(1 Tim. 5:8) He will train and discipline his children. He will also continue to learn to make decisions that honor Jehovah and benefit his family. w21.02 5 ¶12-13

Wednesday, March 30

Throw your burden on Jehovah, and he will sustain you.—Ps. 55:22.

Our loving heavenly Father knows how our past experiences and our negative thinking have affected us. But he also sees the good in our heart—qualities that we may not see in ourselves. (1 John 3:19, 20) Someone who is struggling to overcome a deep-seated bad habit might have a setback and feel disappointed in himself. Of course, it is normal to feel a measure of guilt when we sin.

(2 Cor. 7:10) However, we should not go to extremes and condemn ourselves, thinking: 'I'm a complete failure. How can Jehovah ever forgive me?' Such negative thinking is not based on the truth and could cause us to stop serving Jehovah. Instead, "set matters straight" with Jehovah by going to him in prayer and seeking his mercy. (Isa. 1:18) Considering your sincere repentance, he will forgive you. In addition, approach the elders. They will patiently help you to become spiritually well again. —Jas. 5:14, 15. w20.12 23 ¶5-6

Thursday, March 31

[Treat] older women as mothers, . . . younger women as sisters. —1 Tim. 5:2.

Jesus gave women honor and respect. He did not follow the custom of the Pharisees, who looked down on women and who would not even speak to them in public, let alone discuss the Scriptures with them. Instead, he included women in the deep spiritual discussions that he had with his other disciples. (Luke 10:38, 39, 42) He also allowed women to accompany him on his preaching tours. (Luke 8:1-3) And Jesus gave them the privilege of announcing to the apostles that he had been raised from the dead. (John 20:16-18) The apostle Paul specifically reminded Timothy to honor women. Paul acknowledged that it was Timothy's mother and grandmother who had first taught Timothy "the holy writings." (2 Tim. 1:5; 3:14, 15) Paul specifically greeted sisters by name in his letter to the Romans. He not only noticed the work sisters did but also expressed appreciation for them as Christian ministers.-Rom. 16:1-4, 6, 12: Phil, 4:3, *w21.02* 15 ¶5-6

Friday, April 1

The things that were written beforehand were written for our instruction.—Rom. 15:4.

Are you suffering through a difficult trial? Perhaps someone in the congregation has hurt you. (Jas. 3:2) Or maybe your workmates or schoolmates ridicule you for serving Jehovah. (1 Pet. 4:3, 4) Or family members are possibly trying to stop you from attending meetings or from talking to others about your faith. (Matt. 10:35, 36) If a trial is especially painful, you may feel like giving up. But you can be confident that no matter what challenge you face, Jehovah will give you the wisdom to deal with it and the strength to endure it. In his Word, Jehovah included detailed descriptions of how imperfect individuals dealt with difficult trials. Why? So that we can learn from them. 



and cut off your head; and on this day I will give the corpses of the camp of the Phi·lis'tines to the birds of the heavens and to the wild beasts of the earth: and people of all the earth will know that there is a God in Israel.a 47 And all those gathered here* will know that it is not with the sword or the spear that Jehovah saves.b for the battle belongs to Jehovah.c and he will give all of vou into our hand."a

48 Then the Phi-lis'tine rose and drew steadily closer to meet David, but David ran quickly toward the battle line to meet the Phi·lis'tine. 49 David thrust his hand into his bag and took a stone from there and slung it. He struck the Phi-lis'tine in the forehead, and the stone sank into his forehead and he fell facedown on the ground.e 50 So David prevailed over the Phi-lis'tine with a sling and a stone; he struck down the Phi-lis'tine and put him to death, though there was no sword in David's hand. 51 David continued running and stood over him. Then he took hold of the Phi-lis'tine's swordg and pulled it out of its sheath and made sure that he was dead by cutting off his head with it. When the Phi-lis'tines saw that their mighty one had died, they fled.h

52 At that the men of Israel and of Judah rose and broke into shouting and pursued the Philis'tines all the way from the vallev to the gates of Ek'ron. and the slain of the Phi·lis'tines lav fallen along the road from Sha'ara'im. k as far as Gath and Ek'ron. 53 After the Israelites returned from hotly pursuing the Phi-lis'tines, they pillaged their camps.

54 Then David took the head of the Phi-lis'tine and brought it to Jerusalem, but he put the

55 At the moment that Saul saw David go out to meet the Phi·lis'tine, he said to Ab'ner,b the chief of the army: "Whose son is this boy.c Ab'ner?" Ab'ner replied: "As surely as you live." O king, I do not know!" 56 The king said: "Find out whose son the young man is." 57 So as soon as David returned from striking down the Philis'tine. Ab'ner took him and brought him before Saul with the head of the Phi-lis'tined in his hand. 58 Saul now said to him: "Whose son are you, boy?" to which David said: "The son of your servant Jes'see the Beth'lehem·ite."f

18 As soon as David had finished speaking to Saul, Jon'a·thang and David became bound together in close friendship,* and Jon'a-than began to love him as himself.#h 2 From that day, Saul kept David with him, and he did not allow him to return to his father's house. 3 And Jon'a·than and David made a covenant, because he loved him as himself.#k 4 Jon'a-than took off the sleeveless coat that he wore and gave it to David, along with his gear, his sword, his bow, and his belt. 5 David began going out and was successful*/ wherever Saul would send him. So Saul put him in charge of the fighting men, m and this pleased all the people and the servants of Saul.

