the root cause of our sorrow—the sin we inherited from Adam. (Rom. 5:18, 19) Jesus will completely "break up the works of the Devil." (1 John 3:8) What takes place then?

Why We Attend the Memorial

PREVIEW

Whether our hope is to live in heaven or on a paradise earth, we look forward to attending the Memorial each year. This article will discuss the sound Scriptural reasons why we attend and how we benefit from doing so. NO MATTER how long it has been since our loved ones have died, we still remember them. The anniversary of their death usually brings especially vivid memories to mind.

² Each year, we are among the millions worldwide who gather on the anniversary of the death of someone we dearly love—Jesus Christ. (1 Pet. 1:8) We come together to remember the one who gave his life as a ransom to save us from sin and death. (Matt. 20:28) In fact, Jesus wanted his followers to remember his death. The night before he died, he instituted a special evening meal and commanded: "Keep doing this in remembrance of me."*-Luke 22:19.

³ A small number of those attending the Memorial of Christ's death cherish a heavenly hope. But many millions who have an earthly hope are also present. In this article, we will consider reasons why both groups are eager to attend the Memorial each year. We will also examine how we benefit from

attending. Let us start by considering some reasons why the anointed attend.

WHY ANOINTED ONES ATTEND

⁴ Each year, anointed ones look forward to attending the Memorial as partakers. Why do they appropriately partake of the bread and the wine? To answer that, consider what happened on the final night of Jesus' earthly life. After the Passover meal, Jesus instituted what has come to be known as the Lord's Evening Meal. He passed the bread and the wine to his 11 faithful apostles and told them to eat and drink. Jesus spoke to them about two covenants, or agreements-the new covenant and the Kingdom covenant.* (Luke 22:19, 20, 28-30) These covenants opened up the way for those apostles and a limited number of others to become kings and priests in heaven. (Rev. 5:10; 14:1) Only the anointed remnant, who are in these two covenants, may partake of the bread and the wine at the Memorial.

^{*} For more information about the new covenant and the Kingdom covenant, see the article "You Will Become 'a Kingdom of Priests'" in the October 15, 2014, issue of *The Watchtower*, pp. 15-17.

⁵ Here is another reason why the anointed are eager to attend the Memorial: This observance gives them an opportunity to contemplate their hope. Jehovah has given them a remarkable hope—to enjoy immortal and incorruptible life in heaven, to serve alongside the glorified Jesus Christ and the rest of the 144,000 and, above all, to be in the very presence of Jehovah God! (1 Cor. 15:51-53; 1 John 3:2) The anointed recognize that they have been invited to enjoy such privileges in heaven. But to be admitted to heaven, they must remain faithful until their death. (2 Tim. 4:7, 8) It brings the anointed great joy to reflect on their heavenly hope. (Titus 2:13) What about the "other sheep"? (John 10:16) What are some reasons why they attend the Memorial?

WHY THE OTHER SHEEP ATTEND

⁶ The other sheep attend the Memorial, not as partakers, but as observers. In 1938, those with the earthly hope were for the first time specifically invited to attend the Memorial. The Watchtower of March 1, 1938, stated: "It will be entirely right and proper for the [other sheep] to be present at such

meeting and observe what is done. . . . It should be and is a time of rejoicing for them also." Like invited guests who are happy to observe a wedding ceremony, the other sheep are happy to be present as observers at the Memorial.

They look forward to the Memorial discourse, for much of it focuses on what Christ and his 144,000 corulers will do for faithful humans during the Thousand Year Reign. Under the leadership of their King Jesus Christ, those heavenly rulers will help transform the earth into a paradise and lift obedient humankind to perfection. How thrilling it is for the millions of observers at the Memorial to imagine the future fulfillment of Bible prophecies, such as those found at Isaiah 35:5, 6; 65:21-23; and Revelation 21:3, 4. By picturing themselves and their loved ones in that new world, they strengthen their hope for the future and their determination never to stop serving Jehovah.—Matt. 24:13; Gal. 6:9.

close bond would exist between the anointed and those with the earthly hope. How so? Let us discuss a few examples.