6 When David and the others would return from striking down the Phi·lis'tines, the women would come out from all the cities of Israel with songn and danc-

es to meet King Saul with tambourines,^a with rejoicing, and with lutes. **7** The women who were celebrating would sing:

"Saul has struck down his thousands,

And David his tens of thousands."b

8 Saul became very angry, and this song displeased him, for he said: "They have credited David with tens of thousands, but to me they have credited thousands. The only thing left to give him is the kingship!" 9 From that day on, Saul was always looking at David suspiciously.

10 The next day a bad spirit from God gripped Saul, e and he started to act strangely* inside the house, while David was playing music on the harp as on other occasions. Saul had a spear in his hand.g 11 and he hurled the spear. h saving to himself: 'I will pin David to the wall!' But David escaped from him twice. 12 Then Saul was afraid of David because Jehovah was with him¹ but had departed from Saul. 13 So Saul removed him from his presence and appointed him as chief of a thousand, and David would lead the army into battle.*k 14 David continued to have success*1 in all he did, and Jehovah was with him.m 15 And when Saul saw that he was very successful, he became afraid of him. 16 But all Israel and Judah loved David, because he would lead them in their campaigns.

17 Saul later said to David: "Here is my oldest daughter Me'rab." I will give her to you as wife. "However, you should continue to display your courage for me and fight the wars of Jeho-

vah."^a For Saul said to himself: 'Do not let my hand come against him. Let the hand of the Phi-lis'tines strike him.^b **18** At this David said to Saul: "Who am I and who are my relatives, my father's family in Israel, for me to become son-in-law to the king?"^c **19** However, when the time came to give Saul's daughter Me'rab to David, she had already been given to be the wife of A'dri-el^d the Me-hol'ath-ite.

20 Now Saul's daughter Mi'chale was in love with David, and it was reported to Saul, and this pleased him. 21 So Saul said: "I will give her to him to serve as a snare to him, so that the hand of the Phi-lis'tines may come upon him." Saul then said to David a second time: "You will form a marriage alliance with me* today." 22 Further, Saul ordered his servants: "Speak to David secretly and say, 'Look! The king is pleased with you, and all his servants are fond of you. So now form a marriage alliance with the king." 23 When Saul's servants told David these things, David said: "Is it a trivial matter to you to form a marriage alliance with the king when I am a man poor and lightly esteemed?"g 24 Then Saul's servants reported to him: "These are the words that David spoke."

25 At that Saul said: "This is what you should say to David, 'The king does not want any bride price' except 100 foreskins' of the Phi-lis'tines, to take revenge on the enemies of the king." For Saul was scheming to have David fall by the hand of the Phi-lis'tines. 26 So his servants reported these words to David, and it was pleasing to David to form a marriage alliance with the king. Before the allotted time, 27 David

went with his men and struck down 200 Phi-lis'tine men, and David brought the full number of their foreskins to the king. to form a marriage alliance with the king. Therefore, Saul gave him his daughter Mi'chal as a wife.a 28 Saul realized that Jehovah was with Davidb and that his daughter Mi'chal loved him. 29 This made Saul even more afraid of David, and Saul became an enemy of David for the rest of his life.d

30 The princes of the Phi-lis'tines would go out to battle, but as often as they went out, David was more successful* than all the servants of Saul: and his name was highly esteemed.f

19 Saul later spoke to Jon'a-than his son and to all his servants about putting David to death.g 2 Since Saul's son Jon'a-than was very fond of David.h Jon'a than told David: "My father Saul wants to have you put to death. Please be on your guard in the morning, and go to a secret place and remain hidden. 3 I will go out and stand next to my father in the field where vou will be. I will talk about vou to my father, and if I learn anything. I will be sure to tell vou."

4 So Jon'a-than spoke well of David to his father Saul. He said to him: "The king should not sin against his servant David, for he has not sinned against you and what he has done for you has benefited you. 5 He risked his life* to strike down the Phi-lis'tine, k so that Jehovah brought about a great victory# for all Israel. You saw it, and you were overioved. So why should you sin against innocent blood in having David put to death for no reason?" 6 Saul listened to

Jon'a.than, and Saul swore: "As surely as Jehovah is living, he will not be put to death." 7 Afterward Jon'a than called David and told him all these things. So Jon'a-than brought David to Saul, and he continued to serve him as before.^a

8 In time war broke out again. and David went out and fought against the Phi·lis'tines and struck them down with a great slaughter, and they fled from before him.

9 And a bad spirit from Jehovah came upon Saulb when he was sitting in his house with his spear in his hand, while David was playing music on the harp.c 10 Saul tried to pin David to the wall with the spear, but he eluded Saul, who drove the spear into the wall. David fled and escaped during that night. 11 Saul later sent messengers to David's house to watch it and to kill him in the morning,d but David's wife Mi'chal told him: "If you do not escape* tonight, tomorrow you will be a dead man." 12 Immediately Mi'chal let David down through the window, so that he could run away and escape. 13 Mi'chal took the teraphim statue* and placed it on the bed, and she put a net of goat hair at the place of his head, and she covered it with a garment.

14 Saul now sent messengers to take David, but she said: "He is sick." 15 So Saul sent the messengers to see David and told them: "Bring him to me on his bed to have him put to death."e 16 When the messengers came in, there was the teraphim statue* on the bed and a net of goat hair where his head would have been. 17 Saul said to Mi'chal: "Why did you trick

me like this and send my enemy^a away so that he could escape?" Mi'chal replied to Saul: "He said to me, 'Send me away, or I will kill you!"

18 Now David had run away and escaped, and he came to Samuel at Ra'mah.b He told him all that Saul had done to him. Then he and Samuel went away. and they stayed in Nai'oth.c **19** In time it was reported to Saul: "Look! David is in Nai'oth in Ra'mah." 20 At once Saul sent messengers to seize David. When they saw the elderly ones of the prophets prophesying and Samuel standing and presiding over them, the spirit of God came to be upon Saul's messengers, and they began behaving as prophets as well.

21 When they told it to Saul. he immediately sent other messengers, and they too began behaving as prophets. So Saul sent messengers again, a third group, and they too began behaving as prophets. 22 Finally he also went to Ra'mah. When he reached the great cistern that is in Se'cu, he asked: "Where are Samuel and David?" They replied: "There in Nai'othd in Ra'mah." 23 While Saul was on his way from there to Nai'oth in Ra'mah, the spirit of God came upon him as well, and he walked along behaving as a prophet until he came into Nai'oth in Ra'mah. 24 He also stripped off his garments, and he too behaved as a prophet before Samuel, and he lay there naked* all that day and all that night. That is why they say: "Is Saul also among the prophets?"e

20 Then David ran away from Nai'oth in Ra'mah. However, he came to Jon'a-than and said: "What have I done?" What is my offense, and how have I

sinned against your father for him to seek my life?"* 2 At this Jon'a than said to him: "It is unthinkable! You will not die. Look! My father will not do anything, great or small, without disclosing it to me. Why should my father hide this matter from me? This will not happen." 3 But David swore further and said: "Your father surely knows that I have found favor in your eyesb and would say, 'Do not let Jon'a than know this or he will be upset.' But as surely as Jehovah is living and as surely as you are* living, there is only a step between me and death!"c

4 Then Jon'a·than said to David: "Whatever you say," I will do for you." 5 David said to Jon'a·than: "Tomorrow is the new moon,d and I am certainly expected to sit with the king to eat; you must send me away, and I will hide in the field until the evening on the third day. 6 If your father misses me at all, then say, 'David begged me for permission to go quickly to his city Beth'le·hem,e because there is a yearly sacrifice there for all the family.' 7 If his response is, 'That is fine,' it means peace to your servant. But if he becomes angry, you can be sure that he is determined to harm me. 8 Show loval love to your servant,g for you have brought vour servant into Jehovah's covenant with vou.h But if I am guilty, put me to death yourself. Why turn me over to your father?"

9 To this Jon'a-than said: "It is unthinkable to suggest that about you! If I learn that my father is determined to harm you, would I not tell you?" 10 Then David said to Jon'a-than: "Who will tell me whether your father

"Remain Humble When Successful": (10 minutes)

David received praise from the people

1 Samuel 18:5-7: David began going out and was successful wherever Saul would send him. So Saul put him in charge of the fighting men, and this pleased all the people and the servants of Saul. When David and the others would return from striking down the Philistines, the women would come out from all the cities of Israel with song and dances to meet King Saul with tambourines, with rejoicing, and with lutes. The women who were celebrating would sing: "Saul has struck down his thousands, And David his tens of thousands."

w04 4/1 15 paragraph 4

Soon this shepherd boy would rise to national fame. He was called to attend to the king and to play music for him. He killed the warrior Goliath, a giant so fierce that even the seasoned soldiers of Israel feared to face him. Placed over the men of war, David successfully battled the Philistines. The people loved him. They composed songs lauding him. Earlier, an adviser to King Saul described young David not only as one "skilled at playing" the harp but also as "a valiant, mighty man and a man of war and an intelligent speaker and a well-formed man."—1 Samuel 16:18; 17:23, 24, 45-51; 18:5-7.

Jehovah gave David success in all he did

1 Samuel 18:14: David continued to have success in all he did, and Jehovah was with him.

David remained humble

1 Samuel 18:22, 23: Further, Saul ordered his servants: "Speak to David secretly and say, 'Look! The king is pleased with you, and all his servants are fond of you. So now form a marriage alliance with the

king." When Saul's servants told David these things, David said: "Is it a trivial matter to you to form a marriage alliance with the king when I am a man poor and lightly esteemed?"

w18.01 28 paragraphs 6-7

6 Some people become proud because of their good looks, popularity, musical ability, physical prowess, or exalted position. David had not just one of these assets but all of them; yet, he remained humble throughout his life. After he killed Goliath and was offered the daughter of King Saul to be his wife, David said: "Who am I and who are my relatives, my father's family in Israel, for me to become son-in-law to the king?" (1 Samuel 18:18) What helped David remain humble? The qualities, abilities, and privileges David had were because God 'stooped down,' or humbled himself, to pay attention to him. (Psalm 113:5-8) David knew that he did not possess anything good that he had not received from Jehovah.—Compare 1 Corinthians 4:7.