9 Read Zechariah 8:23. This prophecy paints a touching picture of the way the other sheep feel about their anointed brothers and sisters. The expressions "a Jew" and "you people" refer to the same group—the anointed remnant. (Rom. 2:28, 29) The "ten men out of all the languages of the nations" represent the other sheep. They "take firm hold of"-loyally attach themselves to-the anointed, joining them in pure worship. Naturally, then, on the night of the Memorial, the other sheep show their close attachment to the anointed by being present with them.

¹⁰ Read Ezekiel 37:15-19, 24, 25. In fulfillment of this prophecy, Jehovah has brought the anointed and the other sheep together in an unbreakable bond of unity. The prophecy mentions two sticks. Those with the heavenly hope are like the stick "for Judah" (the tribe from which the kings of Israel were chosen), and those with the earthly hope are

like the stick "of Ephraim."* Jehovah would unite the two groups so that they would become "one stick." This means that they serve unitedly under their one King, Christ Jesus. Each year, the anointed and the other sheep attend the Memorial, not as two separate groups, but as "one flock" under "one shepherd."—John 10:16.

¹¹ Read Matthew 25:31-36, 40. "The sheep" in this parable represent righteous ones in the time of the end who have the earthly hope—that is, the other sheep. They loyally support the remaining ones of Christ's spirit-anointed brothers primarily by helping them to fulfill an enormous responsibility—the worldwide preaching and disciple-making work.—Matt. 24:14: 28:19, 20.

¹² Every year in the weeks leading up to the Memorial, the other sheep show their support for Christ's brothers by sharing fully in a global campaign to invite interested ones to the Memorial.

Are You Planning Ahead for the Memorial Season?

PRIOR TO THE MEMORIAL

- Share as fully as possible in the campaign to invite others to attend this important event. Make a list of those whom you want to invite.
- Consider prayerfully whether you can enroll as an auxiliary pioneer during the Memorial season.
- Review articles or other published information that deepens your appreciation for the Memorial, the ransom, and the love that Jehovah and Jesus have shown us. For example, you can review chapters 14 and 23 of the book Draw Close to Jehovah and chapter 17 of the book "Come Be My Follower."
- Keep up with the Memorial Bible reading schedule found in Examining the Scriptures Daily. Take time to meditate on Bible accounts about Jesus' last days on earth, his death, and his resurrection.

ON THE EVENING OF THE MEMORIAL

- Arrive early so that you can warmly welcome visitors and inactive ones who come to the event.
- Pay close attention to the discourse, and follow along in your Bible when the speaker reads and explains the scriptures.
- After the program concludes, try to start a conversation with a visitor and answer any questions he may have. If he shows interest, make sure that you or someone else can follow up on it.

¹⁵ We highly value the gift of the ransom. (Matt. 20: 28) The anointed treasure the ransom, which makes their wonderful hope possible. Because of their faith in Christ's sacrifice, Jehovah has declared them righteous and has adopted them as his children. (Rom. 5:1; 8:15-17, 23) The other sheep too are thankful for the ransom. On the basis of their faith in Christ's shed blood, they have a clean standing before God, can render him sacred service, and have the hope of coming "out of the great tribulation." (Rev. 7:13-15) One way that both the anointed and the other sheep show their gratitude for the ransom is by being present at the Memorial each year.

¹⁸ We are moved to imitate Jesus' example. (1 Pet. 2:21) In the days leading up to the Memorial, we focus on Bible accounts about Jesus' final week on earth, his death, and his resurrection. Then on the evening of the Memorial, the discourse reminds us of Jesus' love for us. (Eph. 5:2; 1 John 3:16) As we read about Jesus' self-sacrificing example and meditate on it, we feel compelled to "go on walking just as that one walked."—1 John 2:6.

¹⁹ We are even more determined to remain in God's love. (Jude 20, 21) We remain in God's love by doing all we can to obey him, sanctify his name, and bring joy to his heart. (Prov. 27:11; Matt. 6:9; 1 John