7 Like David, Jehovah's people today strive to show humility. We are awed by the knowledge that Jehovah, the greatest Person in the universe, manifests the appealing quality of humility. (Psalm 18:35) We take to heart the inspired counsel: "Clothe yourselves with the tender affections of compassion, kindness, humility, mildness, and patience." (Colossians 3:12) We also know that love "does not brag, does not get puffed up." (1 Corinthians 13:4) When we show humility, people may be drawn to Jehovah. Just as husbands can be won without a word by the conduct of their wives, others can be drawn to God by the humility shown by his people.—1 Peter 3:1.

Spiritual Gems

1 Samuel 19:23, 24—In what way might King Saul have behaved "as a prophet"?

1 Samuel 19:23, 24: While Saul was on his way from there to Naioth in Ramah, the spirit of God came upon him as well, and he walked along behaving as a prophet until he came into Naioth in Ramah. He also stripped off his garments, and he too behaved as a prophet before Samuel, and he lay there naked all that day and all that night. That is why they say: "Is Saul also among the prophets?"

it-2 695-696

Though appointed by Jehovah's spirit, it does not appear that the prophets spoke continually under inspiration. Rather, God's spirit 'came upon them' at certain times, revealing the messages to be announced. (Ezekiel 11:4, 5; Micah 3:8) This had a stirring effect upon them, impelling them to speak. (1 Samuel 10:10; Jeremiah 20:9; Amos 3:8) Not only did they do things that were out of the ordinary but also their expression and manner doubtless reflected intensity and feeling that were truly extraordinary. This may explain in part what is meant by individuals' "behaving like prophets." (1 Samuel 10:6-11; 19:20-24; Jeremiah 29:24-32; compare Acts 2:4, 12-17; 6:15; 7:55.) Their total concentration and zealous boldness in their mission might cause their behavior to appear strange, even irrational, to others, just as a prophet so appeared to military chiefs when Jehu was anointed. Yet, on realizing that the man was a prophet, the chiefs accepted his message with full seriousness. (2) Kings 9:1-13; compare Acts 26:24, 25.) When Saul, in pursuit of David, was caused to 'behave like a prophet,' he stripped off his garments and lay "naked all that day and all that night," during which time David evidently escaped. (1 Samuel 19:18–20:1) This does not mean that prophets frequently went naked, for the Biblical record shows the contrary. In the two other cases recorded, the prophet went naked for a purpose, to represent some facet of his prophecy. (Isaiah 20:2-4; Micah 1:8-11) The reason for Saul's nakedness—whether to show him as a mere man, divested of his royal garments, impotent against Jehovah's own regal authority and power, or for some other purpose—is not stated.

INCREASE YOUR JOY IN THE MINISTRY

Help Bible Students to Overcome Unclean Habits

Clearly explain Jehovah's moral standards, the reasons for them, and the benefits of following them. Focus on helping your students to change their pattern of thinking, and their actions will follow. (Eph 4:22-24) Assure them that with

Jehovah's help they can overcome an ingrained bad habit. (Php 4:13) Teach them to supplicate Jehovah when they experience the urge to sin. Help them to recognize tempting situations that they should avoid. Encourage them to replace unclean habits with wholesome activities. Joy results from seeing Bible students succeed in making changes with Jehovah's help.

Help Your Bible Students to . . . Overcome Unclean Habits By Anthony Morris III, Governing Body Member

Bro. Morris:

In this part of our symposium, we are addressing why and how to help our Bible students overcome unclean habits. Now, first of all, why overcome unclean habits?

As teachers, we need to reach the heart of those we study with, to understand that the God we worship expects this to stop. Let me show you a verse that you're familiar with, many of you, in Peter's letter —1 Peter chapter one. And we could use these thoughts here to endeavor to reach the heart of those who we're studying with, why this unclean habit must stop. Let's read verses 14 through 16: "As obedient children, stop being molded "by the desires you formerly had in your ignorance, "but like the Holy One who called you, "become holy yourselves in all your conduct, "for it is written: 'You must be holy, because I am holy."

So it's very clear here. There are things that our Bible studies practiced before —these unclean habits in their ignorance, before they knew Jehovah, before they knew his requirements. They need to understand he is the Holy One, and they have to have their conduct line up with the Holy One that we worship. And this is not a suggestion, as quoting the scripture here in verse 16, it's a must. They must be holy because Jehovah is holy.

Now, in the following dramatization, note how Neeta helps her Bible student to overcome an unclean habit.

Jade: Neeta and I talked about it. Part of me felt a bit scared, part a bit crazy. Me knocking on doors? But I knew this was the right thing to do.

Speaker: 'A minister should also be free 'from all nonmedical use of addictive or mind-altering substances.'

Jade(Neeta and two brothers meet to discuss Jade's readiness to be an unbaptized witness): Nonmedical? But taking something when I'm feeling a little stressed, like maybe, I don't know, a little weed —that's OK, right? And it's for the stress. I guess I didn't quite understand what "medical" meant.

First Brother: So will we see you during the week? Yeah.

Second Brother: Thank you, Jade.

Neeta: We'll be back.

Jade: You can guess what our next few studies were about. "And you should continue to be made new in your dominant mental attitude." Knowing it was wrong was easy. Figuring out how to cope without it wasn't.

Jade: Beating it felt impossible.

Jade(in service): Being free of it to serve Jehovah felt amazing!

Bro Morris:

Next, let's discuss the "how to help." We see how our Sister Neeta endeavored to help her Bible student when she became aware of that unclean habit. But there are some nice thoughts as to how to help our Bible students overcome unclean habits.

Now, we want to be candid and clear from the Scriptures, but always remember, we need to be warm and we need to be tactful with them. These habits have a grip on them, and we need to display not a judgmental attitude but patience and, really, just imitating Jehovah, helping them to apply Bible counsel. Now, it's important for the teacher to understand what we're going to share with you next, and then, if you have it clear, you're going to be able to impart it to your Bible student.

Let's read a familiar scripture in Ephesians chapter 4. And it's important to understand what we read here as related to helping them overcome unclean habits that go contrary to Bible principles.

Now notice in Ephesians chapter 4, verses 22, 23, and 24: "You were taught to put away the old personality "that conforms to your former course of conduct "and that is being corrupted according to its [that's the old personality] "deceptive desires. "And you should continue to be made new "in your dominant mental attitude, "and should put on the new personality "that was created according to God's will in true righteousness and loyalty." So we have to understand this clearly, and then we need to teach our students.

There's the old personality. Those of us that came in the truth had old personalities. We know exactly what Paul is writing to the Ephesians about —and that's a former course of conduct that is no longer acceptable. But the key to being able to put on the new personality and put away the old one is found in verse 23: "Be made new in your dominant mental attitude." So, what does that mean? That means your Bible students' thinking has to change. The thinking has to change into this new personality —thinking that's guided and directed by Jehovah and his Word.

Now to illustrate what I mean by that, I'll tell you a personal experience with a Bible study that I had many years ago, and I really appreciated how Jehovah helped him. Now, when I studied with him, he was 70, early 70's, and he had smoked cigarettes since he was eight years old. That's phenomenal. I smoked before I became one of Jehovah's Witnesses. But decades? No. So, smoking had a grip on him, that old personality, and that was very discouraging and difficult for him. However, he was making progress, coming to meetings.

And this one example that happened with his life will illustrate the point we're making here. So, I'm working in a department there at the convention, and it's near the lobby area. And I notice my Bible study head out, and the program is ongoing. He heads out the door. And out of personal interest (not to police him) I went to go see; is he OK? So, he's about a block down from the lobby of the convention center, and you know what? Smoking a cigarette. So, he notices me come up behind him, and it just hits him, and he's contrite. The shame is all in his face, and he throws that cigarette down and stomps it with his shoe. So, when I get close to him, he says: "I just— I've been asking Jehovah, 'Forgive me; forgive me.' When this happens, I always ask him to forgive me."

And I said: "Well, that's commendable. "That's so important. I know you love Jehovah. "However, here's what you need to learn. "See, you need to approach Jehovah before, "and supplicate him before you take that cigarette."

And that's where our Bible students need help. It's important that they have to supplicate Jehovah before that unclean habit overwhelms them. And I'm happy to say he did. He turned his back on that. He supplicated Jehovah. And boy, imagine smoking all those decades, and he died a faithful servant of Jehovah God.

So, help your Bible students. And keep that in mind; they have to change their thinking, and it's our responsibility to make that clear to them.

Now, teach them too by means of practical assistance. Be a dear friend for them; stay there for them. Be available when they need help with something, and just love them. Don't be judgmental. Be supportive, and help them to overcome these unclean habits.

And very important, teach them, "'Do not give up.' Jehovah loves you. "He wants you to rejoice in the progress you're making. He loves you." And what you'll experience when they become a dedicated Witness, your fellow servant of God, you will have a friend forever.

A Work That Calls for Humility

1 God's Word admonishes us to be "humble in mind, not paying back injury for injury . . . but, to the contrary, bestowing a blessing." (1 Peter 3:8, 9) That counsel certainly applies in the preaching work. Indeed, the Christian ministry can be a test of our humility.


2 Humility is a quality that helps us to endure unpleasant situations. When preaching, we approach strangers uninvited, knowing that some will respond in an unkind manner. To keep preaching in the face of such treatment takes humility. In one particularly difficult territory, two pioneer sisters went from door to door every day for two years without getting anyone to answer! However, they persevered, and today there are two congregations in that area.


3 Handling Rudeness: Humility will help us to imitate Jesus when others are unkind or impolite. (1 Peter 2:21-23) At one home a sister met with verbal abuse, first by the wife and then by the husband, who ordered her off the property. The sister simply smiled and said that she hoped to talk to them at another time. This so impressed the couple that they listened to the next Witness who called and accepted an invitation to attend a meeting at the Kingdom Hall. The sister who had initially been rebuffed was there to greet them and to give them a further witness. We too may soften unreceptive ones by displaying "a mild temper and deep respect."—1 Peter 3:15; Proverbs 25:15.

4 Avoid Arrogance: Our knowledge of the Bible provides no basis for looking down on people or referring to them in disparaging terms. (John 7:49) Rather, God's Word counsels us "to speak injuriously of no one." (Titus 3:2) When we are lowly in heart, as Jesus was, we refresh others. (Matthew 11:28, 29) A humble approach adds appeal to our message.

5 Yes, humility helps us to persevere in difficult territory. It can soften unreceptive ones, and it attracts others to the Kingdom message. Above all, it pleases Jehovah, who "gives undeserved kindness to the humble ones."—1 Peter 5:5.

- ²³ For a brief period, Satan will be given an opportunity to lure mankind away from serving God. What will that test be? No doubt, each individual will face an issue similar to the one that confronted Adam and Eve—either accept Jehovah's standards, support his rulership, and worship him or rebel against God and support Satan.
- 24 Read Revelation 20:7-10. Significantly, those who rebel at the end of the thousand years are called Gog and Magog. They exhibit traits similar to those shown by the rebels who Ezekiel prophesied would attack God's people during the great tribulation. That earlier horde, "Gog of the land of Magog," was divided into nations that opposed Jehovah's rule. (Ezek. 38:2) Similarly, those who rebel at the end of Christ's Millennial Rule are described as "nations." This is a telling description. Why? Because during the Thousand Year Reign, all nationalistic divisions will have been removed; all people will be subjects of one government, God's Kingdom. We will

belong to one spiritual nation. By calling these rebels Gog and Magog and saying that they are "nations," the prophecy indicates that Satan will be successful in fostering divisions among some of God's people. None will be forced to take Satan's side. Each perfect individual will make his or her own choice.

²⁵ How many will join Satan? The number of those who rebel are "as the sand of the sea." This expression does not necessarily mean that a large percentage of mankind will rebel. How do we know? Consider the promise made to Abraham. Jehovah said that Abraham's offspring would become like "the grains of sand on the seashore." (Gen. 22:17, 18) Yet, the number who made up his offspring ended up being 144,001 individuals. (Gal. 3:16, 29) That figure, while significant, is only a fraction of the total number of mankind. Similarly, the number who join Satan may be significant, but it will not be overwhelming. The rebels will pose no great threat to Jehovah's loyal servants.

25, 26. How many will join Satan, and what will happen to them?





When you are perfect, you will stand before Jehovah on your own merit, completely without sin SEE PARAGRAPH 28

27-29. What awaits those who pass the final test?

- ²⁶ Those who join the rebellion will quickly be wiped out. Along with Satan and the demons, they will cease to exist—with no prospect of ever coming back to life. Only their bad decisions and the consequences of those decisions will be remembered for all time.—Rev. 20:10.
- ²⁷ On the other hand, those who pass the final test will have their names permanently inscribed in "the book of life." (Rev. 20:15) Then, as a united family, all of Jehovah's loyal sons and daughters will give him the worship he so rightly deserves.
- ²⁸ Think of that future. Ahead of you is a life of rewarding work and enriching friendships. Never again will you or your loved ones need to suffer. On your own merit, you will stand before Jehovah completely without sin. Every person will have an unrestricted friendship with God. And most important of all, in heaven and on earth, pure worship will be carried out in perfection. That will be the ultimate restoration of pure worship!
- ²⁹ Will you be there to see that great day? You can be if you continue to apply the three key lessons from the book of Ezekiel—offer Jehovah exclusive devotion, remain united

in clean worship, and demonstrate love for others. The prophecies of Ezekiel offer one final, fundamental lesson. What is that?

"Know That I Am Jehovah"

30 Throughout the book of Ezekiel, the declaration "they will have to know that I am Jehovah" recurs like a drum beat. (Ezek. 6:10; 39:28) For God's enemies, that declaration will mean war and death. They will be compelled to do more than acknowledge that Jehovah exists. They will learn the hard way the meaning of his great name—"He Causes to Become." "Jehovah of armies" will become "a powerful warrior" who will fight against them. (1 Sam. 17:45; Ex. 15:3) Too late, they will understand an essential truth about Jehovah: Nothing can stop him from fulfilling his purpose.

31 To God's people, the declaration "they will have to know that I am Jehovah" will mean peace and life. Jehovah will cause us to become what he originally intended us to be—sons and daughters who perfectly reflect his qualities. (Gen. 1:26) Already, Jehovah has become to us a loving Father and a protective Shepherd. Soon he will become our conquering King. Before that day arrives, let us take to heart Ezekiel's message. Let us prove by our words and actions each day that we know who Jehovah is and what he stands for. Then, when the destructive winds of the great tribulation are released, we will not be afraid. On the contrary, we will lift our heads up, for we will know that our deliverance is near. (Luke 21:28) In the meantime, may we help people everywhere to know and love the only God worthy of worship, the One with the greatest of all names—Jehovah.—Ezek. 28:26.



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

Jehovah Is Our Refuge

PREVIEW

Jehovah is our best Friend. We treasure our friendship with him, and we want to get to know him better. It takes time to get to know someone. This is also true when we want to continue developing a relationship with Jehovah. In view of the hectic lives we lead, how can we make the time to draw close to our heavenly Father, and how will we benefit by doing so?

Make "the Best Use of Your Time"

"Keep strict watch that how you walk is not as unwise but as wise persons, making the best use of your time."

—EPH. 5:15, 16.

WE LOVE spending time with people we care about. A happily married couple like nothing better than to spend a quiet evening together. Young people enjoy the company of their close friends. And all of us cherish the time we spend with fellow believers. Above all, however, we love spending time with our God. We can do this by praying to him, by reading his Word, and by meditating on his purpose and his beautiful qualities. The time we spend with Jehovah is very precious indeed!—Ps. 139:17.

- ² Although we enjoy spending time with Jehovah, we face a challenge. We lead busy lives, which can make it difficult for us to schedule time for spiritual activities. Secular work, family responsibilities, and other necessary activities can demand so much of our time that we may feel that we are just too busy to pray, study, or meditate.
- ³ There is another more subtle threat to our time. If we are not careful, we could allow activities that are not wrong in themselves to rob us of time that we could use to draw closer to Jehovah. For example, consider the matter of recreation. We all benefit from an occasional change of pace. But even wholesome recreation can cut

into our time to the point that there is little time left for spiritual activities. We need to keep recreation in its place. -Prov. 25:27; 1 Tim. 4:8.

4 In this article, we will consider why we need to set proper priorities. We will also discuss how we can make the best use of our time with Jehovah and how we can benefit from this wise use of our time.

MAKE WISE CHOICES; SET PROPER PRIORITIES

⁵ Choose the best course in life. Young people are often concerned about the best way to spend their life. On the one hand, school guidance counselors and unbelieving family members may urge them to pursue higher education in preparation for a prestigious career in the world. That path would likely consume a great deal of their time. On the other hand, parents and friends in the congregation may encourage young people to spend their life in Jehovah's service. What can help a young person who loves Jehovah to make the best decision? He would benefit by reading **Ephesians 5:15-17** and meditating on it. (Read.) After reading these verses, a young person might ask himself: 'What is "the will of Jehovah"? What decision will please him? Which path will result in my making the best use of my time?' Remember, "the days are wicked," and this system ruled by Satan will soon come to an end. It would be wise

on our part to use our life in a way that will endear us to Jehovah.

⁶ Set proper priorities. Sometimes, making the best use of our time involves choosing between two activities that are not wrong in themselves. The well-known account about Jesus' visit to the home of Mary and Martha illustrates the point. No doubt thrilled to receive Jesus as her guest, hospitable Martha set about preparing an elaborate meal. Meanwhile, her sister, Mary, took advantage of the visit to sit close to her Lord and listen to his teaching. While Martha was certainly motivated by the best of intentions, Mary "chose the best portion." (Luke 10:38-42, ftn.) In time, Mary may have forgotten what food was served on that occasion, but we can be sure that she never forgot what she learned from Jesus. Just as Mary cherished that limited time with Jesus, we cherish our time with Jehovah. How can we make the best use of that time?

MAKE THE BEST USE OF YOUR TIME WITH JEHOVAH

⁷ Recognize that prayer, study, and meditation are part of our worship. When we pray, we are communicating with our heavenly Father, who loves us dearly. (Ps. 5:7) When we study the Bible, we are taking in "the knowledge of God." who is the Source of all wisdom. (Prov. 2:1-5) When we meditate. we are considering Jehovah's appealing

> personality as well as his awe-inspiring purpose for all creation and how we fit into that purpose. Can you think of a better way to use your time? But how can we get the most from the limited time at our disposal?

> ⁸ If possible, choose a quiet setting. Consider the example of Jesus. Before he undertook his earthly ministry, Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness. (Luke 4: 1, 2) In that quiet setting, Jesus could pray to Jehovah and meditate on his Father's will for him. Doing so no doubt prepared Jesus for the tests that would soon come his way. How can you benefit from Jesus' example? If you are a member of a large family, it may not always be possible for you to find a quiet place at home. In that case, you might look for an appropriate setting outdoors. That is what Julie does when she wants to spend time with Jehovah in prayer. She and her husband live in a small apartment in France, and it is difficult to be alone and uninterrupted. "So I go for a walk in the park every day," Julie explains. "There I can be alone, concentrate, and really talk to Jehovah."

⁹ Jesus lived a very busy life. During his earthly ministry, he was followed from place to place by crowds of people, all of whom were making demands on his time. On one occasion, "the whole city was gathered right at the door" to see him. Even so, Jesus arranged time to care for his own relationship with Jehovah. Before sunrise, he found "an isolated place" where he could spend time alone with his Father.—Mark 1:32-35.

¹⁰ On the final night of his life on earth, as his ministry came to an end, Jesus again sought out a quiet setting where he could meditate and pray. He found that setting in the garden of Gethsemane. (Matt. 26:36) On that occasion, Jesus gave his disciples some timely counsel about prayer.

¹¹ Consider what happened. When they arrived at the garden of Gethsemane, it was very late, perhaps past midnight. Jesus asked the apostles to "keep on the watch," and he went off to pray. (Matt. 26:37-39) But while he was pray-

ing, they fell asleep. When he found them sleeping, Jesus again urged them to "keep on the watch and pray continually." (Read Matthew 26:40, 41.) He realized that they had been under much stress and that they were tired. Jesus compassionately acknowledged that "the flesh is weak." Still, two more times Jesus went off to pray, and when he returned he found his disciples sleeping rather than praying.—Matt. 26:42-45.

12 Choose the right time. We may at times feel too stressed or too tired to pray. If that has happened to you, you are not alone. What can you do? Some who were accustomed to approaching Jehovah in prayer at the end of the day have found it helpful to spend time in prayer a little earlier in the evening when they are less tired. Others have found that the position they assume when praying can have a beneficial effect. What, though, if you feel too anxious or too discouraged to pray?

Tell Jehovah how you feel. You can be sure that our merciful Father will understand.—Ps. 139:4.

¹³ Resist distractions when you study. Prayer is not the only avenue we can use to strengthen our bond with Jehovah. A study of God's Word and attendance at congregation meetings can also help us to draw closer to God. Is there anything you can do to make the best use of study periods and the time you spend at congregation meetings? Ask yourself, 'What tends to interfere with my concentration during the meetings or when I am trying to study?' Could it be receiving calls, emails, or text messages on your smartphone or on some other electronic device? Today billions of people own these useful tools. Some researchers suggest that when we are trying to concentrate, just having a smartphone nearby can distract us. "Your focus is not on the task at hand," says a professor of psychology. "Your

mind is elsewhere." Before assemblies and conventions, we are often told to adjust our electronic devices to a setting that will not disturb others. Could we do the same when we are alone so that our devices do not disturb us and interrupt our time with Jehovah?

¹⁴ Ask Jehovah to help you focus. When you notice that your mind is wandering during a study period or a congregation meeting, ask Jehovah to help you. If you are worried or anxious, it may not be easy to set your concerns aside and focus on spiritual things, but it is essential that you do so. Pray for the peace that will guard not only your heart but also your "mental powers."—Read Philippians 4:6, 7.

TIME SPENT WITH JEHOVAH IS REWARDING

15 If you take time to talk to, listen to, and think about Jehovah, you will benefit greatly. How so? First, you will make better decisions. The Bible assures us that "the one walking with the wise will become wise." (Prov. 13:20) So as vou spend time with the Source of wisdom, Jehovah, you will become wiser. You will better understand how to please him and how to avoid making choices that hurt him.

¹⁶ Second, you will become a better teacher. When we are studying the Bible with someone, one of our most important goals is to help our student draw close to Jehovah. The more we communicate with our heavenly Father, the more our own love for him will grow and the better equipped we will be to teach our student to love him. This was true of Jesus. He described his Father in such warm, loving terms that his faithful followers could not help but love Jehovah as well.—John 17:25, 26.

¹⁷ Third, your faith will grow stronger. Consider what happens when you ask God for guidance, comfort, or support. Each time Jehovah answers those prayers, your faith in him grows. (1 John 5:15) What else can help strengthen your faith? Personal study. After all, "faith follows the thing heard." (Rom. 10:17) However, to build strong faith, more is

required than merely taking in knowledge. What else do we need to do?

18 We need to meditate on what we are learning. Consider the experience of the writer of Psalm 77. He was distressed because he felt that he and his fellow Israelites had lost Jehovah's approval. Those anxious thoughts kept him up at night. (Verses 2-8) What did he do? He told Jehovah: "I will meditate on all your activity and ponder over your dealings." (Verse 12) Of course, the psalmist was well-aware of the things Jehovah had done for His people in the past, but the anxious man wondered: "Has God forgotten to show his favor, or has his anger caused his mercy to cease?" (Verse 9) The psalmist meditated on Jehovah's activity and on the fact that God had shown mercy and compassion in the past. (Verse 11) The result? The psalmist became convinced that Jehovah would not abandon His people. (Verse 15) In the same way, your faith will grow stronger as you meditate on

what Jehovah has already done for his people and on what he has done for you personally.

19 Fourth, and most important, your love for Jehovah will deepen. Love, more than any other quality, will motivate you to obey Jehovah, to make sacrifices in order to please him, and to endure any trial. (Matt. 22:37-39; 1 Cor. 13: 4, 7; 1 John 5:3) Nothing could be more precious than a close, loving friendship with Jehovah!—Ps. 63:1-8.

²⁰ Remember that prayer, study, and meditation are acts of worship. Like Jesus, seek out quiet settings in which to spend time with Jehovah. Eliminate unnecessary distractions. Ask Jehovah to help you focus when you are engaged in spiritual activities. If you make the best use of your time now, Jehovah will reward you with life forever in God's new world.—Mark 4:24.
